

ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL 6 May 2021

The Annual Elsenham Parish Council meeting was due to be held on Monday 10 May 2021. However, the meeting had to be re-arranged as the legislation allowing parish and town councils to hold online meetings, which Parliament had passed in 2020, expired on 7 May 2021.

This caused a dilemma, the Parish Council could no longer hold Zoom meetings, yet to hold an indoor meeting while observing all Covid restrictions would also not be possible. The Parish Council, therefore, brought forward the meeting to Thursday 6 May 2021, which was held via Zoom.

For the third consecutive year Cllr Graham Mott was unanimously elected Chairman with Cllr Moyra Jackson as Vice-Chairman. The appointments to committees, working groups, representatives to outside bodies and co-ordinators to other roles, were agreed and voted on, 25 in total.

The Playing Field Committee is going to purchase two new cradle swings and two new litter bins. On the request of a resident, the committee is considering replacing or adding new play equipment, this will depend on funds and available space.

The Parish Council's accounts for 2020/2021 have been signed off by the internal auditor. The Chairman signed the Annual Governance Statement and the Annual Accounting Statement 2020/2021 and these will be submitted to the external auditor.

Summer planting has been delayed for a few weeks, as the pansies are still looking wonderful.

Five cherry trees have been planted along the boundary fence of the Memorial Garden; these should give an attractive back drop to the garden over time.

Elsenham Parish Council would like to remind residents that the public sections of the Parish Council Notice Boards are not for advertising businesses. Any posts advertising businesses will be removed by the Parish Council.

The Parish Council would like to place a dog waste bin at the entrance to Alsa Wood. Unfortunately, the Parish Council is still waiting for Uttlesford District Council to agree to empty the bin as part of their weekly refuse collection. This has been going on for months and despite councillors sending numerous emails and leaving telephone messages, the District Council has still not granted the request.

The date for the next Parish Council meeting was scheduled for 7 June 2021, however, it was agreed that in these unsettled times and given the constraints that the Government have imposed, it would be prudent not to hold a meeting in June.

We are preparing for our Annual General Meeting. We are halfway into our administration, and despite the pandemic continue to deliver our Corporate Plan.

We are employing an Interim Chief Executive, whilst we begin the process of employing a new Chief Executive. Dawn French, who has been working in local government for 38 years is allowing herself more time to do something different. Personally, we would like to thank her for the calm and unflustered work in steering the district through the pandemic over the last year.

During the interim the Chief Executive will be asked to focus on improving the Planning Department. We have commissioned a review by the Local Government Association. As many of you may be aware the Queen's Speech included changes in planning, and we must continue to ensure we deliver homes that are right for the District and challenge those that are not.

We have returned to face to face meetings, the new format includes social distancing, wearing a mask in well ventilated rooms (a spare blanket, just in case is a must!). Our meetings can be now be viewed on Youtube, to watch, please visit https://www.uttlesford.gov.uk/article/4776/Your-council.

Due to the announcement of the Government to reduce carbon emissions the Council consequently wrote to the Inspectors seeking the re-opening of the Stansted Airport Inquiry to hear further evidence on the significance of this policy change, which would effectively preclude any headroom in the carbon budget for any additional emissions arising from additional airport capacity beyond that already committed. At the same time SSE wrote to the Secretaries of State for Local Government and Transport seeking them to recover the appeal decision from the Planning Inspectorate on the grounds that STAL's proposed development now clearly raised issues of national significance, notwithstanding previous rejections that they were only of local significance.

The Secretaries of State have not responded on recovery of the appeal decision. The Inspectors allowed an extension for written submissions until 7 May, but have not specifically dealt with the request for a further hearing session.







DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

At the April meeting of Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee, consideration was given to the application by Gladman to build up to 220 new homes to the north of Bedwell Road. The site is half in Ugley parish and half in Henham parish, but the greatest impact would be on Elsenham. All three parishes objected to the proposal, which was rejected unanimously by the Committee.

Essex Highways, true to form, objected and then withdrew the objections. Access would be immediately adjacent to the motorway and the route to the site is spectacularly bad - it is conceded that most traffic would use the narrow lane to the west, with its eight sharp bends in under a mile before reaching the B1383.

The Committee cited a shopping list of reasons for refusal: harm to the countryside, distance from facilities, poor air quality, noise and insufficient infrastructure. That might seem enough to put anyone off, but there is no doubt that Gladman will appeal, citing Uttlesford's lack of a five-year housing land supply and lack of a Local Plan. On the other side of Bedwell Road, determination is awaited of the application to cram in up to 50 dwellings in a small patch of land previously advertised for grazing, which fooled no-one.

At the conclusion of the Appeal Inquiry into Uttlesford District Council's refusal of an increase in passenger numbers at Stansted Airport, the Airport gave notice at the last possible moment of its intention to claim for costs against UDC on the grounds of 'unreasonable behaviour'. Both sides were given time to make their case.

The Airport's claim ran to 22 pages. UDC countered with 55 pages and ran through a full lexicon of abuse, including: inexcusably late, fatal flaw, totally unsatisfactory, no lawful basis, procedural injustice, exercise of shadow boxing, gross oversimplification, complete mischaracterisation, disingenuous, and devoid of any substance or merit. The Airport (the applicant always gets the last word) countered with a final 13 pages, including: preposterous hyperbole, completely absurd, complete misapprehension, hopeless argument, complete and unacceptable mischaracterisation, and illegitimate attack. In the verbal vituperation stakes, UDC had the greater quantity, but the Airport possibly just shaded it on quality.

As if that wasn't enough fun, late in the day came the announcement of a significant shift in Government policy, in that the sixth 'Carbon Budget' is specifically to include the UK's share of international aviation emissions. The parties were invited by the Inspectorate to comment. UDC made a first-rate submission, but then spoilt it by reiterating the call for approval subject to conditions, rather than outright rejection. Stop Stansted Expansion was steadfastly true to its name. Whether the Inspectorate will be swayed in reaching a decision by the Glasgow Climate Change Conference at Glasgow in November is an interesting question.

Garden Crime Prevention

When storing larger items like motorcycles, cycles, lawn mowers etc consider fixing a set/ground anchor into the concrete floor, a heavy chain and again a good quality padlock to secure it. If the chain or lock is lying across the floor it could provide a surface for it to be smashed against so try and keep it tightly secured. Consider a shed alarm if you do not have one, there are shed alarms available that contact you on the phone when activated such as www.uwatch.co.uk.

Products that are fit for purpose can found by looking for the "Secured by Design" or "Sold Secure" logos, or look on their websites www.securedbydesign.comor www.soldsecure.com.

Tips for statues, ornaments and pots:

- Drill and secure larger pots and ornaments to a secure surface with a good quality chain or padlock.
- Offenders will not want to break valuable containers however they may still
 opt to lift out the plant --this is where the Plant Anchors can help.
- Make the plant pot heavier with a layer of gravel at the bottom.
- Some planters/pots can be marked/post-coded /etched carefully with a small Hobbyist drill or an indelible pen can work sometimes on the base.
- Hanging baskets can be secured with chains or cable ties but there is a danger the offender may simply wrench from the fixing point making even greater damage.
- Where possible position statues, ornaments etc in view of the house and neighbours.
- Photograph more unusual ornaments with a scale rule included, and where
 possible ensure these ornaments are in view of a house and have good
 lighting. Consider using a property marking product.
- Only buy ornaments from a reputable source and report any suspicions to Police/Trading Standards.

As summer arrives, we hope that readers will continue to enjoy the walks listed on www.hundredparishes.org.uk. These varied routes provide a wonderful opportunity to appreciate the variety of wildflowers growing in field margins, hedgerows, verges, churchyards and village greens.



After this season's chilly start, the warmer days have encouraged an abundance of flowers to provide essential nectar and pollen to support visiting pollinators. With the increasing concern about the alarming reduction in insect numbers, many of those caring for green spaces have adopted the 'NO MOW IN MAY' approach to grass maintenance, where the uncut grassy places can support a surprisingly large number of different native species. Their flowers add variety to these areas and the bees benefit as well!

Wayside plants such as stinging nettles, goosegrass (the long, hairy plant that sticks to your socks) and cow parsley thrive alongside lanes and tracks. Cow parsley, with its spray of tiny white flowers, can grow as high as a person. A touch of pink is often added by the flowers of red campion, also known as Bachelor's Buttons as it might have been worn as a buttonhole by unmarried men.

Common bright yellow flowers include Dandelions and the shiny golden petals of a great variety of Buttercups. The tall Ox-eye Daisy is often present where wildflower mixtures have been sown. In recent years these have become a common sight beside new roadways.

The types of wild flower I have listed can be seen and enjoyed almost everywhere in the Hundred Parishes. There



are many more varieties to be seen and occasionally something quite rare. For smart phone users there are apps to help with identification, but we do not have to be experts to appreciate and enjoy nature's abundance.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. Thought for the month

I would reply 'Do you remember the SARS & MERS viruses that petered out a few years back, or the catastrophic volcanic eruption in Yellowstone that He prevented or the devastating tidal wave in the Atlantic from a huge landslip in the Canary Islands worse than the Boxing Day tsunami that He also prevented?'

CS Lewis (author of the Narnia Chronicles etc.,) said that, 'Pain is God's megaphone to rouse a deaf world'

God created all this world (ourselves included) and the bible says that He loves all that He has created especially we humans (Isa 43). ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

When he retired on 5 January 1984, Henry (Harry) Cook had served British Railways for 34 years. He started his career at Thaxted, the terminus of the 'Gin 'n' Toffee' line before moving to Elsenham as a porter on the closure of the branch in 1953.

Once at Elsenham, he was responsible for selling tickets, tending the gardens and operating the crossing gates. Being a keen gardener he was responsible for many of the splendid flower displays on the station, winning several 'Best Kept Station' awards that can still be seen hanging in the booking office. Harry lived in North Cottage in Fuller's End and was well known in the village so it was little surprise that on his retirement a surprise party was held for him arranged by Sylvia Bishop, the then proprietor of Country Newspapers which was the shop across from the station. Many of his passengers attended and his farewell card was signed by more than 150 people. On his retirement he was a widower but married again in 1993 to Betty Copping. He sadly passed away in Addenbrookes Hospital on 4 August 1997.

We are very grateful to the family of Harry Cook who have donated a box of his effects including his uniform cap and jacket. There are also many photographs which are now in our webmaster's work stack for scanning and cataloguing.

In 1985, Stuart Witkin, then preparing for his 'O' levels, produced a paper entitled "The Morphology of Elsenham." which examined how Elsenham developed from its earliest days to the then present day. The paper gives a fascinating insight into our village as it was in the mid-1980s. The full document containing many photographs and diagrams will be available on our website to coincide with the publication of this magazine. A little taster may be found below and our thanks go to Stuart for giving us permission to reproduce his paper.

"The Morphology of Elsenham – An Extract: Elsenham is a rapidly expanding village of over two thousand people. It is now dominated by twentieth century housing developments. There is a good range of services and facilities these include two grocers, a butcher, a post office, a confectioners and news agents a hard ware store, a hairdresser, TWO garages, TWO public houses, a church a community centre and also a modern doctor's surgery. It has its own joint-use village hall next to the Primary School. A bus service runs on weekdays to Stortford. Trains run to Cambridge and London."

Stuart concludes the report with these words: "The Village has grown so greatly in the last 30 years that now any further development is prevented by the building line." Hmm... if only.

As I mentioned last month our June meeting will not be taking place as restrictions will not be lifted until a couple of weeks after the due date. However restrictions will hopefully be lifted in time to allow the Village Fete to go ahead on 26 June. So all being well, we will have a stand there and will look forward to catching up with members and friends both there and at a meeting in September.

NATURAL OUTLOOK

Mid-summer is the time when some of my favourite flowers are in bloom; sulphur clover is one of them. You will probably be familiar with the red or white clover but may not be with their sulphur yellow 'cousin'. Its flowerhead is very similar in shape, but the colour is whitish yellow, and it has a pair of leaves tucked right up under it. It is found in a number of Special Roadside Verges round



here: at Burton End by the airport, on both sides of the B1051 road, just before Broxted church as you travel towards Thaxted, and in a patch or two at the side of BR5, as it approaches the side of the Elsenham Golf Course. Another yellow favourite found along there is the common rock rose, a lovely little low-growing flower on woody stems with small soft green leaves that are silver on the underside. It has five mid-yellow petals with one bloom or more at the end of the stems. It likes soil with some chalk in it, which is why it is local. I have seen it on the Broxted verge, but it is one of those plants that disappear from time to time.

One plant that has, for me, a misleading name is grass of Parnassus. I first saw it in Ireland in a marshy habitat and was startled when I saw it in an English bog. It is not at all grass like; to begin with it is rather waxy and has several straight stems, up to 4-10 inches tall, each bearing a single five- petalled white flower. It has low down heart-shaped leaves that stay low. It likes bogs, wet grasslands and fens, which is why you could see it in, say, Wicken Fen, or in Colton Marshes in Suffolk.



Another white flower, a favourite though not rare, is meadow sweet, a perennial well over two feet tall. It bears a fluffy head of teeny flowers in a creamy white 'ball' at the top of the stem and, especially on hot days, smells lovely. It too likes a bit of chalk in the soil and some damp, so I'm looking to see if it can be introduced to the wildflower patch in The Spinney, if I can make a spot wet enough for it.



As we are now permitted to take trips beyond local ones, if you head to the coast, and get closer to it, in a relatively rural bits around say Mersea or Fingringhoe, you will see alexanders along many of the hedgerow verges. This is a tall plant, one of the umbellifers i.e. it has a flower head like cow parsley, but its flowers are yellow-green. It is one of those plants where the stems

become hollow and these are a glossy green as are its leaves, which have the form of several sections per leaf. They are salt tolerant, so if you come across them, it means you're getting near the sea.

Lastly there is pepper saxifrage, another tall plant that looks like a yellow flowered robust cow parsley. There used to be a large patch of it at the bottom of Molehill Green. It seems to have been mown off, a great pity, but I look forward to its return.

THE OTHER BENNET SISTER by Janice Hadlow

'In Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice, Mary is the middle of the five Bennet girls and the plainest of them all, so what hope does she have? Prim and pious, with no redeeming features, she is unloved and seemingly unlovable. The Other Bennet Sister, though, shows another side to Mary. An introvert in a family of



extroverts; a constant disappointment to her mother who values beauty above all else; fearful of her father's sharp tongue; with little in common with her siblings – is it any wonder she turns to books for both company and guidance? And, if she finds her life lonely or lacking, she determines to try harder at the one thing she can be: right. One by one, her sisters marry – Jane and Lizzy for love; Lydia for some semblance of respectability – but Mary, it seems, is destined to remain single and live out her life at Longbourn, at least until her father dies and the house is bequeathed to the reviled Mr Collins. But when that fateful day finally comes, she slowly discovers that perhaps there is hope for her, after all...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

In an unusual twist on our usual choices, this month's readings were split between *The Other Bennet Sister* and *Final Cut*. Those who read *The Other Bennet Sister* felt it was a book of two halves but were divided on which half was best. The conclusion was that this book was best enjoyed by Jane Austen fans who have read Pride and Prejudice.





FRUIT AND NUT GRANOLA (serves 8-10)

- 12 oz (350g) jumbo oats
- 1 heaped teaspoon cinnamon
- 4½ oz (125g) mixed nuts (walnuts, almonds, cashews, pecans etc)
- Pinch of salt
- 3 oz (75g) melted unsalted butter
- 3fl oz (70ml) maple syrup
- 4½ oz (125g) mixed dried fruit (raisins, sultanas, cranberries, chopped apricots)

Heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4.

In a large bowl, toss the oats with the cinnamon, mixed nuts and pinch of salt. Stir through the melted butter and maple syrup.

Place mixture onto a baking sheet and put in the oven for 35-40 minutes or until golden brown, stirring halfway through the cooking time.

Allow to cool down completely, then stir through mixed dried fruit. Store in an airtight glass jar. Will keep for up to six weeks.

CHEF'S SUGGESTIONS: You could use salted butter, but don't add further salt to the mix. Make a vegan version using coconut oil instead of the unsalted butter. For a change, add some coconut chips along with the dried fruit.

A simple mixture of nuts and dried fruits also makes a delicious snack. Add sunflower and/or pumpkin seeds for extra crunch.
