

Parish Council meeting May 15

The meeting on 15 May was the Annual Parish Council meeting.
Graham Mott was re-elected as Chair with Bianca Donald as Vice-Chair.
New councillors Bob Burlton and returning councillor John Minor were welcomed onto the Parish Council.

After 35 years on the Parish Council Peter Johnson decided to step down. Peter's presence at meetings will be greatly missed by councillors and members of the public. Peter had a great wealth of knowledge of parish council procedures.

The appointments to committees, working groups and representatives to outside bodies, were allocated amongst the councillors and co-opted members.

The Parish Council and Elsenham Youth Football Club signed a pro-forma, giving the football Club permission to play football on the Elsenham playing field for the next ten years. This will allow the Football Club to apply for grant funding under Football Foundation Grass Pitch maintenance fund.

As Elsenham is still classed as a rural village, people wishing to use buses may put their hand out to stop the bus, the bus should stop unless it is dangerous to do so.

The potholes in and around Elsenham are a big problem. Highways have a legal obligation to repair the roads and they are failing to do so. The Parish Council has sent a letter to the Secretary of State for Transport asking that action is taken.

Parish Council meeting June 5

The Playing Field Committee are looking at purchasing a heavy-duty basketball stand and hoop to be installed on the playing field. It is hoped to obtain funding from UDC Community Project Grant Scheme, which fund-match projects such as this.

A new Environment and Climate Change Committee is to be set up. One of its main objectives will be to promote awareness and action by residents to limit climate change effects and to improve the local environment.

Due to the increase in water rates, general maintenance, hedge cutting, grass cutting and admin, the allotment fees are being increased, however they still remain far lower than our neighbouring villages allotments.

The Flowerbed Committee now have a five-year plan to make Elsenham even more beautiful. The goal is that one year Elsenham could win 'Essex Village of the year' or 'Essex in Bloom'.

The next Parish Council meeting will be Monday 3 July, 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

I'm sure we all know what S62A means by now, but I'll remind you anyway. It refers to the provision whereby developers can apply direct to the Planning Inspectorate for major applications, since Government has decreed that Uttlesford District Council has refused too many applications which have subsequently been allowed at appeal. The Hearing into the application to build 130 homes in the field opposite the Crown was held under this regulation on 10 May at a hotel near the Airport.

The applicants made late submission of documents shortly before the Hearing. The Parish Council objected that some notice should have been given, and that either these johnnies-come-lately should be set aside, or more time should be allowed for consideration. But the Inspector was having none of it. There had already been a long delay before the Hearing while he had an eyesight problem sorted, and he was now determined to crack on.

The new documents included 33 closely argued pages to show why the five-year housing land supply should be correctly calculated as 4.06 years rather than 4.89 years. UDC was represented at their customary level of ineptitude and had nothing to say on this - an officer was present but remained mute on this subject, no doubt in preference to the alternative of saying something. Later, UDC was ripped apart royally by the Inspector for their failure to engage properly in producing Conditions, should the application be granted. He complained that it was not until the previous day that something was submitted which showed every sign of being, in his phrase, 'hastily cobbled together'. This was incidentally an improvement, albeit of marginal dimensions, on the Hearing into the Bloor application in December when tUDC was heavily criticised for not producing anything on Conditions at all. On the later occasion, an extended lunch break to give time for discussion proved predictably inadequate, and the inevitable outcome was that further time was allowed. The agreed list of draft Conditions was not eventually published until 5 June.

Written representations had been made months before, and a limited amount of time was allowed for verbal submissions. The Parish Council emphasised those objections which do not apply to other sites in the village: the proximity of heritage assets around Elsenham Cross, the location in Stansted Airport's Countryside Protection Zone, the site being the last open space in the village, together with the cumulative impact when taken with all the other many agreed applications, as well as objections on transport grounds. Stansted Parish Council was represented by a parish councillor who is also a ward member on UDC.

Dandara are intending to start work on their scheme to build 99 new homes on two sites off Isabel Drive and off Stansted Road in July, and are seemingly unfazed by the failure to appoint ground workers. The current intention is that show homes should be available by Christmas or January, with completion of both sites expected by Autumn 2024. But developers' forecasts of progress are always optimistic.



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Abusive behaviour is not acceptable, and people sometimes ask what can I do if I think someone needs help but is too afraid to ask?



Members of the public can now report allegations of domestic abuse via the Essex Police website; whether the person reporting is the victim themselves or they suspect someone else is suffering abuse. The option of reporting incidents by phone remains in place, this is an additional means to contact police which is equivalent to calling 101.

By selecting the 'Report' button on the www.essex.police.uk website and then 'Domestic Abuse' the person reporting will be guided through the process by a series of relevant questions. Where someone is in immediate danger the person reporting the incident will be instructed to stop and report this emergency by calling 999.

Essex Police is also asking everyone to take responsibility by:

- Stopping family and friends getting behind the wheel if they have had an alcoholic drink
- Dialing 999 if you know someone is drunk and you see them getting behind the wheel of a car
- Calling Essex Police on 0300 333 4444 to give police information about someone who regularly chooses to drink and drive
- Telling Crimestoppers anonymously about people who regularly choose to drink and drive by calling 0800 555 111 or visiting www.crimestoppers-uk.org.

If you have any information regarding incidents contact Essex Police on €101 or Crimestoppers anonymously on € 0800 555 111.

Now Summer is here, and the weather is warmer and drier, this is a good opportunity for Elsenham residents to help with road safety in our village, and in doing so, reduce any road collisions and injuries to drivers and to any pedestrians that may get caught up in an accident.

Our village is becoming a race track.

Talk is not enough – Your action is required.

To become part of this major village speed reduction plan we need lots more volunteers of all ages over 18 for the task. Why not ask your neighbours or friends, and go out together once you are fully trained, and become part of the

Elsenham Speed Watch Team.

Every driver speeding is reported to the Police. They then send a letter out to the driver, and if necessary, pay them a visit if they discover the vehicle is not legal. So, it is worth an hour of your time to reduce the speeding in the village. Full initial training will be given via Zoom, then roadside training on the use of our fully calibrated SL700 laser device (as used by the Police), then just a few hours a month operationally. When YOU decide you are available.

There is NO weekly or monthly commitment.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

In 1984 when there was drainage work being done at St Mary's Church several skulls and other bones were discovered adjacent to the Church's eastern window. In the Herts and Essex Observer in February 1984 there was a report on the finds with a picture of the Rev Brian Green, vicar at that time, and the man who dug up the bones. Brian Green notified Gordon Barker who went to the church to see one of the skulls. The vicar arranged for the skull to be taken away to get it dated and to find out more about it.

It went to Wicken House, Wicken Bonhunt where it stayed for some time until Gordon Barker decided it was time to find out what had happened to it. Surely the research must have been completed and Gordon was determined to get the skull returned to the Village so that it could be re-buried at St Marys.



Eventually Gordon tracked down the location of the skull and with the help of the Conservation Officer at Uttlesford District Council it was successfully recovered, and Gordon collected it.

It was in a box packed in tissue paper and from the photograph he had, it was confirmed as being the Elsenham Skull. Gordon brought it back to the village and it has been returned to St Mary's where it has been re-interred in the churchyard. The skull was male and thought to be

of Roman origin dating from circa 300 AD. How it came to be at St Mary's remains a mystery.

My thanks to Chris Bush and Heather Barker for the above information.

As I write this, it is just a few days from our June meeting when we will learn about the story of the Stansted Windmill from Tony Wellings, a long-time supporter of the Trust. I will share the story next time.

Looking forward to September, John Rhodes will be coming to speak to members about Sir Walter Gilbey one time Lord of the Manor of Elsenham. Many of you will be familiar with the good that Sir Walter did to improve the village but you may be less aware of his other achievements. John Rhodes has written a book about Warwick Road in Bishop's Stortford and the part Sir Walter played in making it a pleasant place to live. Come along in September to find out more about our village benefactor. All are welcome.

Thought For The Month by Louis Wilson

I recently took a wedding for a delightful couple in a neighbouring Essex benefice which is without a Vicar. In case they were at a loose end on honeymoon, I recommended they read a book on Christian marriage called On Marriage written by Tim Keller and his wife Kathy.

I suggested this because I have often found Tim Keller to be one of the clearest and most insightful pastors you can read. I was therefore very saddened to hear that he died just a few weeks ago aged 72. A cursory glance at my bookcase reveals at least six or seven books all of which I have read, and all of which I have found extremely influential.

In 1989, he moved to Manhattan and founded Redeemer Presbyterian Church. Then came a formidably fruitful quarter-century in New York City. Someone has commented: Many preachers have built megachurches; relatively few have done so with conversion growth in a highly secular and urban environment steeped in biblical illiteracy.

Probably the most important Tim Keller book I've read is The Prodigal God, which is an explanation of one of Jesus' best known but least understood stories, the parable of the prodigal son. The word prodigal means recklessly extravagant. The younger son in the story is recklessly extravagant with his father's estate and yet his father delights to forgive and restore this son: a picture of how God the Father treats us.

What is often overlooked however is that the father in the story has two sons. On the surface the older son's behaviour is exemplary: where the younger son squandered his father's money in wild living, the older son worked dutifully in his father's fields. But where the younger son was lost in self-indulgence, it turns out that the older son was equally lost - but in self-righteousness.

It is such a reminder, actually a warning that however good we are, however hard we work, however many rules we keep, whatever our appearance, without recklessly extravagant grace, we're all lost. And in Christ, recklessly extravagant or prodigal grace is what God offers us.

All this and more is what Tim Keller helped me see and for which I am very thankful.

Let me finish with a quotation which I found from him on The Gospel Coalition (TGC) website (a coalition he helped to found):

"The gospel is that I am so sinful that Jesus had to die for me, yet so loved and valued that Jesus was glad to die for me. This leads to deep humility and deep confidence at the same time. I can't feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone."

NATURAL OUTLOOK ON JUNE

Very difficult to say what July will be like this summer: In 2019 a cold wind quickly gave way to rising temperatures, a mini heatwave started in week four, up to 34.5 °C in the air but hotter in the garden. Three days of cold rain but saw the month out warm. 2020

was "damp" at times, had a few hot days, several nights of heavy rain, a storm or two but warmed up signally on the way out. 2021 had a good share of downpours, and thunderstorms after a cold wind. It then warmed up to 25 °C, hotter in our garden. Last year, however, was different. There was an official heat wave starting in late June and going on till August with one night in Yorkshire staying at 25.9 °C and daytime temperatures *much* higher.

So not the best year for butterflies but looking at records we might see, around the village some of these; large whites, yellow brimstones, late brood orange tips, commas, gatekeepers, peacocks, common blues, meadow browns, red admirals, small tortoiseshells, ringlets, small coppers, small heaths, and possibly a marbled white and others e.g. speckled woods in Alsa Wood and the Aubrey Buxton reserve. Most of the others can be seen along our internal roads or local footpaths.

We also have day-flying moths; the very small, small purple and gold, the larger elephant hawk moth, the humming bird hawk moth, the yellow shell and lots of various small beige moths. The cinnabar moth which has deep crimson and slate grey markings lay their eggs on yellow ragwort. Their caterpillars have black and yellow bands and chomp their way through this poisonous plant, sometimes down to the ground. If you don't know any of these and don't have a reference book either, make a note and check it out at home, or, if you have your phone with you, take a photo and look it up.

Birds are busy raising families; swifts, swallows and house martins are seen flying overhead, catching insects on the wing which by now will be fed to chicks in nests. I think there are swifts, the largest, darkest of these three species, still nesting in central Elsenham but the swallows and house martins have moved further away to some of our 'outskirts'. The swifts scythe through the air calling out 'news, news'. They land only when needing to attend at the nest and even sleep on the wing, keeping one eye closed at a time. Then suddenly there is a flock of them as their chicks have fledged and they are flying with other swifts and also swallows and martins. Swallows have long tails, steely blue plumage, pale chests and dull red faces. House martins have shorter wings, pale underparts and a white rump with black upper parts. I haven't been to the sand pit lately to see if the sand martins still breed in nest holes in the sand cliff. These rather chunkier martins have white underparts and bib, divided by a brown collar, brown upper parts, and shorter tails.

If it does get hot with little rain, putting water out for the birds can be a great help.

The Walled Garden - Elsenham Hall

Len Harling lived a few doors from me. He was possibly the last, or at least one of the last, gardeners who worked at Elsenham Hall. I have seen a photo of him tending a grape vine which at one time grew within the Walled Garden. My friendship with the late Alan Bennett, affectionately known as "Benjamin," would allow me to go on "Adventures" around Elsenham Hall Estate.

Sir Walter Gilbey, "The Guvnor," was the last person to use the hall as one complete dwelling. He moved there in 1878. It now has been broken-up into flats. When Alan's dad was the caretaker and lived in the Caretakers Cottage, Elsenham Hall was almost derelict with just a handful of tenants. I would explore the hall and the surrounding gardens. It was during one of these outings in the early 1960s, that I would explore the Walled Garden.

The garden was very much a shadow of its former self. It once had four heated green houses, cold frames and a medium sized garden shed. There were once a number of fruit trees and the aforementioned grape vines. If my memory serves me correctly there were the remains of two large beds and a central pathway. Together with the vegetables and fruit from these the hall estate had two acres of fruit trees mainly plum and apple. Too much was produced for the hall kitchen requirements. That is why Sir Walter Gilbey's thoughts turned to producing jam - Elsenham Jam!

He is quoted as saying," There is now no need for me to make money, but I like the estate turned to its best advantage and I do not believe in working at anything for nothing." Ever the entrepreneur, he could see a way to turn the harvest into a commodity. So this was the birth of the "Elsenham Jam Factory."

In 1993, the Elsenham allotments moved into the Walled Garden. They are still there today having been joined by more in Elsenham Vale.







THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Conservation Areas were introduced in 1967. District councils are responsible for designating them. The area must have





degrees of protection for each of these designations, all aimed at preserving our heritage for future generations.

Uttlesford District Council covers around half of the Hundred Parishes area. The Council has designated 33 Conservation Areas . For each, it has published an appraisal that defines the area covered and explains the reasons for designation. (see


www.uttlesford.gov.uk/conservation-area-appraisals). These appraisals are often a helpful source for the kind of information provided in the route descriptions for walks

that can be downloaded from www.hundredparishes.org.uk.



East Hertfordshire has the second biggest representation within the Hundred Parishes and this district council has designated 26 Conservation Areas here. Their appraisals are also available and provide valuable insight. (see www.eastherts.gov.uk/planningand-building/conservation-areas).


Similar appraisals are available from the other district councils which are represented within the Hundred Parishes: South Cambridgeshire, Braintree, North Herts, Chelmsford and Epping Forest. Within South Cambs, Linton has the only "Outstanding Conservation Area" designation, including Linton's



side. Much of this area is explored on Walk 182 whose route covers less than 2 miles.

Our towns and villages are usually best explored on foot and each is included in at least one of the Hundred Parishes routes. If you are able to get out and about, I encourage you to try them.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 

COOKERY CORNER

By Sue Johnson 2 812704

This deliciously easy dessert can be made in advance and kept in the fridge for three days. Don't worry if you haven't a slow cooker, see below for oven method.



RASPBÉRRY SLOW COOKER CRÈME BRÛLÉES (makes 6)

600ml double cream
1 teaspoon vanilla bean paste
6 egg yolks
4oz (100g) caster sugar
4oz (100g) fresh or frozen raspberries
2 tablespoons brown sugar

Bring the cream and vanilla just to a simmer in a saucepan over medium heat.

Use an electric mixer to whisk the egg yolks and caster sugar in a large bowl until pale and creamy. Gradually add the hot cream to the egg yolk mixture, stirring well after each addition.

Divide the raspberries evenly among six 5 fl oz (160ml) ramekin dishes. Pour the custard mixture over the raspberries.

Place the ramekins in a large slow cooker. Carefully pour boiling water into the slow cooker to come halfway up the sides of the ramekins. Cover with baking paper to help absorb any condensation. Cover with slow cooker lid and cook for 2 hours on low or until the custard has just set.

Carefully remove ramekins from slow cooker. Set aside to cool for 30 minutes. Place in the fridge for 3 hours to chill.

Preheat grill on high. Sprinkle the brown sugar evenly over the top of each ramekin. Place under grill for 1 minute or until the sugar dissolves and caramelises. Alternatively, use a kitchen blowtorch to caramelise the sugar.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Before you start, check that the ramekins will fit into the slow cooker. If yours is too small, cook in two batches. You can substitute vanilla essence for vanilla paste (or a pod, which will need to be removed before pouring the custard into the ramekins).

If you don't have a slow cooker, place the ramekins in a roasting tin. Pour enough boiling water into the pan to reach halfway up the sides of the ramekins. Bake at 150°C/130°/Gas mark 2 for 25-30 minutes or until just set. Cool, chill and caramelise as above.

Freeze your leftover egg whites – they can be used to make pavlova or meringues next time you need a dessert.

AID FOR ROMANIA

The April lorry for Romania left on the 26th and arrived after a five day journey.

Some of the goods were given free to nearly 40 needy families in Mărăşeşti (not far from the border with Ukraine) as nominated by the local Baptist church and others by the town Mayor, with other items being sold through our charity shop with proceeds helping the same poor sections of the population with health, education and improving their terrible housing conditions.

Our warehouse is now waiting to be filled for the October lorry. We are now wanting winter clothes and shoes for adults and children (those for under 3 years must be new). Single and Z-beds with mattresses (sturdy iron or wooden framed beds are very desirable - no divans please). Cushions, bed sheets, pillows, duvets and blankets (single and double), towels, toiletries (incl loo rolls), umbrellas and rugs (no carpet offcuts). Building and workshop tools (also gardening tools and sturdy wheelbarrows) and a sack barrow. Surplus school tables (must be 2ft clearance underneath i.e not infant) and stackable adult size chairs (please ask any contact with a local school or village hall who are/maybe refurbishing). Sturdy chest of drawers (not flat pack built as these do not survive the 5-day truck journey), bedside cabinets, kitchen/dining tables (either drop-leaf or removable legs). I am short of bicycles, irons and boards as well as air driers for laundry. Kitchen items (crockery, cutlery, utensils, pots/pans - especially large sizes eg preserving pans). Wheelchairs, crutches, walking sticks and Zimmer frames. Bandages and dressings, but please no pills, medicines or creams. Rucksacks and holdalls (must be in good condition). Other items such as costume jewellery, footballs and ear defenders for the manual workers and high-viz vests/jackets. Small toys such as push-along cars, cuddly soft toys etc (no big toys as these can cause a lot of jealousy!). Christmas trees and decorations etc. Cash donations for the cost of the lorry as it now costs more to send since we must now also clear customs in Rotterdam.

The book has 483 pages which is split into about 25 chapters, each focusing on one character - the chapters move around in time, backwards and forwards. The characters are all linked with the connections being made very clear. The main list of characters are Claudette Wells, Daniel Sullivan - Claudette's son, Ari, Daniel's son Niall and daughter Phoebe, from his first marriage and the two children Claudette and Daniel have together, Maeve and Calvin.

Each chapter provides more information in the way of an ever expanding jigsaw. The plot covers many decades and gets more complex before it starts to give away some answers. It is not a linear story although it does start to become more chronological towards the conclusion. The chapters have different structures, some in the third person and some in the first person and one as a series of auction items.

As it says in the blurb, Claudette has decided to turn her back on the film world - we hear from Claudette how she came to be in the film world. Some of the factors that illustrate the 'end' of that career are show through a series of auction items - so we can understand the press intrusion, disillusionment and the breakdown of her relationship with Timou, her mentor and Ari's father.

We meet Daniel when he is already married to Claudette and is off back to America for a family reason. On route he hears a radio programme that starts him on a different journey to the one he planned. Therefore, his backstory is told through a series of chapters that tells us his history.

We also meet some other characters, their mothers and brothers and friends they have met along the way. An entertaining read told in a surprising way.
