AID FOR ROMANIA

The October lorry left on 21st and hopefully has arrived safely as it has to clear EU customs. We are now collecting for the spring lorry.

Some of the goods will be given free to needy families in Mărăşeşti as nominated by the local Baptist church and the town mayor, with the remainder sold through our charity shop with proceeds helping the same poor sections of the population with health, education and improving their terrible housing conditions.

We are wanting the following:

- Summer clothes and shoes for adults and children (under 3yrs must be new).
- Single and Z beds with mattresses (sturdy iron or wooden framed beds are very desirable no divans).
- Bed sheets, pillows, duvets and blankets (single and double). Towels, toiletries (incl loo rolls), umbrellas and rugs.
- Building and workshop tools (also some types of gardening tools and sturdy wheelbarrows).
- Surplus school tables (must be 2ft clearance underneath ie not infant) and stack
 -able and adult size chairs (please ask any contact with a local school or village
 hall who are/maybe re-furbishing).
- Small sturdy chest of drawers (not flat pack built as these do not survive the five day truck journey to Romania), bedside cabinets, folding tables. Irons and ironing boards.
- Kitchen items (crockery, cutlery, utensils, pots/pans, especially big sizes, preserving pans).
- Wheelchairs, crutches, walking sticks, zimmers. **Bikes adult sizes only** as I have loads of children's bikes waiting to be re-furbished.
- Bandages and dressings (*absolutely NO pills, medicines or creams*). Rucksacks and holdalls (must be in good condition).
- Costume jewellery. Suitcases but not the old 'cardboard' types.
- Footballs, small toys such as push-along cars, cuddly toys etc (no big toys as these cause much jealousy!).
- Ear defenders for the manual workers and high-viz vests/jackets.
- Cash donations for the cost of the lorry as it now costs more to send since we must clear customs in Holland.

Frances Lambert has stepped down from the Parish Council after ten years as a councillor. The Parish Council thanks her for all her time and dedication to Elsenham. Frances served on many committees and working groups including, Finance, Planning, Communication and Playing field. Frances was also behind the inspiration of the raised and diamond flowerbeds which were installed for the Queen's diamond jubilee.

People are still walking their dogs on the Elsenham playing field. Please remember that dogs are not allowed on the playing field; this includes the road and car parks.

Uttlesford District Council has now agreed with David Wilson Homes developers that a percentage of the Section 106 payment towards the cost of maintaining the Isabel Drive play area can be used to purchase new play equipment for the children's play area in the playing field.

The courts have rejected Uttlesford District Council's legal challenge against the Stansted Airport planning appeal decision. Over £175,000 has already been spent on defending this planning application. A further £1 million may have to be paid to Stansted Airport for costs.

An onsite meeting was held with Bloor Homes on 1 October 2021. This development is on Henham Road for 350 new homes. There will also be two junior football pitches with changing rooms and a car park, plus children's play areas. Bloor will also be providing a site on their development for a new primary school and early learning provision.

If members of the public want to contact the Parish Clerk, they should do so by either email or telephone. It is not acceptable to approach the Parish Clerk when she is off duty.

A member of the public praised Cllr. Graham Mott on his outstanding performance at the recent Gladman planning application appeal. Cllr Mott had carried out a remarkable amount of research to defend Uttlesford District Council's refusal of the planning application. This application is for another 220 new homes in Bedwell Road.

The Parish Council will be responding to Uttlesford District Council's draft Housing Strategy, stating that there is a shortage of bungalows within the district for both market purchase and affordable rent. The requirement for 5% of properties to be bungalows on new housing developments should be the minimum amount and there should be a mix of bungalows, private, affordable and rented.

The next Parish Council meeting will be 1 November 2021, 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT NOVEMBER 2021

Uttlesford District Council has appointed a new Chief Executive, Peter Holt, following a recommendation by an Appointments Committee.

Peter has extensive local government and leadership experience, as well as a background in organisational transformation. He has been an independent strategic consultant since April having previously been Assistant Chief Executive and Deputy Monitoring Officer for South Northants Council from 2018.

His appointment follows an extremely thorough recruitment process. We are confident he will be an asset to this council and to the residents of the district, and he took up his position on 4 October.

A planning appraisal of the Planning Department was reported in 2018, which we are afraid wasn't acted upon. We have since then commissioned a full report by the Local Government Agency to compile an up to date 360 degree review of the planning department. Since receiving this report, we have engaged a very experienced interim planning officer to implement those recommendations to transform the department.

We have come to the end of the road regarding our opposition to the expansion of the Airport. We ringfenced the money as soon as we declared a Climate Emergency, so the money for the appeal was budgeted for and services have not been affected. We do not regret the decision to oppose the expansion; we do regret the decision of the judge.

We have our Ward Initiative Fund to help fund projects within our ward, so please do contact us if we can help.

Uttlesford has now referred all the responses to their 'Call for Sites' exercise (300+) to town and parish councils for checking as to accuracy of the descriptions only. The consultation exercise when everyone will be able to have a say comes later.

We have restarted our Councillor Surgeries and the first one will be at Petrina's on 11 November at 6pm at Orwell House, Station Rd Elsenham. As always happy to chat via phone, email, Zoom.

If unable to travel, we are more than happy to visit you if that helps.

Hope to see you at the Remembrance Service to be held on 13 November.

Development Developments

The Appeal by Gladman against refusal of their application for up to 220 homes to the north of Bedwell Road was duly held by an Inquiry over an eight-day period. The first topic for discussion was landscape, where there are three problems with making a case against the proposal. The site falls a good way short of picturesque; it can't be appreciated from many locations other than fleetingly from the train; previous planning decisions have driven large holes through Uttlesford's policy.

Developers are supposed to be able to show that their sites are amenable to access other than by the car. The station is a great draw and is a leading reason for the vast number of new housing applications in the village over the last ten years. But access from the site to destinations such as the shops, the school and the pub would rarely be by public transport, walking or cycling. The main access would be to the west, via the narrow windy lane through Ugley Green and then on to the B1383. Gladman proposed to widen two short stretches near the junction of Snakes Lane and Pound Lane, but it was objected that that is not the narrowest section of the road. Essex Highways' engineer, making a rare appearance at an Appeal, burnished her already formidable reputation for unintelligibility.

Gladman were at their shakiest when it came to noise, hardly surprising on a site with a motorway on one side and a railway on the other. They sacked their consultants and came along with a substitute, but wanted to insist that parts of the original report were still valid. They were forced to concede that in order to achieve an acceptable level of noise, every window in every home would need to be closed at all times, giving rise to issues with overheating and ventilation. Gardens would offer no respite, although they did claim at one point that if residents cowered down close to their fences it might help - but not much. They said that people's susceptibility to noise varies, and that only those who weren't too concerned would live there - but it was countered that those looking for an affordable home might not have much in the way of alternatives.

The Inquiry was one of the last which the Planning Inspectorate will hold remotely and duly provided the usual quota of unintended glitches and hitches. The Inspector did not tell the managing technician that she was logging out for lunch, and on her return found that she was denied access to her own Inquiry. Later, she ran out of electronic memory and also had to cope with the howls of a puppy which felt that the division of attention between itself and the Inquiry needed recalibrating. The appellants celebrated their QC's birthday with a total system break-down and an entertaining display of incompetence while they tried, unsuccessfully, to retrieve matters.

But Gladman must not be under-estimated. They have a formidable record of success at appeals, through their strategy of concentrating on smallish district councils with a poor record of housing delivery and little early prospect of a Local Plan. The result could be known before you read this.

You are likely to be reading this in early November, and my calendar tells me that there will then be a little over four weeks until our Christmas Tree Festival over the weekend of 4/5 December. Not much time to go!

As I write this, bookings are already flooding in, and we have approximately half of the spaces allocated already, so if you are interested in taking part there is no time to waste. What we do is ask people and organisations to supply and decorate a tree – any sort of tree, real, artificial – even a bunch of twigs if you like. The tree and decoration can reflect your interests, commemorate an occasion or memory, or even just express your mood and artistic skills. It is up to you. We do not charge for entry, only for the space for a tree - a minimum of \pounds 5 an individual or \pounds 10 an organisation, although more is always appreciated. The monies go to the Church Fabric Fund which helps to maintain your 900-odd year old church. The result will be a church full of wonderful Christmas trees – truly magical, especially as the light fades and the trees' illumination takes over.

We will have seasonal music in the church and seasonal refreshments outside in a marquee, so as to be more Covid safe (and leave more room for the trees inside the Church!). ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

A couple of months back I mentioned the other Elsenham War Memorial in Church Lane that had suffered damage due to lorries visiting the adjacent building site. I am pleased to report that the Site Manager has apologised for the damage and advised that a carpenter has been instructed to effect repairs. My thanks to the Parish Council and Graham Mott for this update. Meanwhile there remains the mystery of who erected this memorial and when. If you can help solve this conundrum do please get in touch.

A little while back I read in the paper that the missing pieces from Rembrandt's great painting, The Night Watch, which were removed when it was cut down to fit its new home in the Amsterdam Town Hall in 1715, had been reconstructed. These will now be displayed with the painting in its current home in the Rijksmuseum. This reminded me that several years ago we had a talk on antique fakes and forgeries by Tim Turner of Sworders auction house.

He told us that there were many more Rembrandts in the world than were ever painted by the great man himself. This had become such a problem that a committee of experts was set up to authenticate every Rembrandt painting. This of course led to the great dismay of some owners who were told that their pride and joy was not what they thought it was.

On the other hand, particularly in later years as advances in scientific scrutiny made authentication ever less subjective, the same committee has been able to go back to others and tell them that their supposed fake was, in fact, genuine. This was just one fact from a very good presentation that itself was just one of the many fine talks from knowledgeable speakers that we have held over the last ten years or so. A summary of every talk is written up in the minutes and these are all available to read on our website alongside lots of other splendid information about the life and times of our village.

Talking of talks, our next meeting will be held on Wednesday 10 November at 8pm when Ken MacDonald, Secretary of the 100 Parishes Society is due to speak about The 100 Parishes. Largely unspoilt and richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage, the hundred parishes are a large, attractive, gently-undulating area of around 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire. Because of the ongoing Covid situation our programme may be subject to changes but we can always promise you an informative and entertaining evening. The children's curriculum has been full of exciting opportunities to learn creatively. Years R, 1 and 2 really enjoyed a visit from a creative performer and took part in a movement and action based story through space to save



the kind, friendly alien from an evil space lord. The experience encouraged them to work on their listening and coordination, as well as getting them to remember actions to a game. It was certainly lots of fun and they also gained a wealth of knowledge about the planets!

There was high drama for the older children too as our Year 5 children learned about Theseus and the Minotaur by acting out scenes from the story. There was plenty of dramatic performance in their interpretation of the part where the son of King Minos dies.

If you are reading this I can assume that you have not skipped this article, as some skip the sports pages or the fashion pages of a newspaper. Why, I wonder, are you reading it? Are you a member of the church, keen to find out what is happening? A former member looking to see how we are coping without you? We acknowledge that God the Father is the creator of all things. In the words of the popular hymn, 'All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small. All things wise and wonderful the Lord God made them all'. We believe that Jesus Christ came into the world to take upon himself the sins of the whole world. Sins that started with Adam and Eve in the garden of Eden, when they ate the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, the one tree that they had been told not to eat, and has continued ever since when people do what they want, what they think is right rather than what God wants. The consequence of sin is that it separates us from God and denies us a place in his heavenly kingdom. We believe in the Holy Spirit who dwells within all who profess Jesus as their Saviour, to help them live lives that are pleasing to God.

For many years we ran a 'Back to Church Sunday' when personal invitations were issued to people who used to come to church but, for whatever reason, had stopped. Perhaps they didn't like the hymns, had fallen out with somebody, had doctrinal differences with what they heard, or had just lost the habit. If anything in this letter makes you think 'perhaps I should give it a try again' please do – things may have changed since your last visit and be more to your liking. You can be assured of a very warm welcome at any of our services.

NATURAL OUTLOOK ON HERE AND THERE

Our house came with a garden front and back but where the birds regularly visit depends on what's on offer and when. For instance the watercourse through the back did flow



regularly years ago but now is intermittent so it's ages since the kingfisher visited and after we took the fish out of the small pond the only time we now see herons is when they fly over us. I do put out water and standard bird seed and this can make a big difference e.g. if you want starlings in the back put out a fat block as well. I don't put out bread.

If you have a garden or somewhere where you have a good view of where birds collect, either because you feed them or there is shelter and berries in autumn then I would expect your 'usuals' to include; sparrows, blue tits, blackbirds – for most of the year at least – dunnocks (old name was hedge sparrows), great tits, and several of the finches, chaffinches, greenfinches and goldfinches though these latter can be picky.

Bigger birds might be wood pigeons, collared doves and, seasonally, rooks, jackdaws and crows, magpies and, possibly, jays. Some of the corvids leave the central part of Elsenham in early summer after the young are fully fledged and don't come back till autumn. Another reason for absence of some regulars in long-standing gardens is that the 'countryside' and its agricultural fields has moved further away; I haven't seen a brambling in the garden for quite a while.

If you overlook the playing field, the railway line, the cemetery, or any part of Fullers End, Tye Green or Elsenham Hall your bird list could be rather longer and the birds' behaviour might be different. For instance, little owls have been known to frequent the area behind the house on the railway side of Robin Hood Road and hoots from tawny owls can be heard in the cemetery.

We have had kestrels hovering over our garden but you are more likely to see them over the fields connecting Fullers End and Hall Road. Buzzards and red kites are fairly new to the village having gradually spread east to get here. Buzzards drift over all parts of the village, especially since they nested in the far side of Alsa Wood. Some of the red kites soar above Gilbey Cottages and Stansted Road whilst others choose the Golds Business Park and New Road as hunting ground.

On a quiet day in winter the playing field plays host to redwings, like song thrushes to look at but with rusty red patches on their flanks, and fieldfares, visitors from the far north and, all year round, green woodpeckers, flocks of pied wagtails and once again, rook, crows and jackdaws. The best place to see mistle thrushes I have found is the far end of the school playing field – again when it's quiet.

"Please to remember the Fifth of November, gunpowder, treason and plot. We know of no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot."



This traditional rhyme appeared soon after the failed plot to ignite barrels of gunpowder beneath the House of Lords on the occasion of the state opening of Parliament by King James I on 5 November 1605. The man found with the gunpowder was Guy Fawkes, one of a group of English Catholics whose intention was to assassinate the Protestant King James so that one of his young Catholic children could assume the throne, thereby restoring a Catholic monarchy.

Some 400 years later, the preservation of the monarchy and parliament is still celebrated by many with a bonfire and the burning of a guy.

Like other major events in British history, there is a link with The Hundred Parishes. In this case, the primary link is Sir William Waad (pronounced Wade) of 17thcentury Battles Hall in the parish of Manuden.

Waad, who lived from 1546 to 1623, had pursued a distinguished career in the service of the Crown and in 1605 held the position of Lieutenant of the Tower of London, responsible for those held prisoner there and specifically for the interrogation of prisoners. The king gave permission for the use of torture, including the rack, to assist in this questioning. It was not long before most of the plotters were rounded up, interrogated, tried and executed by being publicly hung, drawn and quartered for their involvement in the Gunpowder Plot.

Manuden's most famous former resident is remembered on a tablet inside the parish church.

There is a second local link to the Gunpowder Plot. It is believed that Tiptofts, a 14th-century house in Wimbish, may have been used as a meeting place by the conspirators.

At the end of September about 40 of us set off for Weymouth on a five-day trip arranged by Nigel Johnson through Just For Groups. We had fabulous weather and so were able to enjoy lots of time out with our buckets and spades.... Only joking!

On the way down we visited Mottisfont House, an 18th century building with a medieval priory at its heart and the largest plane tree in Britain. On the way home we visited Kingston Lacey - a lavish family home re-imagined as a Venetian Palace in the rural Dorset countryside. In between, we visited the market towns of Dorchester and Bridport, Corfe Castle and the model village and then to Swanage on the Heritage Steam Railway.

In October, we visited Knowle which has the last dedicated deer park. It is also home to some of the last surviving furniture from Whitehall and Hampton Court Palaces and splendid 17th century tapestries. THE BLIND LIGHT by Steven Evers Reviewed by Marion Giles

'As the 1950s draw to a close, and the Cold War escalates, the shape of Drummond Moore's life is changed beyond measure when he strikes up an unlikely friendship with James Carter, a rich and well-connected fellow national serviceman. Carter leads him to Doom Town – an army base that seeks to recreate the effects of a nuclear war – where he meets Gwen, a barmaid with whom he shares an instant connection.



Set over sixty years of British history, The Blind Light by Stuart Evers is the compelling story of one family as they deal with the personal and political fallout of their times. ... ' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

'Extraordinary' – Spectator **'Powerful'** – Guardian

This was the choice of the book group this month. It was liked and enjoyed, although it is a long book (545 pages). Some had not quite finished it before our book group session but intended to as they wanted to know the outcome.

The relationship between Carter and Drum (as he is known) is an interesting and complicated one and seems to be founded on dependency. From completely different backgrounds and class, Carter's wealth and connections means he and his family will have access to a bunker in the event of a nuclear war. He promises Drum and his family a place. The story could be said to be about the corrosive effects of fear and the damage we do to ourselves and our loved ones when danger is all we can see.

Drum marries Gwen from Cumbria and they return to Drum's home in Dagenham where he works on the conveyor belt of the troubled and striking Ford factory. Carter offers a chance to tend a farm on land he wants to acquire and so the family leaves Essex for a farming life. As well as the connection between Carter and Drum, the two wives, Daphne and Gwen, strike up a friendship, again seemingly out of dependency on each other more than anything else. However, there is now a connection between their children's lives, none of whom can be said to be likeable characters.

We all liked Gwen and found the dynamics between her and Daphne and that between Carter and Drum interesting. None of us formed any empathy with any of the children and found they had few saving graces at all.

The historical backdrop underpinning events gives context and colour to the novel. The research that must have been undertaken cannot be faulted and the detail of life in the various decades covered rang true and triggered memories for some of us. The novel has been described as epic and ambitious and that probably says it all.

The Ballroom at Elsenham Hall

I mentioned in an earlier Rays Reflections, how I had been on a journey of discovery with the late Alan Bennett. We had investigated the inner sanctums of the Ice house. I remember thinking that it was a far cry from what once had been the opulence of the Elsenham Hall Ballroom.

According to a sale catalogue the ballroom measured 43' by 32'. What it lacked in size it made up for with elegance. When I, having negotiated a maze of passageways, finally found myself standing at its entrance I could only imagine what it had been many years ago compared to what I saw before me. There was still a central chandelier in place, the sprung floor was almost entirely obscured by miscellaneous detritus. The walls still had the evidence of expensive wallpapers. One could see faded areas where once hung paintings and fine tapestries.

I could only imagine ladies wearing fabulous ballgowns dancing with gentleman in their finest suits. This room, once graced by Royalty, had been a place of numerous meetings and romantic trysts. We know Sir Walter Gilbey almost certainly could be found there, wearing the flashy clothes of a Parisian dandy. All of his coats were made of vicuna, a very soft wool. Buff yellow dominated and was the colour of his waistcoat, with a rust gold handkerchief tucked in the pocket. His clothes were all the same, but there were wardrobes full of them. He always wore the same type of boot on his tiny feet, a closely fitting style that were covered by his trousers and he had thirty or forty identical pairs of them.

Later auction catalogues do depict a photo of the chandelier, but sadly no record exists of what once had been a fine room. I missed my chance to take photos. But I feel I should be forgiven, who in the 50s and 60s could have imagined that one day the entire building would be turned into apartments.

COOKERY CORNER

This is a delicious way of using up cooked turkey or chicken.

TURKEY, HAM AND MUSHROOM CREAM PIE (serves 6)

12oz (350g) cooked turkey or chicken, chopped

3oz (75g) smoked bacon, finely chopped	2 tablespoons brandy
1oz (25g) butter	3fl oz (75ml) cream – single or double
1 medium onion, chopped	1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
3oz (75g) mushrooms, quartered	Salt and freshy milled black pepper
1oz (25g) plain flour	12oz (350g) ready rolled puff pastry
12fl oz (350ml) chicken stock	Beaten egg to glaze

Melt the butter in a large saucepan and gently sauté the onion for 5 minutes, then add the mushrooms and cook until softened, stirring for a further 5 minutes. Remove from pan with a draining spoon.

Add the bacon to the pan and fry until it turns golden at the edges. Return the mushrooms and onions with their juices and sprinkle in the flour. Stir until the flour has soaked up the juices.

Next add the stock, little by little, stirring until the sauce has thickened. Add the parsley, cream and brandy. Season to taste. Remove from heat and leave to cool.

When it is time to cook the pie, pre-heat the oven to 220°/200°fan/gas mark 7. Mix the chicken or turkey pieces into the cold sauce. Place in a pie dish. Cover with the pastry, trimming as needed. Glaze the pastry top with the beaten egg and decorate with any trimmings. Bake the pie in the oven for about 30 minutes.

Serve with a plain green salad, spinach or any green vegetables of choice.

CHEF'S TIP: Lots of alternatives here for using up leftovers after Christmas. If you have any spare cooked ham, use instead of the bacon. Leeks can replace the onion, or use celery instead of the mushrooms. The quantities here can be easily halved. Use your surplus pastry to make some home-made sausage rolls.
