

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ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MARCH 2024

A planning application has been submitted by Gladman for 240 houses north of Bedwell Road. Although this development would be half in Ugley and half in Henham it is right on the Elsenham boundary, making the major impact on Elsenham. This planning application was refused on appeal in September 2021 with noise being the determinative factor, the noise coming from the motorway and the railway line. Elsenham Parish Council have engaged a noise consultant to prepare a report on their behalf, for submission to Uttlesford District Council objecting to this planning application. Henham Parish Council have agreed to pay 50% of the cost.

District Cllr. Donald gave a summary on the investigation regarding the failing of the District Council to supply one of their fundamental services to collect household and industrial waste bins over several weeks. The committee looked at what went wrong and the cost to the taxpayer. The District Council apologises for the disruption of the services. The full report will be broadcast on 16 April 2024. The report will also be recorded in the minutes of the meeting which will be on UDC's website.

The Fire and Police Commissioner elections are taking place on 2 May 2024 in the Memorial Hall.

The Flowerbed Committee has been successful in obtaining a grant from UDC for \pounds 1,000, this will go to help curate a wildflower area on De-Mandeville Green.

The Parish Clerk had attended two meetings with Uttlesford District Council and Essex Police regarding part funding a PCSO with Stansted and Henham villages. However, there were many questions left unanswered, another meeting is to be held on 19 April 2024. The Parish Council will require more information before committing to spending public money on a PCSO.

Stephens Bus Company have increased their prices by 4.2%. However, the £2.00 capped fare still applies which runs until **31st December 2024, this** limits the price of any **single journey** to a maximum of £2.00.

After a 4-year absence the Essex Village of the Year and Rural Community Awards are back. It was agreed that Moyra Jackson, co-opted member of the Allotment Committee and Chair of the Flowerbed Committee, would complete the nomination form for the 'Best Village Award'. This year there are three other categories; Village Hall and Community Building Award, Community and Voluntary Group Award and Community Enterprise Award. All entries must be submitted no later than Monday 3 June 2024. If you wish to nominate anyone, or you can even

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Development Developments

Uttlesford District Council have extended the deadline until 15 May for representations concerning the application by Gladman to build 240 new homes to the north of Bedwell Road - see last month. You can email your objections to planning@uttlesford.gov.uk citing Reference UTT/24/0543/OP. Noise from the motorway is the dominant issue. For good measure, the site extends as far as the railway, so it would be noisy on both sides.

UDC have at last published the results of the 'Regulation 18' consultation into the Local Plan, which closed as long ago as 15 December 2023. The reason for the long delay was said to be that a reply would be given by planning officers to all the submissions, which would be grouped together as necessary. But there is no sign of these replies - they have disappeared to the extent that there is not even so much as an acknowledgment of their disappearance, and enquiries as to their whereabouts have been met with silence. Uttlesford presumably regret that they ever made such an undertaking. Many respondents found the system difficult to master, with the consequence that some responses are in the wrong place, and it's not always clear what exactly they relate to.

But if the system for making responses was obscure, the system for reviewing the responses is opaque indeed - or 'impenetrable and clunky' in words quoted by the Cabinet member with responsibility for Planning. UDC have promised an improved system for the next round of consultations - but the timetable is tighter than a developer's wallet when asked to make a reasonable contribution to infrastructure. UDC are supposed to review all the responses and make necessary amendments to the Plan for the 'Regulation 19' consultation, which is scheduled for summer 2024. By the end of 2024, the results should go to the Inspector who will decide if the Plan is acceptable. Adoption of the Plan is speculatively put down for spring 2026. The next district elections will be held in May 2027.

In Stansted parish, in the area between the motorway and May Walk, a string of applications has been made over many months, as if it's hoped that no-one will notice that, taken together, they amount to large-scale development, a bit at a time. The latest proposal was to build five houses, and used the S62A procedure, probably because UDC had already turned down an application for 11 on the same site. But the Inspectorate refused it. There is no right of appeal, since the application has already been determined by the appeal body. Two other applications in the same general area were refused by UDC - one for a swimming pool and one for a tennis court. The inevitable appeals were lodged against both refusals within a fortnight or so. The continuous stream of applications and appeals could be regarded as an abuse of the process - but there is no such provision, and the formula is always, 'each case must be considered on its merits'.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

The village magazine has been around for nearly fifty years. Originally it consisted of a single foolscap sheet produced on a Roneo machine. How many people still remember those? Published somewhat irregularly at first and not until 1979 was the decision made by the ECA to make it a free, regular, monthly publication for every house in Elsenham.

In those days Stansted Airport was much in the news and in early 1980 the magazine reported that the Government was proposing to increase capacity from the then 300,000 passengers a year to 15 million and more. Public meetings were held, and 72 residents turned out for the one in the Village Hall. Outlining the expected changes to the surrounding villages, the writer noted that the effects could only be imagined. Today, as we look about us, we don't have to imagine, there were 27 million passengers last year! Of more local interest, the Parish Council advised that land acquisition was to go ahead to provide a pavement outside the Crown Inn which, it was hoped, would be completed by the end of the year. Another proposal for pavements outside the Station Garage (now Hunters Court) and along New Road was put forward for consideration by the Highways Department.

In 1982, the January issue published outline proposals for a new school hall to be built to the west of the old school building, part replacing the existing Village Hall. The old hall was built at the turn of the twentieth century and becoming increasingly difficult, if not impossible, to maintain. Also, it would no longer be financially viable as most of its income came from school hirings. Work on the hall started in June that year and the new hall opened for business in March 1983.

Finally, I was amused by the "Inefficiency Award" presented to British Railways (Eastern Region) by local commuters in February 1979 celebrating the first right time arrival of the 08.41 from Cambridge that year. I was even more amused by the refusal of BR(ER) to accept the award as, according to their records, the train was in fact, two minutes late arriving at Liverpool Street. Who said public institutions didn't have a sense of humour!

Our thanks go to the editors and contributors to the village magazines past and present and all their helpers for all their hard work keeping the village informed.

We have all heard of the grand old Duke of York and his ten thousand men. But there was more to this man that we will discover when Richard Till returns for our next meeting with his talk "The Grand Old Duke of York and His Embarrassing Mistress." This will be on Wednesday June 12 at 8pm in the Memorial Hall and promises to be an entertaining evening. Visitors are always welcome for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership costs just five pounds for a full year's meetings. See you there?



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THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

Spring has arrived and with it comes a host of changes in the nature reserve. We say goodbye to some bird species such as redpolls, siskins and redwings that have spent the winter here but, as they head north to their breeding grounds, we welcome back the summer visitors who join the full-time residents singing to establish territories and find a mate. Chiff chaff and blackcap are two arrivals that you will hear but the loudest bird in the wood is still the song thrush which can be heard singing even well before you enter the wood.

If you are interested in getting some help in identifying birds from their song, then I can recommend the Merlin Bird ID App for your phone. It is free and generally very good.

One species of note that has arrived for the first time in the reserve is the ring-necked parakeet. An introduced species, this has been spreading since the 1970s and, whilst I have seen them flying over Stansted in recent years, this is the first time I have seen a pair in the reserve.

The repairs to the car park have been completed and my thanks go to the volunteer group and to Essex Highways and Eurovia who supplied the road scrapings.

With the amount of recent rainfall, it is unsurprising that all the permanent and temporary ponds are currently full so that much of the reserve has a wetland feel with water on both sides of the boardwalks. This harks back to the origins of the reserve which was originally a wildlife park focused primarily on wetland birds. It was advertised as the largest private bird sanctuary in Britain and had over 100 species including flamingos. Entry was 5 shillings for adults. It would be interesting to hear from any residents who visited the park back then.

Give bees a free boost – dandelions are an important source of spring food for emerging bees. Leave as many as you can to flower, then remove seed-heads to stop unwanted spreading.

For the last 11 years, we have attended an event in Eastbourne called Bible by the Beach. A few years ago, Helen Roseveare the medical missionary was a speaker and told us this story about a trip to America.

She arrived at Chicago Airport and found that she had left all her travel documents at her friend's house: wallet, passport and ticket. These were the days before any mobiles or internet.

She joined the check-in queue anyway, got to the front and said: My name is Helen Roseveare, I don't have a ticket or passport or wallet - is there anything you can do? No, came the answer, there is nothing we can do.

She went to the back of the queue and she prayed. She moved back to the front and tried again. This time the attendant said: There is one possibility: If you can get someone to act as your guarantor to prove you are who you say you are, and to pay for your ticket, we'll let you on the flight....

Helen Roseveare did not know where to turn so asked: *Do you have a Chicago City phonebook? Would you be willing to look someone up for me?*

Sure, said the attendant – who shall I look up? Dr Roseveare said, I want you to start at the letter A – and I want you to stop when you reach the first name that has Reverend after it.

So the attendant started looking and said: I've found one, there is a Rev. Atkins.

Please would you be willing to call him for me? The attendant calls. A man picks up the phone. Yes, it's Rev. Atkins here. You have Helen Roseveare at the airport? I'd be delighted to act as her guarantor and I will come right away.

The man arrived at the airport, paid the money, she got the ticket and was able to go on her away. But before she left, he said to her: Mrs Roseveare, you might be wondering why I've done this. Please would you allow me to explain?

Years ago, I was travelling round Asia with my girlfriend. We weren't Christians and to be honest we got up to some pretty bad stuff: drugs, alcohol, everything. We found ourselves in Kabul in Afghanistan. We were both desperately ill. We didn't know what to do. We knocked on the door of the British consulate. They let us come in and use a tiny room.

My girlfriend went straight to sleep, but I couldn't. Eventually, I opened the bedside cabinet and found nothing except a book called *Give me this mountain.* [*Give me this mountain is the autobiography of Dr. Helen Roseveare*]

That night, I read your book and I became a Christian. My girlfriend and I both recovered, and we got back to America. My girlfriend also became a Christian, and is now my wife. For the last 15 years I've been pastor of a church here in Chicago. Mrs. Roseveare, after all these years, it is a pleasure to meet you!

Friends, you never know what might happen if you read a good book.



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NATURAL OUTLOOK

A little while ago I read a newspaper article on a butterfly survey released by the Butterfly Monitoring Scheme for 2023 declaring that it was the worst year since 1976 for the small tortoiseshell. So, I had a look at the record I have kept since 2016 of the butterflies and moths I have seen in our garden. It shows that the weather can be an important factor. Last year the first butterfly I saw, a small tortoiseshell, was in February, whereas in 2022, 2021 and 2020,



nothing showed up until March. In 2019 a small tortoiseshell and a yellow brimstone were about in February but in 2018 I had to wait till April before I could record any; there were seven species, but a small tortoiseshell was not one of them. However, it did show up in March 2017 along with a yellow brimstone and a peacock. Towards the end of autumn, a red admiral was about until November in 2017 and again in 2021, along with a large white, but last year on it was on its own. A few more species made it through to October; large whites, a beige plume moth, a hummingbird hawk moth, a comma and a small tortoiseshell. Others were the white plume moth and the large vellow underwing. The peak months I have recorded are between May and August with July last year clocking up 17 species including two moths: a small purple and gold and our friend the hummingbird hawk moth.

Painted lady butterflies arrive in the summer on migration from North Africa and, depending on weather conditions, they do so in varying numbers. The variation in our summer weather will also determine whether we have a good or not very good time for them here before some of the survivors depart back to Africa, usually in August. They were here from June to September in 2019 when they had a good time on the buddleia but in other years I have only had them for just a month or two. There were none in 2020 but I did get a garden tiger and an elephant hawk moth for compensation and a painted lady visited for one month last year.

Other butterflies we see in the garden are orange tips (males have the tips and the females do without), holly blues, ringlets, green veined whites, meadow browns and small heaths. Daytime moths I like are: the small purple and gold, which can be found in various parts of the garden and on some of the plants in the greenhouse, the Silver Y moth, which has a marking on its fore wing like an upside-down pale Y. the cinnabar moth with its beautiful scarlet hind wings and decorated forewings, the red-belted clearwing which turned up in the raspberry patch and recently a Hebrew Character, so-called because of the marking on its forewings which resembles a character from the Hebrew alphabet. There have been others to admire when a friend stationed his overnight "trap" in our garden and came back in the morning to list the species collected and make sure they could fly off. Otherwise, in summer, the former cricket ground and part of the old gravel pit which now has a large drainage pond in one corner is a good place for a butterfly wander; look out for marble whites, small skippers and small coppers. Aubrey Buxton Reserve has some of the same plus, when you are lucky, gatekeepers, brown argus and speckled woods. I hope you manage to see at least some of these, especially small tortoiseshells!

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Whether birds evolved flight to descend from the trees or to rise from the ground will be the first question to be tackled at the Saturday Seminar on 11 May. Mike Howgate MSc FLS will discuss two controversies on the evolution of flight, "How Birds Fly" and "The Dinosaur Bird Link". Sometimes known as "Dr Dinosaur", Mike is the General Secretary and Chair of the Amateur Geological Society of North London and is a member of the Linnean Society of London. In the first part of the seminar he will look at the evolution of flight and he will then move on to discuss the prevalent theory amongst paleontologists that birds arose from a group of Therapod dinosaurs.

At the General Meeting on 16 May we look forward to enjoying a performance from singer, songwriter and musician, Saffron Summerfield. Saffron's career has taken her from live performance on TV and on John Peel's radio show to tours abroad and playing blues guitar alongside black musicians in the Mississippi cotton fields. Her performance entitled "Milton Keynes to Mississippi" will feature different styles of guitar from the classical to the blues.

In March, Ed Fairey, Essex County Organiser for the National Garden Scheme (NGS), entertained the Garden Group with the history of the NGS. He described how it came into being, why it has always supported nursing charities, and how in 1928, its foundation year, it raised over £8,000 for the Queen's Nursing Institute (QNI). Since 1980, when it became independent of the QNI, it has benefitted a wider range of health charities, including Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK, The Carers' Trust and Parkinson's UK. In May, the Garden Group will continue its own support of the NGS with a visit to "The Mount" in Roydon, which opens to visitors under the scheme.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

As day length increases and the air becomes warmer, plants put out new shoots. Many insects emerge and birds pair up, preparing to breed. Since the 1960s the average minimum winter temperatures





have been rising. Snow fall is now a rarity, and frosty days are much less frequent. The current growing season is almost a month longer than 50 years ago. Primroses and bluebells are opening earlier. Researchers recorded that the first flowering of some 406 plant species has advanced by almost a month since 1986! This has a knock-on effect for the time of emergence of pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies: some are adapting to the warmer climate.

Hedgerow shrubs and trees are leafing and flowering earlier too, providing food for so many

Bluebells at Littlebury hungry caterpillars which are ideal food for nestlings. Hedgerows are a valuable wildlife habitat, often providing a living framework to the landscape and our rural heritage. Long-established hedges grow in soil that is rich in stored carbon and older trees within the hedgerow also hold large stores of carbon.



A recent planning application to fell an ancient hedgerow oak close to Clavering led to a vigorous and successful campaign by residents to save it. This tree is now registered on the Ancient Tree Inventory, a record like the one for listed buildings. There are more trees in local hedgerows that could be recorded - details of how to do this can be found on https:// ati.woodlandtrust.org.uk/how-to-record.

National Hedgerow Week organised by the Tree Council runs from 6th May to 12th May and is timed to showcase hedgerows resplendent with fresh new growth and full of wildlife. Please enjoy one or more of the many walks listed on the Society's website - and consider recording some of our wonderful old trees.

The most important public consultation for a

generation about the future impact of Stansted Airport is currently under way.

At stake is the prospect of the Government removing all of its current statutory restrictions on night flights at Stansted, which have been in force for over 40 years. Manchester Airports Group (MAG) is pressing hard for the removal of the current Government restrictions, which currently allow a maximum of 13,700 Stansted night flights a year.

This is despite the fact that MAG is subject to a planning agreement with Uttlesford District Council (UDC), signed in May 2003, whereby Stansted Airport is subject to the following obligation:

"From the date of this agreement not to seek any relaxation of the night flight restrictions currently in force for the night period of 23.00 – 06.59 or for the night quota period of 23.30 – 05.59."

SAW Noise Advisor, Martin Peachey, commented: "If MAG is successful there could be no limit on the number of night flights at Stansted and this would adversely impact the health of local residents especially vulnerable groups. Aircraft are inherently noisy machines and particularly so compared with the low ambient noise levels at night in the countryside surrounding the airport. It is vital for local residents, local councils and other local organisations to reply to this consultation and make it clear to the Government that we want fewer night flights, not more!"

Responding to the consultation

The link to the consultation document is <u>https://www.gov.uk/government/</u> <u>consultations/night-flight-restrictions-heathrow-gatwick-and-stansted-airports-fromoctober-2025</u>. You can respond online but an email response allows more flexibility to make your own points, rather than just responding to the pre-set questions. The email address is <u>night.flights@dft.gov.uk</u>.

The consultation proposes extending the current restrictions -i.e. maintaining the status quo - at Heathrow and Gatwick until (at least) October 2028. However, for Stansted, the Government is seeking views on three different options:

Option 1 – Removing Government controls on the number of Stansted night flights and the permitted aggregate night noise level in October 2026.

Option 2 – Removing Government controls on the number of Stansted night flights in October 2025, whilst maintaining the controls on the permitted aggregate night noise level.



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Option 3 – Government night controls to remain (as per Heathrow and Gatwick).

Options 1 and 2 reflect lobbying activity by MAG. Both these options would mean fewer restrictions and, inevitably, more Stansted night flights. Option 3 is clearly preferable and it is important that local residents make their views known to the DfT.

Other points you could make

<u>Phase out night flights altogether</u> – Stansted is currently allowed 13,700 night flights a year between the hours of 11.30pm and 6.00am. By comparison, Heathrow, which is three times bigger than Stansted, is allowed just 5,800 night flights a year. Night flights are particularly intrusive in a largely rural area, with low background night noise levels. The aim should be to phase out all Stansted night flights, except emergencies, by 2030.

'<u>Night' should mean 'night'</u> – The limit on the number of night flights should apply for the full 8-hour night period (11.00pm to 7.00am) and not just for the $6\frac{1}{2}$ hours (11.30pm to 6.00am) – when the limit on the number of night flights currently applies.

<u>Dispense with Dispensations</u> – Airport management can grant 'dispensations' where flights are delayed by weather or Air Traffic Control problems. Dispensations do not count against the night flights limit. Stansted granted 1,200 dispensations last summer whereas Heathrow granted only 462. The DfT should remove the right of airports to grant dispensations, i.e. airport management should not be allowed to mark their own homework.

<u>Ban Reverse Thrust</u> – The use of reverse thrust at night should be banned except in the case of an emergency. The Stansted runway is one of the longest in the UK and so the additional braking effect provided by using reverse thrust upon landing is unnecessary other than in exceptional circumstances.

<u>Health Impacts</u> – The Government recognises that aircraft noise at night has negative impacts upon local communities around airports and can impact on physical and mental well-being. These negative impacts are far greater than any economic benefits.

Night flights are the biggest single cause of noise complaints by local residents. This consultation is an opportunity to make your voice heard. The closing date is 22 May 2024. As a reminder, the email address for replying to the consultation is <u>night.flights@dft.gov.uk</u>.

SAW Chairman, Brian Ross, concluded: "MAG is putting profit before people in pressing for more Stansted night flights and, in so doing, is shamefully breaking its planning agreement with UDC. However, if enough local residents and local councils respond to this consultation, making clear that we don't want more Stansted night flights, we can convince the Government not to bow to MAG's pressure."



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SMOKED HADDOCK ROSTI (serves 4)

1 lb (450g) potatoes, peeled and coarsely grated 1 large onion, peeled and coarsely grated 2-3 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed 1 lb (450g) smoked haddock 1 tablespoon olive oil Salt and freshly ground black pepper Finely grated rind of ½ lemon 1 tablespoon freshly chopped parsley 2 tablespoons crème fraiche, to serve Mixed salad leaves, to garnish Lemon wedges, to serve

Dry the grated potatoes in a clean tea towel. Rinse the grated onion thoroughly in cold water, dry in a clean tea towel and add to the potatoes.

Stir the garlic into the potato mixture. Skin the smoked haddock and remove as many of the tiny bones as possible. Cut into slices and reserve.

Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan. Add half the potatoes and press well down in the frying pan. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Add a layer of fish and a sprinkling of lemon rind, parsley and a little black pepper.

Top with the remaining potatoes and press down firmly. Cover with a sheet of tinfoil and cook on the lowest heat for 25-30 minutes.

Pre-heat the grill 2-3 minutes before the end of cooking time. Remove the tinfoil and place the rosti under the grill to brown. Turn out on to a warmed serving dish, and serve immediately with spoonfuls of crème fraiche, lemon wedges and mixed salad leaves.

HANDY HINTS: Do remember to dry off the grated potatoes and onion. It is amazing just how much water comes out. You can use strong kitchen towels instead of a tea towel if you prefer.



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'For Geeta, life as a widow is more peaceful than life as a wife... until other women in her village decide they want to be widows, too.

her abusive drunk of a husband, her reluctant agreement sets in motion a chain of events that will change the lives of all the women in the village......' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group last month. It was very well-liked.

Geeta's husband, Ramesh, disappeared five years ago. Gossip has it that Geeta did away with him so she is feared and treated as a pariah in society. Embracing her pariah-like status, Geeta finds inspiration in Phoolan Devi, known as the Bandit Queen, who overcame her low-caste origins and the most dreadful abuse to seek revenge for what she suffered and to champion the downtrodden.

The tale is set where many women are treated as the property of the men they marry, their job to make babies, cook, clean and are often treated like servants to be beaten. Women struggle against domestic violence and often caste discrimination, however, the women in this story are not depicted as saints; they are judgemental, bitchy and cliquey, but also human and often very funny.

The complexity of female friendships is fundamental as is the sisterhood that bonds them, strengthened by being part of a loan group. If women want to earn money by sewing or jewellery-making, they need a loan to finance it. They meet weekly to make loan repayments from their earnings. When Farah defaults on her contribution, Geeta makes up the shortfall and so Farah approaches Geeta for help in getting rid of her husband, who is drinking her money away. How Geeta and Farah go about this will have an impact of other women in the loan group. One by one they are drawn in. Geeta manages to reconnect with Saloni, who was her closest friend but Geeta's marriage destroyed their relationship. Geeta begins to understand what happened to her and her parents and realises that rage and anger of a bandit queen is not her life but revenge is still possible.

This is a dark tale with a lot of humour and poignant moments. The characters are fully formed, the dialogue is smart and witty. You learn a lot about Indian culture and attitudes to different religions. However, the reality of discrimination, division, poverty, hardship and the caste system is never too far away.
