Over a year ago, a lorry mounted the pavement in Station Road and hit the streetlight outside the doctor's surgery; the lorry never stopped. The parish council paid UK Power Network to connect the electricity. UK Power Network now want to charge Elsenham Parish Council an extra £1,500 to carry out the work, the reason they give is the work will have to be carried out on a Sunday because of the parked cars near the surgery. UK Power Network could easily make an application to Essex Highways for a permit for a parking restriction on this section of Station Road, but for some reason are reluctant to do this. Cllr. Burlton had made six phone calls, to UK Power Network, but so far, his endeavours have not been successful. The quotation was based on Google Maps, rather than visiting the site, and therefore there was no awareness of the parking issue. It is accepted that the Parish Council has been treated badly. There is a commitment to try and get the work done, and it is accepted that, if managed properly, it will not be necessary for it to be done on a Sunday. The streetlight needs to be working before the dark nights set in.

The Finance Committee recommend that all councillors and the Clerk to have a .gov.uk email address. These emails are reserved specifically for local councils' business and operate to higher standards of security. A grant of £100 is available to assist in the changeover, with the promise of practical operational support.

Elsenham Parish Council regularly receive requests for donations to charities. Many, if not all, are very worthy causes. With limited funds, it is important that the Parish Council supports charities which offer help to residents. If anyone has suggestions of charities, they would like to be considered please contact the Parish Clerk \boxtimes <u>louise.epc@gmail.com</u>

The Parish Council have engaged a solicitor, who specialises in planning matters, to give advice on Uttlesford District Council's refusal to pass onto the Parish Council interest accruing from S106 contributions for the financing of the new Community Centre. This is a considerable amount of money, although the exact amount is unknown as Uttlesford District Council say they do not know the total.

The Parish Council is to send a letter to the Surgery, stating that there are concerns in the local community as to the time taken for prescriptions to become available, it is now five days. The Parish Council would like to know the explanation, whether the deterioration is temporary, and, if so, when will an improved service be restored.

Information is available on Uttlesford District Council's website regarding a scheme to help those who are struggling with Council Tax.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday October 7, starting at 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall.

Uttlesford District Council has extended the deadline for responses to the 'Regulation 19' Local Plan consultation to 14 October. As mentioned here last month, an unexpected proposal is included for 110 new homes adjacent to the 200 already approved to the east of Elsenham Station. It is the only proposal in the entire district for an increase over the 'Regulation 18' proposals - elsewhere, in Newport, Thaxted, Takeley and Great Dunmow, the allocations have been reduced. If you want to object to this dubious procedure, then the Regulation 19 consultation on UDC's website, Chapter 7, Core Policies16 and 17, is the place to do it.

In June 2023 an outline application for 50 new homes to the south of Bedwell Road was allowed by the Planning Inspectorate ('PINS'), following refusal in July 2022 by Uttlesford District Council's Planning Committee. The applicants have decided to apply direct to PINS for detailed approval under the S62A procedure. The Planning Committee now has the status of consultees rather than decision takers, and the members were if anything even more uncomplimentary concerning the application this time than they were previously. The inescapable noise from the M11 is the main issue, and councillors were scathing regarding the proposed solution in the form of three-storey blocks of 'affordable' flats lining the site on that side. One member succinctly commented, 'If you can't afford one of our houses, you can go in that block, and make it more pleasant for those who can buy'.

To the north of Bedwell Road, further uncomplimentary remarks have been made regarding the application by Gladman for 240 homes between the motorway and the railway. This application also proposes three storeys towards the motorway, this time in the form of a line of houses. Uttlesford's Urban Design Officer comments:

The houses forming this barrier will be close together and three storeys high, which will create a long, monotonous and unbroken building line – necessary for acoustic reasons, but potentially not creating a beautiful and attractive place to live.

The applicants' reply to this is that there would be all sorts of measures to alleviate the monotony: landscaping, tree planting, grass verges, block paving, different coloured brickwork, gables, dormers and so on. In short, the whole long line would offer a variety of visual delights such that otherwise unendurable motorway noise would be no more intrusive than the merest whisper in the trees.

Back in February 2023, an application for a 'Wellness Hub' was approved on the Stansted side of the motorway. Nothing was done and the wellness of the residents of Elsenham and Stansted remained in much doubt. Then in October 2023, a porch was added to the front, making for a single point of access rather than three. An application has now been made for dormer windows, with no explanation as to why they are needed, prompting suspicion that it's part of a programme whereby a three -unit facility is transformed by degrees into a two-storey house. The phrase 'development by stealth' seems appropriate.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

You may remember that we recently found evidence that Elsenham did indeed have its own windmill thought to be situated off the Stansted Road on what was once Old Mill Farm. Since then we have located the mill on the 1777 Chapman & Andre map of Essex, and as



surmised, it was found by the Stansted Road. We were told more information was available in Volume 4 of "Essex Windmills and Millwrights" by Ken Farries, a treatise that lists every mill in Essex. We tracked down a copy at the Essex Records Office and Dave Verlander spent several hours going through it but to no avail, he could find no mention of a mill in Elsenham within its pages. We will be investigating this conundrum further, watch this space.



The illustration at left is of Ockendon Mill and dates from around 1900.

Ockenden was a smock mill similar in construction to the mill that stood in Elsenham having six or eight weather boarded sides and topped with a thatched or sometimes tiled roof or cap that rotated to bring the sails into the wind.

Ten years ago come November we published a book entitled 'For the Duration – Elsenham at War'. Containing the fruits of several years' research by a dedicated team, it tells the story of all those from the village who lost their lives in service to their country and are commemorated on our war memorial. Copies of the book are still available at just £5 and may be ordered through our website

<u>www.elsenham-history.co.uk</u>, just click on the publications tab on the left hand side. There may well be other books that interest you there too so do take a look.

All that makes for a rather protracted introduction to our November meeting when Alan Taylor, from the team that produced For The Duration, will be coming along to talk about the aftermath of World War One and maybe an update on For the Duration. The meeting will be on Wednesday 13th November at 8pm in the Memorial Hall. Please come along for an interesting evening, you will be very welcome. As you receive this newsletter, autumn will be here and soon the heating will need to go on. It looks likely that the energy price cap will rise in October. So this is a good time to share some ideas from the E



rise in October. So this is a good time to share some ideas from the Energy Saving Trust, which could potentially save you money and help to save the planet.

Quick fixes to potentially save up to £300 per year on gas and electricity bills

Here is what the Energy Saving Trust calculates that you could save per year:

- Switch off standby: save up to £40

Almost all electrical appliances can be turned off at the plug without upsetting their programming. Check the instructions for any appliances you aren't sure about.

- Draught-proof windows, floors and/or doors: save up to $\pounds70$
- Turn off lights when you're not using them: save up to £7

Replacing halogen light bulbs with LED bulbs could save even more

- Wash at 30 degrees (or less): save up to £22
- Avoid using the tumble dryer: save up to £45

Dry clothes on racks inside where possible or outside when the weather is suitable.

- Take 4-minute showers: save up to £50
- Swap one bath a week for a shower: save £8
- Don't overfill the kettle and fit an aerator on the tap: save up to £26
- Avoid overfilling the kettle and you can save yourself £9.
- An aerator is cheap and easy to install on the tap and could save you £17.

Reduce dishwasher use: save up to ± 11 . This is what can be saved by reducing dishwasher use by one wash per week by only running the dishwasher when it's full.

Top up your hot water insulation: save up to £35. If you have thin spray foam or a loose 25mm jacket, you can benefit from increasing the insulation to a British Standard Jacket (80mm thick).

Have you noticed how much of life is about qualifications? They have become a modern obsession. In a dog eat dog world, it seems that the main way to get ahead is to accumulate letters after your name. I recently read this advert for the Master of Business Administration degree:

The MBA is the world's most popular graduate management degree. Employers love it and students can't get enough of it. Thousands of ambitious professionals apply to different types of MBA program each year.

Having MBA after your name will help you stand out to employers, but the true meaning of the MBA goes beyond three letters on a sheet. During an MBA, you'll build your business knowledge, grow your professional network, and boost your career and salary prospects.

And it only costs about £45,000! The thing about qualifications, whether GCSEs, A levels, degrees or masters is that you have to earn them (or dare I say pay for them). And the harsh truth is, the harder you study (or the more you pay), generally the better you will do.

That's the way the world works but in chapter 1 of his letter to the Colossians, the apostle Paul says that is most certainly not how the Gospel works.

When he uses the word Gospel, he's talking about God's eternal plan by which human beings can have their sins forgiven and be reconciled to the God who made them - a plan that concerns his Son Jesus Christ.

Qualifications are certainly required. But the miraculous truth of the Christian Gospel is that these can never be earned or bought. Qualification can only be given (and received) as a gift. It is God the Father who does the qualifying, not us.

Furthermore, Paul says the way to understand the Gospel is to think of a transfer: a transfer from one team lost in darkness, to a team that is full of light and life - where Jesus is the Captain.

Just over a year ago, Chelsea FC signed the Ecuador midfielder Moises Caicedo from Brighton for a British-record transfer fee of £115 million (it turned out to be very shrewd business on Brighton's part!). But it illustrates the point. Usually, when someone transfers from one team to another, there's a sizeable fee to be paid.

And Paul will confirm that the transfer of the Gospel also involves a fee, but a fee paid in full by Jesus, the eternal Son of God, with his blood shed for us on the cross.

Be absolutely clear, however, this is God the Father's doing. It is he who makes the impossible, possible. It is he who arranges the transfer fee. Qualification is needed, but it is God who does the qualifying.

This undeserved generosity is something the Bible calls grace: God's Riches At Christ's Expense. Anything else is not the Christian Gospel, but something which, however well intentioned, we've made up.

NATURAL OUTLOOK

The weather during the last twelve months has been 'different'; we have had a lot of very wet weather, a number of named storms, gales, February Filldyke, few frosts, little snow, and no real improvement till later in the summer when we got some very warm, well 'hot actually' days towards the end of July and in August. I can't predict I'm afraid, what the next twelve months have got in store! Some things have been early e.g. starlings breeding three weeks



early and our main cotoneaster has not only had its berries red for the last five or six weeks but its small leaves have turned yellow at the same time.

The leaf colours at this time of autumn can be delightful to look at – some three weeks ago some limes were going yellow and other plants e.g. virginia creeper were getting red rims on their dark green leaves. By now the trees and shrubs on a large stretch of the Bishop's Stortford by-pass can usually make a splendid display with the colours varying from greens to red; pink, gold, butter yellow, yellow, lime, purple and deep red, set off by evergreens. Going into Newport there are multi-coloured hedges – so long as not all the berries have been eaten. A good time for a wander in Alsa Wood and the Aubrey Buxton reserve.

Honey fungus is a destructive scavenger, lacking chlorophyll that moves along underground by having a web of parasitic threads killing off the roots of trees. Among the species it kills it has affected several of the well-established oaks in the village including the main oak at the front of DeMandeville Green. Last year its fruiting bodies, its fungus the flat-headed dark brown ones, were late, not appearing till November when usually they and others that I know of fruit in October. I report it annually to the UDC. Here in our 'orchard' it has already killed a mature crab apple tree and by now affected other apple trees and the large mulberry which has been seen to have it for about four years, It also affects part of a row of whitebeams in Station Road, these I have to report to the Essex County Council. I think the fungus will have originated from parts of Alsa Wood where it could still affect some trees.

Some other autumnal signs are sightings of flocks of goldfinches, called charms. I have had charms of 12 or 14 working their way through the garden on the feeders and other things such as delicately picking out the seeds from ripe teasels. The largest charm was one of about forty or more flying across DeMandeville Green and across Station Road to land in the tall, mature silver birch in the garden of Alcuin to feed on its plentiful seeds. Two or three robins developing regular perches and singing in or around trees or hedges in Station Road or New Road and, I guess some other special places,

It's rut time for some deer and Hatfield Forest is often a good place to observe the fallow deer and their goings on. The bucks recognise other bucks that are about the same size as they are and they clash antlers to see which will win the prize of a small herd of does to keep them together to mate with them. The bucks announce their presence with their 'roar' which can be heard a long way off and when satisfied, he'll spend all his time keeping his herd for himself. Outside the mating season the bucks move around in their own herd and the does and their fawns, in theirs.

Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve

In September we cut the meadow areas, removing the vegetation so that the soil does not benefit from the nutrients that this would provide as it decomposes. In this way the soil has reduced nutrient levels, and this favours the wildflowers over the grasses, nettles and other plants that prefer nutrient-rich soils.

It is tricky to get the timing of the cut just right, as some important nectar producing flowers may still be present. With the warmer climate, insect life is also more abundant later in the year.

It is incredible how certain plants have evolved to favour certain species of insect. For instance, the black knapweed produces nectar that is only accessible to long-tongued insects such as butterflies, moths and some bees, whereas the water mint has flowers adapted for short-tongued insects like flies.

Also, bird's foot trefoil, which is an important food plant for our common blue butterfly. Just two minutes watching this patch of flowers in early September revealed three species of butterfly, multiple hover flies, several bee species and a hornet.

One evening in early September we carried out a survey to ascertain what bats we had in the reserve. Using a bat detector at dusk we were able to find good numbers of both common pipistrelle and soprano pipistrelle bats. They were particularly flying over the top pond, which is the pond that clearly supports the greatest number of insects.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Many of the walks on our website provide opportunities to pause and enjoy a panoramic view from a vantage point. The layout of roads, settlements, woods and fields is a visual record of many centuries of human activity.

Checking with an Ordnance Survey map, it is possible to pinpoint significant landmarks and features such as hedged field boundaries. From the 16th century, assorted records of land ownership have survived, but the most complete set of records was gathered by surveyors for the mid-19th century Tithe Awards, a forerunner of today's rating assessments for council tax and business rates.



Standon

Field names are varied, some give just the size in acres while others mention specific persons such as Old Harry's Field. Some are more descriptive such as Hop Ground, Twelve Acre Pasture, Thistley Field, The Rookery, Mill Hill Field, Further Pasture, Ozier Ground and Crab Tree Field.

Comparing these old parish maps with recent maps highlights the significant loss of hedgerows with the creation of much larger fields to allow agricultural machines to work the land.

I am delighted to tell you that we have now awarded the contract to construct the building to a local builder, and work will commence very shortly. The building will contain a lobby, a disabled toilet and a unisex toilet as well as a room with a kitchenette in which we can prepare and serve refreshments. In addition, we will have a toilet accessible from the outside to serve the needs of visitors, allotment holders and others.

All of this, of course, comes at a price. Whereas the building fund has some $\pounds 170,00$ that will leave us with a shortfall of around $\pounds 40,000$. We have made some applications for a grant towards this shortfall, but in the meantime we have arranged a loan so that work can commence.

If you feel that you are able to make a contribution towards the completion of the building we would be most grateful. Please contact one of the Churchwardens, Roger Clark or Charles Willbe, if you would like to assist.

BANANA, MAPLE AND DATE LOAF (8-12 slices)

9oz (250g) overripe bananas (3-4), mashed 8oz (225g) light muscovado sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 large eggs 2fl oz (60ml) maple syrup ½ teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 9oz (250g) self-<u>raising</u> flour 2oz (50g) dates, pitted and finely chopped

Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4. Grease and line a 2lb (900g) loaf tin.

Put all the ingredients into a bowl. Whisk until light and fluffy with an electric whisk or using a free-standing mixer.

Spoon into the loaf tin and level the surface. Bake in the oven for about 1 hour or until well risen and lightly golden.

Leave the cake to cool in the tin for about 15 minutes, then transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

Always use well ripened bananas for this recipe. The cake can be frozen whole or cut into slices. Keeps well in an airtight tin for several days.

Village Greens and Hedges



I would like to comment on the parlous state of the village greens and hedges and hope you will pass my comments on.

I understand that it is the intention of the Council or sub-committees to leave the grass in several areas of the village uncut to 'increase natural habitat and biodiversity'. I'm not sure whose advice has been taken on this but just not cutting the greens will not produce a varied or natural habitat for anyone except the irresponsible dog walkers who do not clear up after their dogs who have used this area as a toilet.

To create a wild area requires the grass to be cut, the ground cleared of grass and then tilled to a fine tilth where seeds can be scattered and grow. This is a labour intensive and expensive option to take and the areas that it happens to need to be carefully selected. If you just want a weedy grass area then look no further than the trim trail for what the village greens will look like in a year or so. It is fine on the trim trail and I have no objection to this being left to grow wild as long as the edges along the pathways are cut.

However the area enclosed by De Mandeville and Oziers, at the junction of Alsa Gardens/New Road and definitely the enclosed area opposite the playground on Isabel Drive, are not the right place. If any of the team have visited these areas recently they will see what scruffy and unkempt places these have become.

We live in a village and even taking into account the substantial increase in our housing and population, we have vast tracts of countryside around us full of natural habitat and biodiversity. I have lived here for 46 years and have never seen our village looking in such poor condition. Please don't make this village look an unkempt place where people don't care what their surroundings look like because, if you listen to the villagers, they actually do. Please spend the money that you collect from us in Council Tax to do the job we pay for - cutting the common grass areas.

'The Barnes family are in trouble. Until recently they ran the biggest business in town, now they're teetering on the brink of bankruptcy – and that's just the start of their problems. Dickie and Imelda's marriage is hanging by a thread; straight-A student Cass is careening off the rails; PJ is hopelessly in debt to the school bully. Meanwhile the ghosts of old mistakes are rising out of the past to meet them, but everyone's too wrapped up in the present to see the danger looming ...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group last month. One person really liked it, some found it ok, some found it hard-going and some positively disliked it.

The story is set in a small town in Ireland, about two hours' drive from Dublin. Imelda was originally engaged to Frank, Dickie's brother, but he died. Through their grief they sought comfort from each other resulting in Imelda's pregnancy. They go ahead with the marriage, but it is not really what they wanted for themselves. Dickie inherits his father's business but it doesn't run smoothly. Frank was a troubled soul, Imelda's family are thugs and there is jealousy from other business owners. Cass's friend is unpleasant and Cass's obsession with her is a bit sad. PJ is left to himself to play video games and be unwittingly groomed on the internet. No-one is happy at any point in the story and when you add in the blackmail, domestic violence, drugs, alcohol abuse, infidelity, lies, issues of class and prejudice and at least two major characters struggling with their sexuality—it is not a feel-good read and at 656 pages it's a lot of misery.

I looked at an AI generated summary of reviews by purchasers on Amazon. This is the AI summary:

'Customers find the book very readable and brilliantly told. However, some find the punctuation odd and off-putting. Opinions are mixed on the story quality, character development and emotional content. Some find the story engaging and fantastic, while others say it's frustrating and unbelievable. '

Apart from the first sentence, that was our conclusion. We couldn't find empathy with any of the characters, apart from PJ. The chapters alternate between characters and punctuation decisions are intended to reflect their characters— however, there are no speech marks throughout, meaning we have to distinguish between thought and dialogue; some chapters have no punctuation at all and the chapters veer between the second and third person. The story drags in the middle but picks up at the end towards a fantastic conclusion—sadly, we don't know what it is as the book just finishes. Emperor's new clothes, maybe?
