

ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 3 NOVEMBER

Fiona Gardiner has now officially joined Elsenham Parish Council. Fiona will begin her duties as Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer on 1 December 2025.

Uttlesford District Council cannot act on illegal airport parking at Home Farm until a planning inspector rules on the owner's appeal. The owners cite advanced bookings and potential income loss as reasons to continue operating. These reasons are outrageous. Elsenham Parish Council has submitted objections, requesting that the appeal be rejected.

A section of the playing field boundary fence was cut to make an entrance and path from Barley Way onto the playing field. This is a criminal act and has been reported to the police. The Playing Field Committee agreed to keep monitoring the situation.

A councillor raised the issue of establishing a safe and practical route connecting Elsenham to Henham, emphasizing that people should not have to walk on the road as it is dangerous. The suggestion was that this should be a joint project with Henham Parish Council. It was pointed out that there are currently three footpaths leading to Henham, and Henham Parish Council has plans to enhance them.

Excess water on Hall Road is due to overflow from the spring-fed pond on Church Road. Normally draining through a pipe to Stansted Brook, the flow is blocked by clogged drains and filled-in ditches. Elsenham Parish Council reported this to Essex Highways, and since there has been no response, will now ask Essex County Council for a full investigation and resolution.

The bus consultation has finished. Should the feedback result in timetable adjustments, new schedules will be shared and details posted on Facebook.



The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 5 January at 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall. All residents are welcome.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

When I remember, I offer a round-up of all outstanding developments in the last issue of the year. The biggest unknown as I write is the outcome of Gladman's application for 240 homes to the north of Bedwell Road. Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee duly refused it on 2 July on the grounds of noise from the motorway, and Gladman duly appealed. The Appeal Inquiry commences on 2 December. On the other side of Bedwell Road, the development of 50 homes has not yet officially commenced, despite preliminary site clearance, The scheme was given detailed approval under the S62A procedure in November 2024 (that's right, over a year ago). It looks as if the bright idea of erecting three-storey 'affordable' flats towards the motorway in order to baffle the noise has been stymied, in that no housing provider has come forward prepared to take on the management of such an unappealing asset.

Off Robin Hood Road, detailed approval for 40 homes was given by UDC's Planning Committee on 22 October. There was a marked lack of enthusiasm by the members of the Committee, who thought the design poor and uninspired. Approval was proposed with reluctance and two members abstained. The Committee took seriously the insistence by the locals that there are natural springs in the field proposed for development. The promise of a hydrological report did not impress - one Committee member pointedly remarked that surely the report should come before the approval, otherwise they might be agreeing to the building of new houses on top of the springs.

Dandara duly completed their 99 homes on two sites (Woodland Drive off Isabel Drive and Crown Drive off Stansted Road), with completion of the children's play area unsurprisingly coming last. Off Hall Road, nearly half of the 130 homes scheduled on the Vistry site (now Golden Miller Avenue, after a racehorse's unequalled exploits in the 1930s) are occupied, with the remainder expected before the end of 2026. The developer has applied to defer completing the PRoW through the site until after all the homes are occupied, which effectively gives them 'until the last syllable of recorded time' (*Macbeth*, V, v, 21). Objections have been made that it should be rather earlier, if any of the potential benefit is to be realised.

Bloor Homes continue their concerted effort to infill all the land between Elsenham and Henham with housing. 'Phase 1'comprises 350 homes, and somewhere between 250 and 300 are occupied. 'Phase 2', 200 homes, is well under way, with first occupation expected before Easter. A full application has been made for 'Phase 3', 129 homes, which Bloor confidently expects to be approved as the site was included in the Local Plan, albeit with the lesser number of 110. Lastly, a detailed application is still awaited for 130 homes given outline approval opposite the Crown back in June 2023.

UDC's Local Plan should be adopted in 2026, but there is enough development already approved in the village to last out the year.

As the year draws to an end and Christmas appears on the horizon, one tends to look back at what has gone before. The village has seen many Christmas gatherings over the years but none more prestigious perhaps than the one that took place just before Christmas 1889 when Mr Walter Gilbey had a few "friends" over for the day.



Among his guests were HRH The Prince of Wales later to become King Edward VII, the Hereditary Prince of Hohenlohe and Lord Randolph Churchill father of Sir Winston Churchill. On arrival at The Paddocks, the thoroughbred shire and hackney horses were paraded together with Friday, at that time the smallest pony in England. The party went to Elsenham Hall for lunch after which, expressing himself highly pleased with the visit, the Prince of Wales drove back to Easton Lodge.

While looking back, I realised that earlier in the year our society celebrated its fifteenth birthday. Since our inaugural meeting on 10th February 2010, apart from the 2021 Covid lockdown, we have held four meetings every year. In that time we have welcomed fifty eight speakers some more than once, speaking about all sorts from the 'Great Plague' to Holidays by the Sea', 'Local Railways' to 'Mediaeval Woodworking' and much more. More than 160 newsletters have been written as well as notes of all those speakers' talks.

Who said we wouldn't last!

Of course all those newsletters and meeting minutes are all available on our website together with lots more information, photographs and a village timeline that starts in 61AD! The web address is shown in the article header so please take a few minutes to have a look and see what you can learn about your village.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 11 March 2026 and will include our AGM. The speaker for the meeting will be Mark Cook who will speak about "Policing in The Met and Essex" I hope you will be able to join us at the start of our year and of course, visitors are always welcome.

It was an honour and privilege to represent the District Council at our Memorial Service on Sunday 9 November. As usual, an excellent turn out for Elsenham and a real joy to see the Scout and Guiding Groups attending. Thank you to all those attended.

How we receive our information is becoming more and more digital, with that in mind, we would like to signpost to our website www.uttlesford.gov.uk. It is updated regularly and a real mine of information. Our Scrutiny Department recently concentrated on our Uttlesford Community Safety Partnership. We work in partnership to help everyone in Uttlesford feel safe in their homes; in the streets and the places they go.

The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 (as amended by the Police Reform Act 2002) sets out the statutory requirements for responsible authorities to work with other local agencies, organisations and people, to develop and implement strategies to tackle crime and disorder, help create safer communities and tackle misuse of drugs in their area. These statutory partnerships are known as Community Safety Partnerships (CSP). CSP in partnership is made **up of** Uttlesford District Council, Essex Police, Essex Probation, Essex Fire and Rescue Service and Uttlesford Community Action Network (UCAN). All are working towards the following key priorities in line with the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner for Essex. Our key priorities are protecting vulnerable people, promoting healthy relationships, promoting online safety, building community resilience and tackling emerging trends. These support the Police and Crime Plan 2021-2028 on the PFCC for Essex website, which sets out the policing priorities and aims to keep Essex safe.

The **population** of Uttlesford (as of 2021 census) is roughly **97,500 people** — about the same number as Wembley Stadium can hold! The size of **Uttlesford District** is **about 641 square kilometres (248 square miles)**, which could hold around 6,700 Wembley Stadiums (if packed side by side). Which is why we are Tackling Rural Priorities. We are working on drawing together our understanding of issues and challenges facing our villages and rural communities, including rural isolation, poverty, homelessness, rural crime, rural economy and safety issues. We are developing a coherent plan across a range of interventions we and other partners both currently make and can potentially introduce to serve our communities. We are working to identify specific initiatives that will be implemented under this scheme. We want to ensure this scheme is up and running prior to Local Government Reorganisation.

Some good news, Uttlesford was recognised earlier this year as one of the most improved councils in the 2025 National Climate Emergency Actions Score Cards and highest in the East of England.

Thought For The Month by Pete Tibbott

One of the things that signal "Christmas is coming" for my children is when Daddy puts the Christmas lights on the front of our house. Our lights have ten (!) settings, from a basic 'always-on' mode, through to 'psychedelic-lightshow'. You can imagine which mode the kids enjoy most...

Lights are not only necessary at this time of year, but they also bring joy. Whether it's the twinkling of the Christmas tree, the car headlights of a loved-one turning into the driveway, or an advent candle at the centre of the dinner table. Light makes us feel joyful.

In contrast, the darkness of winter can feel all-consuming. It's dark outside and that can make us feel isolated. Christmas-time sometimes brings back painful memories. We long for the sun to warm things up again and lower our energy bills.

One hymn writer captures the theme of darkness in his first line, based on Isaiah 60:2 - "Darkness like a shroud covers the earth." It can certainly feel like a shroud, physically and emotionally. But thankfully, the hymn continues - "Arise, shine, your light has come."

This is the good news that Christians hold out in a 'dark' world, that God does not call us to stumble through life blindly but to see that the 'light' has come, the true light that brings ultimate joy. Here's what Jesus said about himself in the Bible:

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

What makes these words even more astounding is that Jesus spoke them directly to the Pharisees, the group of religious leaders who would eventually call for his death. Jesus is telling all those whose hearts are shrouded in darkness that he is the light of the world. He himself is the ultimate joy-giver. So then, the one who follows Christ, who believes and trusts in him, does not stumble through life blindly but has the ultimate joy of knowing where they are travelling to.

Ernest Hemingway's 'The Old Man and the Sea' tells the tale of an old man who is dragged around the Gulf Stream by an enormous fish he is determined to catch. When the fish is finally caught after days of struggle, the man finds himself in the middle of the ocean having lost all his bearings. It's not until night falls that he can see the lights of Havana which prove to guide his way home. After fending off multiple shark attacks, it was the light that guided him back: "he knew where he was now and it was nothing to get home."

Whatever darkness you find yourself in, Jesus proves himself to be "the light of the world." The one who gives ultimate joy, life, peace and hope. The one who can bring us 'home' to the God who made us, if we would follow him.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Hundred Parishes Society is not a church or religious organisation but we encourage visits to churches because they are often the oldest and most interesting building in any community. Most of our churches are open regularly and welcome visitors.

Our website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has many short articles, including some about various aspects of churches including bells, clocks, memorials, poppyheads, spires, towers and windows. We recently added an article about church fonts, some of which appears in the next few paragraphs.

Fonts hold holy water which is used to 'baptise' people, an initiation into the Christian faith. They are often situated near the church entrance. Our local churches have a great variety of fonts, usually made of stone.

St. George's church in Anstey has an 11th-century font that is rare in that it is decorated with mermen (the male equivalent of mythical mermaids) holding their tails.

Thorley church has a 12th-century font. It was removed from the church and for many years was used as a drinking trough on a nearby farm before being reintroduced into the church in 1855. Its ornate cover was designed by George Gilbert Scott, a prolific architect known mainly for his work designing and renovating churches and cathedrals.

Chickney church has a carved stone font from the 14th century. The bowl is lavishly decorated including shields bearing the coats of arms of local Braybrook and Fitzwalter families.

Debden's 18th-century font (pictured) is made of Coade stone and is richly decorated with roses and heraldry.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 

THE SAFEKEEP BY YAEL VAN DER WOUDEN

Reviewed by Marion Giles for Elsenham Book Group

"It is fifteen years after the second World War, and Isabel has built herself a solitary life of discipline and strict routine in her late mother's country home, with not a fork or a word out of place. But all is upended when her brother Louis delivers his graceless new girlfriend, Eva, at Isabel's doorstep - as a guest, there to stay for the season... In the sweltering heat of summer, Isabel's desperate need for control reaches boiling point. What happens between the



two women leads to a revelation which threatens to unravel all she has ever known." So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group this month.

The Amazon AI summarises: Customers find this book remarkable and beautifully written, with a richly layered narrative that moves them emotionally and keeps them engaged. The writing style is poetic, and the story is thought-provoking, with one customer noting how it explores deeper themes of love. While the characters are well-rounded, some customers find them unlikeable.

Set in the Netherlands, we meet Isabel, who still lives in her family home after the death of her mother. The house was provided by uncle Karrel. Isabel's brothers, Louis and Hendrick have long since left home. Hendrick is gay, which caused a rift between him and his mother. Louis quickly tires of girlfriends and moves from one to another with rapidity, however, the house has been promised to Louis, by uncle Karrel, when he eventually settles down to start a family. Isabel is isolated, lonely and worried about what will happen to her. She is naturally hostile to Louis's latest girlfriend, Eva, and is angry and upset when he agrees that Eva should stay with Isabel when he has to go away on business.

Part one depicts how Isabel spends her day in strict routine, monitoring the maid, Neelke, and counting possessions over and over. The only pleasure is in her garden which she tends with care. Isabel is brittle, dismissive and uptight.

Part two deals with the relationship between Isabel and Eva. Isabel is almost incandescent with anger when Eva decides to sleep in Isabel's mother's room, which has been kept as it was. The anger between them develops into a passion and desire that Isabel never expected. The hatred turns to love, almost obsession. As this is reciprocated, Isabel and Eva develop a sexual relationship that consumes them. It is explicit so take care if listening to an audio book in Tesco! Then Isabel realises Eva is stealing her things and instructs her to leave.

Part three is mainly experienced through Eva's diary, where we learn of her past, what being Jewish meant and her connection to the house. This was perhaps the most interesting part of the book, that also sheds light on the plight of the Jews in Holland after the war. The book moves to a satisfying, if inevitable, conclusion.

COOKERY CORNER

Here's a recipe suggestion to help use up leftover cooked turkey meat. Makes a delicious family brunch alongside any kind of eggs, fried, poached or scrambled - or served for supper with mash and lashings of gravy.



TURKEYCAKES (serves 4-6)

400g roast turkey, diced small
50g breadcrumbs
Handful of parsley, leaves finely chopped
2 tablespoons soft thyme leaves, finely chopped
Grating or two of nutmeg (optional)
1 clove of garlic, finely chopped
1 large egg, lightly beaten
Plain flour for dusting
2-4 tablespoons sunflower or rapeseed oil for frying
Salt and freshly ground pepper

Put the diced turkey into a large bowl with the breadcrumbs, herbs, nutmeg (if using) and garlic, together with lots of pepper and a pinch of salt. Mix thoroughly together adding the egg to bind mixture together.

Divide mixture into 8-10 pieces and form flat "cakes". Put on a plate, cover and place in the fridge for at least 30 minutes (longer is fine).

Remove the "cakes" from fridge and dust them all over with the flour. Heat 2 tablespoons of oil in a large heavy-based, non-stick frying pan over a medium heat.

Cook in batches for 4-5 minutes per side or until golden and hot right through. Remove from pan, drain on kitchen paper and keep warm until all are fried, adding more oil to the pan if needed. Serve hot.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Swop roasted pork for turkey, adding a little chopped sage to the other herbs and moisten the mixture with apple sauce if you have some, as well as the beaten egg.

Add a spoonful or two of cranberry sauce or some spicy chutney to the mixture to give some extra flavour.
