Mr Gary Williams spoke as a member of the **Elsenham News** editorial team. The magazine will run out of money at the end of the calendar year 2024. More funds are needed if it is to be delivered to new estates, and he made a plea for help from the Parish Council. Elsenham Parish Council's Chair explained that any grant could only be for one year and would need to be considered afresh as part of the exercise to set each year's precept.

Ms Buglass gave an update on the Surgery mergers. Information has been sent out to all patients of the practice. Ms Buglass confirmed that the Elsenham Dispensary will not be affected regarding the merger. It was confirmed that if an appointment was at Stansted Surgery, prescriptions could be dispensed from Elsenham Surgery. There have been three separate investigative reports regarding the Surgery at Elsenham, Infection Control, Health and Safety, and Fire. The Surgery failed all three.

Currently there are investigations on how to update the building to be compliant with all required regulations, updating the building including purchasing the site.

The Transport Consultation has been so popular that all transport meetings have been cancelled for this year, to address the numerous responses.

A meeting to discuss stopping airport parking in the villages, arranged by Uttlesford District Council, was held on 2 November in the Elsenham Memorial Hall it was well attended, and many matters were discussed. Thanks were expressed to Elsenham's WI, who provided tea, coffee and cake.

Thanks were given to Uttlesford District Council, that provided a Sports Grant which helped fund the new basketball hoop. The hoop has been installed in the playing field's top car park.

Work to install new play equipment in the Isabel Drive play area has now commenced.

A summary of Uttlesford District Council's draft Local Plan timeline was provided.

Draft Plan (Regulation 18) Consultation: Autumn 2023. Publication of Submission Plan (Regulation 19) June/July 2024. Submission to Secretary of State Dec 2024. Examination 2025. Adopted Mid-2026.

We write for the magazine on the weekend of the Remembrance Service. It is always moving and an honour to be part of the ceremony. Our uniform attendees are an absolute credit to their leaders, their units and themselves. The Garden is superbly supplied with poppies, crafted by the Women's Institute. Thank you to all who contribute and attend.

The consultation on the Draft Uttlesford Local Plan went live on 4 November. A Summary Consultation booklet has been sent to every household. (Please contact us if you haven't received one.)

We have, as directed by Government, to allocate over 14,000 homes in Uttlesford. The Plan is not just about housing allocation. It is also about ensuring that Uttlesford remains an attractive place to live, work and visit. The Local Plan will set out where new homes are most sustainably and suitably to be located. It will support the success of our local businesses, seek that the right facilities and infrastructure are delivered by the developers and protect and enhance our natural environment. Elsenham has not been allocated any sites, as frankly, there are not any sites left as speculative development has been rife, due to the absence of a Local Plan, since 2005. Politically we have influenced this plan regarding policy – better housing mix, improving the environmental standards and energy efficiency that new builds must meet. We have not and will not interfere politically in site allocations for political convenience. This approach has failed spectacularly in the past.

Please **do respond** to the consultation. It is important that residents respond, not just to the site allocations but to the policies making up the plan. An unstaffed information point, including display panels and maps, which will give an overview of the proposals and details of how to respond to the consultation, will be in place until the15th December 2023. This is available during normal opening hours at UDC Offices, London Road, Saffron Walden, CB11 4ER. To view paper versions of the Local Plan there are copies in local libraries and UDC officers.

Uttlesford District Council met in full session on 30 October and decided by a majority that the draft Local Plan consultation should be made public. The deadline for representations is now 5.00 pm on 18 December. The Plan does not propose any more houses in Elsenham, but other proposals will still have an impact on the area.

It is provided that there will be as many as 390 new homes in the north of Stansted Mountfitchet, with 250 to the north of the recent development at Walpole Meadows, and 140 to the east of High Lane and south of Alsa Street. Much of the road traffic from these developments will head south, through Stansted Mountfitchet, resulting in longer queues at the Chapel Hill junction. In Henham, another 112 homes are proposed, following a calculation of eye-watering complexity. I can find nothing to show where they might be situated, but much of the road traffic from Henham will head inevitably through Elsenham and on through the difficult route via Grove Hill and Chapel Hill.

There is a proposal for an employment allocation of three hectares at Gaunts End, which is within Elsenham parish. Some years ago, an application was approved for three multi-storey office blocks, but they were never built, and there is a very large hole quite close to Hall Road as a memento. Perhaps it is intended to make use of the existing hole, or possibly another, even larger, hole is contemplated somewhere nearby.

Some of the chief battle-lines over the Plan are becoming clear. There is a 'Countryside Protection Zone' (CPZ) around three sides of Stansted Airport. To the south of the Airport, it is proposed that a large swathe of land between the A120 and the B1256 should be removed from the CPZ in order to make way for wholesale development. In Elsenham, a total of 470 homes within the CPZ has been approved piecemeal in recent years, without the pretence of a policy change. As recently as June this year, the CPZ was shrugged aside by a member of the Planning Inspectorate in approving 130 houses to the south of the Crown under the S62A provisions (well done if you know what they are - see July 2023 if not). It will be interesting to see whether a fellow Inspector takes a similar view when examining the Local Plan proposals.

Talking of the S62A provisions - you get such stimulating topics in this item - an application has been made direct to the Planning Inspectorate (PINS - fascinating acronyms here too) to put five houses on land just over the parish boundary in Stansted between May Walk and the motorway, with its own access off Stansted Road. An application for 11 homes thereabouts was refused by UDC. Obviously the applicants think that UDC would turn them down again, so they'll give PINS a go. Objections will be made, but 'this is a dodge' is not really a valid planning objection, unfortunately. It can be pointed out that the site is not in the Local Plan proposals, but that carries only very limited weight so far.





THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

With the recent rains the ponds are refilling nicely but they still have some way to go before they reach capacity and then start flowing into the damp area to the Southern end of the reserve. In this area we find water loving plants such as willow trees and in summer the unwanted Himalayan Balsam. It also means that the entry to the reserve at the Southern end is always muddy in winter. I am pushing for a budget to improve the paths in this area, but unfortunately that won't be happening this winter.

Now we await the arrival of the visiting winter birds. Birds to look out for in the reserve include siskins, similar to a greenfinch but smaller and with a streaked belly. They are often high up in the canopy feeding on alder or birch seeds. Being high up and silhouetted against a dull winter sky can make it tricky to identify them. You will probably need binoculars and then look out for the distinctly forked tail. Another winter visitor, redwings have already arrived and may be seen eating various berries including hawthorn. Further into winter when the berries have gone, they can be seen foraging on the woodland floor in the same way as our more familiar thrushes and blackbirds. Depending on how harsh the weather is in northern Europe the populations of a number of our own domestic species will actually increase in winter. At Aubrey Buxton last year we had increased numbers of blackbirds and jays.

Do let us know what you see.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

As I was preparing for a recent committee meeting, I was reminded that this month marks the tenth birthday of our website. The original idea was for a site where we could let members know about forthcoming meetings and post the occasional article of interest to villagers. Over the years it has grown somewhat with much more content included to make it a veritable encyclopaedia of Elsenham knowledge. Every week we see an average of ninety or so visitors which is a creditable amount for what is a small niche site. Every now and then we are contacted by professional researchers asking for assistance that we are happy to provide where we can.

There is a great deal of information on the site including census records, Births, Marriages and Deaths and a timeline of Elsenham events from the first century AD set in the context of National and International events. Under the People tab may be found many recordings of conversations with village residents, some sadly no longer with us. These are generally accompanied by written transcripts that allow one to follow the conversation more easily. Here you can also find lists of the Lords of the Manor and the Vicars of Elsenham going back to the time of the Norman invasion in 1066. Did you know that Elsenham nearly had a canal instead of the railway; or why the Daisy surgery is so called? A look under Miscellaneous will reveal the answers to these and several other questions you didn't know you had. There are many photographs on the site, some going back a hundred years arranged in several galleries covering the history of Elsenham and some special events. This is just a small sample of what is available, please take five minutes to have a look for yourself and see what you don't know about Elsenham.

How do you plan to approach Christmas this year? Unless you live in Australia, there is something inescapably wintry about the whole thing. It's a dark, cold time of year. Proper Christmas happens in the bleak mid-winter and there's no room at the inn.

One way of handling the darkness is to accept it; to make our home in it. Just say, 'Bah! Humbug!'to Christmas. That's the **Scrooge** approach.

An alternative to Scrooge is the Shopper. The Shopper says: There is darkness. But don't let it get you down. Eat, drink, and shop because tomorrow you might die!

But here's the interesting thing: Every time the Bible describes heaven, the Bible says it's like a party with family, and great food, and friendship, and celebration. So Shoppers are onto something. We were made to celebrate. It's deep down in us....

But if you're a Shopper, you actually have the same view of the future as a Scrooge. There is nothing. When the big day is over, and the credit card bill hits the door mat, just like Scrooge, the darkness remains.

Another possibility is to pretend the darkness away. That's what the **Santa** does ... When he or she thinks about God, they're really thinking about Santa. It goes like this:

Santa is for children - God is for children. Santa lives very far away - God is far away. Most of the time, Santa is irrelevant, but if you really want something, you can ask him. And God is generally irrelevant, but sometimes you can ask him for things.

The Scrooge, the Shopper and the Santa. Maybe you're thinking: I'm a mix of all of them! Well, here's the good news – you can have the best of all of them, but you don't have to be any of them!

The final way to look at Christmas is through the **Stable**, and the Stable says: The darkness is real - but a Light has dawned. A real light, not a fairy tale Santa light. The Light is Jesus. The Bible says he is God's eternal Son. What will he do? He will rescue.

Christmas leads to the cross. Jesus takes on himself all our sins and all the judgement they deserve. Love bears the cost, and on the cross Jesus bears the cost for everything that separates us from God. He suffers the darkness which our sins deserve, and then he bursts through death to life on Easter Sunday. And he says to all of us: 'I know your darkness. Let me be your light.'

You see, with the Stable, you get the best of everything. You don't have to pretend the darkness away, but you can celebrate in hope. You don't need to have a fairy tale, make believe God. You can know the real God, and unlike Santa, he is infinitely worth knowing.

This December, please do join us for any one of our Christmas services and hear more about the God of the stable.

If you make one new year's resolution on 1 January next year, please make it to come and join us at the Choir, you won't regret it, I promise!



GARDEN HINT By Sue Johnson

NOT QUITE A GARDEN HINT

Give cacti and succulents as much light as possible in winter. Take care not to overwater at this time of year. Never let them sit in water. Check for pests between leaves and under the rim of the pot.

WHITE CHRISTMAS PUDDING



65gm Sultanas 65gm Raisins 3 Tablespoons Sherry or Brandy or White wine or orange juice 90gm Glacè Cherries (cut into quarters) 300gm Tin Mandarin Oranges (drained) (or similar) 125gm Butter 125gm Icing Sugar 65gm Ground Almonds packet of 8 Trifle Sponges 150ml Double Cream

Soak the raisins & sultanas in sherry or brandy or white wine or orange juice until liquid is absorbed. Mix in cherries and drained oranges. Cream butter and sugar, add almonds. Crumble trifle sponges very finely. Mix all (except cream) thoroughly, so that oranges disintegrate. Put in to a buttered 1.2 litre (2 pint) basin. Refrigerate (or freeze - defrost before use) Turn out onto a serving plate. Coat with whipped double cream. Decorate with holly or other Xmas decorations ENJOY!!!!!!!



This delicious and very luxurious potato and parsnip combination will go very well alongside your Christmas or Boxing Day roast. The recipe is a little bit like gratin dauphinois, but the vegetables are cut into long, chunky pieces, rather than in thin slices.

PARSNIP AND POTATO GRATIN (serves 6)

1¼ lb (750g) medium sized potatoes, peeled 1lb 2oz (500g) parsnips, peeled 1oz (25g) butter, plus extra for greasing 1 large garlic clove, crushed ½ pint (300ml) double cream 3oz (75g) parmesan, grated

Preheat oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6. Butter a 12 x 9 in (30 x 23cm) ovenproof dish.

Slice each potato into 6-8 evenly sized wedges. Slice the parsnips into similarly sized shapes.

Blanch the potatoes in a large saucepan of boiling salted water for 3 minutes. Add the parsnips to the potatoes in the pan and continue to boil for a further 3 minutes. Drain well.

Return the veg to the pan and add the butter. Place over a medium heat and, once the butter has melted, add the garlic, and cook for 1 minute. Toss the potatoes and parsnips to coat in the butter. Season well with salt and black pepper, then tip into the prepared dish. Bake in the oven for about 20 minutes or until the vegetables are just starting to brown,



Pour the cream over the veg and sprinkle with the parmesan. Return to the oven for another 15 minutes, or until lightly golden and crisp on top.

Serve immediately.

CHEF'S RECOMMENATIONS:

The dish can be assembled ahead, then best cooked ready to serve with your roast. Not suitable for freezing but any leftovers will taste really good heated up the next day.

NATURAL OUTLOOK - CHANGING YEARS

In December 2021 we had icy cold winds, temperatures just above zero, murk, mist and fog, heavy rain, local floods, a damp Christmas and the Boxing Day Walk cancelled but got two warm days before New Year.



Then January gave frost and sun, cloudy days, warmer days, fog, Storm Malik and afterwards Storm Corrie. Allegedly, it was the sunniest January since 1919!! Last year in December we did have warm days but also 12 days of hoar frost, a little fog – and rain but Boxing Day fine. January 2023 gave cold nights, rain, warmer but windy spells, local floods, a frost or two, a splash of snow, fog, and a warm 31st January. This year, who knows?

Though the big walnut off Station Road was bare by Bonfire Night, many trees were still hanging on to lots of their leaves but ashes and our spindle were dropping many. Holly and hawthorn are ripening nicely so expect blackbirds and, if lucky, redwings who will finish them off before you have time to cut any for Christmas.

Ages ago when there was a frost so severe that it it froze over the lake at Hatfield Forest lots of us walked across it! Mad I know. The Forest team have now cracked down on such behaviour. The Forest winter hours have been in operation since November so do find out the opening days and hours. It's worth a visit as the deer and good numbers of wintering birds, jays, jackdaws, fieldfares and redwings, are about as well as the water birds,

Other places to visit are Amwell near Ware, Herts Wildlife Trust, the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust reserve just over the Norfolk border where it would be best to check for water levels. If it's OK there's lots to be seen, also in the surrounding fields where the whooper swans graze in daytime. I'll try to fit in Blue House Farm, Essex Wildlife Trust, on the River Crouch near Fambridge where I should see large flocks of Brent Geese which are here for the winter. They are on the creek and the grass as well as on the river as are other interesting winter birds – so take your binoculars.

Around the village jays and blackbirds are usually more numerous as they are here from the Continent for warmer days and better food, but some others are less so. In our garden, as the countryside retreats we no longer have bullfinches, bramblings or siskins and very few pied wagtails but they are often on the playing field. I'm keeping my fingers crossed for the blackcaps. The sparrowhawks will usually visit. On 'The Croake', the lovely field opposite The Crown, the grass attracts starlings, crows, rooks and, if we are lucky, redwings, fieldfares, and nearer the slope down to Stansted Brook, possibly some Canada geese Or they could be on the golf course.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Two brothers born in north Wales in the 16th century have significant links with The Hundred Parishes. Thomas and Hugh Myddelton were younger sons of Richard, governor of Denbigh Castle. Both came to London to seek their fortune.

Thomas Myddelton was born in 1550, the fourth son. He did indeed make his fortune in trade and became Lord Mayor of London in 1613. In 1615, Thomas bought the manor of Stansted Mountfitchet as his country seat and began the erection of a new Stansted Hall. He died in 1631 and was buried at St Mary's Church. His funeral was lavish; the family even paid for the mourners to be suitably dressed. There is a fine memorial inside the church with a life-size effigy under a decorated arch (right).

Hugh Myddelton was born in 1560, the sixth son. In London, he was apprenticed to a goldsmith and later became Royal Jeweller to King James I. Hugh became a

self-taught engineer. He was largely responsible for construction of The New River (right), which ran for some 20 miles, taking fresh water from springs near Great Amwell into London. He helped fund the project and also secured financial help from the king.

The New River was opened in 1613, following the land contours so that gravity carried the water all the way to the

Clerkenwell area of London. In 1620 a half mile extension was dug to supplement the supply by taking water from the nearby River Lea. After 400 years, the man-made New River still takes fresh water to the citizens of London; it is now operated by Thames Water.

Hugh Myddelton died in London in 1631. A memorial stone (right) was erected on an island in the river at Great Amwell and various roads and properties along the route bear his name.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 



That is a mistake. I am not a girl. I'm a boy.' So begins a heroic struggle to change gender, while around her others also strive to find a place of safety and fulfilment in a savage and confusing world...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group this month. *Sacred Country* was first published in 1992 but was reissued in 2017 with a foreword by Peter Tatchell, human rights campaigner known for his work with the LGBTQI+ community.

Set in rural East Anglia and London, ending in Nashville, Tennessee, USA and covers the years from 1952 to 1980.

Mary is very unhappy and not just because of body dysmorphia but family relationships. Mary's father, Sonny, a poor farmer, cannot really relate to his wife and children and bullies his wife, Estelle. She has a fragile hold on her mental health and is frequently admitted to a local sanitorium. Mary's brother, Timmy, becomes Sonny's focus, which arrests his development. Sonny is disgusted by Mary and sends her to live with Cord, a loving grandfather, who is happy to refer to her as Martin.

Although Mary is the main character and the novel follows their transition to become Martin, this book features other characters and their own struggles.

Irene and Edward (who find comfort in each other despite their circumstances) try to help Mary when others don't. Irene's daughter, Pearl, is a particular focus for Mary whom she considers to be 'precious'. There is Miss Macrae, the school teacher who supports and guides Mary through school years.

Mary leaves the bleakness of Suffolk to seek help in London, and is supported by many: Georgia, their lover, the doctor who guides her through her transition, and work colleagues. However, things don't work out in London. Her brother trains to work in the church and then marries which devastates Mary/Martin.

There is a separate story that features Walter, the son of the butcher, who dreams of becoming a country and western singer and goes through his own agonies to achieve this and finally makes his way to Nashville. When Martin turns his back on Suffolk he heads to Nashville where he is helped by Walter with accommodation and a job and eventually settles into a life that fulfils.

If you feel that there are more Stansted night flights than ever, you'd be right. Stansted Airport Watch (SAW) has finally been able to establish what's been happening.

Stansted is allowed a maximum of 13,700 flights a year during the six and a half hour core night period from 11.30pm to 6.00am. That, incidentally, is more than twice the number allowed at Heathrow. The annual limit of 13,700 night flights is divided into a summer limit of 8,100 and a winter limit of 5,600. The summer period coincides with British Summer Time, and normally lasts for 31 weeks, from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.

The numbers for this summer are not yet available but SAW has been able to establish that Stansted handled 10,509 night flights compared to the statutory limit of 8,100. However, Stansted insist that they have not broken the rules. This is all made possible by a clever three-card trick. Here's how it works.

Step 1 – The night flights legislation (which applies to all) allows up to 10% of the previous winter's allowance (if not fully used) to be carried forward to the following summer. That added 560 flights to Stansted's allowance, increasing it to 8,660 night flights.

Step 2 – The legislation also allows an airport to overshoot by up to 10% and carry this forward by reducing the allowance for the next winter period. That added another 810 flights, increasing it to 9,470.

Step 3 – Finally, the Secretary of State allows Stansted management to use their own discretion to disregard certain night flights. These are known as dispensations and they are mostly granted when an aircraft which was scheduled to arrive or depart before 11.30pm, actually arrives or departs after 11.30pm, thereby becoming a night flight. In the 2022 summer period, Stansted management granted a total of 1,201 dispensations.

Hey Presto! The combined effect of these enabled Stansted to handle over 10,500 night flights last summer without breaching the statutory limit. SAW obtained this information by submitting a series of requests to the Department for Transport under the Freedom of Information Act, by pressing Stansted Airport management to explain the disparity in the number, and by writing directly to the Secretary of State.

SAW has also obtained comparative information for Heathrow and Gatwick. Compared to the 1,201 dispensations granted at Stansted, Gatwick granted 576 dispensations and Heathrow granted just 415. This is despite the fact that Stansted is by far the smallest of London's three main airports. The vast majority of dispensations granted by Stansted management were categorised as being due to bad weather (mainly "thunderstorms") and Air Traffic Control problems. However, this raises the question, why Stansted should be so much more prone to thunderstorms and Air Traffic Control problems compared to the others?
