Alana Warwick has resigned from Elsenham Parish Council. The council would like to thank Alana for all the hard work she has given to the village. Alana was the driving force behind setting up the Parish Council's website and foray into social media. Annie Gleeson has kindly agreed to look after the website and social media until December 2020.

The appeal for the outline planning permission for up to 40 new dwellings on land south of Rush Lane has been approved.

The appeal for Stansted Airport planning application is due to start on 10 January 2021, it is scheduled to last ten weeks. Any further representation would have needed to be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate by 30 September 2020. Only new information will be considered.

Residents are reminded that dogs are not allowed anywhere on the playing field or the children's play area. There is an Uttlesford District Council by-law that prohibits dogs on the playing field.

Seven people have shown an interest in joining the Parish Council. There are currently three vacancies. Councillors will meet the candidates, via Zoom, and vote on who they think would be best to fill the current positions on the Council.

District Councillor Petrina Lees, said that Uttlesford District Enforcement Team has now been given permission to go out to assess enforcement issues and Planning Officers can now visit planning application sites. Members of the office staff will not be going back for some time, as Uttlesford Council Offices in Saffron Walden are not conducive with the Government guidelines. Zoom meetings will continue for a minimum of 2-3 months.

Essex County Councillor Ray Gooding reported that schools across the county are now open and children are returning after an extended time at home. If any parent has any concerns about their child returning to school, they must speak with the head teacher.

There are two ash trees on the verge near Abbotsford Bridge on Hall Road, both trees appear to be dying with limbs overhanging the road, the Parish Clerk is to report them to Essex Highways.

The Parish Council ask that residents respect the trees around the village, recently some trees have had limbs broken off.

The next Parish Council meeting will be 5 October 2020, 8pm via Zoom.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT SEPTEMBER 2020

As all of our lives turn back to the new normal, life for us as councillors still finds us conducting all business over the internet via Zoom or other platforms with UDC officers and other members. The newly constituted Local Plan Leadership Group's will give input to Cabinet concerning how the new Local Plan will be formed during the district wide consultations which will be taking place in 2020 – 2022/3.

As you may have seen and heard through the media, planning and housebuilding are now near the top of the Government's agenda. It has just published a White Paper proposing massive reform. There is an enormous amount of detail to convey. We feel, however, that if made law, there will be less scope for community engagement in the planning process, as areas will be "zoned"; one for Growth, one for Renewal and another for Protection. What this means is yet fully to be explained, but early and thorough consultation will be needed with the community to help define the areas/limits of these "zones". In the case of the first two zone types, planning permission for development in them will be automatic or easier respectively to obtain. Consultation on the White Paper runs until 29 October 2020.

At the same time, the Government is **also** consulting (until 1 October 2020) on the housing numbers to be built in each district. The draft requirement for Uttlesford anticipates an annual number of 1,230, UP from about 700 now. This is the highest percentage increase for any district, exceeded only by the requirement for eight London Boroughs. Discussions will be taking place with the Government to challenge these numbers and formal opposition to both consultations will be submitted by Uttlesford, to which we shall both be contributing as Planning Portfolio Holder and Chair of Planning, as well as in our capacities in the Local Plan Leadership Group. Uttlesford has in **each** of the first two decades of this century experienced over 15% growth in housing numbers. The equivalent statistics for Braintree District incidentally are 12% and 4.65%.

We believe that we must lobby our MP regarding the rise in housing numbers allocated to this district, and urge all to write; the failure of the latest Local Plan, was due to the Inspectors finding it unsound and recommended withdrawal, as they could not see any form of "tinkering" saving the proposed plan.

Those that attend the Planning Committee at UDC will note that the committee is diligent, thoughtful and debate exhaustively at times, thus it is disappointing that the Planning Inspector decides to overturn their well thought out reasons for refusal. The Inspectors' decisions are final. There is not an opportunity to readdress. We must continue to respond to consultations and write.

At the recent council meeting, the Water and Rivers Resolution resolved to raise awareness of the threat to Uttlesford's rivers as regards water Cont'd overleaf

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

The appeal against refusal of the outline application for up to 40 homes off Rush Lane was allowed. The applicants will no doubt now sell the land on, and the purchasers will make a detailed application. There won't be new houses built yet awhile, but it will happen.

The Inspector commented that Uttlesford District Council's Local Plan is now 'painfully out of date'. Given that it was scheduled to expire in 2011, he has a point. My crystal ball was obviously in good nick last month, for I commented that the rules as to how a new Plan is produced might well have changed before UDC is ready. The government has now published proposals which amount to tearing up the planning system and starting again. District councils are expected to produce a plan according to the new provisions by the end of 2024. Uttlesford are in a tiz, and are continuing under the existing regime, knowing that the rules will probably be changed radically before a plan is agreed.

As to the changes, it could be argued that the government has pulled a fast one (gasps of incredulity) through publishing two White Papers simultaneously. The first, with the yawn-inducing title 'Planning for the Future', was published with a fair amount of publicity and a reasonably generous deadline for comments of 29 October. It outlines proposals whereby land would be allocated into one of three categories - growth areas, suitable for substantial development; renewal areas, suitable for development, including 'gentle densification' (a phrase to savour) and small sites within or on the edge of villages; protected areas, that is, Green Belt, conservation areas, and so on.

The aim is to speed up the planning process, while also claiming there will be more consultation. But it will not be through the tired old methods of yesteryear - no more posting notices on gate-posts. Instead there are pie-in-the-sky suggestions that the young will be involved through whizzy new apps on smartphones and the like. There is elaborate window-dressing with stuff about standards and beautiful places and neighbours no longer being strangers, though how this will ever be achieved, much less enforced, is a mystery. Apparently there is a need for the planning system to be based on data, not documents, whatever that means.

The document is opaque in parts, but it is crystal clarity itself compared with the second White Paper, which is concerned with housing numbers. As far as Uttlesford is concerned, this is the kicker. It draws on median wages and house prices to determine the need for more 'affordable' housing in each district, and reaches the conclusion that Uttlesford needs about 1,230 new homes per annum, compared with about 700 per annum under the rejected Local Plan. The revised figure is reckoned to be the eighth highest as a proportion of existing dwellings, exceeded only by some London boroughs. The consultation period is much shorter, and expired on 1 October.

Applications and appeals will continue to be decided according to the current legislation. All in all, though, it's good news for developers.



neighbourhood did too! They all got to share the moment with us. Now Max is doing really well, the vets checked him over and just want to see him nice and big again. For all those who have ever lost a pet our message is to never give up on them, there is always hope. We want to express our sincere thanks to everyone for your support. It was truly heart-warming to hear how many of you were keeping an eye out for him for all that time. A well deserved happy ending for everyone in the village.

NATURAL OUTLOOK ON WELSH WATERFOWL

This time last year we were on holiday, based on Anglesey but had decided to spend a day on the mainland. I made some good notes on this trip so this is an account of what we did.

Waiting for a heavy ten-minute shower to cease we set off, passing on the way house martins and pied wagtails.

Our first port of call was the National Trust's Gardd Bodnant or Bodnant Garden. There we found wonderful cultivated beds and plantings and a very, very steep slope to the river Conwy valley and 150-year-old woodlands, natives and imported specimens from all parts of the world. The river was 'managed' by dams and gullies and also the side ponds. On these were a few mallard, a small group of Canada geese, coots, moorhens and a young female red breasted merganser and a mute swan. In other parts of the garden were robins, male blackbirds, wood pigeons and jackdaws.

Then on the way back, via RSPB Conwy, it was very, very windy but dry! Temperatures up to 16C dropping to 14/13C 'back home'. For starters there were male blackbirds, a magpie, sparrows, coots, moorhens, teal (drakes still in eclipse) a couple of pairs of 'tufties' (tufted ducks), one snipe, several gadwall, and a few mallards.



On a small island, there were up to 100 redshank sheltering from the wind, four grey herons, black headed gulls and one herring gull. Then on the 'drained sands' (incoming tide) a little egret, a scattering of curlews and one or two crows. On distant margins of streams, the River Conwy again, black headed gulls, greater black backed gulls, one or two herring gulls and oyster catchers, two or three more redshank and one or two cormorants.

Then, alerted by a disturbance of gulls, Paul saw that a sparrow hawk had landed on a sand bank with a small, unidentifiable kill. She plucked for around ten minutes. The curlews and nearby gulls seemed unconcerned until she took off with the kill. Then the nearest curlew gave chase and harried her way across the estuary till we lost sight of her.

Worry?

My wife and I were really pleased that we had the opportunity to go recently to a holiday cottage in Norfolk with our daughter, who lives with us, and our son and his wife and three children, but this would not be possible now as we would exceed the limit of six people from two households. This pandemic seems to keep going on and on—things relax but then we get more cases and regulations get tighter again. These are not encouraging times and many people are feeling the strain.

Students are getting ready to go to university and people in university towns are concerned about the increase in social contacts. Schoolchildren are going back and having to cope with a very controlled environment after a long time not in school. My oldest grandson, Reuben, is six years old and has started y2. In his church in Fulham, one of the ministers was speaking in an all-age family service. The minister was applying the kids' talk by saying, "Now you might be worried about going back to school but...[and then was to come the application]" to which Reuben audibly replied (with some indignation), "I'm not worried! I just don't want to go!"

Nevertheless, for many, these times are worrying. Some businesses fear for their viability. Many workers fear for their jobs and people are sad and some are anxious because of isolation and the lack of personal contact.

Things are not what they were and people may fear for the future. We can get stressed or anxious when things are out of our control, when we don't know what will happen. This Covid19 pandemic has really shown us all that our lives are fragile. I've heard of 'covid-safe' environments but in reality it is extremely difficult to remove every risk.

Perhaps we just need to recognise our own frailties – worry is not unusual. The issue might be 'what do we do about our worry?' After all, Jesus taught his followers about anxiety in His Sermon on the Mount precisely because we tend to be anxious!

"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" (Matthew. 6:25-27)

Christians are to recognise the loving, sovereign care of God over their lives and "seek first His kingdom and His righteousness" Matthew 6:33.

Christians are not exempt from hardships and suffering but, as the apostle Peter wrote, we should look to God - "Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7).

Do I worry? Yes of course I do! Do I dislike uncertainty? Yes! Do I think this world is out of control? No!

I believe that God is in control and He holds my future in His hands and that if I trust or believe in His Son Jesus then my ultimate future is secure and glorious. One day I will see Jesus face to face but in the meantime God is always with me, in the ups and downs of life by His Spirit. I am His beloved child and He has come close to me through His Son Jesus. What a glorious privilege- what a glorious hope!

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

At our last committee meeting, there was an ad hoc discussion around the fact that there was an Elsenham Road in Grimsby and why this might be. This discussion had, in turn, been sparked by conversation about the mapping of tramways. Our committee meetings are nothing if not far ranging!



The conversation was noted but nothing was done about it until a book by Jane Kidd entitled 'Gilbeys, Wine and Horses' came to light that offered a detailed look at the life of Sir Walter Gilbey and the Gilbey family business. We now learn that Sir Walter put about £500,000 into property between 1888 and 1908, much of it local cottages and farms. On a larger scale however, in 1898, he bought 40 acres of land on the northern edge of Grimsby and developed it as a housing estate called Littlecoates, using street names local to this area, amongst them Stortford, Stansted, Elsenham and Clavering.

I am also aware of an Elsenham Street in Southfields, South West London but don't know how it got its name. It was one of nine streets, known as the "Southfields Grid", given planning permission in 1891 on land then owned by the Wimbledon Park Land Company, but none of the other eight street names appear to have any connection to our locality.

As an aside, this land was originally owned by absentee landlord Earl Spencer who, due to money difficulties, sold it in 1846 to John Beaumont. Mr Beaumont sold the land in 1886 just as the line of a new railway between Wimbledon and Putney Bridge (now part of the District Line) was published thus losing a significant amount of money when the land was compulsorily purchased from the new owners to build the railway The land where the Grid stood was not required by the railway and was sold off to the developers at a discount. Nothing changes!

Some longer standing residents of the village will recall that Willis Toys used to have a factory and warehouse just off Stansted Road, Elsenham on what is now part of Saunders Close. Does anyone have any of these toys that could be photographed or any photographs of the toys or the factory? We would like to produce a feature on this subject so any material would be gratefully received. Our thanks go to Pam and Keith Merrifield who have kindly donated a Willis Jigsaw to start us off; thank you.

We are still collecting material for the "Elsenham Corona Diaries" so if you have any anecdotes, stories, or anything else please let us know

As I write, news of the new "rule of six" is breaking which probably means that we will have a hat-trick of cancelled meetings this year as it is unlikely that the November meeting will take place.

We were due to hear from Ken MacDonald, secretary of the 100 Parishes Society, who was to speak of the work done by the society in celebration of the attractive, gently-undulating area around us, but Ken will now bring this to life at a later date.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

CCTV

Everyone has their views on CCTV. It is used everywhere now for security, and in towns and shops it has helped to identify shoplifters and warn other shops when known persons are in their area.

It is also a good deterrent on your house as a burglar passing your home will think twice if they see a camera. They can also be linked to your phone and trigger an alert if someone approaches your property when you are not there. This can give you peace of mind that your house and pets are being guarded whilst you are out, but please ensure if you put a camera in your back garden you are not overlooking your neighbour's property.

There are many camera models on the market to suit your budget that you can install yourself, or several companies that will install them for you. If you live on your own you can also check on the outside of your house at night, without going out there. To keep the cost right down many people put up a dummy camera on their house; this will also act as a deterrent.

In these strange times we have seen people unable to attend their place of work. Many have been supported by a furlough scheme. Over the years, governments have taken various steps to care for the poor and those unable to work.



The Act for the Relief of the Poor of 1601 made parishes legally responsible for parishioners who could not work. Most assistance was given as "outdoor relief", meaning financial help but with people able to remain in their own homes.

The Workhouse Test Act of 1723 obliged anyone seeking relief to enter a parish workhouse. Several of these buildings have survived including those at Ashdon, Clavering, Finchingfield, Newport and Stanstead Abbotts.

Under the Poor Law Amendment Act of 1834 individual parishes were grouped together in a Poor Law Union which was responsible for constructing and operating a central "Union" workhouse for the larger area. Many survive and have been re-purposed.

Great Dunmow's Union workhouse has changed very little in appearance since it was built in 1838 at a cost of £8,000 to house 350 inmates. One of the architects, George Gilbert Scott was a prolific workhouse designer who later designed the Albert Memorial and St Pancras Station.

The Union workhouse at Buntingford, built in 1836 to house 160 people from 16 surrounding parishes, closed in 1933 and converted into houses and apartments.

Linton built its workhouse in 1837 in Symonds Lane to accommodate 230 inmates. Today it is a retirement home.

Saffron Walden's workhouse, built in 1836 for 340 inmates, became a hospital and is now apartments.

Life in the workhouse was hard; families were split, husbands separated from wives and parents from their children - a stark contrast to today's benefits systems. Ken McDonald, Secretary.

From small rural settlement to rural sprawl

In the 1960s I had a conversation with a farmer as he stood in a field within our village. He was proud of his farming heritage and his fields around Elsenham. It was his hope to go on for many years producing crops. I am sure he was sincere when he told me about the joy looking after the land given to him. He could be forgiven for not knowing what was around the corner.


During the next four decades he or his fellow farmers were to suffer with Swine Fever, Foot and Mouth disease, CJD in his cattle and the worry of Tuberculin testing. The ever-increasing paper work, the Common Agricultural Policy and frequent communication from the Milk Marketing Board. The main thing which finally hits him is that contract from a supermarket. It seems he now produces a crop which he often sells at a loss!

As he approaches his retirement he contemplates selling his land to developers. This is something he never envisaged.

In **1951** the population of Elsenham stood at 598 people. Prior to the main sewer coming to this village, volume building was forbidden. This rule was broken by the construction of Broom Farm Estate in **1965**. This small estate of 54 houses, Elm Close, Osiers, De Mandeville and Broom Farm were built on the site of farm land and Broom Farm House which burnt down in 1965. There were erected with their own sewage disposal system.

In August **1974**, Elsenham is finally connected to the main sewer.

Gold Close, Jenkins Drive, the enterprise centre and the bungalows in New Road were built on Golds Nursery. Alsa Gardens was Butters Nursery

Between the years of **1981** and **1991** our village grows to 1,955 as recorded in the Electoral Roll. We witness the construction of Hunters Court, Maytree Gardens, The Croft, Spencers Close and Hailes Wood. Hailes Wood was built on a field belonging to William Barker owner of the garage. There is a more recent

extension behind the Crown on a field that

had been a hay meadow.

In **1993**, Rush Lane and Leigh Drive are built. The Playing Field, Bowls Club and Leigh Drive were built on a farmer's field. In **1993** the village exceeds 2,000 adults (Electoral Roll numbers exclude under 18s.)

From **1996** to date the following houses have been built and this does not include minor 'infilling:' Orchard Crescent, Isabel Drive, and its many roads built off it. Franklin Drive and Oak Drive and the many roads built off that. Oak Drive was Behren's Nursery. Kingswood Place and Elsenham Vale were farmland.

At a Parish Council meeting, someone remarked that we had enjoyed a good month and NOT received any planning

applications for houses. I had a wry smile; we had almost reached saturation point. There were fewer than around half a dozen fields left to build on. Planning applications received in the last two years have been on those few fields. In August **2020**, Central Government announced the relaxation of planning laws. So, the 'green light' has been given for even more homes.

A further appeal has been heard (September **2020)** and 40 more houses are to be built opposite Rush Lane.

Some blame the UDC for lack of a District Plan. Others attribute blame on Central Government for their continuing Mantra of "Build, Build." I understand why people are attracted to Elsenham. The village has grown from in population from 589 in **1951 to 2,400** in December 2019. These are the latest figures on the Electoral Roll (now out of date), a rise in excess of 400% with NO ROAD INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS.

COOKERY CORNER

Colourful mixed peppercorns give a modern twist to this classic French recipe. Serve with the red wine sauce, potato wedges, French fries or new potatoes and a leafy salad. This recipe is just so quick and easy both to prepare and cook. It makes a lovely weekend special treat, accompanied by the remainder of the bottle of red wine!

STEAK AU POIVRE (serves 4)

- 3 tablespoons mixed peppercorns
- 4 thick fillet steaks, about 5½ oz (160g) each
- 2 tablespoon olive oil
- 14 fl oz (400ml) red wine
- Salt

Crush the peppercorns with a pestle and mortar or the end of a rolling pin. Brush the steaks with 1 tablespoon of the oil, then press the peppercorns around the edge of each steak with your fingers.

Heat the remaining oil in a large heavy-based frying pan over a medium to high heat. Add the steaks and cook for 5-6 minutes, turning once, until cooked.

Transfer the steaks to serving plates and keep warm. Lower the heat and slowly pour the wine into the pan, then add 4fl oz (100ml) of water. Bring to the boil, then cook for 4 minutes or until reduced by half, stirring constantly. Add the salt to taste, spoon the sauce over the steaks and serve.

CHEF'S SUGGESTIONS:

The cooking time will vary depending on the thickness of the steaks, so check that they are cooked to your liking before removing from the pan.

This recipe can easily be halved if there are two of you. Indeed you can make it just for one, if you are eating on your own.

Mushrooms also make a nice accompaniment to these steaks.

Red wine keeps very well in the fridge as long as you remember to take it out of the cold a couple of hours before you plan on drinking!
