The Parish Council has been looking into the possibility, of once again, part funding a **Police Community Support Officer** (PCSO) with Stansted and Henham. However, the new contract from Uttlesford District Council has been changed. The contracted hours for the PCSO have been reduced from 10 hours per week to 5 hours per week. This included his travel to and from Elsenham. Taking off holidays and any sickness it meant the PCSO would spend little time in the village. However, some councillors still felt very passionately that a PCSO would be a good thing for Elsenham. With many police stations closing, residents needed someone they could contact if necessary. Other councillors thought the cost of £4,445.44 for a nine-month contract of 5 hours per week was not good use of public money. The vote went against signing the contract.

The Playing Field Committee have been negotiating with companies about installing extra paths in the children's play area. Some parts of the play area can become very muddy. The tenders for the new Community Centre are now on the Government Finders Contract Website, with the closing date 12 July 2024. The tenders are asking for architects to come forward with a design for a Community Centre based on the specification set out by a survey conducted by the Parish Council.

It was agreed that the Parish Council's grass cutter would no longer cut the two areas of grass on the western side of New Road & Alsa Gardens junction. The site line will continue to be cut but the rest would be left to wildflowers.

The Flowerbed Committee would like to enhance the pump house in the High Street with some flowerboxes, while making sure that they did not damage the structure. However, Elsenham History Society have stated their disapproval, with concerns about water damage. The Pump House was erected in 1903 by Sir Walter Gilbey. In 2016 it was donated to Elsenham Parish Council by Mr Walter Gilbey, grandson of Sir Walter Gilbey. Elsenham Parish Council agreed to take ownership of the Pump House on behalf of the village.

The results of the Essex Bus Survey 2024 have been published. The Elsenham bus, number 7, was 12th out of 100 for the number of users, but bus number 7A, was 95th. Both services are hopefully going to continue, but villagers must keep using the buses to prove they are an important part of village life.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday 1 July, starting at 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall.

As we write this, we are wondering whether summer will ever come! Thank you to all those who give up their time for the village fete, organising and helping out.

We have completed a refinancing deal on funds originally borrowed to purchase Chesterford Research Park. A very substantial discount of £10.2 million was negotiated for early repayment of the outstanding balance of £35.7 million. Even after refinancing the council is better off by £700,000 a year as well as reducing our borrowing by £10 million. Later on this year, we look forward to a profitable sale of Chesterford Retail Park which is receiving strong, worldwide interest from a long list of potential buyers.

Government imposed cuts and their block on councils conducting commercial investments means that UDC have to find nearly £7 million of savings and new revenue, if it is not to reduce quality of services.

We have a four-year programme which outlines how to achieve these savings, whilst delivering the Councils wide-ranging ambitions, improving outcomes for residents and the best services possible. The first year of this programme has already met the £2 million requirement.

June sees the fiftieth anniversary of Uttlesford District Council. To celebrate UDC produced a video featuring many of our councillors, past and present. Both Bianca and I made the cut! Me in my capacity as Leader of the Council and Bianca as one of the newest members, and who is also 50 this year.

This June marked the 80th anniversary of the Normandy Landings, a day that changed the course of our history. We remembered and honoured the sacrifices of those brave soldiers, whose actions on June 6 inspire us to this day. The poppies on the verges seem especially vibrant this year, as if commemorating the events with us.

For our green-fingered residents, our green bin waste service subscription is now open to new subscribers, please check UDC website for details.

We have our Ward Initiative Fund for local projects - please do make a request.

Development Developments

At the meeting of Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee on 29 May, two planning applications of very different size were approved in Henham, both close to the Elsenham boundary. Detailed approval was given to the application by Bloor Homes to build 200 dwellings to the east of Elsenham station and to the north of the 350 homes now under construction. Outline approval had been given in April 2023 under the S62A provisions whereby developers can apply direct to the Planning Inspectorate rather than to the District Council, but Bloor preferred the Planning Committee for the detailed application.

Once an application has outline permission, detailed approval is usually only a matter of time, but nevertheless both parish councils made representations. Henham Parish Council raised well-reasoned objections regarding surface water disposal, given the propensity of Old Mead Road to flooding. Amendments were made to answer Elsenham Parish Council's concerns regarding the lack of communal space for the flats and inadequate bungalows. The applicants are especially proud of their proposed green 'Circular Walk' around the perimeter of the site. They did not answer the objection made by the Parish Council that it has gaps, with nothing to show whether the walker is expected to hop over them or proceed along housing estate roads. Members of the Planning Committee were impressed that only one three-storey block was proposed; they questioned whether parking complies with local standards, but gave the application the nod anyway.

Approval was given on the casting vote of the Chairman to an outline application for seven houses to the east of Old Mead Road. Planning Committee members were concerned regarding sustainability on a site with difficult access and no footway towards the station. Henham Parish Council again raised the issue of flooding in Old Mead Road. Elsenham Parish Council objected that there are no social or economic benefits, given the vast amount of housing already approved, and queried whether residents' parking provision would be sufficient.

Also outside Elsenham parish, but close to the boundary, further details have emerged regarding Gladman's outline application to build 240 homes to the north of Bedwell Road, between the motorway and the railway. They were refused permission at appeal to build 220 on this site in October 2021 on account of excessive noise. They have now provided a 'Sketch Layout', which indicates that the numbers have crept up to 244, and shows the three-storey houses alongside the motorway which they claim will baffle the noise sufficiently. They would be in pairs and groups of four, with nothing to explain how noise would be prevented from escaping through the gaps.

The Inspector who refused the previous application for 220 said that talking to neighbours in the street would be difficult, and that the open spaces and play areas would be in the noisiest parts of the site, which 'would not encourage community cohesion nor social wellbeing'. Nothing daunted, Gladman have bashed on with the current application, where the same objections must surely apply.

How to support wildflowers, wildlife and us

I'm certain that we're all aware now of the need to encourage wildflowers to support bees, other pollinators (vital for our own food production), insects and the birds and mammals which depend on them.

Wildflower meadows are an essential part of the UK landscape that's sadly diminishing every year. Half of Britain's native plants have declined over the past 20 years, and we have lost 97% of UK wildflower meadows.

So how can we help to support and encourage wildflowers?

If you are in the woods stay on footpaths and admire wildflowers from afar as even a couple of steps can be detrimental to a variety of wildflower species.

You can introduce wildflowers in a range of areas at home, for example: your whole lawn, a section of your garden, in raised beds, in window boxes, in plant pots or at your allotment.

Use local seeds where at all possible. Using seeds of British origin will help support native species that are in decline.

Be patient! Establishing a meadow takes time, and over the next 2-3 years you will start to see some spectacular flowers bloom – as well as all the amazing wildlife that will begin to appear in your garden.

If you have a dog, then please don't let them urinate or defaecate on wildflower areas. This is because dog urine and faeces contain a lot of nitrogen and phosphorus which causes the grass to grow which pushes out the wildflowers.

Most ecosystems are naturally low-nutrient environments, and over fertilisation reduces biodiversity by allowing several thriving plants, like hogweed or nettles, to dominate, which forces out other plants and the wildlife depending on them.

We meet on the fourth Monday of each month at 7.30pm in The Crown. Our July meeting will be on Monday 22 July and anyone interested in what we do is warmly invited to attend this meeting.

I have been walking/limping around the village.

This was because in April 2023 I split my knee cartilage. Having seen my doctor, I was referred to the Physio Clinic within Bishop's Stortford (Haymeads) Hospital. Louise did a good job there, but what happened next was the best thing.

I was encouraged to contact the "Nuffield Health Joint Pain Clinic." They have a Wellbeing Centre in Bishop's Stortford. You contact them, you can self-refer, for an initial joint pain assessment. This includes measurement of blood pressure and a HBA1c from a finger prick blood test. During this appointment you may be recommended to seek medical advice from your GP before participating in their Joint Pain Programme.

The Joint Pain Programme consists of six supported weeks with two per week personal trainer led education and weekly exercise sessions. Then six weeks of independent sessions, although there are trainers around to assist.

Because every single thing this world can possibly give you is inherently unstable, uncertain, and changeable.

Just over 100 years ago, JC Ryle the first Bishop of Liverpool said this: All the good things that money can buy are only momentary: they either leave us or we're obliged to leave them.

All the sweetest relationships in life are liable to come to an end; death may come any day and cut them off. The person whose contentment depends on things here below is like the one who builds their house on the sand. You can't rely on it.

According to the Bible, the secret of contentment in all circumstances is simple, but very challenging. The secret is learning to treasure Christ above all things. That is the secret of joy - to learn that in all things, Christ is enough.

So, in Philippians 4: 13, Paul says: I can do this – I can do contentment, in all circumstances, through him who gives me strength. I can know really deep and lasting contentment, when I find it in Christ.

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NATURAL OUTLOOK

Our recent summers have all been different and this one is already. Because of possibly the mild winter – just four frosts – it has meant that many plants, shrubs, trees and grasses have got larger than usual. Our big mulberry came into bud about three weeks early and the two buddleias are showing signs of flower buds before August.



Birds, too, have bred earlier e.g. in May, when the starlings were feeding in their nests before arriving on the grass with the youngsters. Actually they can be fun to watch; they descend en masse, parents brightly coloured followed by the teenagers with their brown coats and large feet, squeaking to be fed. The parents give them a beak full or two to encourage self feeding and eat some food for themselves and have a drink – then shove the kids out of the way as one or two leap into the low water bowl and have a lovely bath. When they and any others finish the bowl is half empty and needs filling. Then the young ones get the idea and jump in with less splashing and wing flapping, using up the water which then needs a refill! Until now we have had only about 3 jackdaws 'visiting', and the odd rook or two. This year when I put the front feeding out a large collection of young jackdaws and rooks arrive and scared all the others off. I scare them off and the others return. I hope the 'big birds' will be 'off to the fields' sooner than last year. As blue tits, goldfinches and greenfinches hatched early, in May - will there be a second brood?

July is usually a good month for butterflies and moths, I sometimes record 14 different butterfly species and several day flying moths - many of them keen on the buddleias in flower.

There will be warm weather, heat waves, rain with or without thunder – and evenings where you can pleasantly sit out.

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Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve

The reserve has three main types of habitat: ponds, meadows and deciduous woodland. Each attracts different species that go together to make this such an interesting environment, but it is the transition zones between habitats that often have the greatest variety of species. The woodland edges, where they join the meadow areas or the fields, receive more sunlight and allow a greater variety of plants, which in turn support more butterflies and other insects. The pond margins, rather than the open water, provide food and cover for the aquatic species and are where you will see the Moorhens and the Heron.

The moorhens, by the way, along with the mallards, successfully reared chicks again this year. They are not, however, as cute as ducklings, due largely to their large bald heads.

With regard to the ponds, we need to ask members of the public not to allow their dogs to enter the ponds. The reason is twofold. Firstly, there has been very significant bank erosion to the top pond where dogs enter and exit the water. Essex Wildlife Trust has



now commissioned revetment work to be carried out to this area at the cost of several thousand pounds of the charity's resources. These works will be carried out in the near future. The second reason relates to the anti-flea and tick treatments that we give our dogs. There is now increasing evidence that these treatments are harming our ponds and streams and negatively affecting the invertebrate species in the water.

I am sure some will be disappointed by this, but we ask for your cooperation in helping to look after the nature in this reserve.







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THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY By Ken McDonald, Secretary · www.hundredparishes.org.uk

The 19th century was a period of great railway development. Several railways in The Hundred Parishes no longer exist although they played an important role during their hundred-year lifetime.



The Saffron Walden Railway was constructed in 1865. It branched off the London-Cambridge main line and ran from Audley End Station to Saffron Walden. In 1866 it was extended to Bartlow to link up with the Stour Valley Railway. Following loss of passengers and freight from rail onto road (a report in 1964 by Sir Richard Beeching identified many lines that were now deemed uneconomic), many stations and miles of track were decommissioned, including the Saffron Walden line.

In Hertfordshire, a line ran from St. Margarets to Buntingford, including stations at Braughing, Hadham, Standon and West Mill. The Buntingford Line was closed to passengers in 1964 and to goods trains a year later. Buntingford Station, off Aspenden Road, is now a private residence.

Braughing station opened in 1863 and closed in 1964. It too is now a private residence but retains many of the original features including the platform, signal box and signals.



Another line ran from Bishop's Stortford via Dunmow to Braintree. Much of this is now the Flitch Way Country Park, a fifteen mile route that was opened in 1994 and is largely maintained by a group of volunteers, Friends of the Flitch Way. It is used by walkers, horse riders and cyclists and is part of National Cycle Network Route 16. The demise of the original rail line can't be blamed on Beeching; it closed in 1952 for financial reasons.

Our website <u>www.hundredparishes.org.uk</u> includes a fuller exploration of local railways under the Articles section, while the Walks section includes routes from current railway stations, plus a new series of Quiet Lane walks that do not use footpaths.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 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Make life easy with this delicious traybake meal, packed with seasonal vegetables and fresh flavours. The recipe is adapted from one of a selection of traybake ideas from the Womens Institute.

HALLOUMI ROASTED VEGETABLE TRAYBAKE (serves 4)

2-3 tablespoons olive oil
Juice 1 lemon
1 teaspoon red wine vinegar
1 teaspoon dried oregano
Pinch chilli flakes (or to taste)
1 red onion, cut into thin wedges
1 red and 1 green pepper, deseeded and cut into bite-sizes pieces
1 small aubergine, diced
250g cherry tomatoes
3 large cloves garlic, skins left on
250g halloumi, sliced
Fresh basil or rocket leaves to garnish

Preheat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas mark 6.

Whisk together the olive oil, lemon juice, vinegar, oregano and chilli flakes. Season to taste with salt and black pepper.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the onion, peppers, aubergine, tomatoes and garlic. Drizzle over the olive oil mixture, then toss until the vegetables are well coated.

Arrange the vegetables on a large baking tray and place the halloumi slices evenly on top.

Roast for 40-50 minutes or until the vegetables are cooked through and the halloumi is golden on top. Transfer to a warm serving bowl, picking out the garlic cloves and reserving any juices from the bottom of the tray.

Squeeze the garlic cloves out of their skins, mash with a fork and stir into the baking tray juices. Drizzle over the vegetables and halloumi, sprinkle with basil or rocket, then serve immediately.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: Delicious served with warmed flatbreads and Greek yoghurt or some hummus on the side. Can also be nicely served alongside a Sunday roast to satisfy the meat eaters in the family!

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serves 8-10 Ingredients:

- 4 large eggs; 225g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling; 225g self -raising flour; 1 level teaspoon of baking powder; 225g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing.
- 200g raspberries; 250g jam sugar. 100g unsalted butter, softened; 200g icing sugar, sifted; 2 tbsp milk.

Equipment

• 2 x 20cm sandwich tins; electric mixer; piping bag fitted with plain nozzle.

Method

Pre heat oven to 180 c electric/350 c gas; grease and line 2 x 20cm sandwich tins: use a piece of baking or silicone paper to rub a little baking spread butter around the inside of the tins until the sides are lightly coated. Line the bottom of the tins with a circle of baking paper.

Break the eggs into a large mixing bowl, then add the sugar, flour, baking powder and soft butter.

Mix everything together until well combined. Be careful not to over mix – as soon as everything is blended you should stop. The finished mixture should be a soft 'dropping 'consistency.

Divide the mixture evenly between the tins. Use a spatula to remove all the mixture from the bowl and gently smooth the surface of the cakes.

Place the tins on the middle shelf of the oven and bake for 25 mins. Don't be tempted to open the door while they're cooking, but after 20 mins do look through the door to check them.

While the cakes are cooking, make the jam. Place the raspberries in a small deepsided saucepan and crush them with a masher. Add the sugar and bring to the boil over a low heat until the sugar has melted. Increase the heat and boil for 4 mins. Remove from the heat and carefully pour into a shallow container. Leave to cool and chill to set.

The cakes are done when they are golden brown and coming away from the edge of the tins. Press them gently to check – they should be springy to the touch. Remove them from the oven and set aside to cool in the tins for 5 mins. Then run a palette knife or rounded butter knife around the inside edge of the tin and carefully turn the cake out onto a cooling rack.

For the buttercream, beat the butter in a large bowl until soft. Add half of the icing sugar and beat until smooth. Add the remaining icing sugar and one tablespoon of the milk and beat the mixture until creamy and smooth. Add the remaining tablespoon of milk if the buttercream is too thick. Spoon the buttercream into a piping bag fitted with a plain nozzle.

To assemble, choose the sponge with the best top, then put the other cake top-down onto a serving plate. Spread the jam then pipe the buttercream on top of the jam. Place the other sponge on top (topside up) and sprinkle with caster sugar to serve.

'It is July 1974 and on a bright, sunny morning, the Turkish army has invaded the town of Kyrenia in Cyprus. For many people, this means an end to life as they know it. But for some, it is a chance to begin living again.

Everyone has always talked about Koki. They never believed she was her father's daughter and her mother died too soon to quiet their wagging tongues. And when she became pregnant and there was no sign of a husband, her fate was sealed.



So she lives outside the town and hides from her neighbours' eyes. But, held captive with the very women who have made her life so lonely, Koki is finally able to tell them the truth. To talk of the Turkish shoe-maker who came to the town and took her heart away with him when he left. And how she has longed for him all these years.

Meanwhile, Adem Berker finds himself back in Kyrenia, his former home, now as a member of the invading force. Here he left everything he ever wanted and, by cover of darkness, risking his life, he is searching every house, every cafe, every old pathway, for just a glimpse of the only woman he has ever loved. ...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group last month. It was well-liked. We were aware that this was her debut novel and thought that her later novels benefit from more polish. However, this story does show her talent at weaving an intricate and emotive story, which is both beautifully descriptive, sad and rich in imagery.

The odd, quirky title belongs to three belongings that an elderly couple take with them whilst abandoning their home at the beginning of the journey through wartorn Cyprus in 1974. The story covers five days at the beginning of the invasion.

There are three sets of main characters. Paniko and Richard are in London and we hear their stories through concern about the situation prompting reminiscences. Koki and Maroulla are imprisoned in Cyrus by the Turkish army. Lastly, Adem and Serkan, Turkish soldiers at the forefront of the battle ground. Throughout the novel we learn how their stories weave in and out of each other.

The horror of war and senseless actions feature throughout the novel as does prejudice, longing and guilt. The novel also explores relationships and prejudice between Greek-Cypriots and Turkish-Cypriots plus the British.

The ending is a little bit predictable, in that you will probably see it coming.
