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A MISSION FOR 2019 - SAVE OUR LIBRARIES!

Essex County Council is proposing to close up to half of the libraries in the county (44 out of 74 branches) including our nearest libraries in Stansted and Thaxted. You can help to keep this vital community service.

Libraries are safe, warm and welcoming spaces that promote community, literacy, and life-long learning. They offer so much more than "just" books! In the last year, **over 5 million visits** were made to Essex Libraries.

Essex County Council wants to reduce library provision to a small number of hubs. This is an inadequate solution for a rural area with poor transport links. Uttlesford district would be left with just two libraries in Dunmow and Saffron Walden. Unbelievably, this is to save **just 0.2%** of Essex County Council's annual budget.

How can you help?

Most importantly, please fill in the official Essex County Council survey here: https://libraries.essex.gov.uk/libraries-consultation/. To request a print copy, or carry out the survey over the phone, call 0345 603 7639. You can also sign the local petition in support of Stansted Library: https://www.change.org/p/susanbarker-essex-county-council-save-stansted-library.

Pop into your local library branch or use the mobile library van on its next visit to the village, have a chat to the lovely staff, and then use your library card to borrow something, anything you like! When you get back home you could also use your library card to download audiobooks and ebooks!

If you haven't used the library before, 2019 is a great time to join. It's free! Here are just a few of the things going on:

- For babies and toddlers, Rhymetime sessions take place at all libraries. Libraries are also breastfeeding welcome spaces.
- If you're researching your family history, setting up a new business, or looking for support with your homework, there are lots of reference sources and free online courses available with your library card.
- The Home Library Service supports those who can't get to the library due to disability, age, or caring responsibilities.
- Memory Support cards are available for those with difficulty remembering to return due to mental health issues. No charges are incurred on this type of card.

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ELSENHAM C OF E PRIMARY SCHOOL

There has been a very busy and exciting start to the new year in school with the first of our classes moving into our new building. The children have been keen to explore their new surroundings, both inside and out,



and have been particularly impressed by the new outdoor facilities, with the running track for Key Stage 1 proving to be a considerable favourite.

The opening of the new building has enabled us to offer Breakfast and After-School Clubs, providing childcare for the first time in our new studio. We have kept the cost of this provision as low as possible and we hope it will make a real difference for families at an affordable cost. These clubs are being run "in-house" and are staffed by members of our school staff team, who are already known to the children. There has been a definite 'thumbs-up' from our early participants!

The final stages of the building project are under way with completion expected later this month. The local authority has invested a very considerable sum of money into providing this excellent resource for the children in the village and we hope to have an open event to showcase the many changes that have taken place.

In addition to the new building; we welcome some new members of staff this month. Miss Lucas and Miss Hill join our teaching team with Miss Butterfield joining our support staff team. We hope they will all be very happy here.

We have lots of fantastic news in terms of academic achievement. At the end of last year we learned that we have been included in the top 500 state primary schools nationally (as listed in the Sunday Times) out of a total 16,766 primary schools in England. This is a huge achievement for us and the good news doesn't stop there.

We have received confirmation of the results from the national tests taken by Year 6 pupils in the summer of 2018. Ninety three percent of our pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics compared with 64% of pupils nationally. This places us in the top 2% of pupils nationally. Progress in reading and mathematics was also significantly above average and in the top 6% of pupils nationally.

Sport in our school has started strongly this term with Kaja in Year 5 winning a gold medal in the tennis ball catch challenge throwing competition. The competition was held for Year 5 girls across the local area as part of the School Games Sports Award. Congratulations Kaja!

Other areas of sport this term; we look forward to the annual Swimming Gala at the Lord Butler Pool in Saffron Walden and, following their success in the earlier rounds of the competition, Max in Year 4 and Freddie in Year 3 will take part in the County Cross Country finals at Hadleigh Park. In addition to this, we also have football, basketball and netball matches to look forward to.

Please keep us in mind if you are shopping at Waitrose this month. The green tokens they provide can support the work of our PTA, FOES, who are raising funds to equip a new library for us.

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THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

We have been sending monthly articles to magazine editors for more than four years and thought it might be a good idea to provide a reminder of the Society's aims and activities. The



Hundred Parishes Society is a registered charity, run entirely by volunteers. It was launched in 2014 and is still relatively new.

A full explanation of the organisation's objectives is given on its website. Put briefly, it exists to increase awareness, enjoyment and care of the Hundred Parishes, an area that is characterised by its rich and diverse heritage.

The area covered is approximately 450 square miles and incorporates 104 parishes in northeast Hertfordshire, northwest Essex and southern Cambridgeshire. It includes 6,700 listed buildings which is more than any of the country's National Parks, and this despite being smaller than most of them. It is also worth pointing out that the three districts in the UK with the greatest concentration of pre-1700 listed buildings are Uttlesford, Braintree and East Hertfordshire.

Running the organisation is the responsibility of a small group of trustees who meet about every two months. At the present time we would welcome an extra trustee, particularly one from Hertfordshire. We now have 120 members paying a minimum annual subscription of £10: a mixture of individuals and households, parish councils and other local organisations.

Our main activities revolve around the spreading of information through leaflets, the website, regular magazine articles, member emails and occasional talks. The website has details of 20 interesting walks, each starting and ending at a railway station.

In 2018 the Society published "The Hundred Parishes: An Introduction". This 400-page quality hardback book contains a brief history of each parish and is lavishly illustrated with almost 1,000 photographs. It can be bought at local Tourist Information Centres.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. VILLAGE CHRISTMAS BY LAURIE LEE

"Laurie Lee left his childhood home in the Cotswolds when he was nineteen, but it remained with him throughout his life until, many years later, he returned for good. This collection brings to life the sights, sounds, landscapes and traditions of his home - from centuries-old May Day rituals to his own patch of garden, from carol singing in crunching snow to pub



conversations and songs. Here too he writes about the mysteries of love, living in wartime Chelsea, Winston Churchill's wintry funeral and his battle, in old age, to save his beloved Slad Valley from developers. Told with a warm sense of humour and a powerful sense of history, Village Christmas brings us a picture of a vanished world." So says the blurb on the back of the book...

This was the choice of the book group this month. There were mixed feelings. It is a collection of short stories and some were liked better than others.

Perhaps this book is best viewed as a book to dip in and out of, although the "Village Christmas" title is somewhat misleading. That said, it is a nice selection of descriptive short essays that can bring alive a scene, a street, a field, a time and place gone forever.

One to keep on the bookshelf but if you are wanting a collection of winter scenes, this may disappoint. Most of the group felt this was not his best work and gave the impression of being a collection of his works put together by his estate.

A council is then formed to run the Memorial Hall, situated on the playing field (off Leigh Drive), and to ensure it is fit for hiring out to organisations within Elsenham and also for private hire. The ECA also hires the hall to Elsenham Parish Council for their meetings and to Uttlesford District Council for polling days.

The council is made up of full members comprising Village Representatives (elected) and Organisational Representatives (appointed) who all automatically become Trustees once on the council.

The organisations that regularly hire the hall and provide representatives (ECA Trustees) are Brownies, Tots and Toddlers, Women's Institute, Church Lunch Club, Elsenham Village Café, Rainbows, Little Fishes, Elsenham Youth Football, Elsenham History Society, Henham & District Gardening Club, and Elsenham Parish Council. Other organisations that provide representatives are the Bowls Club, the Tennis Club, Elsenham Church, St Mary's Fabric Fund and Neighbourhood Watch.

Regular users of the Memorial Hall include Zumba, Line Dancing, Studs and Stars, Yoga, Aerobics, Slimming World and Petals Together. The hall is also available to hire for meetings, conventions and private parties etc.

The ECA organises the annual Elsenham Village Fete, **Saturday, 8 June 2019**, Playing field, and annual Santa event, Saturday, **7 December 2019**, Village Hall (school).

A 'fair-weather' supporter? (Letter from the Assistant Vicar)

Does a *real* football supporter enthusiastically cheer on his team - but only as long as his team is winning? What kind of supporter abandons their team when they have a run of bad form? Surely a true supporter cheers on his team through thick and thin through good and bad times?

In life, some of us commit to others on the basis of what we can get out of the relationship rather than what we can give. We can treat our personal relationships in a selfish, mercenary way. When things are difficult we can too quickly withdraw that love and support and too hastily walk away.

We can also approach God with an attitude of "what's in it for me?" God becomes someone who is there to bless me and make my life go smoothly. We may think I'll follow him, but I expect him to answer my prayers for health and happiness and to smooth out life's problems. This madeup god is like some genie at our beck and call.

I remember when I was a young teenager in hospital and the minister from our local church came to visit, I thought to myself "That's nice - that's great, but I'm still in hospital!" I had at the time a sense that God was to be at my beckoning, solving my problems, making life good and because he didn't seem to do that, I then drifted away. It was around a decade later that God revealed his true self to me through his Son, Jesus. Jesus had actually done an exceedingly great thing for me in giving up his very own life on the cross that I might have forgiveness and eternal life and enjoy a true and personal relationship with God. God doesn't promise to make life easy.

Jesus said "If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me." (Luke 9:23), Jesus said that in following him you may be persecuted, ridiculed, you may have to give up things that are very dear to you sometimes even your very own life, as many Christians in other countries have found to their cost - but ultimately you will find that God does not disappoint.

Centuries before Jesus, the Prophet Habakkuk wrote that even in the midst of suffering and loss he would trust God and find a joy that was not based on circumstances but in God himself. "Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines," he writes, "though the olive crop fails and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Saviour" (Habakkuk 3:17–18).

There is a joy that transcends our circumstances, that looks beyond and above to Jesus, who did not think of himself but who in love gave up everything for us.

The application by Stansted Airport for an increase in passengers was approved at a meeting of the Planning Committee of Uttlesford District Council in November. Some committee members contributed more than others. A curious local resident with, presumably, an abundance of time on his hands has established that the five councillors who eventually voted against approval spoke in total 103 times, whereas the four who voted in favour, excluding the Chairman, spoke in all 11 times. Some councillors were clearly befuddled. One who voted for approval spoke just once, and commented: 'the information we've got, thousands of pages, is extremely difficult to take in. Because the more you read the more tired your mind gets and then tends to get a little bit fuzzy'. A member who voted against, a solicitor and therefore used to reading through reams of stuff for a living, said he was 'out of my depth'; 'I truly don't think anyone here – including you, Mr Chairman – can put your hand on your heart and say: "I know what I'm doing". You don't.'

The proceedings amply justified Stop Stansted Expansion's objections to the application being decided by Uttlesford on the grounds that UDC's officers lacked the expertise to appraise such a large and technical application, and that UDC's Planning Committee was not qualified to make an informed decision. SSE's court action claiming that the application should be 'called in' for determination by the Secretary of State is ongoing.

UDC seems to be making a habit of accepting proposals without reading them properly. The Sustainability Appraisal is a key document in the new Local Plan. The Planning Policy Working Group recently agreed to a completely new version comprising 523 pages, although some members admitted to insufficient time to absorb it all. They also adopted an update on local representations of 333 pages; the total of 856 pages was approved in 50 minutes, giving an impressive average rate of 17.12 pages per minute.

There was a previous SA (anything with CAPITALS is made into an acronym), which UDC was happy with, until they were told that it should be reviewed. So they commissioned more consultants, who perhaps unsurprisingly ripped it to shreds and stamped on the pieces (probably not literally). UDC reckoned their budget allowed for such an outcome and said, in effect, 'OK, if you think you can do better, you can get on with it', and the new report was produced in double-quick time.

This shining new SA now goes out to yet another consultation, for six weeks, ending on 25 February. UDC are simultaneously sending the whole of the draft Local Plan to the Inspectorate, with the promise that representations on the SA will follow later. The lawyers have said no problem with this, but UDC are a tad nervous and are asking them if they're really sure. After the Inspector has considered all the documents, thoroughly we hope on this occasion, public hearings will be held, probably after the local elections in early May.

Elsenham Parish Council is extremely dissatisfied with the present Uttlesford District Council's policy regarding new litter and dog waste bins. The village has increased by around 50%, therefore, Uttlesford District Council is receiving extra council tax from the new residents and yet refuses to carry out a fundamental duty of emptying any extra village litter or dog waste bins. If the Parish Council moves litter bins or buys new bins to accommodate the extra housing, the Parish Council would have to pay someone to empty these bins. It would be far more cost effective if the whole procedure was carried out by Uttlesford District Council and all the bins were collected together. However, Uttlesford's way makes the District Council look efficient, as they are not having to increase their refuse budget, but it is the tax payer that ultimately loses out by having to pay extra.

British Telecom has now agreed to the Parish Council adopting for £1 the disused telephone box on the corner of New Road and Station Road. The Elsenham History Society is going to make it into a mini museum.

The Parish Council has sent off a letter responding to the library consultation. If you want to keep our local libraries open please complete the consultation. You will find the details on p7.

The Boxing Day walk was a success despite the mud. Fifty-one people plus dogs turned up to complete the two-hour walk.

To accommodate all the budgets required for 2019/20, the Parish Council will have to ask for a precept of \pounds 76,000. This is an increase of \pounds 6,000 but with the income from the extra housing the percentage per household is a 2.6% increase.

The local elections are to be held on 2 May 2019. If you are over 18 and do not have a criminal record, you may stand for council. If Elsenham has more than 11 candidates then an election will be held. The village has not held an election for Elsenham Parish Council for over 50 years.

The second Tommy is now standing in the Memorial Garden. Thank you to all the residents and organisations that donated funds to help make this happen.

The Parish Council is going to update their website. The current website was set up over eight years ago and technology has moved on since then. The benefits for the community will be to make the site visually appealing, accessible on mobile devices, able to link to other online platforms and to invite two-way communication.

The volunteer evening was a great success and was extremely well attended with lots of good feedback from people who had enjoyed the evening. It was a wonderful community evening and certainly something to think about doing again this year.

The next Parish Council meeting is on 4 February 2019 at 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

At our last meeting in November (seems a long time ago now) Alan Taylor, noted local WW1 historian and battlefield guide, gave his talk "The Last Battle – November 2018 and Beyond".

The war ended at 11am on 11 November 1918 and even though the time of the armistice had been communicated to the trenches beforehand, men were being killed less that twenty minutes before the ceasefire. As the guns fell silent for the first time in four years of war, the men in the trenches were unbelieving that peace had finally come. There was after all a great deal to be said for life in the trenches, you were sure of your next meal – if you lived to eat it; the shells fell on good and bad alike producing a great sense of camaraderie and there was no poverty. In the future many men would look back on trench life with affection but suddenly they realised with some shock that they could live to be old men with all that implied for having to fend for themselves as the support from the army ceased. Today we would recognise these feelings as symptoms of PTSD or battlefield fatigue.

You may recall that when For The Duration was published in 2014, Walter Turner was the missing man, there being no information about him available at that time. In 2016, his grandson was located and the editors gained a great deal of information about Walter that was subsequently written up and posted to the EVHS website. Last year, the speaker took Walter's grandson and family to visit Passchendaele and his grave in the New Irish Farm Cemetery. Whilst paying their respects a motorcade turned up carrying Theresa May who was doing a little sightseeing on her way to a meeting and she came over and spoke to the group. It is rather ironic to consider that 100 years after Walter's death, there were three generations of his family talking to the British Prime Minister at his graveside.

Following this episode, it has further come to light that Walter had died in company with an Australian serviceman (by the name of Kelly) while they were engaged in trying to retrieve a field gun from the shell hole it had fallen into. Australian records having survived better than those in the UK, it is hoped that the additional detail in these records will better explain exactly where Walter died and how.

Our next meeting and AGM will be on Wednesday 13 March when Roger Barrett from the Stansted History Group will be speaking about the Fuller-Maitlands of Stansted Hall. Talks later in the year will be: 12 June The History & Practice of Thatching by Master Thatcher, Lee Player; 11 September Arabic Carpenter's Marks and the Building of Kings College Chapel by returning speaker Bill Hardy and finally on November 13 DNA, Surnames and Genealogy by Mark Carroll.

Meetings are free to members and visitors pay just £2 but this is the perfect time to join us for just £5 to enjoy all four meetings through the coming year.

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NATURAL OUTLOOK ON WALLASEA WANDERINGS

Last February's weather was awful – snow at the start and ten days of the 'Beast from the East' to finish. Mid-month, there were a few warmer days than those but that was it. Due to last autumn's weather, it meant that in our garden the viburnum bodnantense started flowering in November, a month early and hazel catkins



have been showing yellow along parts of the Bishop's Stortford bypass and other hedges since later January. This is not necessarily good news as there are few or no pollinators around which bodes ill for next autumn's nut crop. Cold weather does tend to bring birds into our village open spaces and gardens seeking shelter.

Last year, fieldfares and redwings joined the rooks, crows, starlings and pied wagtails on the playing field to feed. It remains to be seen whether, given the increased human activity nearby, they will be about this year. I have yet to have a single fieldfare in the garden and only a few overhead. I'll keep a watch on the field between Elsenham Place and Hall Road where they have often been seen before.

On one of last February's 'warm' days, in need of my annual Brent Goose 'fix', we drove to the east coast, this time to Wallasea Island, a flat area of SE Essex sandwiched between the River Crouch to the north (opposite Burnham-on-Crouch) and the river Roach to the south. It is now an RSPB reserve and the flat land is still being raised and altered using spoil from the Cross Rail project. There are salt marshes, creeks, small islands, wading areas and more inland grassy areas where skylarks and lapwings nest and the kestrel hovers.

The bird list for the visit was guite impressive including up to, say, 70 dark-bellied Brent Geese, our smallest duck, teal, and the largest, shelduck, as well as a small flock of corn buntings. Brents are rather small neat geese, having black heads and necks marked by a small white crescent, a dark breast and white stern. Shelduck are more or less the same size but in different proportions e.g. a shorter neck. They have dark green heads that look black in some lights. Their bodies are mostly white set off by a broad chestnut breast band and patches, a black wing edge and a longways belly stripe and tail tips. Drake and duck both have red bills but the drake's has a knob. The juvenile's plumage is much less spectacular, only gradually gaining the bright colours but still has the same overall shape. Against the overall length of the shelduck (100 - 120 cm) teals are only 35 cm. In their breeding plumage, the males have a chestnut head with a large green eye patch, a grevish back with a white wing stripe, a speckled creamy chest, a vellowish undertail and a green patch 'speculum' on the wings. Females are plainer; mostly shades of brown with a paler underbelly and the tell-tale green speculum. The corn buntings, too, are mainly streaky brown for their plumage. They are a large bunting, social but sing singly on a perch. They have a pinkish yellow bill and long, pale legs that they sometimes dangle if flying only a short distance.

Around the village look out for the first aconites and snowdrops in flower!

This recipe from "Down Under" originated during World War I, when wives and mothers would make these oaty biscuits to send to Anzac (Australian and New Zealand Army Corps) troops fighting at Gallipoli in Turkey. Stored in an airtight tin, they will keep for up to three months.

ANZAC BISCUITS (makes 12)

4½oz (125g) plain flour
4oz (100g) medium oatmeal or porridge oats
4oz (100g) light soft brown sugar
2oz (50g) desiccated coconut
4oz (100g) unsalted butter, cut into cubes
1 tablespoon golden syrup or honey
½ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
1 tablespoon boiling water

Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°Fan /Gas Mark 4. Line two baking trays with non-stick parchment.

Sift the flour into a medium mixing bowl. Add the oatmeal or porridge oats, brown sugar and coconut and mix together thoroughly.

Put the butter and golden syrup or honey into a small saucepan. Place over a low heat until the butter has melted. Meanwhile, put the bicarbonate of soda into a cup and pour on the boiling water to dissolve.

Next, stir the bicarb mix into the melted butter, be very careful – the mixture will rapidly fizz and foam up. Pour the frothing mixture into the dry ingredients. Using a wooden spoon, quickly mix together to form a thick batter.

Place generous tablespoonfuls of the mixture onto the prepared baking sheets, allowing room for spreading. Gently flatten the tops with the back of a fork.

Bake for 10-12 minutes until golden brown. Take the biscuits out of the oven, leave to cool on baking trays for 10 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely.

CHEF'S TIPS:

For more chewy biscuits, replace the brown sugar with caster sugar, or for a slightly chewy biscuit, try using half soft brown sugar and half caster sugar. If you have any cornflakes that need using up, crush 3oz (75g) of these and use instead of the oatmeal. Medium oatmeal gives better results than jumbo oats.
