### THANK YOU, MRS REID

From the Elsenham School Governors, on behalf of many people

At the end of the summer term Elsenham School's Head Teacher, Linda Reid, will be retiring after 18 years of





dedicated service to the community. Everyone who knows Linda, or has had any connection with the school during her headship, knows what a remarkable person she is and what an amazing job she has done throughout her time at the school.

When she started at Elsenham in 2003, the school was a single-form entry with 120 pupils and the numbers were dropping. She leaves the school having transformed it into a two-form entry school with over 300 pupils and pupil numbers rising every week.

Linda encouraged the children to dream and she taught them that they could achieve those dreams if they put their minds to it. Academically, the school is one of the highest performing schools in Essex and it will be no surprise that in 2020 she was recognised by Essex County Council as one of the three best primary school head teachers in Essex.

She has always believed that the children should receive a fully-rounded education wrapped in a Christian ethos and she worked hard to ensure that the children were given a huge range of opportunities, covering a wide range of areas in arts, sciences and sports. Anyone who has heard the children recounting stories of their trips to a wide range of places as diverse as Hatfield Forest, the pantomime at Stevenage, and the Year 6 school journeys will know how much the children have been inspired by this approach.

Linda has always believed that the school should be at the centre of the community and that every child should be able to attend their local village school. In order to achieve that she has successfully lobbied for an expansion of the school premises and, when she was successful with this, managed two significant building projects. On both those occasions, her insight and passion for all aspects of education, combined with her laser-like focus on detail, have resulted in facilities that will help educate children for years to come.

This was never a 9-to-5 job and many of the longer-term residents in the village will recall seeing her working in her office early in morning, late into the evening and on Saturdays. There is an entire generation of Elsenham families who have benefited from her approach to primary education, and I am sure they will all join us in wishing her a long and happy retirement.

#### Love Your Nettles? By Richard Peake

We are being encouraged to 're-wild' bits of our gardens for butterflies amongst others and nettles are often cited as being good for their caterpillars. Indeed this is true as our resident species of small tortoiseshell, peacock and comma love to eat them. Caterpillars of nonresident species of red admiral and painted lady also enjoy them.

It would be a mistake to just let the nettles grow and not 'manage' them for the benefits of these lovely butterflies. Our resident species hibernate in old buildings (including Henham and Elsenham churches) and emerge in the warm spring weather, laying their eggs on the growing nettles. These caterpillars pupate and the second generation adults emerge in July or August and look for more nettles on which to



lay their eggs. This is where the problem begins since nettles at this time of year are now mature and forming seeds. - these are not palatable to the caterpillars.

In olden times, the hay meadows (including patches of nettles) were cut in July and the crop removed (along with the nettles). These meadows were then left to regrow and grazed by the cattle and sheep. Crucially the nettles re-grew and the fast growing new shoots were very appetising for the caterpillars. The adults from this second generation would then feed on flowers in the autumn to build up reserves for the winter hibernation and the early spring when flowers are scarce. Those of you with fallen fruits from apple trees may also see the adults feeding on the sweet juices of these rotting apples and also imbibing some alcohol as well since the sugars ferment naturally. This makes the butterflies a bit drunk!

So, if you want to encourage your butterflies please cut down your nettles this month and remove the cuttings – you may well see some new caterpillars in August on the re-growing nettles. This is also an important food source for the caterpillars of the non-resident species of red admirals and painted ladies so that their second generation adults can fly south to Southern Europe and North Africa over the winter. Thanks as well to Uttlesford District Council for cutting the verges so the re-growing nettles are at their best for the caterpillars.

Incidentally several of the caterpillars of the species mentioned above also enjoy eating hops which we often see in Essex climbing telegraph stays or rambling over hedges. These plants are the left overs from when Essex hosted hop gardens – do you know where local pub 'The Hop Poles' is located?

# DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

A Pyrrhic victory, just in case you weren't paying full attention during Ancient History lessons, is one where you win but gain nothing. Such is likely to be the outcome for Stansted Airport, following the Appeal Inquiry decision allowing an increase in passenger numbers from the current limit of 35 million passengers per annum (mppa) to 43 mppa. In the last twelve pandemic-dominated months, Stansted Airport has handled a mere 3 mppa. An optimist of heroic proportions would be needed to believe that the airport will come anywhere near its 2019 level of 28 mppa for many years, never mind the larger number now granted.

If the decision is hollow for the airport, it is devastating for Uttlesford District Council. The inspectors decided to award costs to the airport against Uttlesford Council and they could run into more than a million quid (you and I will be paying). The inspectors suggested that they might have made a costs award themselves if the airport had not initiated it. 'The Council's reasons for refusal', they stated, 'are imprecise, vague and unsubstantiated. They do not stand up to scrutiny'. UDC 'persisted in arguing for the imposition of a condition (so called "condition 15") which is clearly unlawful, unnecessarily prolonging the inquiry'.

As a further sign of ineptitude, UDC is asking the Secretary of State (SoS) to intervene. This is silly posturing - he has no power to do so, now that the inspectors have given their decision. Stop Stansted Expansion asked for the application to be 'called in' by the SoS in March 2018, April 2019 and as recently as April this year, with zero support from UDC. Uttlesford Council was clearly out of its depth, on which there is something of a conspiracy of silence - UDC won't admit it, and the airport will not now say so, having achieved their objective.

The inspectors have been criticized for the brevity and one-sidedness of their report. Nuanced it is not. One wag suggested that they should be thanked for their Executive Summary and asked for the full report. They continued to regard carbon emissions as a matter for Government, and assumed that foreign air travel must necessarily be a good thing, regardless of the pandemic. The Delta variant did not arrive by the sea route.

The only outfit to emerge with any credit from the whole caboodle is Stop Stansted Expansion, which pursued its case consistently. If the inspectors set aside too readily some well-reasoned arguments, SSE at least escaped censure, and the airport did not apply for costs. There is no realistic likelihood of further applications for airport expansion and SSE is now transforming itself into Stansted Airport Watch, with some of the old guard leaving and a different but still vital monitoring role anticipated.

The Gladman application for up to 220 dwellings to the north of Bedwell Road has gone to appeal, with an inquiry scheduled to start on 14 September and last for eight days. UDC has promised to defend refusal vigorously; no doubt the applicants are assembling a full team of expensive lawyers and consultants.

YOUR INFO? DON'T BE SCAMMED!



Residents are reminded to keep their personal documents safe after a number of reports of scammers asking for copies of passports and driving licences. Essex Police have seen a recent trend in scammers requesting personal details which can be used to steal someone's identity. This has been linked to a number of different scams including:

- HMRC/National Insurance fraud where the criminal claims they need your personal details to prevent prosecution or reinstate your NI number.
- Computer software frauds where the criminal claims to be from your internet provider. They take control of your computer and say they need to take a photo of you and your driving licence/passport to confirm your identity.

Requests for personal details should always be a red flag. You should never provide this information unless you have confirmed who you are dealing with. To protect your information and your money,

STOP - Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

CHALLENGE - Could it be fake? It's OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

PROTECT - If you have provided personal details to someone over the phone and you now believe this to be a scam, contact your bank, building society and credit card company immediately and report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or at  $\sqrt{2}$  www.actionfraud.police.uk.

DID YOU KNOW? Over 70s can renew their driving licence for free with the DVLA.

#### ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 Temporary Closure of Footpath 44 and Footpath 45, Stansted Mountfitchet

Essex County Council will temporarily close footpath 44 and footpath 45 starting at Alsa Street, just after Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve, eastbound across the footpath and footbridge to where the footpath meets Isabel Drive. The footpath will be closed from 9-30 August. The closure is required for the safety of the public whilst waterproofing and resurfacing work is carried out to the footbridge.

## THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

With school holidays approaching and more people spending time near home, I would like to remind you of the walk routes that are on the Society's website and free to download and

print. Over the last year or so, we have been steadily increasing the number of recommended routes. We now offer more than 75 routes covering some 400 miles in total with little repetition. Soon, each of the hundred parishes will feature in at least one walk. Most routes have a mixture of countryside and town or village. There is a good range of distances, from 1 mile upwards. Station walks start and finish at railway stations and all others start and finish at a suitable place to park.



Our aim is to help residents and visitors to easily enjoy the area. The routes are planned so as to use good paths and quiet lanes, and to achieve an interesting mix of scenery. The descriptions seek to ensure that nobody will get lost and also to provide sufficient information along the way to make the outing interesting. The area's abundance of public rights of way, its gentle natural beauty and wealth of listed buildings make this possible. Many walks pass or finish near a pub or tea room, thankfully now open again.

While we can plan the route to pass through attractive countryside and villages, we can't predict what pleasures nature may have in store: perhaps majestic cloud formations, the sights and sounds of birds, the variety of butterflies and insects, the scale of badger diggings, deer prints, even a glimpse of a hare or fox or herd of deer. The seasons bring changes to trees, crops, wayside flowers and fruits. With such potential, each walk can be an adventure. We encourage you to carry a camera.

## Elsenham Village History Society

Reading the paper a little while back I was sorry to see that a plan to maintain a heritage centre on the site of the old Whitechapel Bell Foundry had foundered and the old foundry would become yet another boutique hotel ending over four centuries of tradition.

Newer readers may wonder why this would feature in an article about Elsenham's history but the answer is simple. Two of the four bells that grace the tower of St Mary's church were cast there. The first of these and the first to be hung was the Treble bell cast by William Culverdon, a Master Founder at Whitechapel between 1506 and 1522.

The bell cannot be dated better than this but at the start of this period Henry VII was on the throne to be succeeded by his seventeen year old son Henry (VIII) in 1509 who at once married his first wife (of many) Catherine of Aragon. History indeed! The second of the Whitechapel bells, the Third, was a relatively modern addition having been cast in 1819 by Thomas Mears, another master founder. This was also the last of the St Mary's bells to be hung. A swift glance at the Elsenham Timeline on our website shows that this was the year of the Peterloo Massacre in Manchester and a year before the death of King George III in 1820. It was also a year after the appointment of Thomas Canning as Vicar of Elsenham, a post he held until his death in 1855. For the sake of completeness, the other two bells of St Mary's, the Tenor and the Second were cast at Hitchin Foundry in 1572 and 1600 respectively.

All is not lost, however, for the art of bell founding in the UK. The Loughborough Bellfoundry Trust has won a grant to save the premises of John Taylor and Co. Bellfounders. It was here in 1881 that the Great Paul bell was cast for St Paul's Cathedral, larger even than Big Ben that was cast at Whitechapel in 1858. Big Ben was a replacement for the original bell that had been cast in the North East and cracked beyond repair when being tested and tuned in New Palace Yard.

Over the years there have been more than a hundred of these articles covering a wide range of topics. They may all be found on our website, if you have a spare minute or two, click on <Our Society> then <Newsletters>, it will be well worth your time. There is of course a great deal of other information available on the site as well as a lot of photographs both ancient and modern to coin a phrase. Go on, have a look, you won't regret it.

Hopefully by the time you read this, we will have had a successful Village fete and will be looking forward to a more normal life. It is intended that our first meeting post lockdown will be on Wednesday 8 September and will incorporate our postponed Annual General Meeting. The final speaker line-up is still being finalised but our previously booked speakers have been very helpful and all have agreed to speak at some point, I should have more on the programme for the next few meetings next month.

#### NATURAL OUTLOOK ON THE HIGH LIFE

Recently, while in Yorkshire, we went to the RSPB Reserve at Bempton Cliffs where it was the early part of the birds' breeding season. Magic. There were many 'usual birds' about on the landward parts of the reserve on the North Sea's edge, cliffs that go down hundreds of feet to the water. With loads of ledges from very narrow to very wide this is where seabirds, up to about 250,000 of them, 'nest'.



Near the cliff's edge I looked up and above me was a gannet. These are big birds! Adults are mostly white with black tips to their wings. The long, pointed bill protrudes from the gap between two piercing blue eyes crowned with a buffish yellow head. The wing span over me was more than six feet. Later we watched them diving in their classic style, way below us, pointing at the surface clasping their wings tightly to enter the water like a torpedo.

There are fulmars too. Like an albatross but much smaller, it has the ability to glide a long way on stiff, straight wings. With large heads, a short, thick neck and a yellow bill with glands to get rid of sea water, their plumage is usually pale, medium grey above and pale below. Their look-a-likes are kittiwake; a bit smaller, round-headed, with a short, white neck and underparts, grey wings with tips, "dipped in black ink" and black legs and 'Kittiwake, kittiwake' is its call as well as its name. There were several herring gulls patrolling the cliffs looking hopefully for unattended nestlings.

There were three representatives of the auk group; guillemots, razorbills and puffins.

Guillemots, about 16" -17 " beak to tail, are dark chocolate on the head, back and wings with a white stripe on the wings – though they tend to look black - and white on the other parts. Some have white 'spectacles' .The bill is slender, dark and sharply pointed. They use the very narrow ledges for 'nesting' and lay an almost pointed egg to prevent it rolling off the cliff. Razorbills like wider ledges or crevices. They are a bit smaller and the plumage looks blacker where it doesn't cover the white underparts. It, too, has a white wing stripe. Bills are *very* different, in contrast to the guillemots' bill it is shaped more like an old-fashioned razor, black with white bands round it. There were a few puffins where we were; in burrows where there was a patch of grassed over soil sloping towards the cliff edge. I expect you know what a puffin looks like – smaller than the two other auks, black and white with the multi-coloured 'parrot bill' but the most delightful of all I think.

The whole experience was amazing; the hundreds of various birds in flight, to and fro from 'nests' - they are very sparingly arranged if at all - whirling about and plunging down to the water. Then the noise created by all these birds squawking, grunting, cackling, making raucous noises or a call like someone with a sore throat. And the stench – very fishy. And being so close to some of them which had made their homes near the top or in the wide crevices which came close in to the path. Or if you get the binoculars on the teeny white dots below only to discover a whole raft of mixed sea birds either fishing or just floating and preening.

This was the choice of the book group this month. The book was generally well-liked and was rated with a couple of 9/10 scores. There is no doubt that this is a book full of tension and drama although that didn't appeal to all.

At a family party, 15 members of Lydia's family including her husband and her mother are murdered by members of a local cartel. A criminally orchestrated murder. Owing to a fortunate trip to the bathroom at the time of the massacre, Lydia escapes with her eight year old son. The bulk of the book follows their flight to el norte - the United States - following the route used by refugees on La Bestia. There are many others with a range of backgrounds and reasons for attempting this dangerous and illegal journey. Who to trust is a constant dilemma for Lydia in her attempts to keep her son safe.

The book is 450 pages but is a real page-turner with a relentless pace and is surprisingly easy to read. The novel illustrates what can happen when societies and their political leaders turn a blind eye to the actions of the corrupt and criminal few which erode the rule of law. It also illustrates the negative effects that certain policy decisions have on refugees and migrants.

Jeanine Cummins has thoroughly researched her subject and her empathy with migrants is evident. Some people have criticised the book for cultural appropriation but Jeanine Cummins uses her reporting skills to simply tell a story. Agatha Christie was not known as a murderer just a brilliant crime writer. Some of the events are quite shocking and from the author's notes at the back are obviously based on true accounts. However, Lydia and Luca are fictional and the story demonstrates the humanity and vulnerability of many migrants faced with almost impossible choices.

This classic salad is full of flavour and texture. It is very versatile. Mix and match the ingredients to suit what is in season.

SALADE NICOISE (serves 2)

- 8 small new potatoes
- 50g green beans (a small handful), trimmed and halved
- 2 medium tomatoes, quartered OR 8 cherry tomatoes, cut in half
- 50g pitted mixed or black olives
- 1 Little Gem Lettuce, quartered
- 145g can tuna in olive oil, drained, oil reserved
- 3 eggs

For the dressing:

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> garlic clove
- 1 anchovy fillet (optional)
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 4 tablespoons reserved olive oil from the tuna can (topped up, if needed)

To make the dressing, mash the garlic and anchovy (if using), with a small pinch of salt. Combine the paste with the mustard and vinegar, then slowly stir in the oil. Set aside. Tip the new potatoes into a large pan of cold, slightly salted water. Bring to the boil, then reduce to simmer. Add the beans and cook for 5 minutes, then remove with a slotted spoon, plunge into a bowl of cold water to cool. Cook the potatoes until tender, drain and leave to cool. Halve or quarter the potatoes and toss in a large bowl with 1 tablespoon of the dressing.

Meanwhile, simmer the eggs for 7½ minutes. Transfer to a bowl of cold water. Drain the beans and eggs. Peel and halve the eggs. Tip the lettuce quarters, cooked green beans and olives into the bowl with the potatoes. Add most of the remaining dressing and gently toss. Divide the salad between two bowls and top with the tomatoes and eggs. Flake over the tuna, then drizzle with the remainder of the dressing and season. Serve immediately.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: Little Gem lettuce is great for crunch but you could also use rocket or mixed leaves. To optimise the flavour of this salad, use really ripe tomatoes, warm them in the sun before use, if you can. Alternatively, use a handful of sundried tomatoes instead. If you prefer, omit the potatoes. If fresh tuna is on offer, cook on the griddle, slice and add instead of tinned. For maximum flavour, let your potatoes and green beans cool in the vinaigrette.
