Kate Robson gave a presentation on the Citizens Advice.

The Citizens Advice provide free, confidential advice on debt, benefits, housing, community care, immigration (level 1), relationships, employment law, warm home support. Employees are qualified to place someone in a debt 'breathing space', defend eviction orders, deliver debt solutions, support disability benefit appeals and many other issues.

Residents can access support in several ways, telephone advice, email, home visits. There is a one-touch video access point in Takeley Old School House and face to face outreach appointments in Takeley can be arranged if required.

The work on the wildflower area on De Mandeville Green began on November 15. Flowerbeds will be established with paths in between. As it will take time for the wildflowers to establish, daffodil bulbs will be planted to give some colour. The revised grass cutting contract, incorporating the rewilding, will be voted on by Full Council on December 2. This will of course be a public meeting and residents may have their say.

The Parish Council are to arrange for three dead trees on the southern boundary of the cemetery, to be felled.

Cars continue to park on the Gilbey Cottages verge. The verge is owned by Essex County Council and mowed by the Parish Council. In conjunction with North-east Parking Partnership the council could stop cars parking on the verge. However, the residents would have to find somewhere else to park, which could be difficult.

The timetable for the 7 & 7A buses is not changing. The single bus fare cap was raised to £3.00 in the budget.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday December 2, starting at 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall.

# DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

Here's a bit of an end-of-year round-up, starting with Dandara's scheme in two parts. The new access off Stansted Road is now named Crown Drive, presumably because it's as far from the Crown pub as you can get without leaving the village. The 48 homes are completed and all, or nearly all, are occupied, with a not very generous play area towards the northern end, positioned presumably so that the noise of children playing will drown out the motorway. If you keep walking further north, you now have access to the footpath from Isabel Drive to the footbridge over the motorway. Dandara have made a contribution towards the improvement of this footpath, but Essex CC, dilatory as ever, have made no moves towards constructing it. The other Dandara site, Woodland Drive off Isabel Close, 51 homes, is expected to be completed in January, with about half occupied and just one unsold at the time of writing.

Bovis Homes now have a sales office in Golden Miller Avenue, off Hall Road, with first occupation anticipated during December or January, and completion of all 130 by the end of 2026 at the latest.

Bloor Homes continue with mass building at what they call 'Elsenham Park' - only a developer would take a large tract of open undeveloped land, cover it with houses, and call it a park, which is otherwise a name for a large tract of open undeveloped land. Somewhere approaching 100 of the 350 comprising 'Bloor 1' are occupied; then there will be the 200 of 'Bloor 2'; then, in all probability, the 110 of 'Bloor 3', offered to Bloor within Uttlesford District Council's Local Plan 'Regulation 19' consultation by way of 'quid pro quo' for making land available for educational purposes.

As reported last month, the application for 40 with access off Rush Lane was withdrawn, it is believed because of the existence of a 'ransom strip' along the boundary, which the ransom holders are not prepared to let go. An alternative detailed application with access off Robin Hood Road is possible, but the site has been flogged on and it is likely that the new owners will start again.

Gladman are attempting to satisfy UDC that they can 'mitigate' the noise from the M11 sufficiently to build 240 homes to the north of Bedwell Road, and a much smaller outfit is engaged in a similar endeavour with the Planning Inspectorate regarding 50 homes to the south. One of the many ways in which the planning system is biased in favour of developers is that they can take as long as they like, and come back with amended proposals if they are knocked back.

That should be it, but no! Countryside have outline approval for 130 in the field opposite the Crown, and still have eighteen months or so to make a detailed application.

A happy and peaceful festive season to all readers, with a respite from construction activity for a few days at least. It will resume in 2025.

#### **ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY**

My first duty this month is to thank Alan Davidson, a village resident who has been following the saga of the windmills! He spent some. time looking through all four volumes of Essex Windmills and extracting any and all information pertinent to Elsenham before giving us the fruits of his research. This has revealed a lot of new information which we will collate and publish in due course. Thanks again Alan, your help is much appreciated.

As you read this, Christmas will be upon us once more and thoughts will be turning to spending time with friends and family. Give a thought then to a Christmas gathering in 1889. Mr Walter Gilbey (he was not then yet a Sir having to wait until 1893 for that honour) of Elsenham Hall had a few "friends" over for the day, among his guests were HRH The Prince of Wales later to become King Edward VII, the Hereditary Prince of Hohenlohe and Lord Randolph Churchill, father of Sir Winston Churchill. On arrival at The Paddocks, Sir Walter's thoroughbred shire and hackney horses were paraded together with Friday, at that time the smallest pony in England. The party went to Elsenham Hall for lunch after which, expressing himself highly pleased with the visit, the Prince of Wales drove back to Easton Lodge.

Staying with Elsenham Hall, we have learned that at Christmas 1915 and for probably a few years more, the hall was in use as the 60<sup>th</sup> (London) Casualty Clearing Station (CCS) manned by the Royal Army Medical Corps (Territorial Force), R.A.M.C.T. The Territorial Force formed, in 1908, became the more familiar Territorial Army in October 1921. A perusal of minutes from the Village Hall Management Committee showed that it was agreed that the hall should be opened on a Sunday for military personnel stationed in the village to use for the playing of the usual games, but not, by order of the Rev. Sant, card games! On Wednesday December 8 1915, musicians from the CCS gave a concert at the Village Hall. Entry was by programme, price one (old) penny.

Our next meeting will be held on Wednesday 12 March at 8pm in the Memorial Hall and will include our AGM. The speaker for the evening will be our Chairman Ray Franklin who, in his own inimitable style, will tell the story of St Mary's Church.

Visitors are always welcome at our meetings for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership costs just five pounds for a full year's meetings. A bargain!

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our readers a very Merry Christmas and a Happy and Healthy New Year.

#### IMPORTANT and WONDERFUL RECYCLING NEWS

We thought it might not be widely known that in Uttlesford, you can put "Don't recycle at home" items into your kerbside recycling.

You don't need to bag it all up and take it to a supermarket!

All plastics which have the following labels CAN be put in your Uttlesford Green-Lidded Recycling bin:



No need for any of the above, just put it into your green-lidded bin! This includes:

- Plastic carrier bags
- Plastic cereal bags, eg porridge oats (not inners from boxed cereals), plastic wrappers
- Plastic wrappers from toilet roll and kitchen towel packs
- Plastic magazine and newspaper wrap (type used for home delivery only)
- Plastic bread bags (shake out)
- Plastic wrappers and ring joiners from multipacks of cans and plastic bottles
- Plastic freezer bags
- Thin bags used for fruit and vegetables at supermarkets

We have updated our map of recycling points in Elsenham. You can check this out on our Facebook page: Elsenham Action Group for Local Environmental Sustainability – Eagles

There are now printer cartridge recycling boxes at the station and the post office. When full, these boxes are returned to recycle4charity who give a donation to Elsenham Community Association.

Finally, if you recycle toys to charity shops before Christmas this could make a positive difference to families struggling with the cost-of-living crisis.

We wish everyone a Happy Christmas and, of course, a very happy 2025.

We meet on the 4th Monday of each month at the Crown at 7.30pm and all are welcome, even if you're just curious about what we do.

### **DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT**

#### UDC PLANNING COMMITTEE DECISIONS AND "DESIGNATION"

There still appears to be a misunderstanding of what 'Designation' means. It is NOT special measures, (meaning that all planning powers are removed). It does NOT mean that UDC has no control regarding planning. It means that developers can CHOOSE whether to apply for planning permission via UDC or the Planning Inspectorate. At the time of writing over 75% of applications come to UDC. These reports contain statistics which are provided (by all planning authorities) to the **M**inistry of Housing, **C**ommunities and Local **G**overnment ("**MHCLG**") and published by them quarterly. The reports on these matters which will be presented to the November UDC Planning Committee are available online.

There are four criteria under which a Local Planning Authority may be "designated" which relate to its performance under standards termed by MHCLG – Quality Major; Quality Speed; Quality Non-Major and Speed Non-Major.

The only one where UDC has not been able to demonstrate compliance historically is where the Planning Inspectorate ("PINS") on appeal has overturned decisions by the Planning Committee and/or Officers under their delegated powers, and the resulting percentage overturn ratio has exceeded <u>10%</u>, (this was reduced from 20% in 2017) calculated on a rolling average basis. Exceeding this ratio can lead to designation by MHCLG (as has occurred in the instance of Uttlesford and recently, for some other local planning authorities).

For some time, we are pleased to say, the applicable majors overturn ratio has been substantially lower than 10% and presently stands at 4.41% for appeal decisions made to April 2024.

#### CORPORATE PEER CHALLENGE

Corporate Peer Challenges are run by the Local Government Association upon request and provide a key opportunity for District Councils to bring in independent expert colleagues to perform a "health check" on how well they are performing across a range of headings including governance, partnership, financial management, leadership and so on.

The Cabinet has decided to undertake such a challenge, and it will take place in December. UDC but also by speaking directly with a representative sample of UDC front line staff across the different functions and seniorities and, of course, with various elected councillors.

We consider that this health check will be helpful with a view to building positively on the conclusions to be drawn by our Peers in their report, which will be published in full.

#### UDC CABINET AND COUNCIL BUSINESS

Members and residents might wonder from time to time what is the UDC Cabinet and what does it do, is it a talking shop or is it more than this? It is most certainly more than a talking shop. Nor is it a "rubber stamping bureau" approving unquestioningly actions prepared or to be taken by the UDC Officers, of whom the most senior is, of course, the Chief Executive, Mr Peter Holt. So, it might be helpful to have a snapshot of the work the Council is undertaking at a senior administrative level this last month.

UDC is managed on corporate lines which involve a Corporate Management Team ("CMT") made up of employed officers, namely the Chief Executive, three Strategic Directors and six Directors. They are named together with their ascribed functions and responsibilities on our website.

<u>Corporate Management Team - Uttlesford District Council.</u> The CMT meet among themselves in a collegiate fashion so that one area of activity is known in general terms to others so as better to enable the UDC Corporate Plan <u>www.uttlesford.gov.uk/corporate-plan</u> to be coordinated and discharged. The Cabinet is made up of six elected Members (Petrina being one) who meet fortnightly by way of an informal Cabinet briefing together with necessary officers in anticipation of actions to be considered at the forthcoming programme of Cabinet Meetings. The Cabinet members and their responsibilities are described here: <u>www.uttlesford.gov.uk/cabinet-portfolio-holders</u> All Cabinet Meetings are of course held in public and their proceedings broadcast live and recorded for viewing through the Meeting Agenda link.

#### **DE MANDEVILLE WILDFLOWER AREA UPDATE**

By now you may have seen the new developments to the wildflower area on De Mandeville Green. In November, Tom Belton marked out the new wildflower beds and pathways, rotavated the beds to get rid of the grass and to deeply embed the wildflower seeds for future years. Many wildflowers require a cold period to initiate germination, so by sowing at this time of year we should be ahead of the game come the spring.

We are now in the most difficult and unsightly time, waiting for the good stuff to happen! As we all know good things come to those that wait, and the first year of a new wildflower meadow is always the least satisfying. The name of the game for the first year is establishing strong root systems. Plants, like humans are not great multi-taskers, so in the choice of roots or flowers, we are taking the sensible choice and choosing roots. This means that for the first year of our meadows there will not be a lot to see as we will need to keep the area regularly cut, to force the wildflowers to concentrate on their root systems. This is a similar process of pinching out new shoots on seedlings to encourage sturdier growth. We are conscious that the village needs something pretty to look at, so the Flowerbed Committee is going to plant spring bulbs into the beds.

We are also planning on adding to the wildflower seeds year on year, so that as the meadow becomes more established, we will be rewarded for our patience by ever more varieties and numbers of wildflowers. We love our village, love this project and cannot wait to see a carpet of colour in the village, buzzing with bees and fluttering with butterflies.

#### The Countdown

**The week before**: Cook braised red cabbage fully and cool. It will keep covered in a casserole dish in the fridge, for up to 3 days.

**The day before**: Make your cranberry sauce, cool, and keep in the fridge. Make the stuffing and garlic butter now. Chill in a bowl or get ahead and stuff and cover the turkey with it, cover with foil then return the bird to the fridge. Prepare your stuffing mixture (such as a classic sage and onion stuffing or vegan chestnut stuffing) and shape into balls or press into your chosen dish ready to go in the oven. Refrigerate. Wrap your sausages in bacon for the pigs in blankets, refrigerate in a baking dish.

**6 to 7 hours ahead**: Bring turkey to room temperature (remove the giblets).

**4.5 hours ahead**: Blanch Brussels sprouts, immerse in chilled water. Peel the potatoes and immerse in water to prevent browning.

**3.5 hours ahead**: preheat oven. Stuff and prepare the turkey then put in the hot oven. Baste and lay the bacon rashers over the turkey breasts after first 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature then baste every 30 minutes. Peel parsnips and carrots 2-3 hours ahead, Keep immersed in chilled water until you are ready to cook.

**1.5 hours ahead**: Take the cranberry sauce from the fridge and spoon into a saucepan. Take the braised red cabbage out of the fridge. Boil the milk and flavour the bread sauce and leave to infuse. Finish preparing your peeled potatoes ready for roasting. For classic roast potatoes, this means parboiling, adding herbs and seasonings and getting the fat hot in the oven. Put the potatoes into the oven, followed by your prepared stuffing, to roast. Check the turkey is fully cooked through – insert a skewer into the thickest part of the leg and check that the juices are running clear, rather than pink. When ready, remove

from oven and leave in a warm place to rest. Use trimmings and roasting juices to make gravy. Leave in pan until serving.

I find it alarming that for much of my life, I knew the Christmas story, sang the songs, opened the presents, ate the dinners – but never really understood the point.

But look at the words of almost any well known Christmas carol, and it's inescapably clear that Christmas is about a King. Take, for example, the Sussex Carol:

On Christmas night all Christians sing To hear the news the angels bring, News of great joy, news of great mirth, News of our merciful King's birth.

2000 years ago the eternal, all powerful and all knowing God, somehow, stepped out of eternity and into history as a human being. At his birth, he was given several names. One of them was Immanuel which means God with us. That is, the baby born in Bethlehem, was fully God and fully man which makes him an altogether new and different King.

But secondly this Immanuel was a rescuing King. In advance of his birth, his parents were instructed to give him the name Jesus, "because he will save his people from their sins." Jesus means God saves.

Sadly, we feel the effects of this thing sin every day: anger, violence, frustration, betrayal, injustice. We hear it on the news, we experience it in our homes, we sense it even in our own hearts. We can ignore some of it, overlook it, pretend it away, but we know that the world - and we along with it - doesn't work the way it's meant to. However optimistic we are, we live trapped in the thorny prison of a fallen world.

But then a rescue! And Jesus is the King who can do it. That is what makes Christmas news of great joy and great mirth. Jesus grows up to die on a Roman cross. And on that cross, he carries your sin and mine, and begins to reverse its horrible effects and open up the way to God.

What's the point of Christmas? It's about a King. A new King, a rescuing King, and lastly a forever King.

For many of us, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was an ever-present reality. But suddenly she was gone. And now her son is King. I've never met him. I don't expect I ever will. But all of us can meet King Jesus, and meeting Him can make a real difference today. You see, the cross was not the end. Death could not hold him and he reigns now and forever: of the increase of his government there will be no end.

The point about a king is that he requires our allegiance. Just before he died in 1891, the famous preacher Charles Spurgeon commended King Jesus with these words: "If you wear the livery of Christ, you will find him so meek and lowly of heart that you will find rest for your souls. He is the most magnanimous of captains and the choicest of princes."

This December, please do join us for any one of our Christmas services where I pray you meet the King.

#### **NATURAL OUTLOOK** By Heather Salvidge 🕾 814153

Even when there are very few people about on the playing field, there seems to be no birds. Maybe there is still time over the winter to see some, not just magpies etc. but what I like to see, sheltering from winter storms, would be flocks of seagulls, even if they are in winter plumage.

There could be black-headed gulls (dark brown heads usually) smaller than most and now with a pale head and a dark spot behind its eyes. Herring gulls are bigger, grey backed with some black in their tails, a red spot on the beak and yellow eyes. Any juveniles with them are the same size but have varying amounts of blotchy brown feathers. Lesser black-back gulls are smaller, greater black-backs are larger than all these. Somewhere in the flock there may be a 'common gull' which it isn't – smaller than a herring gull, its grey back is less obvious and its feathers are <u>very</u> white and its head <u>very</u> round, its legs are yellow and its smaller bill is too.

If gulls are 'not at home' I might go to bird reserves such as the Essex Wildlife Trust's Joan Elliott Visitor Centre near the coast where there are a variety of birds that you might see including 100s of shovellers, Egyptian geese, pochards, greylag geese, moorhens, pied wagtails and mallards plus gulls. Inland, there is the RSPB Centre at Rye Meads Wetlands on the Essex/Herts border where you can see, depending on the season, an amazing list of birds, residents and visitors e.g gadwall, teal, coots, tufted ducks, grey herons, Canada geese, kingfishers, grey wagtails, moorhens, starlings, green sandpipers – and more.

Going further north, nearer the fens just into Norfolk you get to Welney Wetlands Fen reserve which is on Station Road alongside the high bank of The New Bedford River. In the main building there is the reception, cafe and shop where there are good views out across Lady Fen. On the grassland area above the cafe you look down on the bird feeders where the tree sparrows feed, now in recovery of numbers, wrens, longtailed-tits, cattle egrets when there are grazing cattle, moorhens, mallards, geese on some of the ponds and occasionally deer in the far distance. You cross the bridge over the New River and get to the main hide overlooking Welney Wash that holds back flood waters when necessary, so sometimes you get a lot and the birds are distant and in summer dry so that species wander around looking for puddles. When it's 'just right' often in autumn and later, there are the winter visitors; the barnacle geese, brent geese, whooper swans, smaller Bewick's swans, shelducks, male pintails. Overhead there is often a marsh harrier, looking down as there are water voles as well as birds, then redshanks, little egrets and great white egrets. Absorbing! Those of you who read Ray Franklin's articles may not be surprised that in 1999 he spent a lot of time working to find out the name of the rose that the first Sir Walter Gilbey planted at Elsenham Hall. It was called the 'Salet Rose' so Ray rang round the village to ask who wanted one to mark the Millennium. We said 'Yes' but were startled when it arrived that May when our flower beds were full so it was heeled in to a vegetable bed. Fortunately last autumn Paul had dug over the first half of the central bed in the back garden so we could transplant it there. It has established enough for it to flower this year, double roses in light pink. I look forward to next year - 2025. Thanks Ray.

The first of these takes place at our General Meeting on Thursday 16th January, featuring a gripping personal story from World War II. The presentation will focus on one of the most daring RAF missions, involving low-level bombing with pinpoint accuracy. The mission, Ramrod 564, The Amiens Prison Raid, launched from RAF Hunsdon nearby in Hertfordshire in February 1944, was crucial in the lead-up to D-Day. Guy Thomas, Denis Sharp and Susan Sedgebeer will recount the story of the raid, featuring a first-hand account from the navigator of the second Mosquito to drop its bombs, breaching the outer wall.

For those who attended Mike Howgate's Saturday Seminar in May 2024, where he challenged the theory that birds evolved from dinosaurs, the upcoming seminar on Saturday 18 January offers the perfect follow-up. Professor David Norman from Cambridge University will present the opposing evidence, aiming to prove that birds did indeed evolve from dinosaurs. Whether you joined the previous seminar or not, this promises to be a fascinating session from one of Cambridge's leading paleobiologists.

# THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Until the 19th century, education in England was mostly linked to religious institutions or funded by wealthy donors. The Education Act of 1870 made a commitment to the provision of education to all on a national scale.

The Hundred Parishes has some fine examples of schools that were founded prior to this time and continue to educate young people today.

Felsted School was founded in 1564 by Richard Rich, the first Baron Rich. Under Henry VIII, he accumulated immense wealth whilst overseeing the dissolution of the monasteries, and he was later appointed Lord Chancellor of England under King

Edward VI.



Dame Joyce Frankland, 1531-1588, lived at Rye House in Stanstead Abbotts, the wife of the lord of the manor. Her son was killed by a fall from his horse. In her will, Dame Joyce remembered him by providing funds for the education of boys at many locations including the "ffree grammar schole" in Newport, now

The Joyce Frankland Academy.

Gatehouse to Rye House St, Edmund's College in Standon parish is the oldest Catholic college in England. The main building dates from 1769. The school chapel is Grade I listed, built in the mid-19th century and designed by A.W.N. Pugin whose bestknown work is Big Ben, the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament.

Some schools built after 1870 have adopted the names of notable locals. For example Leventhorpe Academy in Sawbridgeworth was established in 1965 and named after the Leventhorpe family. Sir John Leventhorpe died in 1625 and has one of the finest memorials in Sawbridgeworth parish church.

Ralph Sadleir School in Standon was founded in 1971 and named after Sir Ralph who was born in 1507 and knighted in 1543 by Henry VIII. When Queen Mary I came to the throne, Sir Ralph retired to live quietly in Standon.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. These crispy biscuits could be included in your Christmas hampers without too much effort. The mixture can easily be frozen in advance, defrosted in the fridge overnight, sliced and baked at the last minute.

### PISTACHIO AND CRANBERRY COOKIES (makes 22)

6oz (175g) butter, softened 3oz (85g) golden caster sugar ½ teaspoon vanilla extract 8oz (225g) plain flour 2½oz (75g) pistachios 2½oz (75g) dried cranberries

Mix the butter, sugar, and vanilla extract with a wooden spoon in a large bowl. Stir in the flour, then add in the pistachios and cranberries. Use your hands to bring the mix together into a soft dough. Halve the mixture and shape into two logs about 5cm diameter. Wrap in cling film, then chill for an hour or freeze for up to 3 months.

Line a couple of large baking trays with baking parchment.

Heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan oven/gas 4. Slice the logs into 1cm thick rounds, place these on the baking tray and bake for 15 minutes. Cool completely on the tray.

### CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Use a mixer if you have one. You could use chopped white chocolate, or chopped walnuts, in place of the pistachios for a change.

This was the choice of the book group last month. The AI generated summary of reviews on Amazon said:

"Customers find the book enjoyable, profound, and gentle. They also appreciate the witty and funny banter between the main characters. Readers describe the concept as remarkable and magical. They appreciate the beautiful depictions of the English countryside. Opinions are mixed on the writing style, with some finding it beautifully written and gorgeous, while others say it's overly complicated and forced.'

Book group readers also liked the gentleness of the book and the characters' and the author's appreciation of the natural world and the English countryside. Both the main characters in their different ways wanted to show that appreciation and to do something that took them physically close to the landscape. We discussed how they made the crop circles, how the author explained it enough for the reader to believe it could be done, without making it a manual or being too detailed.

There were mixed views on the descriptive language. A general feeling that there was too much description across the book as a whole and it was too wordy, too many metaphors and that made the book heavy going in places.

Everyone's favourite part was the press reports on each crop circle and the crazy explanations given for them. It was delightful to remember how this worked in a pre-mobile phone, pre-social media era. Don't think Calvert and Redbone would've escaped scrutiny if they'd tried it this year.
