

In the meantime, we will continue with the usual regular features and local community news and hope we succeed in continuing to provide you with your monthly copy of Elsenham News.



ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL 7 MARCH 2022

Elsenham Parish Council are still looking for new Parish Councillors.

The Council meet once a month and there are committees for specific areas, Finance, Flowerbeds, Planning, Playing Fields, Rights of Way and Open Spaces and Communication. If you would like further details, please contact the Parish Clerk louise.epc@gmail.com

The Parish Council are still waiting for the third quote for the new equipment in the children's play area. When it is received the Council will study all three quotes and decide which one to proceed with. The decision will take into consideration the suggestions made by residents and the price. Once the new equipment is installed a bench, dedicated to the late Peter Clear, who was Chairman of the Playing Field Committee for 17 years, will be positioned in the play area.

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held on Thursday 28 April 2022, at 8.00pm in the Memorial Hall. This is a meeting for residents to have their say on issues in the village. Essex County Councillor Ray Gooding, District Councillor Petrina Lees and our own Parish Council Chairman, Graham Mott, will each give a summary of the last year. There will be an opportunity for you to ask questions.

If a bus stop is not used, it can be removed by Essex County Council. This has happened to a bus stop on Henham Road. Unfortunately, the travel apps and the timetable still refer to this bus stop. However, the buses will stop at non dedicated stops if you put your hand out and if it is safe for the bus to do so.

North Hall Road have extended their road closure date to the 10 November 2022. Hopefully, the road will be open before this date, but for safety reasons some of the work will have to wait until the summer when the river is at its lowest. The work is going to cost in the region of £1million.

Essex Highways are installing enforcement measures on the roads approaching Stansted, this is to stop large vehicles coming through Stansted along Grove Hill and into Elsenham. There will be a weight limit imposed on the centre of Stansted Village. Traffic travelling from Thaxted will be diverted down Hall Road, around Stansted Airport. The police will also be monitoring the traffic lights on Grove Hill for drivers who jump the lights. Satellite navigation companies will amend their routes.

Uttlesford District Council's Planning Department and Planning Committee have been put on special measures based on the number of applications they have refused and then lost at appeal. This means that all major planning applications, over 10 houses may, if the applicant so chooses, be made to the Planning Inspectorate, bypassing Uttlesford District Council. However, if these measures had been in place when the major developments in Elsenham had been submitted, the outcome would have been the same.

The next Parish Council meeting will be Tuesday 19 April 2022, 7.30pm, Old Frank's.

Spring is here, and we welcome the lighter days. From the 1 April, as I write this, the new norm begins. There will be a hybrid of office and home working and more meetings will be face to face for members. We have employed a new Director of Planning and the transformation of the planning department continues.

Council Tax rebate

Uttlesford households in Council Tax Bands A-D will get a £150 rebate in their Council Tax bill in April this year. This rebate won't have to be repaid and will be made directly by us.

The £150 rebate will not be shown on your bill, nor will it be credited to your Council Tax account.

Eligibility

To be eligible, you need to be living in a property in Council Tax Bands A-D, living in the property as the primary residence of the person liable to pay the Council Tax. If you qualify for the rebate and currently pay your Council Tax by Direct Debit, we'll make the payment directly into your bank account. We expect to make these payments in April and May 2022.

If you missed our Menopause, The Last Taboo Workshop, this was a virtual workshop to help you to feel equipped and more positive about the menopause, as well as understanding the different ways it can be managed.

We teamed up with Over the Bloody Moon, for an interactive, educational menopause workshop to help us understand more about this transition and be able to better spot the signs associated with this time of life. The session got us thinking about how we can be better managers and colleagues, to support those impacted by menopause. Cultivating and opening the conversation is an essential part of removing the taboo from menopause and helps you be a better colleague, partner, and friend. You can watch it on our website.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

If you've left the village in the direction of Henham recently, you'll know all about the temporary traffic lights at the bend beyond the cricket field. A new access road is under construction which will go as far as the corner of the main part of the site for 350 homes. A more substantial detailed application has been made for the development itself, and Bloor Homes have said that revisions will be made in the light of comments from the Parish Council and others. Despite anxious scanning of the horizon, these revisions are awaited as I write.

350 new homes is as many as the Isabel Drive and Franklin Drive developments combined. One of the rules of the two-phase game which is outline and detailed planning approval is that, for the most part, plans with the outline approval are 'purely illustrative'. Once that approval is secured, the site is flogged off and the new developer starts again. The outfit making the outline application wants to include as many homes as possible, since that will increase the sale price.

Fairfield used the ploy in their outline application of allowing just one parking space for each home, on the grounds that residents would use an enhanced bus service and the train, and there would be no need for more than one car. This was always a non-starter - apart from anything else, it's at odds with Uttlesford's policy, but the application was nonetheless approved, with the caveat that it's for 'up to' 350 homes. Bloor have not attempted to continue the absurd parking strategy - but as they have approval for 350, they are determined to fit in that number through various devices.

They include two blocks of three-storey flats, which have no amenity space. Some of the gardens are below the prescribed size (the sort of argument they use is that 93% or whatever of the whole are up to standard, so why should the remainder matter?). Visitor parking is concentrated too much in two areas rather than being spread around the whole site. The houses on two sides are too close to the perimeter of the site; and there is not enough provision for recreational walking or cycling.

Bloor do not have agreement to a pedestrian link to Hailes Wood, but they try to fudge the issue by using the word 'potential' and saying that the existing informal link can be retained, without acknowledging that it's muddy and constrained and cannot be guaranteed to remain available.

There will admittedly be some benefits. Two much-needed junior football pitches are proposed, together with related amenities. There will be two children's play areas, and Bloor have undertaken to consult the Parish Council concerning equipment to complement provision elsewhere in the village. A 'hedgehog highway' (holes in boundary fences) is promised, although there are no known responses from the potential beneficiaries. Thus it's good news for the young, especially footballers, and spiny nocturnal mammals, but be prepared for yet more traffic for everyone else.

Neighbourhood Watch research shows two thirds (67%) of people are worried about their home being broken into, yet there are simple, proven measures we can all take to reduce

our chances of becoming a victim of burglary by up to 50%. To help you feel safer at home, we are running our Think WIDE(N) burglary prevention campaign, highlighting the simple, evidence-based WIDE measures which can be taken in any home on a variety of budgets.

At Neighbourhood Watch, we also believe neighbours keeping an eye out for each other is key to reducing burglary, so we've extended the WIDE acronym to WIDE (N):

- W: WINDOWS: Keep your windows locked
- I: INTERIOR: Put inside lights on a timer/smart bulb
- · D: DOORS: Double or deadlock your doors
- E: EXTERIOR: Put outside lights on a sensor

Thought For The Month

"When I spoke to you last, at Christmas, I asked you all, whatever your religion, to pray for me on the day of my Coronation - to pray that God would give me wisdom and strength to carry out the promises that I should then be making.

Throughout this memorable day I have been uplifted and sustained by the knowledge that your thoughts and prayers were with me. I have been aware all the time that my peoples, spread far and wide throughout every continent and ocean in the world, were united to support me in the task to which I have now been dedicated with such solemnity."

So spoke her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, as she addressed her subjects, on the evening of her Coronation, on the 2nd June, 1953, having acceded to the throne on the 6th February, 1952. This year, we therefore celebrate her Platinum Jubilee.

NATURAL OUTLOOK

April is the cruellest month as described by T. S. Eliot, "breeding Lilacs out of the hard land". He has got it about right except when sometimes it follows at the end of a wet winter. I expect there will still be frosts and high winds but also some occasional very warm spring sunshine and this might just bring out some early butterflies to our open areas or your garden.



Orange tips are so called because the males have an orange area spread over the top half of their forewings; females lack this and can be mistaken for a greenveined white. If you have some early flowering ice plants or mauve honesty, that's where you could see them. Small tortoiseshell butterflies often overwinter in sheds of some sort and can be seen fluttering against the glass frames when the sun is warm enough. Their fore and hind wings have orange, yellow and black markings and have two borders; the inner has blue spots and the outer a narrow, continuous yellow/brown band. Yellow brimstone males live up to the name, having sulphur yellow wings, each with a pointed tip. Females are a much paler greenish/yellow and can be confused with large whites. If we do get a warm spell later in the month, red admirals might appear. These are larger than small tortoiseshells and are mainly dark brown with white spotted even darker tips to their forewings and a curve of red on all four wings that join to make a circle when the butterfly rests with its wings open.

The avian world has kicked up a gear and is getting busier. Nest building had already started but is now getting serious; rooks, wood pigeons and magpies can be seen "flying around with a twig it its beak" and others are collecting their preferred nesting materials, be it starlings stripping the papery 'skin' from honeysuckle, or long-tailed-tits going for mosses, discarded sheep's wool, spiders' webs and sufficient feathers for the lining. The moorhens on the ponds at the Aubrey Buxton nature reserve make their nests from rushes, reeds and grass and sometimes use a low overhanging branch as a base. There have been a pair of buzzards drifting around over the village as if checking out potential 'building sites'. A year or two ago a pair did nest in the far side of Alsa Wood across the M11 and did raise a brood of two young. I wonder whether we will see a repeat performance this year?

Grey squirrels get active, refurbish dreys and start to breed. Much of the frogspawn will have hatched by now and have become tadpoles. Spring flowers come on apace and by the end of the month even the white cow parsley could have made a start.. But please, don't be tempted to pick bluebells to take home, because they droop almost instantly and don't revive in water. Just enjoy the spring!

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

Our first meeting of 2022 was well attended and included our AGM which saw the current officers and Committee re-elected to serve for another year. The speaker for the evening was Anthea Hawden from Raking Light, her subject "Church Graffiti" with particular reference to our own St Mary's.



Raking Light is an organisation that has been set up to provide a searchable resource for enthusiasts and researchers of historic graffiti, masons' marks, carpenters' marks, merchants' marks and protection marks. In fact, if it's old and inscribed on plaster, stone, wood or any other surface you can think of, then Raking Light are interested in it. Anthea's talk was very well received and much enjoyed by those present. More information about Raking Light and their work may be found on their website: https://rakinglight.co.uk/ wherein you can also find photographs of the graffiti to be found in St Mary's.

Regular readers will be aware that over the years, the Elsenham Parish boundaries have changed many times and I can report that they have now changed once more. This time the boundary has been extended to include the forthcoming Henham Road development and has taken land from Henham Parish. We have just received a copy of the signed official order and our man of maps Dave Verlander will shortly be updating his boundary map to reflect the change. In due course this latest map will be added to the Society's website. Also in connection with the Henham Road development, archaeologists have been investigating the area behind the cricket field in advance of the actual development. We have just received a copy of the report from those investigations and a guick look at the summary reveals evidence of prehistoric settlements dating from the late Bronze Age and early Iron Age. Following this period the land was primarily agricultural and apart from the find of a Roman Silver Denarius there was no evidence of later settlements. There were many mediaeval field boundaries identified that accorded with evidence from 19th Century maps and later aerial photographs of crop marks.

Last month I mentioned that a Sally Morgan had contacted us asking for information about the house she used to live in. I am pleased to say that we were able to put her in touch with the current owner and Sally is now able to further her family research. Thank you to those that got in touch to help. As an aside, we have been contacted by a technical author asking to use information from our website which we were pleased to allow. This is proof indeed that our website is a useful resource so why not have a look when you have a few minutes to spare (address above).

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 8th June when we look forward to welcoming Anthony Tuck who will be speaking about "Newport, A Great and Poor Town", the story of our neighbour just up the road.

Membership costs just five pounds a year that will allow admission to four meetings which will all feature interesting speakers on a wide range of subjects. Visitors are also very welcome to any of our meetings for just two pounds per evening, we look forward to seeing you soon.

I would like to remind readers of the walk routes on the Society's website, www.hundredparishes.org.uk. All routes can be download and printed. They include route instructions and

information about the places you will pass. Each of the hundred parishes is included in at least one route and there are walks for all abilities. The routes have been designed to take you through interesting places and lovely countryside.

Before setting off, you might like to check the relevant parish introductions on our

website; there, you will find details of local tea rooms and pubs, etc. It's best to check with the pub to see if it will be open on the day and time that you will need it.

Most of our routes include footpaths or bridleways where good footwear will make life more comfortable. A modest investment in a good pair of walking boots is recommended. Carry boot covers or plastic bags to put on before visiting a pub or church - or leave boots outside. Check the weather forecast and be prepared with waterproof top, woolly hat or sunscreen.



I do hope you are not eating dinner BUT my then neighbours had hand pumps which meant they could avoid the far-from-small charge by pumping out their tanks. Only problem was the smell was horrid and the "water" had to go somewhere. I use the word "water" quite wrongly.

This meant that many were stuck with what they had until the main sewer came.

As one of the proud owners of an outdoor toilet I was in that unhappy situation.

COOKERY CORNER

This zesty cake can be put together in no time. Something delicious for Easter perhaps!

CITRUS, ALMOND AND YOGURT CAKE (serves 12)

6oz (175g) soft butter, plus extra for greasing

7oz (200g) golden caster sugar (plus 2 tablespoons for the syrup)

5oz (150g) self-raising flour

4oz (100g) ground almonds

3 eggs

3oz (75g) full fat natural yoghurt

1 lemon and 1 orange, both zested and juiced

½oz (15g) toasted flaked almonds

Melt the butter in a small pan over a medium heat. Remove from heat and leave to cool slightly. Meanwhile, grease a 9 inch (23cm) cake tin and line with baking parchment. Heat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4.

Put the 200g golden caster sugar, flour and ground almonds in a large bowl and mix well. Whisk the eggs and yogurt into the cooled melted butter, then pour this into the bowl with the dry ingredients and the lemon and orange zest. Stir with a spatula until there are no streaks of flour, then scrape the mixture into the tin and bake in the oven for 40 to 50 minutes.

Put the juices with the two tablespoons of golden caster sugar into a small pan. Simmer for 5-10 minutes, until the juice has reduced to a syrup.

Check if the cake is cooked, using a skewer inserted into the middle. Cook the cake for another few minutes if not quite done. When the skewer comes out dry, then take out of the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes, then spoon over the citrus syrup. Leave to cool for 10 minutes more, then remove from the tin.

Scatter over the flaked almonds.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Delicious served warm topped with a drizzle of cold cream. For an extra sweet topping, mix a tablespoon of yoghurt with 2oz (50g) icing sugar to make a thick icing, then spoon onto the cake allowing the topping to drip over the sides and sprinkle with the flaked almonds.

The First Fifteen Lives of Harry August

'No matter what he does or the decisions he makes, when death comes, Harry always returns to where he began, a child with all the knowledge of a life he has already lived a dozen times before. Nothing ever changed - until now. As Harry nears the end of his eleventh life, a little girl appears at his bedside. 'I nearly missed you, Doctor August,' she says. 'I need to send a

message.' This is the story of what Harry does next, and what he did before, and how he tries to save a past he cannot change and a future he cannot allow... ...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

'Beautiful and gripping' - The Guardian

The First Fifteen Lives of Harry August was the choice of the book group this month. It is a whopper of a story with 448 pages but is a page-turner and so doesn't feel like a long read.

Harry August has a pretty ordinary life. He is born in Berwick-upon-Tweed in 1919 and dies in a hospital in Newcastle in 1989. In the meantime he has different jobs, various relationships and tries to move on from his difficult family life. Following his death, he finds himself back in 1919 but as a child again. However, he has retained the memories from his prior life. This is very confusing for him and he doesn't handle it well. However, it happens again, and again.

Harry finds out he is an Ouroboran, which means he will go round and round, destined to live his life over and over. He is one of many, although not all retain their earlier memories. Harry does, which makes him a mnemonic referred to as Kalachakra.

Through the overlapping lifespans of others like him, it is possible to send and receive messages from both the distant past and future that supports and helps them. In Harry's eleventh life, a young girl visits him when he is dying and tells him that the world is ending. So, messages from the future have started to change, warning that the world is accelerating towards an inevitable end.

When Harry notices that amazing technology appears decades early, he realises that one of their number has betrayed them and is using their power for their own ends, with destructive consequences for humanity.

Harry has been tasked with finding out what is happening. Why him? It must be because of something in his own life that he needs to stop or is it someone? He doesn't know but the story becomes a race between a hunter and the hunted. Who will get there first?
