Memories of Peter Clear by Therese Clear

As many of you will be aware, Peter Clear sadly but peacefully passed away on 28th November last year. He will be missed by his family and many friends and colleagues in the village as being a bit of a character but always with the best intentions for all he took part in as a member of our Community.

I first met Peter through Elsenham Bowls Club when he invited me to accompany him to the Summer Ball. Our first actual date though was to the Bingo held a few days later and that was our lucky ticket and set the scene to follow for the next 18 years, being married in 2004 and not quite making our 17th Anniversary in 2021.

Peter was a Founder Member of the Elsenham Bowls Club being one of four people who took the idea of a Bowls Club in the Village from paper to reality and was staunchly supportive of his role in various positions within the Club, finishing eventually as a Trustee. Peter loved his bowls and took great pleasure in representing the Club at all levels throughout his bowls career from novice through to Badged County player.

Peter was also involved for more than 20 years with the Parish Council and for much of that time, one of his roles was as the Chairman of the Playing Field Committee; so those of you and your children that enjoy the facilities on the playing field, this is mostly down to his dedicated efforts to make it a good place for people to gather, play, play football and just enjoy a safe open space. The Playing Field won two gold awards in 2021 which sadly Peter did not get to know about before he died but he would have been very proud to have headed the team that made this happen.

Peter has been laid to rest in Elsenham Cemetery and I am able to go and say hello to him and tell him what the village is up to when I want to visit. He would have been immensely impressed by the attendance at his funeral by so many people (and even that was limited by the Covid situation). His funeral was a sad occasion but a jolly affair with great music (mostly chosen by himself), lovely poetry and readings by our family so thank you all for attending, if not in person, then in spirit.

So many lovely people sent me cards and messages of support and apologies for not being able to attend and I can't hope to write thank you notes to all of you. However, I do want to collectively thank you all for your messages and cards, phone calls, texts and chats in the street which have made me aware of just how much people thought of Peter and how much he will be missed. As I said in my funeral address, he could be a cantankerous man at times, but he was my cantankerous man and I'm going to miss him very much.

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DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT MARCH 2022

You may have read that the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) has decided to take control of major planning application decisions away from UDC. Our MP is a minster in that department.

The new process means that developers or sites that are either of 10 homes or more, or on a site of greater than 1 hectare, can bypass UDC and seek approval directly from the Planning Inspectorate, which is an agency of DLUHC. In effect, our MP's department gets to decide what gets built in Uttlesford and where, not locally elected representatives.

The reason for this that DLUHC state is that UDC is refusing too many applications which end up being overturned on appeal. Uttlesford's rate for this is 16.5%. This seems at odds with the data that shows that there are 3 other authorities with higher overturn rates where the government hasn't intervened in the same way. Amongst that group, it is interesting to note that UDC is the only authority controlled by an independent residents' group.

What we do know is that Uttlesford has been one of the largest housebuilding districts in the country for the last decade. Without doubt this is due to our proximity to London, high margins for developers, and two failed Local Plans by the previous UDC administration.

We are not apologetic for turning down poor developments that are overrunning our villages and towns. We don't 'dance with [tycoon property] donors' – we stick up for residents. But for a decade we have heard the term 'build, build, build. Residents have repeatedly said 'no' to unsustainable development. So now they've decided that instead they want to be able to approve thousands of new houses via the back door. It is an appalling betrayal of local democracy." The threshold is 10 % turnover of appeals, four years ago it was 20%. The time line the Government have looked at is 2018-2020, half of that time we were not in administration. Those of you who have attended planning meetings in 2018 will recollect hearing, "we might as well approve as we will lose at appeal !"

At UDC we are working with DLUHC to understand what process they want to use and what it takes for local residents to be able to decide for themselves again. We are however still open for business and the risk for developers of going straight to the Inspector is that there isn't an opportunity to appeal.

Parish councils and local residents should continue to respond to planning applications and look out for guidance from UDC as the DLUHC makes it clear how they'd like the new process to work.

We believe that this removal of local decision-making is an unwarranted and we feel cynical political move and we will work hard to overturn it, while still responding to residents' needs and wishes.

But what are we advertising to the opportunist thief



There are no more burial plots left in the Elsenham Cemetery in the High Street. There is to be a walk round the village on Good Friday (7 April), starting at 10am in the top car park. The route will include the three proposed developments in the village.

Cllr. Peter Clear sadly passed away in December 2021. Peter was chairman of the Playing Field Committee for 20 years. As a tribute to his service to the village the Parish Council are to purchase a bench dedicated to Peter which will be installed in the playing field. It will be a re-cycled bench as Peter felt very strongly about re-cycling.

Permission was given for the Elsenham Fete to be held on the playing field on Saturday 18 June 2022. It was agreed that residents could celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee by having a picnic on the playing field on Sunday 5 June.

The Parish Council may become involved in the Queen's Green Canopy project which is 'Plant a tree for Jubilee'. Not only would this be supporting a green initiative, but also involves purchasing a veteran made plaque to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Every penny towards the plaque goes towards helping support veterans, their families, and people with disabilities.

The New Community Hall Working Group held a meeting with Jack Bennett, UDC's Principle Urban Designer who spoke about the orientation of the new Community Hall. There are pros and cons as to whether the building faces east overlooking the playing field or west facing onto the street.

The next Parish Council meeting will be Monday, 7 March 2022, 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

Welcome and good luck to the new team as they assume the onerous burden of the editorial mantle. Your regular contributors will no doubt continue to submit their copy at exactly the right length by the deadline, and I'm sure you'll find that much of the magazine falls neatly into place with a minimum of effort.

Despite the extended interregnum, several ongoing developments remain much as they were before Christmas. But there have been developments of another kind.

Uttlesford District Council received a nasty, but not wholly unexpected, shock recently in the form of a Designation Notice from the absurdly-named Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities. The Department reckons that too many planning decisions made by UDC are being overturned at Appeal in favour of developers by the Planning Inspectorate. The penalty is that developers can now apply for major applications, defined as those of over ten homes or more than one hectare, to be determined direct by the Planning Inspectorate without going through UDC.

The provisions hold for an indefinite period. There have been some hysterical political reactions, but in practice it won't make much difference - major developers will be able to go to the Planning Inspectorate direct instead of being rejected by UDC first.

The new dispensation could be used by the applicants who want to build up to 50 homes to the south of Bedwell Road. They now allege that account has been taken of the Gladman appeal to build 220 homes north of Bedwell Road, which was refused on grounds of noise. They claim that the plans have been revised accordingly and, surprise! they now comply with every feasible objection that could be raised, such that the only possible problem faced by future residents will be the extreme sense of quietude.

Back in November 2019 UDC's Planning Committee agreed to a full application to build 130 homes to the west of Hall Road. For reasons unknown, the drafting and agreement of the Section 106 agreement has proceeded at the pace of a geriatric snail. However, there has been some more rapid movement lately (youthful snail, perhaps). It is not until the Section 106 is signed that the Parish Council can be assured of a substantial contribution towards the building of a new Community Hall on the space reserved between the playing field and Southfield Close.

UDC is moving towards an independent enquiry into the Stansted Airport planning appeal debacle. It's all very hush-hush while negotiations continue as to what seven-figure sum should be paid to the Airport by way of damages, UDC having been found responsible for 'unreasonable behaviour'. Breath should not be held, but we'll all be paying eventually.

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

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH - HOPE

Hope is a very human need, living without hope must be intolerable and could and does easily lead some to end it all. We all need hope. Every New Year's Eve we look forward to the year ahead with hope that it will be better than the previous 12 months. But by implication of that hope, we are often disappointed with the year gone before that did not live up to our expectation.

Our hope is usually based on a vague notion that somehow events will turn out better, or family relations will improve, or world leaders will come together to solve the climate crisis, or the endless wars we see on the TV will stop. So much of our hope relies on our fellow human beings changing their ways. Jesus himself said in Matthew 22 v39 'Love your neighbour as yourself'. But our human experience shows that we rarely pay any attention to Jesus' words here. Instead, we have an inbuilt tendency to look after number one, or at least our family – usually to the detriment of others. So relying on others to provide the basis for our hope is not well founded. Should we look elsewhere for our hope of a better future?

Christian hope is of a different order. Human hope would like things to be better, but 'expects' that it will often not be so. Hope is often described in the bible as something that is guaranteed in the future because God, who has promised it, will deliver. How many politicians who promise hope to the electorate actually deliver? At the end of chapter 13 in 1 Corinthians Paul says that after everything is done *these 3 remain: faith, hope and love* because God is faithful and will not let us down. The Holy Spirit who resides in every Christian confirms the hope we have that God accepts us, because Jesus has already paid our penalty and taken God's wrath from us. This hope of heaven is secure as Paul again says *hope does not disappoint us* (Romans ch5 v5).

Many will argue that it is arrogant to assume that we are acceptable to God through faith in Him but understanding what Jesus did for us is the key to unlocking this mystery. Not only are we promised the hope of heaven in the bible, but it is clear from Titus ch2 v13 - *while we wait for the blessed hope – the glorious appearing of our great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ* that this hope is actually a person. And what could be better to be promised than God himself?!

God is often portrayed as aloof and not very caring. Many people think that we need to ingratiate ourselves with him with good deeds. But the God of the bible is our Father who loves and cares for us very deeply. Once we have yielded to him by accepting Jesus as our Saviour, he places his hope in us so that we can be sure we are his beloved children.

'Piranesi lives in the House. Perhaps he always has. In his notebooks, day after day, he makes a clear and careful record of its wonders; the labyrinth of halls, the thousands upon thousands of statues. The tides that thunder up staircases, the clouds that move in slow procession through the upper halls. On Tuesdays and Fridays, Piranesi sees his friend, the Other. At other times he brings tributes of food to the dead. But mostly he is alone.

Messages begin to appear, scratched out in chalk on the pavements. There is someone new in the House. But who are they and what do they want? Are they a friend or do they bring destruction and madness as the Other claims? Lost texts must be found. Secrets must be uncovered. The world that Piranesi thought he knew is becoming strange and dangerous. The beauty of the House is immeasurable, its kindness infinite..... 'So says the blurb on the back of the book.

'Brilliantly peculiar. It subverts expectations throughout. Utterly otherworldly' – The Guardian

Piranesi was the choice of the book group this month and is a beautiful yet strange story. This book is currently being serialised on Radio 4 and BBC Sounds.

The first part of the book is very descriptive and introduces us to 'The House' with its three storeys, full of halls and vestibules and statues. It is initially difficult to relate to without any familiar reference points for the reader. However, if we accept and enjoy the descriptions through the eyes and thoughts of Piranesi, the narrator, then it doesn't matter. He is clearly describing a very unusual place and we speculate as to whether it is real or imagined. However, it is revealed that he is existing in a labyrinth. We soon realise that we are reading a journal. Piranesi tells us of an innocent idealised world as he sees himself as 'the Beloved Child of The House', nurtured by the fish and seaweed. The birds seem to be the other principal living occupants and are his friends and protectors. He respects 'The House', its living, its dead, its tides and ways and in return, The House nurtures him.

To Piranesi this is the only world. There is one regular visitor, 'The Other.' We come to discover through a series of events that 'The Other' is called Ketterley and it is he who has trapped Piranesi in the labyrinth and not by accident. Through Piranesi's journals, Ketterley's actions and one or two other visitors to the labyrinth we learn why and how. We discover who Piranesi was before he was trapped in 'The House.'

Once the truth is discovered and he is made aware of his situation, he needs to xplore options once re-introduced to life outside the labyrinth. This part of the story towards the end is a little anti-climatic but it offers a conclusion.

The theme was the Railways of Elsenham and featured photographs spanning over a hundred years depicting the station and its staff, Robin Hood Road level crossing and passing trains. There is a wealth of information in there including a time line of the village that starts 2000 years ago and continues right up to the present day. I am doing some research on my family so I am working on the history of Byculla and I wanted to know more about the history of the land that my father bought and what happened to it all after he left. I do not know if the new people kept the Byculla name."

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, Natural England can designate any area of land considered to be of special interest by virtue of its fauna, flora or geological features as a "Site of Special Scientific Interest" or SSSI. This designation ensures that the area is appropriately managed and protected.

The Hundred Parishes has more than twenty SSSIs. I will mention a few that can be visited.

In the parish of High Easter, Garnett's Wood comprises 25 hectares (62 acres) of ancient coppiced woodland (meaning the trees have been regularly cut down to ground level). Mentioned in the Domesday Book, this wood, in which the lime is the dominant tree, was given in the twelfth century by Henry II to a knight called Geffrey Garnett. A stump of a tree has been carved to depict the knight, still watching over his wood.

Patmore Heath in Albury parish is an 8-hectare grass heathland, now a scarce habitat in South East England. It is managed by Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust. A variety of native grasses grow here and the heath's ponds are home to all three native English newt species: great-crested, smooth and palmate.

Amwell Quarry, formerly an area of gravel pits, has been transformed into a 37-hectare wetland environment, important in particular for wintering wildfowl and regarded as England's premier site for

dragonflies.

Best-known and by far the largest of our SSSIs is Hatfield Forest which covers more than 400 hectares, around 1.5 square miles. It was a royal hunting forest from around 1100 AD until the 15th century. It has never been ploughed and has been managed for centuries by coppicing and by pollarding (cutting trees to a height above which livestock and deer cannot

reach the new shoots). It has been owned by The National Trust since 1924. *Ken McDonald, Secretary*

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. NATURAL OUTLOOK By Heather Salvidge 🕾 814153

Chances are this month we'll get a couple of named storms along with some strong icy winds. But the days are getting longer with more daylight and the hour changes at 2:00 A.M. on Sunday 27th. Clear nights bring sharp frosts but the sun is now strong enough to melt it early and on good days temperatures up to the top teens. Walking early along Station Road you might hear birdsong possibly from our two distinct song thrushes, blackbirds, robins, great tits or dunnocks. These will be males, establishing their territories and/or attracting a mate – but very pleasant for us to hear.

At home I keep a list of the species of birds I see in our garden so that I can know who's here, who's not and who's new. For instance, until 2019 I recorded bullfinches but none since then. Now coal tits are getting scarce but blackcaps are turning up occasionally. Some of the regulars the year round are blackbirds, chaffinches, house sparrows, goldfinches, greenfinches and wood pigeons together with stock doves which first arrived half way through 2019 and now tend to disappear for a month or two in the summer.

I am pleased to have them to watch as they are delightful birds. With mainly blue/ grey plumage, they are smaller and 'neater' than a wood pigeon with <u>no</u> white about them at all but black edges to their wings and tail. Their chests are a soft pink and when adult a shiny green patch on their necks and pink legs and they make a soft cooing notes. They look very similar to rock doves but this species is not yet resident in the U.K. Blackcaps are about the same size as greenfinches with males giving them their name as he has a deep grey back and lighter, dusky underparts, a paler patch on his chin and a similar one under the base of his tail and a small, black cap. Females (and juveniles) have a red/brown cap, the same pale patches, a lighter grey back and pale fawn underparts.

A number of our early flowering spring plants are yellow in order to attract pollinators and primroses are one of the earliest. They grow in clumps of 5-petalled flowers on a single stem above spreading green leaves. There are just a few in our side of Alsa Wood.

They are followed by oxlips, a rarity growing locally in Cambridgeshire, Essex and Suffolk. On 'our side' of Alsa Wood is a locally well known site in the Aubrey Buxton reserve where there are a few plants. They have small mid-yellow flowers borne in clusters at the top of a stem about 6/7 inches tall. Some of their patches have to be fenced in against predators, e.g. muntjacs, so take care of them.

Towards the end of the month come cowslips, similar to oxlips to look at but a **deep** yellow cluster of flowers and are much taller than oxlips. There are good patches on BR5 (near the golf course) and on the verge at Ugley Green, outside Foxtons Farm. Their leaves are like the primroses'.

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COOKERY CORNER

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ONE POT CHICKEN AND BACON STEW (serves 8)

3 tablespoons olive
16 chicken pieces on the bone (about 6lb 8oz (3kg) in total)
5oz (140g) smoked bacon, chopped
4 medium carrots, thickly sliced
2 onions, roughly chopped
2 tablespoons plain flour
1 tablespoon tomato puree
2½ fl oz (75ml) white wine or cider vinegar
1¾ pints (1 litre) chicken stock
2 bay leaves
4 tablespoons double cream or crème fraiche
11b 5oz (600g) small new potatoes, halved (or quartered)
12 large white mushrooms, quartered
Chopped herbs, such as parsley, tarragon or chives

Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6.

Heat the oil in a large flameproof casserole with a lid. Fry the chicken pieces in batches for 5 minutes on each side until browned, then transfer to a plate. Sizzle the bacon in the casserole for a few minutes until beginning to crisp. Stir in the carrots and onions, then cook for 5 minutes until starting to soften. Stir in the flour and tomato puree and cook for 1 minute more. Finally, splash in the wine or vine-gar and stir well.

Pour in the stock and bring to a simmer. Add the bay leaves, cream and seasoning. Slide in the chicken pieces and scatter over the potatoes, turning everything over a few times so that the potatoes are immersed in the sauce. Put the lid on and place in the oven. After 40 minutes, remove from the oven and stir in the mushrooms. Cover again and cook in the oven for 10 minutes more until the chicken is cooked through and tender but not completely falling off the bone. Turn off heat. Remove casserole from oven, sprinkle over herbs and serve.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: Freeze any left-over stew. Defrost overnight in the fridge. Reheat for 30-40 minutes at 160°C/140°C fan/gas 3 until piping hot (or in the microwave, if preferred).

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



Each time I do a quiz for the Tennis Club they make a donation to the charity, Tiger-Tops Swiss Air Preschool based in the Chitwan area of Nepal. A charity which provides a free head start development programme for disadvantaged young children in Nepal. A charity I have myself supported since 2007.

In 2008 I held my first charity quiz at the Bowls Club for the Tiger Tots and have done one each year, excluding 2020 due to Covid limitations. Hopefully, these will resume soon. Every December I produce an annual quiz booklet for the Tiger Tots with all proceeds going to the Preschool.

There are no hall hire fees and no fees to myself as Quiz Master. I cover all expenses for the quiz nights and booklets which means all money raised goes to Tiger Tots. To date, my fund-raising total is 2,222,799.50 Nepalese Rupees which equates to nearly £17,000.

I have done quizzes for Stortford Camera Club, Turpin's Indoor Bowls Club & South Street Surgery. I look forward to Covid restrictions easing so that once again we can get our grey cells working on Saturday nights.
