Dear Editors,

New Annexe at St Mary's Church - Progress Report

This is a further update on our plans to build an annexe at St Mary's Church to provide toilets, refreshment facilities, a new vestry and storage.

It has become clear that we are not going to be able to raise the amount of money needed to build the annexe for which we have obtained planning permission. Our original target was £250,000, but it is likely that the final cost would have been even more than that.

The Parochial Church Council has considered the options open to it to achieve its basic desire to provide a toilet and refreshment facilities. They would be either to build a smaller structure close to the church, or to build further away from the Grade I listed building where the design could be simpler, and cheaper.

These possibilities are being explored and we hope to have a more positive update to share with you in the coming months.

We are enormously grateful to those who have contributed to our Annexe Fund and look forward to being able to turn our vision into reality soon.

Bishop's Stortford Food Bank

The churches of Henham, Elsenham and Ugley support the Bishop's Stortford Food Bank, which, with the Harlow Food Bank, provides emergency food to people living in crisis in this area. Each food parcel contains enough to feed an individual, couple or family for three days. In December it helped 483 adults and 354 children.

At the moment the Food Bank is in urgent need of tins of solid meat (ham, spam etc), tinned rice pudding and sponge pudding.

Any tinned or dry food with a long 'best before date' is gratefully received but It currently has sufficient stocks of beans, pasta, soup and fish.

The Food Bank will also accept toilet rolls, washing and washing-up liquid, and toiletries.

If you are able to donate any items there is a box in St. Mary's church, or you can leave them at the Church Office, Old Frank's, in the High Street.

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On Thursday, 12 March 2020, commencing at 7.30pm, the Elsenham Community Association (ECA) will be holding its Annual General Meeting. The evening will comprise two meetings to be held back to back. The first meeting is to officially close the existing charity (numbered 302363) and for all trustees of this charity to stand down.

The second meeting will be to formalise the new charity (numbered 1186436) still named Elsenham Community Association (ECA).

The ECA owns and runs the Memorial Hall, situated on the playing field (off Leigh Drive), and ensures it is fit for hiring out to organisations within the area of Elsenham and for private hirings – parties, meetings etc. The ECA also hires the hall to Elsenham Parish Council for their meetings and to Uttlesford District Council for polling days.

The organisations that regularly hire the hall, are Brownies, Zumba, Line Dancing, Studs and Stars, Yoga, Tots and Toddlers, Women's Institute, Aerobics, Church Lunch Club, Elsenham Village Café, Rainbows, Little Fishes, Slimming World, Stretch and Relax, Elsenham History Society, Elsenham Flower Show and Henham & District Gardening Club.

The ECA also organises the Elsenham Village Fete – Saturday, 6 June 2020 on the Playing field and the Santa event, Saturday, 5 December 2020, Village Hall (school).

The object of this meeting is to vote in the new trustees of this charity and to elect the Chairperson, Treasurer, Secretary, Vice Chairperson and Booking Secretary.

The trustees will come from: a) representatives of the village organisations that use the hall and b) village representatives (a village representative is a resident of the village who wishes to be involved in the ECA). Those, from these groups, who do not wish to become trustees, but who wish to attend and participate in discussions with respect to the ECA may do so, but may not vote.

The ECA is run by the village for the village, we look forward to seeing you there.

At the closing of the meeting there will be wine and nibbles available.

The Fairfield application has gone to appeal for non-determination. There will be a public inquiry held at Uttlesford District Council's (UDC) offices, on 28 April - 1 May 2020. Residents who submitted comments/objections on this application should receive a letter from UDC asking if they would like to make any further representation. All previous submissions will be sent to the Inspectors.

An appeal has also been lodged for the proposed 40 new houses in Rush Lane and also Crossways in Station Road.

Uttlesford District Council's new Local Plan has been found 'unsound' by the Inspectors. UDC also do not have a five-year housing supply, it currently stands at 2.68 years. This is bad news for Elsenham as it leaves the door wide-open for developers.

The Parish Council asked Essex Highways if they would reinstate the central white line on Abbotsford Bridge. Essex Highways have replied saying that the white line will not be reinstated as the width of the road is less than required for a two-way line marking.

Helen Mudge has resigned as a co-opted member of the Flowerbed Committee. The Parish Council would like to thank Helen for her time on the committee, she was always very enthusiastic, knowledgeable and pro-active.

The Parish Council website usually receives around 100 visitors per month. However, in January 2020, there were 1,600 visitors to the site. The 'News Section' was the most accessed, showing updates on Abbotsford Bridge and the Fairfield development. So, if you want to keep up with what is happening in the village, please go to I elsenham-pc.gov.uk

The Parish Council has written to the Elsenham Vale Management Company and Crest Nicholson regarding the appalling condition that the trim trail is in.

After some discussion it was decided not to pursue a neighbourhood plan. This decision was made due to the amount of funding, plus the time and dedication it would take from councillors and residents to compile all the different documents that form a neighbourhood plan. A village neighbourhood plan must fit in with UDC local plan and it may only last three years before it becomes obsolete.

The next Parish Council meeting will be 2 March 2020, 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

Whilst writing the February Report, we were waiting the Planning Committee Meeting regarding the Stansted Airport application. The Committee (Cllr LeCount is a member) voted to turn down the application. We at Uttlesford District Council (UDC) resolutely support the refusal. The expansion of the airport is incompatible with the Council's own Climate and Environmental Emergency and is at odds with the government's carbon net-zero 2050 target. However, we shall have to see whether the airport's owners will appeal this decision.

To reiterate last month's news, the Local Plan has failed rather miserably. We are going to have to work diligently to fix this expensive fiasco to protect our communities from predatory development. Fairfield Appeal will be by public inquiry, 28 April to 1 May. Public presence is always good, so put the dates aside!

The presence of the Police Community Officers outside the schools in our ward will, hopefully, remind folk to park sensibly and legally and to keep in mind the space required for emergency vehicles. A cross-party team has compiled a dossier of incidents with school buses in the district, including our ward. Our team is working hard and has gone directly to ECC to demand intervention and has sent a dossier of evidence to the Police, Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency.

We are keen to build more council houses, but in this district we are all aware how expensive it is. We are on the lookout for altruistic land owners, or affordable land within the district to enable us to provide good, solid council houses. Petrina would also like to hear about experiences people within the ward are having with trying to find affordable housing.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee held an Extraordinary Meeting at the end of January. After lengthy discussion the Committee voted by 10 votes to 0 with 2 abstentions to reject the application by Stansted Airport to increase the permitted passenger numbers, which would have meant an effective increase in the number of flights. The application was approved in November 2018 during the previous administration but was then delayed by legal shenanigans.

The chief concerns were over noise, health, especially particulate emissions, and climate change. A presentation by Stop Stansted Expansion addressed the issues effectively, and one by the Airport conspicuously failed to do so. Then it was over to the Committee for discussion. As the time wore on, it became increasingly clear that none of the councillors had a good word to say for the proposals and the faces of the Airport representatives lengthened until they resembled fully-grown horses. When it came to the vote the only question was over the size of the majority.

What happens next is an interesting and confusing question. The Airport has six months to decide whether to appeal, which would mean a public inquiry, a lengthy and costly process providing ample opportunity for all-comers to enjoy their brief moment in the spotlight. The situation is complicated, however, by the judicial review which Stop Stansted Expansion submitted some time ago, in the days when it appeared that UDC would approve the application.

The action claimed that UDC is not competent to decide an issue of such wideranging importance and that it should go before the Secretary of State who would have a more extensive pool of expertise available. SSE lost the application, and could now appeal. It would be an altogether briefer and more intimate affair than a public inquiry, being mostly confined to persons wearing wigs who would concentrate on such vital questions as the distinction between technical and practical capability (no space to explain), and not be diverted onto side issues such as the Airport being a congenial place to work.

In all this, what remains mysterious is why exactly MAG (as the Manchester Airports Group is affectionately known even by those who have no affection for it) is making the application in the first place. On some estimates the current caps will not be reached until 2035, by which time for all anyone knows air travel could be as distant a memory as the Tiger Moth and Spitfire are now.

Last month I noted that the long-awaited letter from the Inspectors into Uttlesford's Local Plan had been received. Effectively the Plan was rejected, with just a chance of amending it. Uttlesford were asked for an early indication as to when they might provide a response, but, over a month later, they do not seem even to have got that far. 'If you're so smart, why don't you prepare a Plan yourselves?' does not seem to be an option.

I used to work in a factory in North West Kent and I shared the workplace with many different sorts of people from all kinds of interesting backgrounds. One of my best work mates was a man I'll call Ash. Ash was a Hindu and I was a Christian. Sometimes Ash and I would have religious arguments.

"There's only one God," I'd say and he'd reply, "No! There are many gods or many different emanations of God."

"Vishnu is the saviour," he'd say and I'd say, "There's only one saviour and that's Jesus Christ."

Ash and I could really argue and tell each other what we thought was wrong in each other's beliefs. We disagreed and we disagreed strongly.

And yet, Ash and I worked together, had our breaks together, ate lunch together, agreed in our opinions about the company we worked for and occasionally had a drink down the pub. We got on together despite claiming elements in each other's religion were false. Our conversations were hard but honest and, therefore, genuinely meaningful. That is what I call tolerance and freedom of speech. Tolerance is something we have to show to people we disagree with. Telling someone they are wrong in their beliefs does not mean we hate them. Neither does disagreement over some things preclude agreement over others.

However, words can hurt and arguments can divide. So how, on the one hand, do we avoid holding back

from saying what we think is true for fear of upsetting the person and, on the other hand, avoid needless offence?

I think the key is 'motive.' We have to ask ourselves, "Why am I disagreeing with this person and trying to correct them?" Is it because I simply want to assert myself over them (a selfish motive) or is it because I believe in truth and goodness and truth and goodness for the person I'm disagreeing with? If each of us is honest with ourselves, we'll admit that all too often our speech is not motivated by a real love of truth and goodness. So I think fundamental to the right motive is repentance and humility.

There's a desperate need for good, honest dialogue between people in our society but each of us is flawed in the discussions because of the selfishness that lies at the heart of each of us.

But God invites us in for a talk: "Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet they shall be as white as snow." (Isaiah 1:18 in the Bible).

Easter reminds us that Christ came to reconcile us to God through His death on the cross. I believe freedom of speech is only ever safe and truly worthwhile when the speakers have been truly set free from their sins. That freedom is what Christ freely offers to each and every one of us.

Such a person was the late Bill Jones, for some time the Parish Council Chairman, he also ran the local Sunday School and was a mainstay in other organisations. There is an inscription on his grave stone, "He hath done all things well." A fitting tribute to a fine man.

At the time I of writing this piece there is a vacancy on the Parish Council. If this village is to continue to flourish it is imperative that people give of their time, just like the late Bill Jones and the others that came before.

CELEBRATING 125 YEARS AT HATFIELD FOREST

As the days lengthen and we approach the spring equinox, Hatfield Forest is coming back to life after its winter slumbers.

Hatfield Forest - a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a National Nature Reserve - is the best preserved medieval royal forest in Europe and home to 4,000 plus species of wildlife and trees, and a refuge for many rare insects, fungi and wild flowers.

One of our volunteers recently discovered a 'coral fungus', *Marchandiomyces corallinus*, previously unrecorded here. Another sighting this winter has caused a flutter – a flock of hawfinches visiting from colder climates. Globally threatened, the hawfinch is also on the UK conservation Red List.

With so many species to look out for, why not take part in some 'citizen science' and record your sightings? You can visit <u>www.ispotnature.org/</u> to

make an identification and then record the details <u>www.brc.ac.uk/irecord/</u>. Hatfield Forest is the second most species-rich property in the whole of the National Trust's ownership – second only to Wicken Fen in Cambridgeshire.

This is the 125th anniversary year of the National Trust and we have launched a special fundraising challenge to get everyone involved to safeguard and protect unique places for future generations. For details of the 125 Challenge please <u>www.nationaltrust.org.uk/features/fundraise-for-us</u>.

Although the weather is improving, the heavy rain has taken its toll on Hatfield Forest this winter, leaving some of the pathways very boggy and compacted. Until the ground has recovered, we urge people to stay on our hardstanding paths or save their visits for the warmer summer months.

The new polymer £20 banknote has just been issued. It features the British artist JMW Turner (1775 –

1851) and his painting: '*The Fighting Temeraire*'. The painting shows HMS Temeraire in 1838, being towed by a steam tug towards a scrapyard at Rotherhithe on the Thames. It was a sad

ending for a ship that achieved fame at the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805. The Temeraire was immediately astern of Nelson's flagship, the Victory and played a major part in the battle. Her crew captured two enemy ships while suffering heavy casualties.

The captain of the Temeraire at Trafalgar was Eliab Harvey (1758 – 1830) from Chigwell, Essex. He shared his time between naval duties and being one of the two Members of Parliament for Essex. He was later knighted and promoted to the rank of admiral. Sir Eliab's final resting place is in the Hundred Parishes, beneath St Andrew's Church, Hempstead. The crypt holds the coffins of around fifty members of the extended Harvey family.



An earlier family member was William Harvey (1578 – 1657), the first doctor to describe the circulation of the blood. His mortal remains are also in Hempstead Church although his body was moved in 1883 from the crypt into a large sarcophagus in the chapel above the private crypt.

A print of *The Fighting Temeraire* hangs in Saffron Walden in The Temeraire, a Wetherspoon pub whose walls are richly decorated with pictures and information about local history.

The £20 note is not the first to have a local connection. The £50 note in circulation from 1994 to 2011 featured Sir John Houblon. Members of his family once owned Hatfield Forest.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. 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ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

Yes, we are celebrating ten years since the first meeting of the fledgling society was held in February 2010. A local history group had long been thought about but it wasn't until then that a meeting was called and the thirteen people present at that meeting voted in the officers and agreed a constitution. Gordon Barker was voted Chairman, later to become President, and Ray Franklin, his deputy with Paul Salvidge as Treasurer and Chris Bush as Secretary. Dave Verlander and Heather Salvidge were voted on to the committee.

Since those early days, we have had another forty meetings featuring a wide range of speakers presenting on everything from the Black Death to holidays at the seaside via King's College Chapel and the Saffron Walden Branch Railway to name but a few. An early speaker was the late John Hurwitz who, as the retired Managing Director, gave a fascinating talk about the Elsenham Jam Factory from its earliest days through to its sale to a multi-national company. This was one of our most popular talks and to mark our 10th anniversary Ray Franklin will be reprising John's talk using both the original material and new information that has come to light subsequently. If you have old memories of the factory or have never heard of it do come along to find out more about one of our most famous and loved institutions.

Over the years, various bits of research by members has been transferred into our publications covering such subjects as the Pantomime Society, Elsenham School, Broom Farm and of course For The Duration – Elsenham in Conflict published to commemorate the fallen of World War One. Our latest book will be published at our next meeting on 11 March. It is entitled History Walks Around Elsenham and it describes a gentle ramble around the village and its surroundings with a short description of what you are seeing. Details of all our books may be found on our website. Set up in December 2013, the site has since evolved into a resource packed full of information including a number of recordings of village residents, some sadly no longer with us, and an accompanying transcript. There are also a number of short articles such as the Canal That Never Was and a number of photo galleries with photographs old and new of the village and its goings on. 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NATURAL OUTLOOK ON SOME UNUSUAL SIGHTINGS

When writing about the birds, which we see locally I tend to describe a siskin or a bullfinch in some detail but simplify doing the same for chaffinches and greenfinches. Perhaps this isn't fair on these two species simply because they are "common". This is a good time of year to give them closer attention that they might get were they "rare."

Greenfinches are about 6", beak to forked tail end and rather chubby and thick necked with a thick bill. Juveniles coming into adult plumage are mostly a rather drab brown on the back with a streaky, paler chest and throat and just some greenish yellow on the wing edges and some black patches on the lower back. At a distance they may look just brownish but like adults seem to have darker set eyes. Females have more colour; head and upper back brown, a greenish/ greyish chest and more yellow on the wings and tail than juveniles. The males, however, are much flashier; grey/green upper parts, a yellowish green breast and a lot of yellow showing on the wing primaries and the tail, especially in flight. Really a very handsome and colourful bird.

The long tail of both chaffinch sexes makes them a teeny bit longer than greenfinches and they are less chubby. Chaffinches' plumage has the same sort of variation as greenfinches have, in that the females (and juveniles) are a lot less showy than the males. The females are grey/green/brown above and a paler greenish/white below and have two white wing bars between two black ones, this helps to tell them apart from female house sparrows. The males, however, have a lovely bluey grey head and back nape and a reddish brown mantle. Cheeks and chest in prime males at this time of year are a gorgeous deep pink (bullfinches' chests are a pinkish/red). They have the double white wing bars white tail-sides and a grey/green rump. Altogether another handsome bird at its best, perhaps, when in full song it is perched at the top of a white-flowered blackthorn shrub.

By contrast, two other species, little egrets and Egyptian geese, once rarities, are now accepted on the British List. About 30 years ago little egrets were scarce dwellers on the south coast. Now, because of, perhaps, climate change, they have moved north and west, settled and bred and can be encountered not only on the coast but in some inland watery places. As I have mentioned, we had one in the back garden when our watercourse was in flood.

Locally, north and south of Thaxted, the Chelmer often attracts them especially on the water meadows valley south of Stanbrook and Monk Street. They are elegant birds, a medium sized heron and mainly "Persil White" with black legs and yellow toes that makes them look as if they are wearing slippers. In the breeding season they have a two-feather plume from the top of their heads.





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Our first half term of the year has brought a multitude of scouting activities to our members, both young people and adults, with event planning for the summer moving forward apace. Cubs held a Mad Science evening with Jurassic Jill, discussed environmental issues on Australia Day and took part in a problem-solving evening, with all activities working towards badges and awards. Cubs also attended the Hatfield Forest District Winter walk in January, joining with other Cub packs to walk from Hatfield Forest to Birchanger.

Both of our sections celebrated Chinese New Year by learning about the lunar calendar, Chinese traditions and playing themed games. The upcoming half-term break will also see our Founders Day celebrated worldwide on 22 February, which is Robert Baden-Powell's birthday.

A new, exciting item to include this month is our recent involvement in County and national events which are open to members of all age ranges in scouting. The Essex Scouts Mountain Activity Team held their annual Lake District weekend which allows Explorer Scouts, Scout Network and leaders from across the country to learn hiking, navigation and mountaineering skills. These events enable leaders to gain experience and qualifications to run local events, such as the Winter Walk, for younger scouting sections. This year's training weekend took us to the top of the highest mountain in England, Scafell Pike, as well as practising snow and ice techniques, safety, rescue and rope work. The weekend also saw us battling storm Ciara for some additional excitement and excellent practice for risk assessments and safety planning.

Now we shall be entirely free

'One rainswept winter's night in 1809, an unconscious man is carried into a house in Somerset. He is Captain John Lacroix, home from Britain's disastrous campaign against Napoleon's forces in Spain. Gradually Lacroix recovers his health, but not his



peace of mind. He will not - cannot - talk about the war or face the memory of what took place on the retreat to Corunna. After the command comes to return to his regiment, he sets out instead for the Hebrides, unaware that he has far worse to fear than being dragged back to the army: a vicious English corporal and a Spanish officer with secret orders are on his trail. In luminous prose, Miller portrays a man shattered by what he has witnessed, on a journey that leads to unexpected friendships, even to love. But as the short northern summer reaches its zenith, the shadow of the enemy is creeping closer. Freedom, for John Lacroix, will come at a high price.....' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

Reviews: "Both a ripping yarn and a skilful mediation on absence ... The pacing of his story is excellent; his style is crisp; his apprehension of pain is arresting; and his ability to show people trembling at the edge of unreason is compelling." *Andrew Motion, Guardian*

This was the choice of the book group this month. This books starts slowly but does pick up into an interesting and engrossing read.

Andrew Miller sets this novel in a time of trouble and change, a continent at war. It is part love story, part adventure. The author has revealed that the plot is derived in part from a terrible incident during the Vietnam War, the massacre at My Lai in 1967. The three main characters take their names from American soldiers involved in this massacre – Lacroix, Medina and Calley.

The story begins in Somerset when Lacroix (a British officer) is brought home from the war in Spain. The story moves back to Spain where we are given information about what has happened in the town of Morales.

John's journey from Somerset to Scotland is fraught with much strife and bad fortune on land and on sea. He ends up on a Scottish isle, where he meets a family of a brother and two sisters. They take him in and allow him to recover and he becomes entangled in their lives, beliefs and needs, especially Emily.

We follow the journey through both John's eyes (the hunted) and the hunters' eyes, Calley and Medina. We do not hear John's story until near the end of the novel so it is unclear what is pursuing him: justice, revenge or guilt.

Until the final pages it seemed that all the characters have chances and choices. However, the ending is somewhat ambiguous and we differed in our interpretation of what it meant. Whether this is deliberate or not is unknown.

ORANGE AND PASSION FRUIT TRAYBAKE (serves 12-16)

- 6 oz (150g) butter or margarine, plus a little extra for the tin
- 6 oz (150g) caster sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 6oz (150g) self-raising flour
- 1 orange, zested and juiced
- For the mascarpone topping:
- 250g tub mascarpone
- 1 tablespoon icing sugar
- 4 tablespoons fresh orange juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 passion fruit

Heat oven, to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4. Butter and line a 9" (23cm) square cake tin with baking parchment.

Cream together butter (or margarine) and caster sugar, using an electric whisk until light and fluffy, then beat in the eggs one at a time. Sieve in the flour and fold it in. Add the orange zest and juice, fold that in as well, then pour into the prepared tin, smoothing over the top.

Bake for 25 minutes. A skewer should come out clean when inserted in the middle.

Remove the cake from the oven, leave for 5 minutes, then remove from the tin, peel away the parchment and leave to cool on a wire rack.

Meanwhile, make the topping by mixing the mascarpone, icing sugar, orange juice and vanilla until smooth. Cut open the passion fruit, scoop out the seeds, then add half to the mix, reserving the rest.

Use a palette knife to spread the topping over the cooled cake, then drizzle over the remaining passion fruit seeds.

CHEF'S SUGGESTION: The sponge can be frozen for later use. Add the topping once defrosted.
