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DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

It has been a busy time following the election and we thought we would give further insight into our work as Councillors. It is important to attend as many training sessions and information briefings as time allows.

Bianca has attended Scrutiny training and has contributed to her first committee meeting. Training sessions have covered Safeguarding, Community Safety, Communities programmes, Effective decision making, Council Finance and Investment Training, Local Plan training, Audit and Standards, Code of Conduct, Planning (though not on the planning committee), which helps with ward planning applications and as Deputy Chair of Elsenham Parish Council. Many papers are being read along with continuous learning.

A snapshot of Petrina's work as Leader so far includes:

Overseen all the committee and external body appointments. Welcomed a new Assistant Director of Housing, Health and Communities – an absolutely key appointment, who will be a huge part of the solution to the problems we have in properly looking after our 2,800 council houses. Interviewed and offered the job of Head of Legal Services and Monitoring Officer to an experienced candidate. despite this being an Incredibly hard post to recruit. Appointed an ecologist under planning. Overseen our Draft Corporate Plan (this sets out our priorities over the next four years). Seen steady progress in continuing with our Local Plan - still on track to be ready to go out for public consultation this autumn. Met with the Planning Advisory Service Peer Review Team, who came to inspect our Development Management Function. Pressed on with recruitment campaign which has filled in all but one of our bin loader vacancies - as we have had unusual delays in recent weeks due to staffing vacancies and sickness. Spoke at the Staff Conference and co-hosted the annual staff garden party. Met with leaders of all other Essex Authorities to discuss our combined response to the refugee crisis. She also met with other leaders to discuss a combined response to Government. which will hopefully stop them picking Stansted every time. Attended multi-agency roadshow in Elsenham. She has been working on a blueprint for Uttlesford to help save monies in the future.

We are delighted to have begun to distribute some of our Ward Initiatives monies and welcome further applications.

The New Community Centre Working Group held a meeting on June 29. A document showing the costing and time scale of the project was presented. The total funding required is approximately £2,775,000, with the time scale for building the hall just under 3 years. The total of Section 106 money from developers is £2,026,154. However, it is unknown when (and if) all the payments will be made. The Parish Council are looking at fund raising to bridge the shortfall . If there is anyone in the village who feels they can help with fund raising, please email the Parish Clerk.

There has been correspondence from residents regarding parking in the village. Airport parking is still a big issue on some of the developments; Daniel Burford from Stansted Airport Consultative Committee said there was no real satisfactory conclusions. Parking at Oziers is a problem as there are just too many cars and not enough parking. The Parish Council had looked at ways to solve this problem, but with no success. Parking on Station Road is also causing problems as the yellow lines have worn away and people are parking anywhere along the road – this will be reported to the Essex Parking Partnership.

The Parish Council has always been mindful in keeping the precept as low as possible for residents. However, some budgets have accrued large increases this year due to inflation, which is putting a strain on the Council's finances. It is important that all councillors try and limit spending as much as possible.

Plaques had been placed in the flowerbeds by the Memorial Gardens showing sponsorship from Stansted Golf Club, who have kindly donated £500.

Some residents of Elsenham are looking to set up a monthly Community/Farmers Market in the village where they would like to sell local produce from small independents. It was agreed at the meeting to change the Allotment Tenancy Agreement to allow allotment holders to sell some of their products at the market, with the proceeds returned to the allotments or for charitable purposes.

As from July 31 2023 the 7 and 7A busses will be operated by Stephensons of Essex.

Despite promises from the landowner to repair the War Memorial in Church Lane that was damaged by the lorries delivering earth to the adjacent field, nothing has been done. Allan Hathaway is now very kindly reconstructing the War Memorial as closely to the original as he can, using what was left of the original memorial and local materials. A big thank you to Allan from the Parish Council and residents of Elsenham.

As indicated by **STOP PRESS** last month, decisions regarding two developments in the area were issued by the Planning Inspectorate in June. First, the result of the application to build 130 homes in the field opposite the Crown was made known. Essex Highways had, for once, objected to the proposal on the grounds that the cumulative impact, in particular in Stansted, would be severe. The Inspector chewed it over, mixed it in with the applicants' usual excessive reliance on computer modelling and the argument that this proposal itself would not make much difference, and concluded that the cumulative impact would not be severe at all. He didn't quite say that the route through Stansted is perfect in every possible respect, but he didn't make much of any imperfections either.

The Inspector gave disappointingly short shrift to other objections raised by the Parish Council. He was dismissive of claims that the position near to the ancient heart of the village resulted in an impact on heritage assets, and gave no more credence to the contention as to cumulative impact on the village than he did to cumulative impact on the highways. The usual nonsensical arguments were rehearsed as to the supposed social and economic benefits, all of which rest on the assumption that an increase in population must in itself be a good thing. Thus he said that there will be an economic benefit by way of increased spend 'in the local area', which in practice means more car journeys to Stansted and Stortford. The new housing will 'maintain a balanced community', as if without it the village would stagger uncontrollably and then fall over. You expect this sort of piffle from developers, who are bound to make the best of their case; but to find it repeated by the Planning Inspectorate leaves any sane person close to hair-tearing despair.

24 hours later came the news that the Appeal against refusal of 50 (not 20 - last month's proof reader has been admonished severely) new homes to the south of Bedwell Road had been allowed. The issue here was all about the noise from the motorway. The application had been refused by Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee, but, for reasons which remain unclear, UDC decided not to contest the appeal. It should have seemed a simple matter to claim that the Gladman application north of Bedwell Road was refused on grounds of noise and therefore the application for 50 to the south should be refused for the same reason.

The Inspector, however, had other ideas. He was much taken with the applicants' hare-brained scheme whereby three-storey blocks of affordable flats will be erected on the side of the site nearest the motorway in order to baffle the noise, to the benefit of the more affluent residents of the market houses below. The developers claimed that the flats can be erected in such a way that habitable rooms are kept away from the side towards the motorway. The Inspector was unimpressed by the argument that the arrangement must result in some implausibly large bathrooms and some remarkably small bedrooms.

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ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

As I sit down to write these notes, the village fete is but a distant memory, however I would like to thank all those who came along to look at what we are doing and have a chat. Hopefully you learned something you didn't previously know about the village and so made our efforts just that little more worthwhile. Thank you one and all.



This never happened of course, but more information about what may have been can be found on our website; look for "The Canal that Never Was".

The mill suffered a chequered history not least because of the non-appearance of the canal and several owners went bankrupt. It was not for nothing that milling was known as a financially perilous occupation. The mill remained in business until 1910. but lack of funds over the years meant that the mill remained largely unmodernised. James Blyth, later to become the first Lord Blyth, bought the mill in 1887 and his son instituted initial preservation work in 1930 before gifting the mill to the parish in 1935.

In 1941 the mill was used as a headquarters by the local Scout troop (they left in 1963) but by then the condition of the mill was deteriorating. In the late 1950s a preservation society was formed to look after the mill and major restoration work started in 1966 after which the mill was in pretty good order. A further restoration effort took place in the 1980s. Being 18th century technology, the mill is prone to break down and it is then down to the expertise of the volunteers to get it going.

We have written a lot about the good that Sir Walter Gilbey did for Elsenham. The Jam Factory, Village Pump, High Street Cemetery and even our own Strawberry Fields. As always you can find out about all these on our website. Anyway, Sir Walter's largesse spread outside the village and in September, John Rhodes will be coming to speak to members about his activities to improve the lot of the folk in Bishop's Stortford.

Stansted Airport Watch (SAW) Patron Terry Waite has been appointed Knight Commander of the Order of St Michael and St George (KCMG) in the King's first birthday honours list. The appointment recognises Sir Terry's many years of charitable and humanitarian work.

As a Church of England envoy, Terry Waite had travelled to Lebanon in January 1987 in an attempt to secure the release of four hostages, including the journalist John McCarthy, whose family were from Broxted. Terry Waite was then himself kidnapped and held captive by Islamic Jihad terrorists until November 1991. He

was kept in solitary confinement, forced to put a blindfold on when anybody came into the room, faced a mock execution and was beaten.

Sir Terry has long been a stalwart supporter of Stop Stansted Expansion, and then Stansted Airport Watch, despite living more than 30 miles away, in Suffolk. On becoming SSE Patron, in September 2003, he explained the reasons for his passionate support for the campaign:

"When I first heard of the proposals for the expansion of Stansted Airport, I was amazed given the fact that three independent inspectors had completely ruled out any further development. The expansion of Stansted would undoubtedly mean that the total character of the area surrounding Stansted would be entirely changed – and very much for the worse."

"Contrary to what has been reported," he continued, "I do not live adjacent to the airport and therefore would not be personally directly affected. However, it is my firm belief that over time our countryside and rural communities are being ravaged and we will all lose out in the long term as a result."

Age 84, Sir Terry is still our Patron today. The KCMG recognises service in a foreign country or in relation to Foreign and Commonwealth affairs.

Upon receiving his honour, Sir Terry commented: "I suppose it's a peak, really. I was given an MBE many years ago and then I got a CBE several years afterwards. Now this is the next one up, so to speak. I think I've been very fortunate to get this because there are many other people who are deserving of honours who don't get mentioned."

If you're looking for something to read over the summer, I might suggest a book called *God's Smuggler* by Brother Andrew (a Dutchman who died quite recently aged 94). He tells how before the collapse of Communism, he smuggled thousands of Bibles and preached the Gospel in the countries of Eastern Europe.

Very soon after he started he found himself in Belgrade, the capital of what was Communist Yugoslavia, and speaking to a very full church. At the end, he invited people who wanted to make a commitment to Christ to raise their hand. Every hand in the room went up. Oh no, he thought, this is not good at all! They clearly haven't understood a word I'm saying!

And so he explained again what a serious step this was. He made the conditions of Christian discipleship under a hostile government painfully clear. He made the cost of following Christ painfully clear. And this time he said: if you want to commit your life to Christ, stand up! Every person in the room stood up.

Reflecting on this, Brother Andrew said: I was astonished. I had never before seen such readiness to bear the cost of following Christ.

The call to costly discipleship is unmistakably woven into the fabric of the Bible because Christians follow Jesus Christ the self-denying and crucified servant Messiah. His call is unmissable. Yet in many ways, we live in a culture (and dare I say a church) often defined by our need for self-fulfilment and our pursuit of self-interest.

But the call of Christ is to follow where he has gone: to a life of radical and costly self-sacrifice in our work, our commitments, our time, our money, our attitude, our relationships, and above all our hearts. At first glance, this looks pretty unappealing - but it actually turns out to be a life of real satisfaction, joy and blessing.

I think of a woman called Gladys Aylward who puts this so well. She left her life of self-indulgence (men, drinking and gambling) and went to China as a missionary in 1932. After a lifetime of Christian service, she said this:

I have not done what I wanted to. I have not eaten what I wanted or worn what I would have chosen. I have lived in houses that I would not have looked at twice. I longed for a husband and babies and security and love, but God never gave them. Instead he left me alone for 17 years with one book – a Chinese Bible.

I don't know anything about the latest novels, pictures or theatres. I live in a rather outdated world and I suppose you would say it is awful miserable isn't it? But friend, I have been one of the happiest women who stepped the earth. I have known the heavens opening and the blessing tumbling out.

Such has been the testimony of so many Christians all through the ages. With best wishes,

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NATURAL OUTLOOK ON AUGUST

Before they faded during July, I was astonished to see how tall some of the wilder plants in our back garden had grown. Some of the meadow sweet by the stream was up to 6ft, the huge clump of figwort was 6ft 6" and the tallest of the teasels were about a foot taller than the 6ft 6" fence.



Last year being <u>so</u> hot seemed to be a bad year for butterflies. In August we did eventually get a gatekeeper, a small tortoiseshell, a holly blue, and both the small purple and gold day moth. We also had a hummingbird hawk moth. It was a good year for that one but not for other butterflies we usually see. A new one for the last two years has been a silver washed fritillary which was happy to feed on the two buddleias. If it returns this year, I'll try to get a photo.

Other insects about were the common wasp (which builds a nest of yellowish 'paper') and the wasp beetle, which is about the same length as a queen wasp with a very pinched 'waist.' It is much more slender and has variable yellow bands on its black body. We get the small hover flies and two bugs: a green shield bug which is bright green and the forest bug which is brown and favours cherry trees and other orchard fruits. And, of course, we see bumble bees and honeybees. I have heard of a local digger bee making its solitary nest in a crack in paving stones - hope it stays dry. When I wrote this the two buddleias were just coming to early flower, the davidii in the front and the Black Knight in the back, so I do hope that there is still plenty on these bushes for all the insects to feed on in this month.

In The Spinney, the main wildflower patch, late-summer flowers are: low growing red bartsia, for purples there are the fluffy lesser knapweed and self heal, yellows are toad flax, ragwort, flea bane with its oval flower heads and white upright hedge parsley by the trees. Also, there are the seed heads of yellow rattle, which was planted to slowly remove phosphorus from the soil and give the wildflowers a better chance.

This year the grass, too, has grown taller than usual so this year *especially,* when exercising dogs in The Spinney, please keep them off the wildflower areas because dogs' urine kills wildflowers and the phosphorus in dog excrement encourages grass. If necessary, you will find waste bins nearby.

Signs of Autumn approaching: by the end of the month harvest is half-way done, the berries on the young rowan on The Spinney are orange, some of the leaves and seed cases on our spindle bush are just turning pink, the cotoneaster berries are turning red, as well as the rosa glaucas. Any young robins still with speckled chests begin to get orange ones and older birds start singing to get territorial. The swifts left weeks ago but the swallows and house martins are still about.

Let us dissect some of their words. *"Perfectly located to enjoy all that this desirable area has to offer."* The location is such that any attempt to travel to the market town of Bishop's Stortford will be hindered by that old chestnut, or should I say bottleneck, Grove Hill. The completely inadequate road access to all those good restaurants and cafes will frustrate easy access.

Developer after developer has built homes within Elsenham BUT no improvement (other than cosmetic) has been made to the road infrastructure. Prospective buyers should be warned that they will become extremely frustrated as they travel the road network. You will find appallingly expensive parking within Stortford and that assumes you can even find a parking space.

"Perfectly located to enjoy all this desirable area has to offer." Once it was perfectly desirable but the large expanses of green fields are now replaced by large expanses of housing estates. No longer a beautiful village.

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THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Hundred Parishes is blessed with an exceptional number of museums, all open at this time of the year. Saffron Walden Museum was purpose-built in 1835. It displays a real treasure trove of material relating to the local area.



Imperial War Museum, Duxford is enormous, displaying all kinds of wartime material including its own listed buildings from each World War, as well as many aeroplanes, both civilian and military.

Great Dunmow Museum is housed in a former maltings. It encompasses displays about its former function as well as broader elements of Dunmow history.



Forge Museum in Much Hadham includes metal tools from the forge, while its own medieval wall paintings reveal an insight into Tudor fashion. Still in Much Hadham, the hamlet of Perry Green was for many years the home of sculptor Henry Moore. Today, the Henry Moore Studio and gardens includes an extensive outdoor display of his large







works and indoor history of his life. Ashdon Village Museum has an exceptional display of all aspects of local life in the 20th century - and an excellent tea room.

Stansted Mountfitchet has an extensive toy museum within Mountfitchet Castle which is itself a popular destination for children who probably don't realise that this fun place is teaching them a lot about the history of Norman times.

Finchingfield's 15th-century Guildhall incorporates a small collection of local history, presented with help of modern technology. Great Bardfield has a small Cottage Museum and also a village cage, a former lock up.



Further information for each of these can be found on www.hundredparishes.org.uk - either towards the end of the relevant Parish introduction, on What's On, or on the Attractions pages. There, you will also find information about Fry Art Gallery, Linton Zoo, Hinxton watermill and several windmills.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 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Here's a very simple supper dish, easily doubled or halved.

PIRI PIRI CHICKEN (serves 4)

2 red chillies 1 red pepper 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar 4 tablespoons olive oil 4 boneless chicken breasts (skin on) Salad leaves, to serve

To make the marinade, halve and seed the chillies and red pepper. Chop the chillies finely and the pepper roughly. Tip into a food processor. Add the vinegar and oil. Season with a little salt and pepper. Whizz, but leave chunky.

Slash the chicken breasts across the skin side and put in a shallow dish. Pour over three-quarters of the marinade, turning the chicken to coat it. Marinate for at least 10 minutes or overnight in the fridge. Reserve the remaining marinade.

Heat a griddle or heavy frying pan, add the chicken and cook for 5-6 minutes on each side, turning once. Serve on a bed of salad leaves with the reserved marinade drizzled over.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Make extra marinade and keep chilled, ready to add some piri piri to your cooking at any time. Leave the seeds in the chillies for extra kick if you wish. For a healthier option use skinless chicken breasts.

Carol sells her house and gives the money to her son for his house purchase. She moves into Declan's house and imagines this will be her forever home, although they don't marry. Carol met Declan when she provided tutorials to Sally, Declan's daughter. The relationship with Sally and Declan's son Killian becomes strained after she moves in and Carol understands Sally misses their mother who mysteriously left several years ago. Unbeknownst to Carol, Declan's children have power of attorney and when he becomes ill with dementia, they put the house up for sale. Carol has no rights and so is forced to return home to live with her parents, the wonderful Maureen and Dave. Dave has acquired wealth through his coffee shops. He seems a contented, simple and home-loving man. Maureen is a whirlwind of action. They were never keen on Declan and are worried about Carol. They can see that Carol has been shut out from Declan's care. Dave and Maureen purchase Declan's house anonymously and Maureen sets about doing it up for Carol. This is when the fun starts and they realise that there are mysteries in the house... Maureen, although in her 80s, is keen for adventure and she and Carol set out to uncover the secrets. To say any more would be a plot spoiler.
