

The Chair extended a warm welcome to Fiona Gardiner, who will be taking over the position of Parish Clerk and RFO on 1 December 2025.

There are several airport parking issues in and around Elsenham. Cllr. Gooding is trying to establish if there is link to them. The airport parking at New Farm, Elsenham Road is now with the legal system. The District Council has served a notice on the site, but the owners have since appealed against the notice. Therefore, UDC's Enforcement cannot take any further action until the matter has been resolved by the planning inspector.

Cllr. Gooding received another reminder regarding the need to establish a buffer zone on Stansted Road. As vehicles enter the village over the motorway bridge, the speed limit drops from 60mph to 30mph, but many drivers are not slowing down as required. The ongoing issue of excessive speeding on Stansted Road needs urgent attention. Recently, a hit-and-run left two sixteen-year-olds hospitalized, with one suffering a serious head injury.

The Playing Field Committee has scheduled the replacement of the window in the teen shelter. It is hoped that the new window will remain undamaged.

The Parish Council must begin preparing its 2026/27 budget for approval at the Full Council meeting on 5 January 2026.

The annual allotment invoices have been sent to all plot holders. These should have been paid by 1 October but there are still some outstanding.

The Bloor phase 3 planning application for 129 homes has been submitted to UDC. Though located in Henham, it will impact Elsenham; the application is included in the new Local Plan.

The appeal regarding Gladman's planning application for Bedwell Road is being held starting on 3 December 2025. Cllr. Mott will be attending the appeal hearing.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

Uttlesford District Council's Local Plan continues to be examined by the Inspectors. A consultation on major modifications closes on 27 October, with waggy-finger warnings that any comments which stray outside the very limited issues raised will be consigned to the electronic waste bin.

One issue of local concern is not mentioned, since it is claimed that it is not a modification, major, minor, or minuscule, at all. Uttlesford resolved that they would appraise developments by 'settlement' rather than by parish. They decreed that land adjacent to consented Bloor applications is in Elsenham 'settlement', although actually in the parish of Henham, which is lower down the development hierarchy than Elsenham. Provision for a further 110 homes was duly included in the Local Plan. When UDC were asked where the settlement boundary between the two parishes might lie, the mirth-making reply was: 'Just to be clear, the settlement boundary is not intended to function as a boundary between settlements'. Not content with that, they continued with a further rib-tickler, by way of explanation that although the boundary couldn't be found on the relevant map, that is for a very good reason. There is a 'visibility issue', which means it cannot be seen, but not that it doesn't exist - although how to tell the difference between a line which can't be seen because it's not visible, and one which can't be seen because it's not there remains a mystery.

The current best estimate by Uttlesford is that the Local Plan will be adopted in April 2026, always assuming the Inspectors don't linger unduly over Christmas. Bloor Homes have not waited for such niceties as approval of the Local Plan. They have banged in an application on the land in question, which is north and east of 'Bloor 2' and adjoins the north-east corner of 'Bloor 1', such that the 'educational provision' can be doubled in size. In recognition of making this land available to Essex, Bloor were given the 'quid pro quo' of another 110 homes in the Local Plan, which they have stretched to 129 in their application.

When 'Bloor 3' was first mooted, there were enthusiastic noises around the idea of a shop on the site, but now Bloor have decided that, well, really, it's not a very suitable location, it's all very unfortunate, but they will have no alternative than to fill the site with as many houses as possible, without it being too obvious that that's their intention. There are insufficient bungalows, which are much needed for downsizing purposes in view of the large amount of new developments in the village. Whether they consider that they've provided enough already is unknown. It has seemingly not occurred to them - or, if it has, they've ignored it - that with their total of housing now standing at 679 (350 + 200 + 129), some provision for employment should be made on the site. But they're not interested in that. To a developer, the proximity of the station means selling more houses to commuters, and they don't mind how crowded the trains might be.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

Elsenham has been around a long time. First written mention was in the Domesday Book of 1086 but we know from archaeological evidence that there was an Iron Age settlement here dating from around 700 – 500BC. There was also evidence found of a first century AD high end Roman villa. These were found by the Stansted Brook near where Hall Road now crosses the stream.



At some point the centre of the village moved from there, up the hill to what is now Elsenham Cross possibly as a result of the Great Plague causing people to look for healthier surroundings. The area around Elsenham Cross is probably the oldest part of the existing village where there is a preponderance of older buildings many of which are listed including the Crown Inn that dates from the 18th century.

But what is a listed building? Well, a listed building is a building of great historical or artistic value that has official protection to prevent it being changed or destroyed and is included on a statutory list. Buildings are assigned a Grade according to their level of historic interest. Grade I buildings are of exceptional historic interest; Grade II* buildings are of great historic interest; Grade II Buildings are of special historic interest.

In Elsenham we have one Grade I listed building, that being our church, St Mary The Virgin that dates back to 1100AD. There are another fifty-six Grade II listed buildings in and around Elsenham including the aforementioned Crown Inn, the 16th century Elsenham Place and the 18th century Elsenham Hall. This number represents one of the highest density of listings in the country.

If you are interested in exploring some of these buildings, EVHS publish a small booklet of "History Walks Around Elsenham" available from our website for just two pounds.

Listed Elsenham was the subject of the talk at our last meeting and went into much more interesting detail than can be captured in the precis above. This is just one example from our programme of talks that cover the many diverse aspects of local history. Next year's programme for example includes talks on policing in Essex and the local railway amongst others.

However, the last meeting of this year takes place in just a few days' time as you read this, on Wednesday 12 November. Just a few days after Halloween, when we will learn all about "The Witch Trials of Herts and Essex." Our speaker, Prof. Alison Rowlands is an authority on the subject and this promises to be a very interesting evening. All are welcome and visitors pay just two pounds.

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)

From the outset, it was clear that the option of LGR *not* happening was off the table. Uttlesford District Council has been listed on the Government's **Devolution Priority Programme** since January, confirming that reorganisation is inevitable. Our choice, therefore, was to either help shape what happens or sit back and let it happen to us. We of course wanted to ensure we were involved right from the beginning.

A key consideration has been the **size of any new authority**. Essex has a population of around **1.9 million**, so dividing that by the number of proposed unitary councils gives an indication of their average size:

- One single unitary: ~1.9 million residents
- Two unitaries: ~950,000 residents each
- Five unitaries: ~380,000 residents each

While the Government suggested that new unitaries should generally serve populations of **500,000 or more**, it later clarified that this was *not* a hard rule — smaller, well-argued proposals would be considered.

Our **Chief Executive** played a leading national role in this discussion, publishing research comparing outcomes across all **132 existing unitary councils** in England. His findings showed **no correlation between council size and quality of outcomes for residents** — in other words, larger councils do not necessarily deliver better services. This evidence supported our position that keeping local government as *local as possible* should remain the priority.

Based on this research and broad agreement among Essex councils, we concluded that the **maximum realistic number of new unitaries for Essex** would be **five**, each averaging around 380,000 residents. A single countywide unitary was quickly discounted — the largest existing unitary, Birmingham, has around 1.1 million residents, meaning a whole-Essex authority would be almost twice that size.

In March, **Uttlesford District Council formally agreed in principle** to support the creation of five new unitary councils across Essex. Ten council leaders — representing all political parties — have now confirmed their collective support for this model, which would replace the current 15 councils with five new authorities. The proposal aligns with the Government's invitation for councils to suggest new structures that **simplify local government while keeping services close to residents**.

In a joint open letter, all ten council leaders stated that Essex residents "deserve councils that are local, accountable, and responsive." They emphasised that reorganisation should "promote growth by respecting the geography of this hugely diverse county and by bringing government closer to residents, not further away."

The **five-unitary model** is locally developed, rooted in community identity, and designed to protect local service delivery. Under this model, **Uttlesford would join Harlow and Epping Forest to form a new West Essex Council.** Other models are also under consideration, including a **three-unitary proposal** from Essex County Council, which would place Uttlesford within a much larger new area.

As Leader, **CIIr Petrina Lees** has stated: "I have consistently argued that keeping local government as local as possible is the best way forward for Essex. The five-council model provides meaningful reorganisation and protects local services. Local councils are better placed to provide services such as education, social care, and highways, as opposed to larger councils that may have less understanding of local needs."

Cllr Bianca Donald added: "We are also committed to local representation, with our model having one councillor for every 3,000 residents — 25 councillors for the Uttlesford area — compared with the Essex County model's 15." Ultimately, the decision will rest with Government — but whatever happens, we remain committed to working together across Greater Essex to ensure that any changes protect our communities and achieve the best outcomes for residents.

Hate Crime Awareness Week

In October, as part of **Hate Crime Awareness Week**, Uttlesford District Council joined **Essex Police** and **Essex Fire and Rescue Service** to raise awareness and offer support across the district.

It was an important opportunity for us to stand together as a community and reaffirm that **hate has no place here**. Hate crimes — whether based on race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity — can have a devastating impact on individuals and communities.

We believe that kindness is a fundamental part of our community, and this was clearly shown during the events. The sessions provided a safe and welcoming space to learn what constitutes a hate crime, how to report incidents, and how to access support.


The Elsenham Mothers Union

Enter Elsenham Church and walk towards the altar. Now look to your left and towards the corner of the Church. There you will see, looking all lonely and abandoned, a small flag bearing the initials MU. That, apart from a few photos, is all that is left of the Elsenham Mothers Union. Over time, many vicars have supported the MU, during the time Rev. Brian Green was in the village, his wife, Sheila Green, made that flag.

This Society was started within the Church of England on December 31 1826 and has more than 15,000 branches throughout the World. The Elsenham Branch of this Society had strong ties with our neighbouring villages. Meetings were often held in homes within Henham. This was from the 1970s, although an exact date is not known. They had not only local meetings but the occasional day trip, once visiting our Parliament in London.

Once a large group, the numbers declined. The last was the meeting held within the home of Pat Ackerman at Christmas 1997. It is recorded that in spite of the sadness of the occasion they all had a happy meeting led by their enrolling member, Mrs J. Morphew, with carols and readings and enjoyed a glass of sherry, tea and mince pies. The Vicar, Dick Farr was present and witnessed the closure of the Elsenham Mothers Union.

Our winter lorry was dispatched in mid October and we are now collecting for the April lorry where some of the goods will be given free to nearly 40 needy families in Mărăşeşti (not far from the border with Ukraine) as nominated by the local Baptist church and others by the town mayor, with the better quality ones sold through our charity shop out there with proceeds helping the same poor sections of the population with health, education and improving their terrible housing conditions.

We are now wanting **SUMMER** clothes (shoes must be brand new – new Romanian rules) for adults and **children** (under 3yrs must be new). Single and Z beds with mattresses (sturdy iron or wooden framed beds are very desirable - no divans). Cushions, bed sheets, pillows, duvets and blankets (single and double), towels, toiletries (incl loo rolls), umbrellas and rugs (no carpet offcuts). Bicycles adult and children's and scooters. Building and workshop tools (also some types of gardening tools). Surplus school tables (must be 2ft clearance underneath ie not infant) and stackable adult size chairs (please ask any contact with a local school or village hall who are/maybe re-furbishing - I can arrange collection). Sturdy chest of drawers (not flat pack built as these do not survive the five day truck journey to Romania), bedside cabinets, kitchen/dining tables (either drop-leaf or removable legs) and corner display units. Irons and boards as well as air driers for laundry. Kitchen items (crockery, cutlery, utensils, pots/pans - esp big sizes eg preserving pans). Wheelchairs, crutches, walking sticks, zimmers, Bandages and dressings (absolutely NO pills, medicines or creams). Incontinence pads. Rucksacks and holdalls (must be in good condition). Costume jewellery. Footballs. Ear defenders for the manual workers and high-viz vests/jackets. Small toys such as push-along cars, cuddly soft toys etc (no big toys as these cause much jealousy!). Large plastic storage boxes with lids. Surplus Christmas trees and decorations.

We are especially looking for a pair of identical 2ft 6in wide mattresses (we already have the bases).

Cash donations for the cost of the lorry as it now costs more to send since we must now also clear customs in Rotterdam.

Thought For The Month by Louis Wilson

On the wall of my school hall in Gravesend, there were a few random portraits of old men. They were not exciting, and I never took much notice of them.

But there was one that was different. It was a picture of a much younger man in a blue uniform. To be honest, I didn't pay much attention. It was a relic from a bygone era. I never dreamt of asking what it meant or why it was there.

Years went by, and one day I found myself at the RAF museum at Hendon, in north London. They have Spitfires, Hurricanes, Typhoons, Mustangs, Mosquitoes - but most impressively, a Lancaster bomber.

I started reading about the Lancaster pilots and I read the story of Squadron Leader Robert Palmer. He flew 110 bombing missions. That was an exceptionally high number.

In December 1944, he was leading a daylight attack on marshalling yards in Cologne. It was his job to mark the target. Two of his plane's four engines were set on fire by anti-aircraft shells. But even so, he made a perfect approach and his bombs hit the target before his plane was destroyed.

The article went on to say that Squadron Leader Palmer displayed conspicuous bravery. His record of prolonged and heroic endeavour was said to be beyond praise. And aged just 24, he was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross.

But what really caught my eye was that Robert Palmer was born in north Kent and he attended Gravesend Grammar School for Boys: my old school.

Suddenly I was back in that hall, seeing that portrait. I still had a friend who taught at the Grammar School and I called him that evening. And he confirmed that the picture still hanging in the hall, is a portrait of Squadron Leader Robert Palmer VC, DFC and Bar.

But now the portrait and the man had real significance. Without explanation, he meant nothing to me. But give it explanation and suddenly his life had real meaning. He was brave to the point of death, as so many were. Brave enough to give his life, so that ultimately others could live

Two thousand years ago, another man was brave enough to die a sacrificial death for others. I guess many of us grew up with some knowledge of the Christian story. I did. But for many years it was like the portrait in my school hall: meaningless and insignificant because I never took the time or trouble to find out the explanation.

There is an explanation. Just one verse in the Bible explains: *Romans chapter 5 verse 8*: But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

This November, as we remember Robert Palmer and so many like him, I want to invite you to consider Christ and the death he died, not for his friends, but for his enemies.

We will be marking Remembrance in various ways on the weekend of 8 and 9 November. Do join us.





THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

On a fine September day, I caught an early train to Ware before tackling the longest walk on the Society's website. Station Walk number 18 covers 17 miles (28 kilometres) between Ware Station and Stansted

Mountfitchet Station. Although I walk regularly, it was some years since I last

covered that distance in a day, so I carried a mobile phone just in case.

An advantage of this route is that it heads north for several miles and then turns east, so for much of the way the sun is behind to give the best

After leaving Ware, the route is all in lovely countryside, passing through eight of our hundred parishes: Wareside, Standon, Thundridge, Braughing and Albury in Hertfordshire and then Farnham, Manuden and Stansted Mountfitchet in Essex. Through these parishes, only Standon and Stansted contributed much more than the occasional farmhouse. They, along with Gravesend in Albury, also offered opportunities for refreshment.



The route follows a series of good paths and tracks, rising and falling between river valleys. It passes over the River Lea just after the start, spends several miles along the Rib valley, and crosses the Ash and the Stort.

The journey crosses the Greenwich Meridian, the original route of Roman Stane Street and the former Buntingford railway line. It passes beside Barwick Ford, Standon Lordship, Patmore Heath and Stansted Windmill and there are sightings of distant churches, water towers and much more. But the best views are of unspoilt, rolling countryside and occasional wildlife.

I completed the walk, accompanied for the last six miles by my wife Janice, after lunch in Gravesend. Altogether, a most enjoyable day, and the legs only ached a bit for the next few days! Having completed this challenge, I can return to the many shorter routes on our website.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. TRANSPORT UPDATE

Despite numerous warnings of possible changes to our time table the "Bus Passenger News," of August 31 showed there were no change AS YET to our services.

However, there are proposed changes mentioned at the bottom of the "Local Bus Consultation." This consultation closed on 27 October

The proposed changes which could possibly come into force from November 1 are:

The total withdrawing of the 8.49 early morning bus from Stansted Airport to Bishop's Stortford. The afternoon 3.30 bus would now run at 4.00. All buses after 4.00 would be put forward by 30 minutes. Resulting in the possible withdrawing of the last bus.

In all cases "Stephenson's" (our Bus Operator) say these rarely used buses are uneconomic.

THE SEA BY JOHN BANVILLE

Reviewed by Marion Giles for Elsenham Book Group

"When art historian Max Morden returns to the seaside village where he once spent a childhood holiday, he is both escaping from a recent loss and confronting a distant trauma.

The Grace family had appeared that long-ago summer as if from another world. Mr and Mrs Grace, with their worldly ease and candour, were unlike any adults he had met before. But it was his contemporaries, the Grace twins Myles and Chloe, who most fascinated Max. He grew to know them intricately, even intimately. What happened next would haunt him for the rest of his years, and shape everything that was to follow." So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group this month.

The Amazon Al summarises: Customers find the book brilliantly written with intriguing plotting and emotional truth, with one review describing it as a rapturously written novel of loss and love. Moreover, they appreciate its thought-provoking content, with one review highlighting its insightful reminiscences of childhood, and consider it a worthwhile read. However, the language quality receives mixed feedback, with several customers noting the thick vocabulary, while opinions about the novel's quality are also divided.

The Elsenham book group was formed in October 2003. To celebrate 20 years, in 2023, we read a prize winning book from 20 years ago. We decided to make it a tradition every year so the book chosen for October was the Booker Prizewinning novel of 2005. We read many reviews that described this prize-winning novel: incandescent prose, beautifully textured characterisation and transparent narratives. To be honest, only one of us liked it.

In terms of the prose, adding a simile to every sentence and stuffing it with adjectives and archaic vocabulary became very tedious as the book went on.

In terms of characterisation, it was hard to connect with such a dislikeable person. He was a true misanthrope, unpleasant to others, dismissive of his daughter and full of his ego and academic abilities. He was unnecessarily cruel to animals, which he seemed to believe made him attractive to Chloe.

Lastly, we found the novel long on 'style' and short on story, which was not enough to save it. There is less about the recent loss of his wife and more about the events of a childhood holiday and the effect that place had on him. Of course, he is also mourning his lost friends, his youth, the first taste of love.

Most of us persisted solely for the reveal, but realised we didn't much care. Considering there was so much praise for this book, for us it was like marmite.

COOKERY CORNER

Crumbles are a great all-round family dish, a good way of using gluts of fruits in season, such as apples, plums, rhubarb, blackberries or a mixture of everything! Delicious served with thick cream, crème fraiche, ice cream or Greek yogurt.



THE HUMBLE CRUMBLE (serves 6)

For the crumble topping:

8oz (225g) plain flour 3oz (75g) butter, at room temperature 5oz (150g) soft brown sugar Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas mark 4.

If you have a food processor, place the flour and butter in the bowl, pulse for half a minute until crumbly. Then add the sugar and pulse again briefly until well combined. Otherwise, just mix with your fingertips in a large bowl, flour and butter first, adding the sugar last.

Spiced Apple and Raisin Crumble (serves 6):

2lb (900g) Bramley Apples, peeled, cored and sliced 3oz (75g) raisins
1oz (25g) soft brown sugar
½ teaspoon ground cloves
1 level teaspoon ground cinnamon

Put all the ingredients in a saucepan, sprinkle with a little water, then cook gently until the apples are soft and fluffy. Spoon the mixture into a 3-pint (1.75 litre) pie-dish. Sprinkle with the crumble topping. Cook for 30-40 minutes.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

My favourite crumble is damson and cinnamon: 2lb (900g) damsons, 4oz (110g) demerara sugar and 1 teaspoon of powdered cinnamon.

Also highly recommend rhubarb and ginger: 2lb (900g) rhubarb, 3oz (75g) soft brown sugar and 1 teaspoon powdered ginger, cooked in a saucepan over a gentle heat for 15 minutes before baking.

Dried fruit crumble is also delicious, using a mixture of dried apricots, figs, raisins and prunes, weighing in all about 1lb (450g), soaked overnight with 2oz (50g) demerara sugar in the juice and zest of one large orange, then simmered gently in a pan over a low heat for a few minutes before baking.
