Happy New Year to everyone.

The majority of the meeting held on 8 January 2024, was spent on agreeing the budgets for 2024/2025 and setting a precept.

The following factors were taken into consideration:

- Inflation is currently high.
- There were six new budgets items for the Parish Council to consider.
- The budgets for 2024/25 are higher than the predicted income for 2024/25.

A new budget was included to part fund a PCSO for the village. This will be dependent on Uttlesford District Council and the Police having an available PCSO.

A new budget was also included to donate £3,500 to the Elsenham News. This will allow the magazine to continue to be published for another year.

Funds were set aside in the budget to install extra pathways in the children's play area. It can become very muddy in this area.

Funds were also set aside for Tye Green. The hamlet has experienced many problems last year with the pond, which belongs to the Parish Council, overflowing. A budget was allocated to a new Committee formed by the Parish Council for Climate Change & Environment.

An ear-marked reserve was created for the road and car parks in the playing field. Funds will be added to this reserve each year, so when the car parks or the road require resurfacing, hopefully there will be enough funds to pay for it.

The contribution from Elsenham Youth Football Club for the maintenance and using the Parish Council's land, was increased.

So that the Parish Council can continue to provide the services expected by residents, the Parish Council agreed a precept of $\pounds125,000$ for the financial year 1 April 2024 – 31 March 2025.

As January is always an exceedingly tough time for many families, the Parish Council donated \pounds 190 to Touchpoint.

District Councillor Petrina Lees said the Local Plan was on track. All the comments that people have submitted regarding the Local Plan are going to be tabulated by the District Council and then published with an answer.

The next Parish Council meeting will be Monday 5 February, 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall. All members of the public are welcome.

In mid December we were disappointed to receive a letter form Michael Gove regarding the Local Plan. It told us nothing new –Uttlesford has not updated its Local Plan since 2005. The last submitted plan as you know, was unsound and not good enough to be tinkered with according to the Inspectors. We are along the road to rectifying this, having voted at full Council on October 30 to submit the draft for a full public consultation. Mr Gove and his team also know this, so the demand that we send him a timetable for submitting a Local Plan within 12 weeks is perplexing as that timetable (known technically as our Local Development Plan) was published months ago, and we were ready to send him a link to it within moments of receiving his letter demanding it!

We look forward to collaborating with all councillors through 2024 to refine and improve our Reg 18 draft plan into a stronger, better, and evidence-based Reg 19 final plan for us to vote on this coming summer. There will be opportunities over the coming months to see and consider all the consultation responses, as well as to explore in detail (and amend as necessary) policy chapters on vitally important issues like affordable housing, infrastructure, and biodiversity, as well as substantially reducing the housing site allocations once we know how many additional homes have been approved between April 2023 and April 2024, and can therefore come off our allocations target. All consultation responses will be published, and any questions will be answered and published.

We would like to thank you for your patience and understanding regarding our refuse collections. Crews have been dealing with a much higher than anticipated volume being left out for collection over the festive season. They have braced inclement weather and now crews have to travel to Braintree to empty their full trucks after Essex County Council moved the site from Dunmow, meaning it takes crews longer to get back on the road. Our crews continue to smile and have dog biscuits in their pockets.

Having an airport in the district, means that we have people fleeing real crisis in their home countries and land here in our District. It was an honour and a privilege for Petrina to attend a reception to thank the exceptional volunteers, community partners and community and public sectors who helped at the airport following the Ukrainian and Sudanese Crises. Eduard Fesko, the Ukrainian Ambassador, attended and gave a moving speech, about the realities of war. The compassion for our neighbours and the selfless work, time, and kindness that members of our district have demonstrated is something to be proud off.

We still have monies available from our Ward Initiative Fund.

Our councillors' Surgery this month will be held on Thursday February 22 at 6.30pm at OSCA, Crow Street, Henham.

A detailed application was submitted in August last year to build 40 new homes in the field to the south of Rush Lane, just three weeks before the deadline of three years following the appeal decision which permitted the outline application. Little more was heard. Rumours of difficulties with the site access seemed to be confirmed with news at the end of November of a new outline application, this time with access from the turning head at the end of Robin Hood Road, rather than from Rush Lane. The developers have chosen to apply direct to the Planning Inspectorate under the 'S62A' provisions whereby Uttlesford are penalised by Government for inadequate performance.

Access from Rush Lane was difficult, but the proposed new access from the end of Robin Hood Road is surely worse, since the road is very narrow. It is proposed to widen the part nearest the railway, but leave the section nearest to Rush Lane, in order to preserve a venerable ivy-clad ash tree in the hedge. The idea is that there will be 'one-way working' over this stretch, with northbound traffic expected to give way. It is impossible to see how this arrangement could work, particularly when construction traffic is going to and from the site with the remorseless intensity typical of construction traffic when the development gets going.

I reported last year that the applicants are unfamiliar with the village. They have not used the interim to improve their knowledge. They have no idea that there are issues regarding road access - Grove Hill is unknown to them, which is no doubt why their estimates of cycling times to destinations in Stansted are hopelessly optimistic. They don't seem to have any idea of all the new housing in the village, and they assume that more new housing must necessarily be a good thing. They are unaware, or don't care, that this field is the last vestige of open space in the village, and they absurdly refer again to the patch of grass outside the Memorial Garden as the village green. They think that the 7 bus goes from Stortford to the Airport and the 7A takes the reverse route. It is surely unfortunate if 'transport consultants' are unable to read a bus timetable They are unfamiliar with Uttlesford's parking standards, and with the district's current five-year housing land supply, which is now over five years and should make a difference to the way the application is appraised. They seem to know nothing at all of the natural springs which anyone familiar with the area will tell you are to be found within the site. And the equipment suggested in the children's play area is modest to the point of non-existence.

Apart from that, there's not much wrong with it, really, and the application will probably be allowed by the Planning Inspectorate, on the grounds that Uttlesford does not have a Local Plan. The news there is that the 'Regulation 18' consultation is closed, and at some time in the future all the responses will be published with replies from the Local Plan team.

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

December saw wet and relatively warm conditions with hardly any frost. The three main ponds in the reserve are now full and all the other ditches and depressions are full of water, providing multiple locations for our frogs and toads to breed. Given the number of frogs that were present in the reserve at the end of the summer I am expecting to see lots of frogspawn any time from the end of January or early February.

The saturated ground has led to a few trees being partially blown over in the high winds at the end of December and the volunteer group have been making these safe as well as laying a new anti-slip surface to the lower boardwalk.

Despite the damp conditions underfoot the reserve still offers a wonderful space to enjoy nature. It is a suitable time to look out for treecreepers as they are more easily seen without the foliage on the trees. These active little birds will be seen close to the bark, gradually working their way up the tree trunk in a spiralling climb, looking for insects, spiders and grubs.

When and how to contact the Police



The Police are offering more ways of reporting non-emergency crime and anti-social behaviour through the digital 101 service on their website.

You can also use the service to contact your local policing team, tell them about something you have seen or heard, or request information.

They also have a Live Chat service, where you can send direct messages to a digital 101 operator Monday to Friday (excluding public holidays) between 10am-9pm. They still have the 24-hour 101 service which people can call if they feel it is more appropriate to speak to them or don't have access to the internet.

Always call 999 if a serious offence is in progress or has just been committed, someone is in immediate danger or harm, property is in danger of being damaged, or a serious disruption to the public is likely.

If you have a hearing or speech impairment, use the textphone service 18000. Or text the Police on **999** <u>if you've pre-registered with the emergencySMS service</u>. British Sign Language (BSL) users please use their <u>video relay service</u> where an interpreter will help you report the crime.

If you're in danger but you can't talk on the phone, you should still call **999**, then follow the instructions below depending on whether you're calling from a mobile or a landline:

How to make a silent 999 call

If you're in danger, call 999 and try to speak to the operator if you can, even by whispering. You may also be asked to cough or tap the keys on your phone to answer questions.

Call 999 from a mobile

If you don't speak or answer questions, press 55 when prompted and your call will be transferred to the police. Pressing 55 only works on mobiles and doesn't allow the police to track your location. If you don't press 55 your call will be ended.

Now that Spring and Summer is coming, and the weather should be warmer and drier this is a good opportunity for Elsenham residents to help with road safety

in our village, and in doing so, reduce any road collisions and injuries to drivers and to any pedestrians that may get caught up in an accident.

Our village has become a race track. Talk is not enough – Your action is required

To become part of this major village speed reduction plan we need lots more volunteers of all ages (over 18) for the task. Why not ask your neighbours or friends, and go out together, or just go out with a member of the team once you are fully trained, and become part of the **"Elsenham Speed Watch Team"**

Full initial training will be given via Zoom, then roadside training on the use of our fully calibrated SL700 laser device, (as used by the Police) and then just a few



hours a month operationally. When you decide you are available.

There is NO weekly or monthly commitment

Are you interested? Or need more information? Or you would like to come out with us, to see how it works before you say yes?

Every driver speeding is reported to the Police, they then send a letter out to the driver, and if necessary, pay them a visit if they discover the vehicle is not legal. So, it is worth an hour of your time to reduce the speeding in the village.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

With the Christmas festivities behind us we are into the New Year and the start of the fifteenth year since the inauguration of our society in February 2010. One of the earliest bits of research, and one that is still ongoing, is the origins of the road and place names in and around the village. Some of the fruits of these labours follow.

Gilbey Cottages – after the Gilbey family of Elsenham Hall, the most renowned of all was Sir Walter Gilbey (1831-1914), long-time benefactor to this village and the surrounding communities.

Glebe End – was church land in use as allotments until built on circa 1977-79. **Gold Close –** built on land that formed part of the Gold brothers' Nursery site. The Golds were connected by marriage to the Gilbeys.

New Road – built following the move of the railway station from Fuller's End in 1846/7. The road was built to give easy access for the nurserymen of Ugley Green to get their products to market.

Oziers – after the plot of land called by this name which presumably had osiers growing on it. It was part of Broom Farm. There was also a pond, now filled in, which had at least one willow tree growing beside it. The tree is still there.

Robin Hood Road – taken from the name of the Robin Hood public house which ceased to be licensed premises around 1988/89 and is now Fullers Court. **Rush Lane** – was named after the Rush family of Elsenham Hall who were

Lords of the Manor from 1783 to 1904. When the houses were built, the builder asked the primary school to research suitable names which they did with the help of Gordon Barker. The builder made the final choice of Rush Lane. **Saunders Close** – named after Mr Saunders who had his bakery in the yard behind what is now the Post Office.

The Daisy – is the formal name for the Surgery in Station Road. Built in 1989, it was named after Mrs Daisy Robinson (d.2008) whose family of builders and funeral directors owned the land.

Our next meeting is on March 13 in the Memorial Hall and, as is now customary, will include our AGM. At a Committee meeting some time ago, we were discussing possible talks when we realised that we had never presented a talk about Elsenham. Nothing ventured, our Chairman Ray Franklin delved into his photo collection and has put together a "Potted History of Elsenham" that takes us from the 12th century to the present day in forty-five (and a bit) minutes. Ray is a very entertaining speaker so this will be a good opportunity to come along and see what we are all about.

Visitors are always welcome for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership costs just five pounds for a full year's meetings and this would be the perfect time to join. See you there?

More news about recycling

Did you know that the crisp packets which you recycle using the bin outside Petrina Lee's house (Orwell House on Station Road) are made into beads which are then made into benches and fence posts? The beneficiary is the Food Bank.

The beneficiary of recycled dental items is Essex Air Ambulance. It's all in the worthy causes of the Food Bank and the Air Ambulance as well as recycling the items and preventing them going to waste. So well done Elsenham residents, it's well worth keeping up the good work.

We have also found out that Golf World recycle their golf balls. So that's more good news!

Good news about wildlife: Spains Hall Farm, Finchingfield, is the home of the first beavers to return to Essex for over 400 years and the home of a biodiversity project. Good news about trees: The Essex Forest Initiative (Essex County Council website) in 2019 committed to planting £1million worth of trees over the next five years. This will include planting 375,000 trees, over 150 hectares, equivalent to the size of 210 football pitches.

Toothpaste Tubes: Sadly the Terracycle scheme in Elsenham has ended. Over four years 153kg was collected and the funds raised went to the Essex Air Ambulance. Many thanks to Clare Hardy who transported the collections to Terracycle. Boots in Bishop's Stortford offer a recycling scheme and you can earn points while helping the environment.

Another year, another BBC Sports Personality of the Year. 2023 saw the 70th edition and completed a hat-trick of women as Mary Earps followed previous winners Beth Mead and Emma Raducanu (two footballers and a tennis player).

As a nation we love sport (especially watching it) so at our recent Christmas Morning Service, we considered an unlikely theological question: If God were a sportsman, what sport would he play?!

Cricketer Stuart Broad took second place in the award this year, and a cricketer last won in 2019 (Ben Stokes). Perhaps if God played sport, he'd be a cricketer.

But think about what happens in cricket: the batsman tries to hit the ball; the bowler tries to get you out; and the fielders try to catch you out. Some people think that's what God is like: trying to catch us out. But it's not true. God made this world and he loves what he has made. He's not trying to get us out.

So it seems God is not a cricketer! What about tennis? The players serve. They return. The Bible says that Jesus came to serve and that one day he will return. Maybe God would be a tennis player. Or maybe he'd play football. One person shoots, somebody else saves. Jesus came to save. His name means God saves. Maybe God would be a footballer.

But just once in 70 years a sport has produced a winner of Sports

Personality of the Year.

The clue in is John's Gospel chapter 1, verse 12. Speaking about Jesus, John says: to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.

I wonder if you can think of a sport where someone wants to pass you something, and you can pick it up. In fact, you have to receive it almost like a present, a gift.

The sport is rugby (and its only winner was Jonny Wilkinson 20 years ago). You see, God has something that he wants to pass to us: the right to be his child. The Bible says that we are not his children by right of birth: his creatures yes, but not his children. To be his child is something he must pass to us, and it is something he yearns to pass to us.

And it is something we must receive as a gift or a present. And receiving God's pass means to believe in Jesus. In the Bible, to believe is to trust something enough to let it change your life. The gift God wants us to receive is Jesus. And when we do that, when we believe in his name, there is this incredible promise that we will become children of God: Children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God a permanent, miraculous, wonderful change of status.

I have absolutely no authority for this at all....but if God were a sportsman, perhaps he'd play rugby. I wish you a very Happy New Year.

Hello and Happy New year to all our readers. We hope everyone had a fantastic time over the festive period.

The team at the Station have been busy over the period responding to emergencies, training and even running their own Christmas open evening and market which was a huge success.

Over the Christmas period the team assisted with the putting up of the Elsenham Christmas tree which was a fantastic morning helping all the local volunteers.

The wet weather and wind has caused the crew to respond to a variety of incidents. The station, in the midst of Storm Henk early in the New year, was extremely busy and was even at one point called back to our own station after a concerned resident reported a tree with the potential to be hazardous on our own station ground, The crew closed the area and were thankful to TTMC for coming out as an emergency and taking the tree down safely.

The crew have also been attending a lot of incidents involving cars being stuck in flood water and would like everyone to take note of the below safety statement.

- Keep an eye on weather reports for flooding in your area. Do not travel in heavy rain unless absolutely necessary.
- Do not ignore road closed signs
- Never attempt to cross or drive through floodwater if you don't know how deep the water is. Just two feet of water will float a car.
- Never try to swim through fast flowing water or floodwater you may get swept away or be injured by an object in the water.
- Don't assume fords are safe to cross just because the road is not closed. Always look at the river level gauge and use your common sense.
- Floodwater may be contaminated. Never allow children or pets to go near or play in floodwater.
- Prepare a flood kit in case your home floods or you are trapped in a vehicle for any period. This should contain a change of clothing, wellies, waterproofs and blankets as well as a torch, charged mobile, medication and a first aid kit and a list of useful numbers, including flood alert lines.

This seems to be a wet and stormy winter, the named ones starting with Storm Babet and more until storms Gerrit and Henk came just after Christmas. At a guess, there's more to come. Otherwise there has been sub-zero temps, night or day for frost, fog, or temperatures warm enough to bring out the odd garden butterfly. However, on a clear day there should still be daylight around at 5pm!

On a good morning walking up to get the paper there is bird song, once there were three regular thrushes on the station singing, By the car park across from 'Durnsford', then by Ridley Gardens or in the opposite hedge and then somewhere by the surgery. As well, there was at least one robin, on or around the tall tree in Alcuin's garden or in the whitebeams nearer the station. Not so usual now but often one and a great tit too. More recently still, sometimes a song thrush now sings in the long back gardens of the three first houses by Hunters' Court or round the corner in the New Road gardens, including ours! Lovely.

On the way back with the paper I have been known to check the playing field and sometimes get lucky as I have seen some redwings on the far side, starlings, a crow and two magpies. Another time, I was there as the sun went down and using my spare binoculars saw a magpie, two corvids, two starlings and about 80 redwings which were scattered all over the top and north side!. Also, the Stansted Road red kite often flaps over The Spinney and the playing field so another bird to look out for.

In our own garden we sometimes, but not always, get a lot of avian visitors. Last year a wren was here for a while, trilling away front and back in the hedges and otherwise the list for the day was wood pigeons, dunnocks, chaffinches, great tits, blue tits, jay, magpie flying low across to next door, coal tit, goldfinches, greenfinches, a male blackbird, robin, sparrows and a collard dove – over the years the best daily total for species has been 17.

One or two fellow villagers let me know if they have had an unusual visitor; for instance there was the cock pheasant who strutted around a Glebe End garden; the little egret which landed in the Mill's garden and strolled past the house to the Stansted Brook; the brambling which was seen at Tye Green for the first time when I hadn't seen one here for two years; then the two different times when small skeins of Canada Geese flew over going NNE. All good to know about.

If you go to Hatfield Forest for a walk at this time of year it is wise to check to see when it will be open and for how long. On the lake you will probably see, for instance, coots, Canada geese and, just maybe, a pair of grey lags, black headed gulls with just a dull spot on their heads and mallards in moult. In the park I've seen jackdaws, redwings, mistle thrushes and their 'look-a-like' fieldfares. Worth the visit.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Chilly conditions often greet us as we step outside in the early months of the year. The old saying - "When the wind is out of the East, tis never good for man nor beast" - certainly rings true. Before the advent of broadcast weather forecasts, people had to rely on checking nearby weathervanes for the wind direction. These were usually found on tall buildings such as church spires, while Audley End House has gilded weathervanes mounted on eight corner turrets. Today, a variety of designs can be seen (see examples below).

Robert McFarlane's books of old words include about fifty that describe winds, storms or clouds. One Essex term he mentions is *aigrish*, used to describe a sharp cutting wind. The East Anglian word for a strong sudden gust is *gussock*, or *twitchy* for an unsteady wind.

Forecasting the weather for those who till the soil is helpful as weeks of westerly winds can bring relentless rain causing waterlogging of the ground, while cold easterly winds dry out the soil and retard growth.

Currently, the UK Meteorological Office operates over two hundred official automated sites, each recording accurate measurements of temperature, wind speed and direction, and the amount of precipitation. These readings are processed by powerful computers and the results enable forecasters to make predictions about future weather conditions. Local recording sites include the Cambridge Botanic Gardens and Stansted Airport. By searching the Met Office website https://www.metoffice.gov.uk you can check the local weather forecast to help plan your day.

Many individuals or schools are interested in operating a personal weather station and the Met Office is keen to enhance the weather observations network; it asks those who have a personal weather station, manual or automatic, to send data to its Weather Observations Website, WOW, at <u>https://wow.metoffice.gov.uk</u>.

News from St Mary's

We have good news concerning the construction of an annexe in the north-west corner of the churchyard to provide toilets and refreshment facilities. In June we received planning permission from Uttlesford District Council and in December the Chancellor of the Chelmsford Diocese granted



us a Faculty for the works. This is the Church's planning permission for construction at or near a church, and is the equivalent of Listed Building consent.

Since then we have received a report from a structural engineer, detailing the materials and technical details of the building. We have arranged an archaeological survey (this was a condition of the planning application). Sadly, there will not be lots of trenches dug across the site, the archaeologists will merely be on hand to observe when trenches are dug for the foundations and services in case anything of interest is uncovered. The Essex County Archaeologists suggest that there might be evidence of an Anglo-Saxon settlement in the area.

We are presently putting together the tender form to be sent to suitable builders and, once we have chosen the preferred contractor, we can plan a timetable of when the actual building work can be carried out. One feature of the design of the annexe is that it includes a toilet accessible from the outside. This will benefit visitors to the church outside of service times, and allotment holders. Exciting times indeed!

Meanwhile, we have been undertaking a number of repairs to the church building. Nearly one hundred roof tiles have been replaced and the gutters and down-pipes repaired and repainted. Much of the stonework has been re-pointed and the ferramenta (the ironwork that supports and protects the windows) has been restored. These are expensive repairs and we are enormously grateful to St. Mary's Fabric Fund for meeting the costs of the works.

Next on the list of jobs to be done is to replace the fence around the burial ground and effect repairs to the flint wall along the north and east sides of the churchyard. As you can imagine, a 900 year old building requires continuous maintenance and we benefit enormously from the work that has been previously carried out over the centuries to ensure that this 'little Norman gem' is in such good condition today.

If you like Jaffa Cakes, you'll love this moist cake!

JAFFA DRIZZLE LOAF (8-10 slices)

5oz (140g) butter, softened 8oz (200g) self-raising flour 1½ teaspoons baking powder 8oz (200g) golden caster sugar 3 large eggs 6 tablespoons milk Finely grated zest of 1 large orange



3 tablespoons orange juice

2oz (50g) golden caster sugar

2oz (50g) plain chocolate, broken into pieces

Heat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4. Butter and line the base of a 1.2 litre loaf tin.

Put the cake ingredients into a bowl and beat with a hand whisk or wooden spoon for 3-5 minutes, until light and fluffy. Spoon the mix into the tin and level the top.

Bake for 40-50 minutes until golden brown and firm to the touch.

Meanwhile, heat the orange juice and sugar gently in a small pan, stirring until dissolved. When the cake is cooked, remove from the oven and spoon over the orange mix. Leave to cool in the tin, then remove and cool completely on a wire rack.

Melt the chocolate over a pan of simmering water. Drizzle over the cake and leave to set.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: This cake will keep for up to a week in a cake tin. Alternatively, wrap in foil and freeze for up to 3 months.
