

So, Happy New Year!



The Parish Council held its first meeting of 2025 on a Wednesday, not on the usual first Monday of the month. This was due to the Memorial Hall having a new heating system installed, which wasn't up and running on the Monday.

Most of the meeting was taken up with discussing budgets for the next financial year, which starts on 1 April 2025, and then agreeing a precept for 2025/26.

Budgets were set for the playing field, flowerbeds, allotments, open spaces, village general and more. Funds were added to ear-marked reserves to help accumulate funds for large expenditures that may arise in the future, such as the pond and access road in Tye Green and resurfacing the road and car parks in the playing field.

A budget for a PCSO of $\pounds 6,000$ was accounted for in the budgets. However, more information on hours and costs is required before the Parish Council will vote on whether to use the $\pounds 6,000$ to part fund a PCSO.

The Full Council voted unanimously for a precept for 2025/26 of £170,000. Although this is £20,000 extra than last year's, because of the extra housing in the village, it represents a small decrease for a Band D household.

The next Parish Council meeting will return to the first Monday on February 3, in the Memorial Hall.

Memorial Hall Heating & Lighting

Uttlesford District Council continues to be 'designated' by Government for major applications, following the decision that too many of the Council's refusals of planning approval were being overturned at appeal. Developers now have the choice of either submitting their applications to UDC in the usual way, or applying direct to the Planning Inspectorate through the 'S62A' procedure.

Two recent decisions show very clearly that the S62A route, like much else in the planning system, can be heavily loaded in favour of developers. An outline application for 50 homes to the south of Bedwell Road was refused by UDC's Planning Committee in June 2022 because of noise from the nearby M11. It was allowed at appeal in July 2023. The developers decided to take the S62A option for their detailed application, no doubt anticipating that the Planning Committee would be no more favourable to the second application than they were to the first. The S62A application was published on 8 July 2024, with written representations to be made by 6 August. There was no Hearing. The decision was issued 16 weeks later, on 27 November, and amounts to nine pages. That gives an average return of 1.7 recurring pages per week, a low rate of productivity which could support the Government's contention that the planning process is ripe for improvement.

Why the long delay? The Inspector allowed the developers repeated efforts to submit something which was even marginally acceptable, in view of the noise factor. At one point, he asked them whether it was OK with them if he deferred his decision in order to allow them more time to respond, and unsurprisingly they said 'yes, that's a great idea'. There was no chance for anyone else to give their views over this protracted period. It seems the Inspector was determined to view the application in as favourable a light as possible. He eventually approved a shocking design, with a three-storey block of 'affordable' flats on the side towards the motorway, intended to act as a buffer against noise for the benefit of the more affluent householders in the two-storey houses.

There has been uncertainty regarding the field bounded to the north by Rush Lane and to the east by Robin Hood Road, with outline applications agreed allowing access from both locations. However, apparently Robin Hood Road has the nod, with a detailed application submitted. There is much which is objectionable, not least that the outline application was made through the S62A procedure, and the Inspector knocked out any contributions towards health, education, or the new Community Centre. The affordable homes are very obviously clustered together alongside the railway, whereas UDC policy expects them to be dispersed throughout the site. The visitor parking is not distributed around the site either. Four -bedroom houses have the stipulated three parking spaces, but they are tripletandem, one behind the other. Pedestrian access is poor, with one footpath running through the children's play area. Moreover, some issues previously raised are . . .

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

As we enter the New Year I was reflecting on recent changes to the village and as we welcome new residents to Elsenham, I remembered that Elsenham was not always Elsenham!



How so you might ask? The first mention of Elsenham was in the Domesday Book in 1086 when it was known as Alsenham. The next recorded instance of the village name occurred around 1250 when it was known as Elseneham. Between then and the end of the 13th century, it was known variously as Helseneham, Elsinham, Elselham or Ellesham and Elsingham. In the latter part of the 14th century the name had become Elsynham by Thremenhale which by 1420 became Elsyngham. By the turn of the 15th century and into the 16th the name changed again becoming in turn Ilsyngham, Islyngham, Hellysnam, Ellisnam and by 1540 Ellysnam. There are few recorded instances of the village name after that until 1817 when during the trial of the Elsenham Gang at Chelmsford Assizes, they were reported as coming from Elseningham! Sometime between then and the start of the 20th century the modern spelling was adopted and has not changed since.

The best theory for the difference in names lies with the clergy. Until the 19th century it was likely that the only educated person in a rural village was the Reverend and it was very often personal preference, and bad spelling, that dictated how a place name was recorded in the parish records. Oh, and why Elsenham? From, we believe, the ham or hamlet of Elesa or Elsa, thought to be a Saxon Noblewoman.

Whatever the name may have been, we welcome all our new arrivals to modern day Elsenham and look forward to meeting you at one of the many Clubs and Societies in the village.

Our Chairman Ray Franklin in his Reflections this month features the village schooldays of our Founder, Gordon Barker. Gordon's anecdotes and many others are to be found in our "History of Elsenham School" that we published in 2013 to mark the 150th anniversary of the founding of the school. If you would like to know more about the Village School, copies of the book are still available at just £2.00. Contact us via the website, e-mail or telephone as listed above.

Our next meeting will be held on Wednesday 12th March at 8pm in the Memorial Hall and will include our AGM. The speaker for the evening will be our Chairman Ray Franklin who, in his own inimitable style will tell the story of St Mary's Church. Visitors are always welcome at our meetings for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership still costs just five pounds for a full years meetings. A bargain!

Memories of Elsenham School

The piece below was given to me by the late Gordon Barker in 2013, it affords a glimpse of educational yesterday.

I started at Elsenham School in 1938, leaving in 1948. My first teacher was Caroline Bates, the junior teacher was Mary Alcorn. The children's name for her was "Trotty" because of her pigeon-toed walk, her classroom was the small one to the rear of the school. On the wall was a picture of a boy being asked "When did you last see your father?" During the early years of World War II we used the chapel which was opposite Park Road. The windows had sticky tape to prevent flying glass. Two air raid shelters were built for the boys and the girls. A cycle shed was in the front playground next to where Mr Chalk, our headmaster, kept his 1936 Morris Eight. Nurse Chitterdon came periodically to inspect our hair for head lice.

At play times as I lived close-by I would slip home, so Eddie Powell a senior pupil, was given the task as my minder. School dinners were provided, also school milk in one third pint bottles, delivered from Robinsons, Mill Farm that was based in Stansted Road. Start of the day was prayers and register. There were garden plots to the rear of the school for the boys. Water was drawn from a hand pump adjacent to the small back playground. Next to the pump house was a small wooden building used as a wash house. We had a Christmas party in the old Village Hall, which was next to the school, organised by Mr Knappett, who lived in Elsenham Hall. We had to take a cup with a spoon tied to the handle. Party games were played and at the end we were given

an orange, apple, and a brand new threepenny piece.

The Barkers attended Elsenham School for almost 100 years. My father, my sister, my children and grandchildren also attended.

Are you a rhino or a hedgehog? Apparently, psychologists say there are two ways in which people react when hurt or angry, and it seems that the population is split roughly fifty-fifty between these two patterns of behaviour.

Rhinos are aggressive, charging when threatened. Hedgehogs are more defensive, using their prickles as a shield. Both can make relationships, and disagreement, quite challenging!

Healthy disagreement may require more restraint from rhinos than comes naturally, and more boldness from hedgehogs than is comfortable. It got me wondering how the Bible might help all of us: rhinos, hedgehogs or a mix of both.

In our All-age Service on the first Sunday of every month, we have been looking at the Beatitudes: sayings of Jesus which all begin with the word Blessed, and all found in Matthew chapter 5.

To be blessed can certainly mean to be happy. But in the Bible it means more. To be blessed is to be approved by God. To be blessed means God looks at you and declares: Good man! Good woman!

The Beatitudes therefore describe Jesus. They are also supposed to describe people who follow Jesus. For his followers, the Beatitudes should be a bit like our Jesus jumper or blazer. When I went to secondary school, by wearing my blazer, people knew which school I belonged to. I wasn't born wearing the blazer or going to that school. I wore the blazer only when I became part of that school. In the same way, the Beatitudes tell us how to live Jesus' way. When we live his way, it's as though we're wearing the same blazer Jesus wears. People can see that we belong to him.

In the first Beatitude, Jesus says: 'Blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.' It's the basis of all the other Beatitudes and a reminder right at the beginning that we have to come to God with our spiritual wallet empty. We can't do anything or give anything to God to get us into his family. Only Jesus can do that for us. I don't get God's love and blessing because I deserve it. No one does. We become part of God's family when we trust Jesus.

Nobody wants to be poor. But Jesus says being poor in spirit is absolutely essential. Blessed are the poor in spirit because they are ready to come to Jesus with empty hands and trust in him for their forgiveness and future. That requires humility.

And so we come to the third Beatitude: 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth,' a verse for rhinos and hedgehogs alike. Meekness is not weakness. Meek is the word Jesus chose to describe himself (Matthew 11: 29) and he was never weak.

To be meek means to know: I'm not Number 1 - God is, and then to live that out in all our relationships, showing restraint, patience, humility and boldness as required, rather than simply rejoicing to be the hedgehog or rhino we may naturally be.

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

Surveys of the invertebrate life in our ponds have shown the lower two ponds are significantly below the quality of the top pond. So in December we carried out work to help improve the lower pond. There were three main tasks:

- 1. Removal of fallen branches and dead wood which was slowly decaying in the water. This involved donning waders and fishing out branches or for the largest branches dragging them out with a winch.
- 2. We pollarded some trees to improve the amount of sunlight reaching the pond surface to help improve the environment for aquatic plants.
- 3. We opened up the route for the prevailing winds to put a breeze across the pond surface to increase the amount of oxygen that is dissolved into the water.

We made sure to leave plenty of bankside vegetation overhanging the water to provide cover and nesting locations for out mallards and moorhens. We also left in place the fallen tree that spans the pond and provides a convenient resting spot for the mallards and their ducklings in the spring.

This winter we have also done some more coppicing of hazel stands, opening up the floor of the wood to another cycle of regeneration and continuing a hazel wood management cycle that has been practised for hundreds of years.

It won't be long now and we will be looking for the first signs of spring.

Like others, I have covered many miles through the patchwork of landscape in the Hundred Parishes and have often crossed intersecting footpaths, stopping to examine my map to understand why they exist and where they go.

Recently, I picked up local author Christopher Hadley's book, The Road, in which Hadley explores a spur of Ermine Street which connects former Roman towns at Braughing and Chesterford, carving a straight line for 13 miles through

The Hundred Parishes. Hadley draws on years of archaeological and

historical research. Tracing the route, he gathers lost names, locates burial mounds and tracks down archaeology in the hope of revealing two thousand years of history. Through his words, we gain a glimpse of the civilisation that sited and constructed the road, of the people who used and maintained it and, eventually, of what happens when a road passes out of general use and the legacy it leaves behind.

Much of this route can be walked still; the actual Roman road is most visible as Beards Lane where it defines straight parish boundaries, with Clavering and Arkesden to the south-east and Langley and Elmdon to the north-west.

In short, The Road is a lyrical, nostalgic, sometimes humorous and intriguing social history and travelogue which will enthral enthusiasts of cultural and local history. After

finishing this book, I find myself re-examining parish churches, wondering if the red, small bricks in

the tower are Tudor in origin or perhaps pillaged from a lost Roman storehouse.

The highway which is the focus of this book is one of several local routes with Roman origins. Many feature somewhere in the walks that can be downloaded from www.hundredparishes.org.uk.

Here's lovely warming soup which can be enjoyed all the year round. You can use a variety of white mushrooms for this recipe, including button, chestnut and closed cup.

MUSHROOM, LEEK AND POTATO SOUP (serves 6)

- 1 oz (25g) knob of butter
- 1 tablespoon of sunflower oil
- 12oz (350g) white mushrooms, sliced
- 3 leeks, washed and sliced
- 2 large potatoes, peeled and cut into a small dice
- 1 large garlic clove, sliced
- 26 fl oz (750ml) hot chicken or vegetable stock
- 4 tablespoons double cream
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped tarragon
- Salt and freshy ground pepper

Heat the oil and butter in a casserole. Add the mushrooms and leeks and fry for 3 minutes. Cover with a lid and cook for a further 2 minutes.

Add the diced potatoes and stock. Cover the pan and simmer gently over a low heat for about 15 minutes, until the potatoes are tender.

Blend until smooth consistency with a hand-held blender or food processor. Season well, then add the cream and tarragon to serve.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: Serve with crusty French bread, ciabatta or sourdough. Can be made up to two days ahead and stored in the fridge. This soup also freezes well.






