DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

We have been inundated with requests for information and anger regarding Essex County Council's Decision (again disappointedly without consultation) regarding bringing in a booking system to all refuse centres in the County. As we all know – One Size does not fit all, and the landscape of Uttlesford's refuse centre does not lend itself to traffic congestion and long queues and other difficulties recognised across the county. We have written to ECC regarding our disappointment and asking for the decision to be revisited and to stop the introduction in Uttlesford. If, when you read this the decision has not been changed, please contact us and Ray Gooding expressing your views.

Just as household budgets have been hit by spiralling costs, the Council is also facing significant budgetary pressures from factors outside its control, such as high inflation and rising utility bills. Its funding from central government has also been significantly reduced over a number of years. Within the budget papers is also a proposal for a below-inflation Council Tax increase of just £5 a year - about 10p per week for an average Band D property. This will generate an additional £195,000 that would be put into a Cost of Living Support Fund to provide Council Tax discounts to households who may be experiencing hardship, with a particular focus on those who are not eligible for other forms of support. This is in addition to the discounts for vulnerable and low income residents through its local Council Tax support scheme, which remains the most generous in Essex.

Petrina has been involved with the Local Government Association Debate Not Hate Campaign, The intimidation and abuse of councillors and officers undermines democracy. LGA's Debate Not Hate campaign aims to tackle the abuse and intimidation councillors and officers face from the public for carrying out their role. The so called Silly Season will soon be upon us, where the ante is upped. As Leader I receive some interesting communications! We are grateful for the measured response and support here.

The Officers at UDC have decided not to defend the refusal at Bedwell Rd, as the Independent Advisors have strongly recommended that they will not win. It is believed that costs are not awarded routinely just because one side loses; they are only awarded if the Inspector decides that one of the parties has indulged in 'unreasonable behaviour'. It is considered unreasonable if you ignore independent advice and continue procedurally. Here at a cost of £50k - £100k. There are over 55 Civil Parishes in Uttlesford. If the Council took a punt every time a Parish requested us to - despite the advice and the Council lost the appeal the costs could run into the millions. I appreciate that we all feel differently when it is our own parish, the Planning Director does have a have a duty not to expose the Council to unnecessary and excessive costs. The political leaders do not have any influence here.

ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL FEBRUARY 2023

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held on Wednesday 15 March 2023 at 8pm in the Village Hall. This meeting gives residents the opportunity to have their say on issues in the village. Essex County Councillor Ray Gooding, District Councillors Petrina Lees and Garry LeCount will give reports and be available to answer any questions. Everyone is welcome.

At the last Parish Council meeting Cllr. Gooding said he was going to write a letter to Essex Waste regarding their HGV vehicles driving through the villages. Essex County Council's legal department has advised him not to write the letter, but to work with the police on this matter.

Cllr. LeCount said he was disappointed that Elsenham Parish Council had voted at the last meeting not to continue with the 'No Airport Parking' signs in the village, the reason being that they thought this would only move the problem on to other roads. Although these signs were not enforceable, they had helped deter some airport parking in Stansted. Cllr. LeCount said he would continue with the signs and that he had a meeting with representatives of Stansted Airport at the beginning of March.

There had been no further correspondence regarding the repair of the war memorial in Church Lane, which had been damaged by the lorries delivering earth to the adjacent field. Allan Hathaway has very kindly offered to make a memorial with the original wood, although he will be restricted as there is very little of the original structure left.

Elsenham Youth Football Club (EYFC) were given permission to fence off an area, no larger than 12m by 20m, to store roll-on goals. The area would be in the far-left corner on entering the recreation ground from the car entry. However, planning permission may be required.

The Parish Council are to investigate the possibility of a legal licence agreement with EYFC, allowing them to play football on the Elsenham playing field for the next 25-30 years. The agreement for EYFC to play on the playing field has always been just a verbal agreement, with the club paying half towards the maintenance of the field. If a legal agreement was set up it would allow the club to apply for grants.

The appeal for the Rochester Properties planning application for 50 dwellings south of Bedwell Road, which was refused by Uttlesford District Council's Planning Department on the grounds of noise, is to be held on 21 March 2023. Disappointingly, Uttlesford District Council are not going to defend their decision. EPC Chairman, Cllr. Mott, has registered to speak at the appeal, against the application, on behalf of Elsenham and Ugley Parish Councils.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 6 March at 8pm in the Memorial Hall. All residents are welcome.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

At the last meeting of Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee, Dandara applied for detailed approval of their scheme to build 99 homes on two sites, 51 off Isabel Drive and 48 off Stansted Road. They have gone through three consultants and a dizzying six tranches of new documents in attempting to fulfil the Condition concerning noise. The tactic that emerged after this heroic struggle with reality was to say that they were sure they could meet the Condition, it's just that they're not in a position now but they should be able to make a separate application later, which will meet every noise requirement, such that the only problem could be intensity of the silence. The Parish Council was unimpressed with this promise of jam tomorrow and insisted that bread and butter must be offered today, and cited the refusal of the appeal into the application by Gladman for 220 homes north of Bedwell Road as a precedent.

Members of the Committee also took heed of the Urban Design Officer, who made some late adverse comments on some of the attempts to reduce the noise, and suggested that a couple of the houses should be removed altogether. After a fair amount of umming and aahing, the Committee decided to defer a decision so that Dandara could improve matters, although it wasn't very clear what it was exactly they're expected to improve.

Elsewhere near the M11, UDC's Planning Committee voted in July 2022 to refuse the application to build 50 homes to the south of Bedwell Road, having visited the site and taken due regard of the amount of noise. The applicants banged in an appeal in December, and, extraordinarily, UDC have decided not to defend their decision. It is impossible to know the full extent of discussions behind the scenes, but it seems that the applicants gave UDC seven days in which to agree not to contest the appeal, failing which they would apply for costs. However, costs are not awarded routinely just because one side loses; they are only awarded if the Inspector decides that one of the parties has indulged in 'unreasonable behaviour'. It seems unlikely that an Inspector would find it unreasonable to defend a decision to refuse 50 houses south of Bedwell Road when 220 north of Bedwell Road were refused at appeal. Indeed, it could more sensibly be claimed that not opposing the Appeal is unreasonable.

But there we are, and the Appeal will be heard by the Planning Inspectorate, PINS to those who know it well, at UDC's premises in Saffron Walden, but without their active participation, on March 21. Elsewhere, PINS has gone very quiet, prompting fears that its officers have joined others on strike without actually telling anyone. The Hearing into the application for another 200 homes by Bloor was heard as long ago as December 12, with no sign of a decision at the time of writing. The application for 130 south of the Crown seems to be emerging from a period of hibernation and a hearing might, or might not, be held on 13 April.



I am often asked what can I do about this or that, and who should I report it to. The rule of thumb is Is it an emergency? If so it's \$\infty\$ 999. For everything else it's \$\infty\$ 101.



Reporting it on Facebook won't bring you the help you need. It makes people aware of a problem in the area but they are not the people who can bring you help.

If you have a problem with noisy and disruptive neighbours and you have tried a polite word with them, keep a diary for a month of the times and dates and what type of noise.... shouting...music...noisy cars etc. Then call Uttlesford Council who have a department to report it to. If you are aware of drug taking, dealing or the growing and manufacturing of the plants let the police know, and your information will always be dealt with in confidence.

Unless we report all crimes the police are not aware of them and think our village is crime free, but by reporting all incidents to them they are then aware of the problems we have and keep an eye on the village. So many times, when I have been told of an incident, I have asked "Did you report it?" to be told "No it wasn't worth it". With all the information we give the Police they can build a pattern of where certain crimes are being committed and if you are making an insurance claim for something stolen an incident number will usually be needed.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

I was rather saddened to read in the local paper that the Crown Inn was closing its doors possibly for the last time. It opened for business as the Rose & Crown around 1770 before becoming the Crown Inn in 1840 following the coronation of Queen Victoria. It has served the village ever since in several capacities. Until the coming of the railway, it served as a way station for stagecoaches to surrounding towns and was for many years a thriving farrier business. During the war the USAF were stationed at Stansted Airport and we have recorded memories that they often frequented the Crown Inn and of course the long closed Robin Hood just around the corner in Robin Hood Road.. In the 1960s the local hunt used the Crown as a base of operations and could often be sighted cantering down Hall Road before galloping off across the fields. We must hope that if the pub's doors are shut, they re-open in the not too distant future.

Following last month's article about the village in the second World War, we coincidentally received an enquiry about military units stationed in Elsenham during that war. We have recorded memories from Gordon Barker who talked about troops being stationed at Elsenham Place during World War 2. He thought they were Royal Army Service Corps and he remembers their lorries being parked out of sight under the trees in Hall Road and Church Road. Gordon also said that he recalled the Royal Horse Artillery being billeted at Elsenham Place. There are other recollections of anti-aircraft guns being mounted at Gaunts End and Takeley and search lights positioned at Tye Green and of course we have already mentioned the USAF stationed at nearby Stansted Airport

Previously we had ascertained that during World War 1 the 60th Casualty Clearing Station (CCS) was set up in Elsenham Hall run by the Royal Army Medical Corps (Territorial Force) R.A.M.C.T. When they arrived is not clear but on 8th December 1915, musicians from the unit gave a concert - entrance one penny (1d) - in the Village Hall so were clearly well established by then.

There is more to be discovered about the above topics on our website, As well as Gordon's contribution, there are several other recordings of village residents past and present who shed light on village life in the last century. These recordings are accompanied by written transcripts to aid understanding. Please take the time to have a look, you won't be disappointed.

Our next meeting will take place on Wednesday 8th March 2023 and will include our AGM. The talk that evening will be given by Chris Bush and will recount the "Story of Park Road". As always, visitors will be very welcome for a small fee, just two pounds. This is the first meeting of the year however so for just five pounds, you can become a member and enjoy four interesting evenings of talks through the year. We look forward to saying hello.

We are so grateful for all the donations from fellow villagers to our 'Aid for Romania' appeals over the past few years. So, it was a privilege to be asked to join the organiser on a visit to see the late autumn lorry being delivered to our distribution centre last October.

It takes us 5 hours to load the lorry from our Great Chesterford barn and after 6 days travel we arrived in Mărăşeşti (about 4 hours drive north east of the capital Bucharest, not far from the Ukraine border). On arrival there was an army of local



church folk waiting to unload which they do in less than 2hrs! Whilst the staff sorted out the goods, we were able to see the very poor end of town (already a backwater in Romania). We visited one young mum with two children in her one room shack which comprised of upright wooden poles with sheets of ill-fitting plywood for the walls. Winter must have been hell with no insulation and holes in some of the sheets. The children ran about the 'yard' in bare feet whilst the husband tries to find casual labouring

work. She is shortly to lose her home to make way for a road extension and will have to re-build again elsewhere with no help from authorities. Her story used to be common in Romania, but we saw a lot better housing in this poor area since we last visited 5 years ago.

Back at the distribution centre they were ready to receive 40 poor families who had been invited by the Baptist minister we deal with out there. He knows a lot of the families in need both from within the church family and elsewhere in the town. Mostly it was the mums that came with their children, and they could choose suitable winter clothes for the whole family from our well stocked racks. Then they could have a box of kitchen equipment and a larger item of furniture (e.g. a single bed which will sleep up to 3 children out there or a chest of drawers) plus a chair or two.

After we had given all the free goods away the staff prepared the centre to be a charity shop selling the goods to the better off people in the town. The proceeds are used to part support the Baptist minister and help the poor section of the town with housing repairs and medical bills. Charity shops are unheard off in this area of Romania where the legacy of communism still lingers. Everyone just calls it the 'English shop' and its opening is eagerly awaited. The best sellers are beds and bikes.



So many thanks to all that have contributed over the past few years – your gifts are much appreciated. We next go in late April so please bring suitable goods to 1 Hall Close, Henham very soon as we will have to stop collecting and prepare the manifest for EU customs. Thought For The Month by Louis Wilson

In January, we started a brand-new monthly service for all our Sunday morning congregations in the Henham, Elsenham and Ugley Benefice. Our aim is that it should be a genuinely all age service suitable for everyone: the young, the old and the in-between. We want it to be engaging and interactive, and as clear and welcoming as possible so that when we say everyone's invited, you really are.

At the same time, there is a growing need for us to provide a regular service which is accessible to families and young children. The new all age service meets at 10.15 am each first Sunday of the month at Elsenham Village Hall (the school hall) on Elsenham High Street.

Over the coming months, as we meet together, we'll look at who Jesus is as presented in Mark's Gospel, from the moment he steps out into Galilee, to his death on a Roman cross a few short years later.

Along the way, we'll look at his identity. Who was Jesus? He claimed to be God himself come to earth - somehow fully God and fully human. He proved he was by healing the sick, feeding the crowds and making the unclean clean. He proved it by the authority with which

he taught and by his life of transparent compassion and godly obedience. But supremely, he proved his identity by conquering death and rising to new life.

We'll look at his mission. Why did Jesus come? Despite being God himself, he came not to be served, but to serve and to give his life as a ransom or payment for the sins of many. He is the suffering servant of Isaiah 53 to whom all the Old Testament scriptures point: pierced for our transgressions and crushed for our iniquities, so that we could be reconciled to the God who made us.

And finally, we'll look at his call. What does Jesus require? He gave himself for us freely and offers forgiveness at no cost. But then calls us to a life of costly obedience to him. Following Jesus really does bring life to the full, life in relationship with our maker as it's meant to be. But at the same time, Jesus warns that it will require self-denial, sacrifice and sometimes suffering. In the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, 'When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die.'

All of this means that Jesus is the King and Lord of all. We'd love to invite everyone, whatever your age, to come along to Elsenham Village Hall on the first Sunday of the month and meet the King.





NATURAL OUTLOOK

I have a much yellowed cutting from a sports page in *The Daily Telegraph* from Saturday 9 March 1963 headed 'First Race Meeting in England for 75 Days'. This was to mark the end of the legendary winter of 1962/63 with a meeting at Newbury. This winter hasn't been **that** bad and there have been some good bits in February but March has its ups and downs. When the sun



Some of the wild flowers opening now are deep yellow five petalled lesser celandines, with their low-growing spade-shaped dark green leaves, and coltsfoot, paler yellow, more daisy-like with scales on the flower stem; their leaves come after the flowers have all but faded. Deep purple violets and paler mauve dog violets will be around. In 'our' side of Alsa Wood there are a few delicate white wood anemones and in grassier places are lovely mid-blue, low-growing germander speedwells and their blue and white 'cousin', the common field speedwell. Flying about and enjoying the flowers, wild or garden, are some of the early butterflies; yellow brimstones, peacocks and small tortoiseshells.

In fine weather bird song erupts and robins, dunnocks and wrens can be heard in hedges, shrubs and trees along New Road, Station Road and The Spinney and a sole collared dove calls with his repetitive 'What do you think what do you think?' Males in species which have not paired for life do this to claim territories and/or attract mates. I hope very much to hear at least one song thrush, especially along Station Road where, until recently, there were three calling males, well-spaced and staking their claims. Last year there was only one in a back garden. Blackbirds. starlings, sparrows, robins and blue tits are among those busy nest building. Sparrows and blue tits are quite happy to occupy nest boxes but these will probably need you to clear them out to get rid of insects and other pests. Robins might also use them but I have had them building in sheds where the door was wonky, in tatty old garden pots and so forth. Blackbirds make their own nests in bushes, shrubs, hedges or garden trellises. I have seen them carrying twigs, wet leaves from the pond and finally drier stuff to finish the lining. 'Our' starlings won't be able to get into the loft this year as we have had it 'fixed' so maybe they will choose somewhere under the eaves or gutters. Waiting outside Tesco's I watched a magpie fly across from the silver birch with a twig in its beak to go to a tree behind the shop and then do it again.

If enough water stays in our watercourse we should get frogspawn, which this year should actually be fertile so that we get tadpoles. The newts in the pond **did** produce and teeny newtlets were seen. What I don't want to see is a repeat of that 'orange Sahara dust' that was blown up on warm, southerly winds. The rain washed some of it down on to car roofs, house roofs and the earth and sometimes the higher clouds of it gave an orangey tinge to the daylight.

ST MARY'S CHURCH - ANNEXE

It is some years since we wrote about the progress being made to build an annexe at St. Mary's Church to provide toilets and refreshment facilities, that is because there had been no progress.

Having obtained planning permission to build an annexe to the north of the church we found the cost to be prohibitive. Various options were explored to reduce the cost, but to no avail. Alternative schemes were explored, including siting a small building on the other side of Church Lane, but again we found that this would cost more than we could afford.

Now for the good news. Working with a new architect we have designed a smaller annexe, using cheaper materials, which will be sited further from the church in the north-west corner of the churchyard at the top of the concrete spine that gives access to the car parking. A planning application is currently being considered by Uttlesford District Council and we are hoping to receive approval in the next month or so. Once obtained we will need to gain permission from the Diocese of Chelmsford to build on church land, and this will include the equivalent of Listed Building planning consent.

All being well we hope to be able to move on to the next stages of the project, employing a structural engineer, organizing an archaeological survey of the site and so on in the spring. Watch this space – we hope to bring you further updates in the coming months.



THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) recently published analysis of the 2021 Census. Nationally, this showed that the population of England grew by 6% in the last 10 years and 14% over the last 20 years. Locally, the increase has been much faster. The population of The Hundred Parishes in 2021 was around 156,000, up 12% since 2011 and 24% since 2001. If roads seem busier, these extra 30,000 people are a major factor.

Half of the increase is accounted for by six parishes close to Stansted Airport. Elsenham, Flitch Green, Great Dunmow, Little Canfield, Stansted Mountfitchet and Takeley have each expanded by more than 50% in the last 20 years. Another big growth was seen in Buntingford: from 4,300 in 2001 to 7,900 in 2021.

The Census is the modern equivalent of the Domesday Book produced in 1086 AD when the national population was less than 2 million, compared to 60 million today.

Today, 8% of the Hundred Parishes population was born outside the UK (compared to 17% in the whole of England and Wales); 10% of homes are flats (v 22%); 36% of houses have 4 or more bedrooms (v 21%); 27% of homes are rented (v 37%); 40% of adults work at home (v 31%); 55% are in professional or managerial jobs (v 46%); 56% of households have 2 or more vehicles (v 35%). We have a different age mix to the UK average, with a shortfall of around 5,000 people in their 20s and 30s offset by around 5,000 extra people aged over 40.

While the previous paragraph highlights contrasts, some statistics are closely aligned with the national picture: 99% of households have central heating; 5% of households have a second home; 51% of the population is female and 49% male.



GROWING UP IN ELSENHAM

I moved to No. 11, Gilbey Cottages, when newly built in 1953. It was a snowy February day and I was aged 11. My Father, Bob Jaggard worked at Mill Farm as a herdsman and milkman. I would sit fascinated as he milked the freesian cows by hand and watched the milk going through the sterilising machine. I would help him put the cardboard tops on the milk bottles. Then he would often take me on his milk round in Elsenham, Gaunts End and Tye Green. On arriving at Gaunts End, a quiet little road, he would let me sit on his lap and steer the little green milk van. I thought I was driving!

Mill Farm's cows grazed on the meadows that is now Franklin Drive housing estate. My Dad worked with Percy Mason from Broxted who went to work on a motorbike. He also worked with Frank Smith, who also lived in Gilbey Cottages. He was a herdsman and horseman, tending two shire horses, Joey and Peter. He would walk the horses to Fred Halls, the local blacksmith to be shod.

Alsa Wood, now at the top of Isabel Drive, was the adventure playground. Two ponds on the wood edge have now sadly dried up. They were full of newts, we loved to catch them. We also took frogspawn home in jam jars to watch them grow into newts then take them back to the ponds.

Wild strawberries grew in the bushes and long grass. We would pick and eat them in the sunshine.

Prior to Mill Close being built behind Gilbey Cottages we would walk out of the back of our garden. We would search for mushrooms growing fresh in the meadow for our breakfast.

COOKERY CORNER

This dessert has been chosen as one of the classes in the baking section of the Flower Show this year. It is easy to make and a real treat to eat.

BUTTERSCOTCH APPLE MERINGUE (serves 6-8)

1lb (450g) cooking apples, peeled, cored and chopped

1½oz (40g) cornflour

1 tablespoon golden syrup

2oz (50g) unrefined light muscovado sugar

1oz (25g) butter

2 tablespoons fresh single cream

2 large eggs, separated

3½oz (100g) caster sugar

Preheat the oven to 150°C/130°C fan/gas 2.

Cook the apples in a little water until tender. Blend the cornflour with a small amount of the milk.

Heat the remaining milk with the syrup, brown sugar and butter, until boiling. Add to the cornflour mixture and return to the pan. Bring to the boil and simmer for three to four minutes.

Stir in the cream and egg yolks, then reheat without boiling, before gently folding in the apple. Pour into an ovenproof serving dish.

Whisk the egg whites until stiff, then whisk in most of the caster sugar. Fold in the remaining caster sugar and place the meringue over the apple mixture.

Bake for 20-25 minutes or until the meringue is brown and crisp. Serve hot or cold.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: I remember my Mum used to make a pudding like this, she always added some coconut to the apple mixture.

THE BIRDCAGE by Eve Chase Reviewed by Marion Giles for Elsenham Book Group

'When half-sisters Lauren, Flora, and Kat are unexpectedly summoned to the Cornish house where they spent their childhood summers, it's the first time they've dared return.

Because the wild cliffs and windswept beaches hide a twentyyear-old secret. The truth about what they did.

Someone who remembers them lurks in the shadows, watching their every move. And there are other secrets, even darker than their own, waiting to be unearthed So says the blurb on the back of the book.

The Birdcage was this month's choice for the book group.

Charlie is a famous artist. Every summer, he leaves his London studio to return to his Cornish studio where his parents live. His mother is very keen on birds and has an African parrot and an aviary full of budgies.

The girls, who have different mothers, spend each summer with their father and grandparents in Cornwall. During the summer of 1999, Charlie decides to paint a portrait of his daughters set against a huge ornate birdcage. Also in 1999, there was to be a solar eclipse which attracted many visitors to Cornwall. The painting of the portrait and the solar eclipse dominate the back story. The flashbacks to 1999 are full of cultural references which we all enjoyed.

The girls have a lot of freedom to roam about on the beaches and in caves and on the headland in between sitting for the portrait. Angle is employed to supervise the girls but is more interested in Charlie. Viv, who cleans for them also seems quite close to Charlie and her daughter, Gemma, spends time with the girls, particularly Lauren.

An event that occurs that summer fractures the family and from then the sisters rarely spend time together. When Lauren's mother, Dixie, dies they attend the funeral and the following January, Charlie invites them to Cornwall as he wishes to make an announcement. So, 20 years later they are reunited in Cornwall and secrets, sibling rivalries, memories and jealousy surfaces.

Each chapter of the story reveals a little more about the sisters. The events of summer 1999 are also revealed little by little. This is the downside of the book as the final reveal is held back until the end of the book. The present day story felt laboured and overly drawn out meaning that we were impatient and so speculated about what happened, to whom and who was involved. All of us in the book group had more or less guessed all the secrets... and so this left us all with a bit of an anti-climatic feeling.
