## ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL 1 NOVEMBER 2021

John Minor has resigned from the Parish Council. The council would like to thank him for all the work he has done for the village over many years.



Two new councillors have been co-opted onto the Parish Council and will start their duties at next month's Parish Council meeting. However, the council is still looking for a further two members, so if you are interested, please read the advert in this magazine, p34.

Uttlesford District Council has issued the technical studies brought forward in the 'Call for Sites'. The Planning Committee is working on a response to the accuracy of the data. Five sites have been highlighted for Elsenham, three are housing developments and two are housing and employment. The largest site of 500 houses surrounds Tye Green. Although these sites have been put forward, they will not necessarily form part of Uttlesford District Council's new local plan.

The Inspector refused the Gladman appeal for 220 new homes on Bedwell Road, on the grounds of unacceptable noise. However, it was very disappointing that the inspector stated, 'I do not accept that Elsenham has reached its limit in terms of development'. Gladman could challenge the refusal on the appeal in the High Courts. There is a deadline of six weeks, so the appeal would need to be submitted before 6 December 2021.

The Parish Council have eleven plots on the Smith Road allotments that are currently unallocated. So, if anyone is interested in taking on a plot, please email the Parish Clerk. louise.epc@gmail.com, meanwhile the plots will be strimmed and covered to stop the weeds growing.

Frances Lambert, who resigned from the Parish Council last month, has very kindly agreed to remain as the Village Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator. There has been a slow increase in the number of passengers using the buses since the decline during Covid lockdown, hopefully this will continue.

A working party is being arranged to make the footpath that runs alongside Alsa Wood more accessible.

Stansted, Henham and Elsenham Parish Councils will meet with Fiona Gardiner from UDC, to discuss the current arrangement with the PCSO. The Parish Council wants to make sure they are getting value for money.

The PCSO is sometimes called away from her duties in the villages to attend other incidents in the district. The Parish Council would also like to see her patrolling the village regularly.

The next Parish Council meeting will be 6 December 2021, 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

Prior to Climate Change Conference 26, Uttlesford District Council passed, 'The Chair's Charter.' It is a new scheme aimed at encouraging residents, businesses, schools and other organisations to take small, practical steps to reduce their carbon footprint and single-use plastics waste.

The Charter was adopted by Uttlesford District Council as part of its commitment to taking positive action on the climate crisis and the current Chair, Cllr Arthur Coote, will be working across parties to promote and further the cause.

As part of the scheme the council has made three initial pledges:

- to encourage local businesses to reduce their use of single-use plastics with a commitment to reducing their carbon footprint
- to work with schools to reduce their plastic waste and investigate different ways to reuse and recycle
- to educate and encourage council staff to reduce single-use plastic waste.

As part of the scheme, residents are asked to make their own pledges, stating what actions they would like to take to tackle these issues. Actions can be big or small, with plenty of room for creativity! We hope to see some initiatives from the village.

Cllr Louise Pepper, Portfolio Holder for the Environment and Green Issues, added "We have committed to taking local action to prevent a climate and ecological catastrophe. This Charter is a step towards this - it is about sharing ideas and encouraging communities to work together to preserve and nurture our shared future. Protecting our environment is everyone's responsibility and I hope as many people as possible get involved". So let us know about your pledges.

## **DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS**

The Appeal by Gladman against refusal of their application to build 220 homes to the north of Bedwell Road was dismissed on grounds of noise from the motorway on one side of the site and the railway on the other. In order to achieve acceptable living conditions all windows would need to be closed at all times; moreover, gardens would be unendurable, talking to neighbours in the street would be of the can't-hear-yourself-speak variety, the open spaces would be particularly deafening - and the Inspector decided it would not do.

Other aspects of her decision were, frankly, disappointing. She found that the distance of the site from most amenities is not a problem, and that road access through the twisty lane via Ugley Green and Pound Lane is not dangerous, and could therefore cope with the additional traffic. Gladman have a limited amount of time in which to mount a challenge in the High Court, but it must be on a point of law rather than planning judgement. It would be good to think we'll never hear from them again, but they don't give up easily and could try again with a revised scheme.

This being year end, here's a bit of a round up of other applications in and around the village. What bearing the Gladman decision will have on the application to build 50 homes to the south of Bedwell Road remains to be seen, but it is hardly likely to help; the strategy of building three-storey flats to baffle the motorway noise is not attractive. At Rush Lane, the appeal was allowed in September 2020 giving approval to build 40 homes, but nothing has been heard from the developers who were said to be acquiring the site. Similarly, Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee agreed over two years ago to the application to build 130 homes to the west of Hall Road; but apart from the applicants changing their name from Bovis Homes to Vistry, little has happened. In particular, the Section 106 agreement has not been signed, which means that the much-needed contribution to the new Community Hall is not guaranteed.

Other developers have got further. Dandara's detailed application for 99 homes split between west of Isabel Drive and north of Stansted Road awaits determination. Bloor Homes have acquired the rights from Fairfield to build 350 homes off Henham Road, and their detailed application is being pored over as I write. It's not likely that many good grounds for objection will be found. The application is on UDC's website with the reference UTT/21/3269/DFO. There is just about time to respond, but remember if you do that the principle of the development has been agreed and you can only object to the detail.

I wish you an enjoyable and tranquil holiday period. There will undoubtedly be much new construction work in 2022, so don't miss the Boxing Day walk which includes three of the sites mentioned above before they succumb to the concrete mixer (see p17). Thanks and best wishes also to the retiring Elsenham News editorial team as they relinquish their blue pencils, hang up their green eyeshades and stop worrying about how far their ideas of correct comma placement should be imposed on their contributors.

Matthew, chapter 1, verse 21 is perhaps one of the most important in the whole Christmas story. One might even say that it provides a summary of the whole Bible.

It is part of what the angel said to Joseph, "You shall call his name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

First of all, his name means 'God saves', or 'God is salvation.' The main purpose of Jesus coming was to be a saviour. Our world is suffering deeply because of sin, and God provided the answer. He willingly gave his son, and Jesus willingly gave himself.

Who was Jesus going to save? His people.

What was he going to save them from? Their sins.

What does the scripture mean by 'save from sins'?

First, from the penalty for sin. When Jesus gave up his life on the cross, he was taking the punishment that, sinners as we are, we deserve. Without that salvation, we cannot end up in heaven.

Second, for us as Christians, the power of sin is broken. When someone puts his or her trust in Jesus, the Bible says that there is a new creation, a new person, born of the Holy Spirit. That person is making a fresh start in life. When someone becomes a Christian, he or she is given the Holy Spirit, who gives us power to resist temptation and to live as God wants.

The great question is, are you one of

his people? Not everybody is. Are you settled in your mind that Jesus is your Lord and Master and that you will do whatever he wants for the rest of your days on earth?

You may have been thinking about this for some time. Perhaps you sense that you ought to be a better person. You feel far away from God. You may have a good idea of what it means to be a Christian, but you haven't quite been able to take that great step of faith over what we might call the line of salvation.

There is no time like the present to give yourself and your life to him. It will mean that at once you will start growing as a Christian. You will, with God's help, have to start making changes to what you think and what you do – but they will be changes for the better. And there will be changes that he will bring about within you by the power of the Holy Spirit – because of that fresh start I mentioned earlier.

Revelation chapter 3, verse 20 has helped many to cross that line. Jesus says, "See, I stand at the door and knock; if anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will go in and eat with him, and he with me."

You could open that door today. What better season than around Christmas? What a special Christmas it would be!

In prayer you could acknowledge that you are a sinner, thank Jesus for dying for you and ask him to come into your life.





## NATURAL OUTLOOK ON WINTER WATCHING

Unless there has been a freezing end to November, there are still just a few yellow leaves left on some trees but they go in the next icy spell. Sunrises can be spectacular to watch e.g. pre-sunrise pale green/blue sky, emerging sun colouring the fluffy clouds salmon pink, then sun a deep golden disc. Of course, we also get fog, rain, white hoar frost, snow, but not enough to get the sledge out, some days up to 14C and at least two named storms!



When you are out walking about the village and are in Hall Road, check out the grazing field by Elsenham Place where in winter there are often a flock of 60 or more Canada geese with perhaps a few greylags, a heron or two, crows and maybe a buzzard drifting overhead. The Canada geese also graze on parts of the golf course. When the playing field is not in use winter visitors, redwings and fieldfares are feeding and possibly crows, magpies, pied wagtails and a common gull, which is rarer. Around the village hedges and trees the two winter thrushes also forage for various berries and choose roosting sites.

Gardens may get these too along with the 'usuals' e.g. finches, sparrows, tits, dunnocks, robins, blackbirds, starlings, collared doves and pigeons. I hope to add long-tailed-tits, once frequent, now scarce and similarly brightly coloured bullfinches. These latter seem to have retreated and to improve my chance of seeing them I'll take a wander along Dellows Lane in Ugley Green – good hedges there.

What we do get here are frequent visits by the sparrow hawk pair, Sid and Sylvia as I call them. Sid has been known to perch for at least an hour on the rose arch waiting for an innocent birdie to wing by but for no result. Sylvia is a lot less patient but can get lucky. In the short days before and after Christmas, the redwings and fieldfares sometimes visit us in search of berries and 'manky' apples put out for them. They are also on DeMandeville Green. Winter mammals around are fallow or muntjac deer, badger, foxes, grey squirrels and hedgehogs on mild days, and bank voles. These may be in the gardens in older parts of the village and the cemetery.

More signs of spring are birdsong from song thrushes and robins, aconites primroses and snowdrops coming into flower and birds pairing up.

Very sorry to lose a good friend and great 'Birder', Alex Quig, who showed me the common gull among a flock of black headed gulls on the playing field.

As 2021 enters its final month, we anticipate seasonal celebrations to brighten the shortest days of the year. The ancient tradition of decking our houses with garlands of fresh green holly branches reminds us of the continuity of life, bringing us cheer when the days are short.



Holly

On reaching the age of 20, female holly trees bear red berries on branches covered with prickly shiny green leaves which can be cut to make decorative wreaths. Such wreaths featured in midwinter Celtic and Roman celebrations as symbols of good fortune, a tradition that continues thanks to the intervention of a local man, William Winstanley (1628 – 1698).



During the Commonwealth, which lasted from 1649 to 1660, the Puritans under Oliver Cromwell proclaimed that it was illegal to celebrate Christmas, banning frivolities and feasting on mince pies. Winstanley, who lived in Quendon, believed in celebrating Christmas as a time for sharing joy, fun and good fortune with others. After restoration of the monarchy in 1660, using his influence as a writer, he encouraged a return to the seasonal merrymaking which we still enjoy today.

Holly trees were frequently planted near houses to ward off a lightning strike; interestingly, scientific research has revealed its spiky leaves can act as miniature lightning conductors! Holly also grows in hedges or as a shrub in woods where its berries provide nourishment for blackbirds, thrushes and wood mice. Its dense branches provide secure nesting sites. Deer and rabbits will eat its nutritious leaves.

Today, many homeowners plant variegated forms of holly to provide interest in their gardens and they can select a mixture of foliage to make seasonal decorations.



Yew is another evergreen with red coloured fruits (loved by birds and squirrels), but as its leaves are poisonous it is less suitable for indoor decorations.

This was the choice of the book group this month. It is a story of intrigue, set in two time spaces.

In the older narrative, Nathaniel and Rachel are teenagers. Their father leaves to work in Asia, and their mother leaves supposedly to join their father.

Nathaniel and Rachel are left in the family home supervised by strangers who appear to be involved in some criminal activity, i.e. illegal greyhounds and nocturnal trips on the river in a mussel barge. We read about Nathaniel and his school, work and first girlfriend. We don't learn so much about Rachel as it is Nathaniel's story. They genuinely like and come to enjoy being with The Moth, The Darter and particularly Olive. Then it all collapses in on itself.

Moving to the later section, Nathaniel works for the government. This gives him an opportunity to investigate war events. He discovers what his mother was actually working at and about her relationship with Marsh Felon, the son of a thatcher who had worked on her roof many years previously. There is narrative but not really explanations nor much information about his father. However, it is no surprise that everyone involved is some sort of spy but how or why or what they did is not explained. Nathaniel's mother has always seemed to have behaved inexplicably and we didn't find it plausible.

Therefore, for most of us, we found it a book of two halves. The first half had pace and a liveliness and interesting characters plus great evocation of postwar London whereas the second half set mostly in Suffolk is more plodding as it is a journey of discovering facts. We didn't agree on which was the better half.

We did agree that the book is beautifully written and not hard to read.

# ELSENHAM C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL

November saw the children in Year 6 take part in the Armistice Day service at the Elsenham war memorial, where we respectfully remembered those who



have died serving our country. During the service, led by Charles Willbe, the children read Bible verses, shared poems that they had written themselves and laid wreathes that each of the two classes had made together. 
# Reception admissions for academic year starting in September 2022

# **COOKERY CORNER**

This festive roulade is a classic Christmas bake. Fun to make and looks so good!



# YULE LOG (serves 8-10)

#### For the sponge:

5 eggs separated
125g light brown soft sugar
40g pure cocoa powder
½ teaspoon mixed spice
½ teaspoon ground ginger
White caster sugar, for sprinkling

## For the frosting:

100g dark chocolate, chopped 100ml double cream 25g butter

#### For the brandy butter filling:

100g soft butter 250g icing sugar, sifted 4 tablespoons brandy 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

#### For the decoration:

75g white chocolate, chopped 10 fresh bay leaves Icing sugar for dusting edible lustre, food spray or powder

Line a 35x25cm Swiss roll tin with baking parchment and heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4. Beat the egg whites with an electric whisk until just holding peaks, then add half the sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until the peaks hold. Set aside. Beat the yolks with the remaining sugar until pale and fluffy in a clean bowl. Sift in the cocoa, spices and a pinch of salt and gently fold them through. Beat in a third of the egg whites, then gently fold through the rest until you have an airy mousse. Pour into the tin and spread evenly. Bake for 12-15 minutes until springy.

Sprinkle caster sugar over a large sheet of baking parchment. Turn the cake out onto the sugared parchment, then peel off the sheet you used to line the tin. Cover with a clean tea towel, then leave to cool completely. Trim the edges, then score along the inside edge of one of the short sides and roll it up from there, using the parchment to help.

To make the filling, beat all the ingredients together with an electric whisk for 10 minutes until light and fluffy. Unroll the sponge, then turn it so that one long edge is facing you. Spread the buttercream over the sponge using a palette knife, keeping the end furthest from you clean. Using the parchment, roll the sponge up again into a roulade.

For the frosting, tip the chocolate into a large bowl. Put the cream and butter in a saucepan and heat gently until the butter melts and the cream reaches simmering point, then pour over the chocolate. Stir to create a smooth mixture, then leave to cool, stirring occasionally until you can spread it over the sponge. Make bark lines using a fork, then chill in the fridge for at least 30 minutes.

To decorate with chocolate leaves, melt the white chocolate in a bowl over simmering water and paint the underside of the bay leaves with it. Put in the fridge to set for 30 minutes, then gently peel away the bay leaves. Arrange over the log, then lightly dust with icing sugar and lustre.
