



ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MAY 2023

Due to the government reducing the amount of dispensary fees at GP surgeries, the Elsenham Surgery has found itself in financial difficulties. A merger with Stansted Surgery is still being considered. At this stage of the procedure, it is looking like Elsenham Surgery will remain open, but with limited opening times.

All assistance dogs and guide dogs are allowed on the Elsenham playing field and they do not have to be kept on their leads.

The bench dedicated to the late Peter Clear, Chairman of the Playing Field Committee, has now been installed in the children's play area.

The pond at Tye Green, which belongs to the Parish Council, has flooded again. The pond had already flooded early in the year. Arrangements have been made for the pond to be drained again. The Parish Council will investigate a long-term solution.

The flowerbed committee are looking at potential areas to place more flowerbeds, hanging baskets and bulbs. Watering of the plants is a big consideration when looking at potential areas.

The 7 and 7A buses have gone out to tender based on the same timetable.

Potholes in the area are a big problem. Essex Highways have started to address some of the potholes in the area but have stated there is no quick solution. To add to the problem many of the drains by the side of the roads have deep ruts around them, which could result in the drain covers becoming loose and breaking. Essex Highways have said many of the potholes are caused by the utility companies when they dig up the roads and do not resurface them properly. The Government is looking into making the companies more responsible.

Due to two bank holidays at the beginning of May the next Parish Council meeting is on May 15 at 8.00pm in the Memorial Hall.

'With this application it is the cumulative element that is the key issue. Developments in Elsenham have come forward piece meal over the years each one adding more to the network. While there has been some mitigation which has reduced the severity of the impact of individual developments on this junction this is not the case with this application.'

My opening quote refers to Grove Hill, and it comes, not from a concerned individual, nor from a parish council, nor even from the District Council, but, remarkably enough, from Essex Highways, in opposing the application by Countryside Partnerships to build 130 homes in the field opposite the Crown. As ever, computer modelling has been provided by the applicants to show that there is no real problem, but Highways have rubbished it fairly comprehensively, as also has the transport consultant engaged by Elsenham Parish Council. Highways have also recommended refusal of Bloor's application to tack another 200 homes towards the station onto their existing development, as if the 350 they're building already isn't enough. Both applications were submitted directly to the Planning Inspectorate under the S62A provisions currently applied to Uttlesford, and both seem to be stalled, possibly while the developers make increasingly frenzied attempts to convince the Inspectors.

It would be a mistake to get too excited by Highways at last managing to get to grips with reality. We have been here before. They opposed the outline application for 99 homes split between off Isabel Drive and off Stansted Road, and then capitulated at the last moment when a second 'detector' was offered at the top of Grove Hill, which, allegedly, would ease the queue (how this would avoid longer queues in Lower Street back as far as the mini-roundabout was never explained). Dandara have now, after several attempts, been given detailed approval for this application through a near-unanimous decision by Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee at their April meeting. It is not known which of the two sites will be built first. It is a condition that the houses off Isabel Drive cannot be occupied until the public footpath alongside Alsa Wood is improved.

Dandara struggled for some months with the tricky question of showing that they could somehow cope with noise from the motorway. Motorway noise was the only issue of substance at the Appeal Inquiry on 21 March into the refusal by UDC of the application for 50 homes to the south of Bedwell Road. As noted earlier, UDC mysteriously decided not to contest the Appeal. It was opposed by a determined parish councillor who made up for the lack of numbers by a lengthy address on exactly why the noise from this application would be no different from the noise from the Gladman application on the other side of Bedwell Road, and therefore the approach adopted by that Inspector in refusing the application should be followed. Whether these arguments will be accepted remains to be seen. If not, and the Appeal is allowed, there should be the consolation prize of £100,000 for the new Community Hall - although some of the conditions attached are unintelligible.



Criminals are targeting WhatsApp users by posing as a friend and asking for a security code. Action Fraud has received over 60

reports relating to this scam. The scam begins when a criminal gets access to another WhatsApp account which has you listed as a contact. The criminal, posing as your friend or someone that's a member of a WhatsApp group you're in, will then send you seemingly normal messages to try and start a conversation with you.

However, around the same time you will receive a text message from WhatsApp with a six-digit code. This is because the criminal has been trying to login to WhatsApp using your mobile number. The criminal will claim that they sent you their code by accident and ask you to help them by sending it to them. Once the criminal has this code, they can login to your WhatsApp account and lock you out.

The criminal will then use the same tactic with your WhatsApp contacts in an effort to steal more accounts and use them to perpetrate fraud.

What you need to do:

□ Set up two-step verification to give an extra layer of protection to your account: Tap Settings > Account >Two-step verification > Enable.

□ THINK. CALL. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity.

□ Never share your account's activation code (that's the 6-digit code you receive via SMS).

You can report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.

If you have been a victim of fraud or cyber crime, report it to $\frac{Action \ Fraud}{2}$ or $2000 \ 123 \ 2040$.

Your Help is Needed - SPEED CAN KILL

How can **YOU HELP** to stop any accidents in Elsenham? Join the Elsenham Community Speed Watch Team

Now that Spring and Summer are coming, and the weather is warmer and drier, this is a good opportunity for Elsenham residents to help with road safety in our village, and in doing so, reduce any road collisions and injuries to drivers and to any pedestrians that may get caught up in an accident. Our village is becoming a race track. **Talk is not enough – Your action is required.**

To become part of this major village speed reduction plan we need lots more volunteers of all ages over 18 for the task. Why not ask your neighbours or friends, and go out together once you are fully trained, and become part of the **"Elsenham Speed Watch Team"**

Full initial training will be given via Zoom, then roadside training on the use of our fully calibrated SL700 laser device (as used by the Police), and then just a few hours a month operationally. When you decide you are available.

There is NO weekly or monthly commitment.

<u>Every driver speeding is reported to the Police, they then send a letter out to the driver, and if necessary, pay them a visit if they discover the vehicle is not legal. So, it is worth an hour of your time to reduce the speeding in the village.</u>



ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

Passing through Elsenham Station on April 1st, I'm sorry to say that I was caught by an April's Fool joke - hook, line and sinker. I might also add that no Alex... you are not forgiven!



Later on the train, I got to thinking about the age of the station and how many people might have gone through the doors of the booking office. Of course, the present station is Elsenham's second, the first having been built on Robin Hood Road where Fullers End level crossing now sits. The Northern and Eastern Railway opened the line to traffic on 30 July 1845 and by 1849 three trains a day – two on Sunday – were calling at Elsenham. The first station was situated on the steepest part of the line and trains had difficulty starting away particularly in bad weather. It wasn't unknown for trains to roll back down the hill towards Stansted! A new station was therefore authorised to be built, the same as the first, about half a mile further north where the climb ended and the line was level. This was the highest point on the entire line, the ruling gradient being downhill from here to Cambridge and the Fens. The new station opened in 1846.

Over the next forty years extra sidings were laid at the station together with engine inspection facilities to serve the large number of coal trains being worked to London that were slowing passenger services. By 1889 six trains a day were stopping at the station and two on Sundays. This had increased to nine each way by 1905 and ten by 1923. there now being three services each way on Sunday.

My thanks to Peter Paye and "Elsenham, The First 1000 Years" published by Elsenham Parish Council for information in this article.

Of course, Elsenham might never have had a railway station or indeed the railway if earlier proposals for the Elsenham Canal had not fallen through. You didn't know about the Elsenham Canal? May I suggest that you visit our website where you can read about the "Canal That Never Was" and lots more. You can also find a more in-depth history of the railways around Elsenham.

Everyone that reads this has very probably driven past the Stansted Windmill and if you're like me wondered why it was built, when it was built and how it has managed to survive. All will be revealed at our next meeting on Wednesday 14 June 2023 when Tony Wellings will be coming along to tell the story of the mill. This will be a very interesting talk and as always, visitors will be very welcome for a small fee, just two pounds. For only five pounds however, you can become a member and enjoy four interesting evenings of talks through the year. We look forward to seeing you there.



Amidst much pageantry, tradition and coverage, the coronation of King Charles III will take place on Saturday 6 May 2023. He has been preparing for this moment for much of his life. No British prince has waited longer and Charles will be the oldest monarch to be crowned in British history.

It will take place at Westminster Abbey, where all monarchs have been crowned since the coronation of William the Conqueror in 1066. The ceremony will involve two crowns, two sceptres, the coronation ring and the Sovereign's Orb. The orb is a hollow gold sphere with a cross at its top. It will be placed in the right hand of the King as a reminder that Jesus died for the sins of the whole world and that his (Jesus') kingdom covers the whole earth.

Since the coronation of William and Mary in 1689, the formalities have included the presentation of a Bible. In 1953, these were the words of presentation to Charles' mother: "Our gracious Queen: to keep your Majesty ever mindful of the law and the Gospel of God as the Rule for the whole life and government of Christian Princes, we present you with this Book, the most valuable thing that this world affords. Here is Wisdom: This is the royal Law; These are the lively Oracles of God."

When the crown is placed on Charles' head, trumpet fanfares will sound and all those present in the Abbey will respond with loud shouts. It will be a sensational event, and for many of us,

without precedent.

As we recalled a few weeks ago, on Palm Sunday 2000 years ago, there was another coronation. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a young donkey which had been very deliberately untied. By these actions, he consciously fulfilled Old Testament oracles of kingship and the crowds acclaimed him as such. For the first time in the Gospels, Jesus did nothing to deny it. But what sort of King and what sort of Kingdom?

On 6 May, King Charles will not travel through London on a donkey, but in the magnificence of a horse-drawn gold State Coach. According to Zechariah 9, Jesus came on a donkey as the King who would proclaim peace to the nations and through his blood set prisoners free. Just a few days later, he would be lifted on a cross: the moment when the King poured out his blood, so that peace with God would be possible.

It has been said: "All through history, there have been people who died for their King, but only once did a King die for his people." King Jesus did this to bring us into his eternal Kingdom. He extends his invitation to citizens of every nation to receive the forgiveness for which he has paid and to submit to his wise and loving rule. As we sing 'God save the King,' on this Coronation Day, I pray that we would know and celebrate the King who saves.

May is a busy month but not as busy as it has been usually, climate change and changes in the village account for this. I could rely on seeing brimstone butterflies, orange tips, holly blues and small tortoiseshells.



Last summer hardly any orange tips and fewer butterflies overall, especially on the buddleia bushes. Probably the very hot, dry summer spell killed off a number of plants they needed for food as adults and caterpillars. Yes there were **some** large whites, peacocks, and red admirals and, mothwise, more than usual humming bird hawk moths and elephant moths, so that was good but no small whites, speckled woods or small heaths. Honey bees, red and white tailed bumble bees and other insects also need a variety of plants to feed on and so do some of their offspring so they too felt the effects of the drought as well as the birds which feed on them so the decline was not good for them either.

All sorts of birds are very busy, whether nest building, laying eggs, brooding or feeding the chicks. The sparrow hawks flash through, be it either Sylvia (her) or Sid (him) freezing the busyness of the garden birds which only resumes when they are sure it is safe again. What I do enjoy watching are the activities of the starling families who make much use of our smaller front lawn. They nest under/in/around our gutters and those of neighbouring houses and hatching is marked by the scattering of white, medium-sized eggshells. As soon as the juniors leave the nest, adults start teaching them how to be independent. The adults are shiny and covered in speckles (little stars?) in their summer plumage but the 'teenagers' are brown and seem to have very large feet that they "plonk" as they follow a parent, squawking to be fed by the beakful .They learn how to drink and also bath in the low drinking bowl, so much splashing that I have to refill frequently. Gradually the juniors get more confident and become anxious to get to feeders first, sometimes having a squabble with other adults and young. Then they learn how to look for grubs by poking their bills into the soft lawn or flower bed and are taught how to fly. Soon you see the mixed aged flocks flying in circles overhead before heading 'off to the fields'.

I have to go elsewhere for specialized birdsong e.g. from nightingales and cuckoos. So now I go the Fingringhoe Wick, an Essex Wildlife Trust reserve by the coast where there is a good population of nightingales and frequent visits by cuckoos. You have to get there in the early morning for the nightingales as they shut down around say, 10:30am. Cuckoos are sometimes distant but if you get lucky, much closer.

The oxlips might still be about in Alsa Wood and the bluebells making a show. To keep the wood as good as it is, it helps if dogs are kept on leads and don't run loose in the undergrowth after small mammals or in the flowers as dogs' urine kills wild plants. It is up to us all to look after it. Wouldn't it be great if we got a cuckoo back in Elsenham!

THE LITTLE LAKE-ELSENHAM HALL

Just past the turning to Elsenham Church on Hall Road you can see into the grounds of Elsenham Hall and get a view of "The Little Lake." This "Lake" as described in Auction Catalogues is really no more than a large pond. When the Hall was sold it was the main source of drinking water to Elsenham Hall. Water was pumped from there by hydraulic ram. I remember clearly standing just before the aforementioned Church turning and hearing the "Thump, thump," of the hydraulic pump. Arthur Bennett, Alan's dad, had one far from pleasant duty. Every time there was frost the ram would become frozen. It was his job to de-ice it. At one time the Hall also combined the ram pump with an additional pump in a building near the Church. There were two, 3 horse-power oil engines.

During my many adventures with Alan Bennett, many, many years ago I must confess to fishing in the Main Hall Lake as a member of the Elsenham Angling Club and also the "Little Lake." Now to fish in the latter was definitely not good. Casting worms and the occasional maggot may possibly have added some unwanted flavours to the water! However the little lake was incredibly well stocked with lots of Rudd. The water in the Lake was used by the Firemen when they tried to extinguish the fire at Elsenham Jam Factory. But that is another story.



Milestones have been part of our heritage for centuries. They were an important element of the Roman road network,



positioned to indicate the distance travelled or to be travelled. In 1767, milestones were made compulsory on all turnpikes, the toll roads managed by turnpike trusts, although many local milestones were in place before then.

There are around 40 surviving milestones within The Hundred Parishes, mostly along three highways that run between London and Cambridge. These highways are now called B1383 (formerly A11), B1368 and A10. The

milestones are marked on Ordnance Survey maps as "MS".

One of the earliest and most visible milestones can be seen in Barkway, a historic coaching village. It was installed in 1728, one of 16 milestones funded at that time by a trust established in 1586 by a former master of Trinity Hall, Cambridge.

Additional milestones were added by the Wadesmill Turnpike Trust in 1742, some along the old Roman road, Ermine Street, now A10, and others along the alternative route, now mostly called B1368. Over time, the inscriptions became weather-worn and many stones were upgraded in 1804 by the addition of a cast iron plate.

Most milestones in Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire are listed but only one in Essex is included on the National Heritage List - the large, three-sided iron



milepost in the centre of Stansted Mountfitchet on the B1383. This is probably the newest in the Hundred Parishes, having been installed in the early 1900s. The earlier milestones along the old A11 would have been installed by the Hockerill Turnpike Trust which was responsible from 1744 to 1870 for 28 miles of highway between Harlow and Stump Cross.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. Ginger biscuits feature in the Baking Section of the Flower Show schedule this year. This recipe makes lovely squidgy gingery biscuits. If you like them really crunchy, bake them for another 20 minutes.



DOUBLE GINGER BISCUITS (makes approximately 16)

2oz (50g) butter

1 level tablespoon golden syrup

6oz (175g) self-raising flour

1 level tablespoon ground ginger

3oz (75g) stem ginger, finely chopped

1 tablespoon bicarbonate of soda

2oz (50g) demerara sugar

2oz (50g) light muscovado sugar

1 medium egg, beaten

Heat the oven to 160°C/fan 140°C/gas 3. Line two baking sheets with non-stick baking paper.

Put the butter and golden syrup into a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring until melted.

Place the flour, ground ginger, chopped ginger, bicarbonate of soda and demerara and muscovado sugars in a mixing bowl. Mix well. Stir in the melted ingredients. Add the egg and bring the mixture together to form a dough.

Divide into about 16 equal pieces (a dessert spoonful each) and roll with your hands into small balls. Place on the baking sheets and slightly flatten to about ½ inch (1cm) thick. Bake for about 25 minutes, until golden and firm around the edges.

Leave to firm up on the baking sheets for a few minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

CHEF'S RECMMENDATIONS: These biscuits will keep well in an airtight tin for 5 days. You could also use chopped crystallised ginger for this recipe.



'Your ability to change everything - including yourself - starts here. Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing.

But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute take a very unscientific view of equality. Forced to resign, she reluctantly signs on as the host of a



cooking show, Supper at Six. But her revolutionary approach to cooking, fuelled by scientific and rational commentary, grabs the attention of a nation.

Soon, a legion of overlooked housewives find themselves daring to change the status quo. One molecule at a time. ...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

'Sparky, rip-roaring, funny, with big-hearted fully formed, loveable characters' Sunday Times

Lessons in Chemistry was this month's choice for the book group.

Elizabeth is a research scientist thwarted by the misogyny of 1950s America and still in the 1960s as she becomes an unwitting feminist hero in her role as the host of a TV cookery show. The programme airs in the afternoon slot immediately before 'housewives' everywhere need to galvanise themselves to ensure their husbands' suppers are on the table the moment they walk through the door. Elizabeth is also strikingly beautiful which leads to both men and women wanting to pigeonhole her even more.

Elizabeth has met and fallen in love with her kindred spirit, Calvin, and they have a daughter - named Mad who is, of course, brilliant and lastly, their curious and faithful dog named Six Thirty, whose intelligence and thoughts are perhaps a bit overdone but it won't spoil enjoyment of the book.

Calvin's back history provides a background to the novel and we learn much about his childhood and experiences that shaped his career. The depiction of the Catholic Church and religion was as to be expected. A major influence in Calvin's life was his love of rowing, which he learnt at Cambridge.

The main characters are well-supported by secondary characters such as her neighbour, Harriet, without whom she wouldn't have been able to have her career; her doctor and rowing team member and her TV producer, Walter Pine.

It is a story about strong women and what they can achieve but Elizabeth does come across more stubborn than strong. However, it is an enjoyable read but to be read like a satire.
