Elsenham Parish Council

Within Uttlesford District Council's Local Plan Regulation 18, it had stated explicitly that there would be no more housing allocations to Elsenham, because the village has already had over 1,500 new houses. Yet in Regulation 19 there is a proposal for 110 dwellings, plus educational provision, close to the Elsenham parish boundary. Elsenham Parish Council held a meeting with Uttlesford District Council to ask why the additional 110 houses had been added. We were told the additional development at Elsenham was identified to help enable the provision of a primary school and an early years' facility. Bloor Homes could build another 110 houses if they provided land for a primary school. We pointed out there was already provisions for a primary school on Bloor Homes phase 1 development, and further provisions on the Vistry development on Hall Road. Essex County Council do not seem in any hurry to utilise either of these provisions. Elsenham Parish Council will continue to object to any more houses.

The traffic feasibility study taken by Essex Highways on Grove Hill has now been published. It shows the proposed changes to direct large vehicles, over the weight restriction, away from Grove Hill and through Takeley is not feasible. Going up Grove Hill, where there is a weight limit, the study shows 1.5% of the traffic flow was over that limit, while going down Grove Hill where there is no weight limit, the study shown 2.5% of the traffic flow, the study therefore showed the weight restrictions are working. The 1.5% going up could be the buses and authorised local delivery vehicles. The other issue is that Takeley already has too many large vehicles going through their village.

The Parish Council received 39 tenders from architects to design the new community centre. The appraisers now must assess each one. A meeting is arranged for September 7 to whittle down the 39 to a short list of four or five, who will then be interviewed.

Essex County Council provide financial support to approximately 15% of local Bus Services within Essex. The remaining 85% are run by bus operators at a profit. Following recent tender negotiations some services have been withdrawn or revised and others have different operators. There have been no changes to the 7 & 7A Bus services which operate within Elsenham, hopefully this means there will be no changes for the foreseeable future.

A resident complained about the water pressure in the village. There are times during the day when they do not have enough water to shower or flush their toilet. The resident had contacted Affinity Water many times, but the company said that nobody else had complained, so are doing nothing about it. If other residents are having similar problems, they may want to also contact the water company. If Affinity Water know it is a general problem and not an isolated issue, they may start to help improve the water pressure.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday September 2, starting at 7.45pm in the Memorial Hall.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

The Regulation ('Reg') 19 Local Plan consultation has now been published, and runs until 3 October. The headline is that, despite assurances in Reg 18, a further 110 homes are proposed, together with educational provision, adjacent to the approved site for 200 (Bloor 'Phase 2'), itself adjacent to 350 under construction off Henham Road (Bloor 'Phase 1', with the curious name 'Elsenham Park').

It has been claimed that the development is justified because it will mean new early year's provision, which the village badly needs. But two sites have already been allocated. The first is very handily placed immediately to the south of Elsenham primary school. The other is on the Bloor Phase 1 site. There is no explanation as to why Essex CC has not taken up the option on either of these sites. There have been repeated earnest assurances that the Local Plan proposals are 'evidence-led'. UDC has been asked for the evidence justifying yet more educational provision, and a response is still awaited.

It's proposed that there should be 110 houses next to the new educational facility. They are not needed in order to 'top up' the numbers and thus make a new school viable. UDC has been candid in saying that the extra allocation is a 'quid pro quo' to the developer in return for making the educational land available, since the alternative would be compulsory purchase. In other words, the developer decides the terms on which the infrastructure shall be provided, and the need for the infrastructure has not been given.

Then there's the question of another shop. Elsenham is shockingly under-provided considering its burgeoning size. UDC are reportedly sympathetic - but nothing is included. Presumably if it is forthcoming at some future time, it will be on the basis of another 'quid pro quo' whereby the nod is given to the developer for yet more houses in return for making land available.

The proposed 110 houses are on the Henham side of the parish boundary. But Henham PC has been told that they won't count towards their allocation, since UDC will in future appraise by 'settlement' rather than by 'parish', and the area is reckoned to be in Elsenham settlement. This change was suggested by about five parishes in the Reg 18 responses, responding to a question which wasn't asked, and UDC readily agreed, without bothering to consult the other 45 or so parishes, or highlighting it amongst the many hundreds of pages which inevitably received no detailed consideration through UDC's various committees, or making it explicit in the Reg 19 proposals. There's nothing to show where the settlement boundary is considered to lie - if you want to know, you have to ask Uttlesford. It's a rum old way of introducing a radical new policy.

New to Reg 19 is the combining of Elsenham with Stansted as a new Area, in order to demonstrate the innovations in infrastructure - but close examination shows that the improvements, such as they are, are in Stansted rather than Elsenham.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

Visiting the surgery in July, I was struck by the snazzy new sign announcing that this was now the Elsenham branch of the Peacock Surgery. Prior to this, since it was built in 1989, it had been known as the Daisy Surgery as stated on the stone cartouche to the right of the main doors. But why the Daisy?



Daisy was Daisy Saunders, the daughter of Harry Saunders, the local baker whose premises were in Robin Hood Road down a short drive opposite today's Saunders Close. There is still a property there called "The Old Bakery". Daisy had a sister Ivy and when the Saunders family left Elsenham around 1945, Ivy moved to Sunderland and Daisy moved to Clacton. Later on, Daisy married Edward Oliver Robinson of the Elsenham Builders family. A Miss Waterman lived in "Hollydene" in Station Road, and she bequeathed the property and the adjacent plot of land to Edward Robinson (known to some as Ted). It was upon this plot of land that the Daisy now stands. Edward Robinson made the land available to build the surgery and stipulated that it should be known as "The Daisy" in memory of his wife.

Thanks go to Gordon Barker, the Robinson family and Chris Bush for the above information.

The first doctor to practise in the village was Dr Emil Leigh who set up a surgery at Crossways on Station Road whilst maintaining another surgery in Church Street Bishop's Stortford. He worked in a very traditional manner seeing all patients personally making him a very busy man although the then population was very small compared to now. He employed no nurses or receptionists at either surgery but still found time to act as anaesthetist for a Mr Catchpole, a dentist in 'Stortford. Both Doctor and Mrs Leigh showed great generosity to Elsenham when resident, donating part of their extensive garden to provide the pedestrian access to the playing field. It is difficult to imagine just how extensive their grounds were, another property was erected on Mrs Leigh's large lawn, once home to the village fete.

Our next meeting will be held on Wednesday 11th September at 8pm in the Memorial Hall when our speaker will be Alex Froggatt from Sworders Auction House. He is a specialist in glass and his talk will be based around Antique Glass, discussing what interests collectors and why. He will talk about 18th century drinking habits and introduce the glass making centres of the period. This talk is a little different from our normal presentations but should prove to be an interesting evening nonetheless. Please do come along and see for yourself what we are doing. You will be very welcome.

Visitors are always welcome at our meetings for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership costs just five pounds for a full year's meetings.

EXCITING NEWS!



We have some excellent news to share: We have been offered a piece of land by Elsenham Parish Council (EPC) to develop into a wildflower area.

The land in question is the current "sitting" area on Isabel Drive, opposite the children's play area.

We hope to work in collaboration with EPC and the residents of Kingswood Place to turn this currently rather neglected-looking space into a peaceful community haven for humans and a thriving diverse habitat for vital pollinating insects.

David Attenborough says "Every space in Britain must be used to help wildlife".

A staggering 97% of wildflower meadows have been lost in recent decades and since 1970 the abundance of insects has decreased by 50% (source: www.somersetwildlife.org "Insect declines and why they matter".).

The wildlife is not only valuable for its own sake; approximately three quarters of the crop types grown by humans require pollination by insects.

It is therefore imperative, if we are to have a sustainable future, that we try to replace these lost areas which support wildlife.

We are therefore delighted that EPC have given us the opportunity to work with them and with local residents to develop a community space which not only supports wildlife but is also a beautiful and restful community space for local people.

This project is very much in its infancy but we'll keep you in touch with progress as it unfolds. Essex & Witches

Today, when we think of witches, we think about old hags & black cats. Four hundred years ago, Witchcraft was rife around the country, hundreds of women and a few men were to be executed.

This all began in North Berwick, Scotland in 1590 on All Hallows Night. A few women gathered within an old Church drinking and making merry. That same night King James of Scotland was returning by sea from Denmark. His ship caught in a storm was sunk, he was lucky to get out alive. Those women were blamed as witches for causing that storm and were summarily executed. King James was to produce a pamphlet which began the Witch trials across the entire country.

Things would change somewhat when the witch trials came to Essex, for change they did. In rural communities if your cattle died or your crop failed it was not uncommon to blame witchcraft. Indeed, pretty much anything that befell a person could be, and frequently was, blamed on witches.

There were more convicted witches in Essex than any other county. We had our own" Old Mother Redcap" a herbalist who lived in Pledgon Wood. In Stansted, to the rear of "The Dog and Duck" public house, we find a small road called "Galls End". Many believe this is a corruption from "Gallows End," It is believed that near there once stood gallows and we know what they were used for. Four witches came from Elsenham. The last was Deborah Navlor who was executed in 1650.

I do not believe in witches. BUT just to be on the safe side I have been told putting a line of salt across the door way keeps them out and garlic wards off vampires...... SWEET DREAMS

As I write this, I was very sad to learn of the death of Graham Thorpe, a great cricketer who played 100 Tests for England between 1993 and 2005. Those were pretty difficult years to follow the England team! But his obituary described him as a world-class lefthanded batter in a struggling side and a key player in the upturn that followed.

A bit over 100 years before Thorpe made his test debut, there was no doubt about the most famous cricketer in Britain. It was Charles Thomas Studd – known always and forever as CT Studd: he was four times a Cambridge blue, Captain of Cambridge University, and played test cricket for England at the age of 21.

For two years running, he was the best all-round cricketer in the world: batting, bowling, fielding – he was outstanding in every department. At the same time, he was a serious Christian, but there was no doubt that he lived chiefly for cricket, not Christ.

But that changed in 1884, when he attended a meeting of a small charity called the China Inland Mission and heard about the vastness of the spiritual need in China. He had already begun to hear the call to whole-hearted and sacrificial service, and he knew that night that China was where Christ was calling him to serve.

It broke his mother's heart to see him go, but in February 1885, with 6 other Cambridge graduates, he sailed to China. He never played cricket again.

Before he left, he said: I want to

recommend to you tonight my Master. I have tried many ways of pleasure in my time; I have been running after the best master – and thank God, I have found him.

In 1887, he inherited £29,000 from his father – over £2 million in today's money - but immediately gave £20,000 away to four Christian missions.

He asked his wife to be: What shall we do with the rest? What did Jesus tell the rich young man to do? She replied. Sell all he had. Well, let's give it all away, she said, and start clear with the Lord at our wedding.

He spent the rest of his life as a pioneering missionary in China and Africa and died in 1931.

In Romans 12, verse 1, the apostle Paul says: Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God —this is your true and proper worship.

It is an urgent, grace-motivated call to sacrificial living. But you don't have to be a CT Studd to do this. Another famous missionary to China, Hudson Taylor once said: God's giants have been weak men who did great things for God because they reckoned on His being with them.

Sacrifice is not necessarily heroic and unattainable. It is often mundane and totally unglamorous. Sacrifice is simply a call to be wholehearted for God, but it always flows out of what God in Christ has first done for us: his grace and his mercy.

NATURAL OUTLOOK

Three years ago, in August we had a heatwave of 5 days; the first day gave our parked car a temperature of 33 degrees C and even the wasps were thirsty! The day after it ended, storms started, heavy long-lasting downpours with thunder and lightning. The next was storm Francis in late August and then another awful downpour late in September with more rain and gale force winds



for two days. In 2021 it was different – better days for the official start to Autumn, just the odd thunder storm. In 2022 we had a lot of heavy showers for starters, one gave us a spectacular rainbow stretching from Elsenham Vale to New Road and then some cold, strong winds. Last year was different again, more morning mists leading to the hottest day for the year so far! This was complicated by Saharan dust for a day or two and then some cold north winds and being very wet. I'll leave you to guess what climate change might do for us this year!

The mild winter and the wet start to the year seemed to have started early breeding for some birds; e.g. starlings were out of their nests about three weeks earlier than I expected, arriving with the adults, on 24th May, being fed initially then becoming independent sooner. For the first time we seem to have had rooks, jackdaws and magpies breeding much closer. So, when their broods had fledged from early May they descended first of all to our front garden and ate most of the bird food put out for the 'usuals', sparrows, dunnocks, blackbirds etc. I stopped the fat balls so the young corvids and their adults went to the back garden and fed there where some of the feeding tubes let them. Eventually I managed to get them to spend more time in the fields and leave the usual birds, including the greater spotted woodpeckers, to enjoy their preferred foods. Last year when we went to Cavenham Heath to see the stone curlews, the 'Marty Feldman look-a-likes of the bird world', before they took off to winter in warmer climes - we only saw one and this was because two kind birdwatchers showed us on their binoculars where one was sitting crouched in the heather. This year we'll go earlier.

The up and downs of the weather so far i.e. including the cold start to June, rain in the first half of July and then, at last, some much warmer spells, has led to an absence of butterflies because the patches of poor weather have killed off some of the overwintering ones as well as eggs and caterpillars, a great shame. Last year we did have 14 different species in July, 10 in August and 5 and a moth in September. This year there were 11 species in July but were few in number of each e.g. 1 comma, and just 2 ringlets; large whites were about and stayed, two small purple and gold moths and 1 white plume moth, a red admiral and 2 or 3 meadow browns but a sudden almost explosion of gatekeepers which were about in July and August might last into September yet! But will they return next year? Plants, however, have tended to cope with the changing climate and not many succumb to the winter weather.

I now wait to see which birds have gone and which will come to spend the winter here!

Summer is a quieter time for the volunteer group as we leave nature to its own devices before we start again in autumn with the cutting of the meadows. However, one job that we do undertake is control of the himalayan balsam. This plant can grow to over head height and is able to tolerate low light levels allowing it to grow in the more shaded and less accessible areas of the reserve. It produces pink flowers that add a splash of colour and are a good source of nectar for insects such as bees that can penetrate the helmet shaped flowers. The problem with the himalayan balsam is that it grows quickly and shades out other, native species. Each plant can produce up to 800 seeds and has the amazing ability to shoot these seeds up to 7 metres. If left unchecked it would dominate significant areas of the reserve.

As we don't use chemical or biological controls in the reserve the only solution is to pull up each plant before it sets seed. In this way we are gradually reducing the numbers of this plant in the reserve even if a lack of control on neighboring properties means that we are unlikely to ever completely eradicate this plant. I must thank the volunteers who turn out every year to help get this done.

Now that the woods are quieter it is a good time to appreciate the meadow areas, which on a sunny afternoon are busy with bees, butterflies, dragonflies and other insects.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY By Ken McDonald, Secretary 🗥 www.hundredparishes.org.uk

The Hundred Parishes has an exceptional depth of ancient buildings. More than 6,000 are "listed", meaning that they appear on the National Heritage List for England. Each property listing includes a description and many of these descriptions take their text from the guidebooks produced by one exceptional man, Nikolaus Pevsner.

Pevsner, an architectural historian, was born in 1902 in Leipzig, Germany, the son of a Russian-Jewish fur merchant. In 1933 he moved to England and settled in Hampshire. Following the

outbreak of World War II, he was taken to an internment camp but was released three months later

Work on his series of architectural guidebooks, The Buildings of England, began in 1945. The edition covering the whole of Hertfordshire was published in 1953; Essex and Cambridgeshire followed in 1954.

> Most of the ancient architecture in The Hundred Parishes is mentioned by Pevsner in these three editions, either in general terms or in great detail. One example in Essex is Manuden, which he describes as follows: "Manuden has a specially pretty, short village street with timber framed cottages with oversailing upper floors near the church and a small assortment of

Georgian houses a little further west".

In Cambridgeshire, he described the Norman interior of Ickleton's parish church as having few equals in the country.

In Hertfordshire, the 17th-century almshouses in Buntingford were described by Pevsner as "the stateliest almshouses in the county".

> Nikolaus Pevsner was granted British citizenship in 1946, appointed CBE in 1953 and knighted in 1969 "for services to art and architecture". In total, he was responsible for 46 county-wide guides. He died in Hampstead, London in 1983.

The website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has more than a hundred walk routes that can be freely downloaded. The

route descriptions draw attention to some of the listed buildings that are passed.

The Hundred Parishes is 450 square miles of northwest Essex, northeast Hertfordshire and southern Cambridgeshire that is largely unspoilt and is richly endowed with many fine examples of agricultural and built heritage The area has shared a common history which shaped and preserved its distinctive landscape of small and medium-sized farms linked by winding lanes and ancient rights of way to hamlets, villages and then to small market towns. SLOW COOKER CAMPFIRE STEW (serves 6)

1 large onion, sliced 3 cloves garlic, sliced 400g tin chopped tomatoes 2 x 415g tins baked beans 2 tablespoons tomato puree 2 teaspoons ground cumin 4 teaspoons sweet smoked paprika ½ teaspoon mild chilli powder 3 tablespoons Worcester sauce 600g gammon joint, fat layer cut off 2 green peppers, sliced

Put all the ingredients (except the peppers) into the slow cooker.

Cook on HIGH for 6 hours or LOW for 8 hours.

When the stew is cooked, microwave the peppers for 3-4 minutes until just soft.

Take the meat out of the slow cooker pot and shred. Add the green peppers to the bean sauce mixture. Stir everything well and serve.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: If you don't have a slow cooker, cook casserole in the oven at 160°C/fan 140°C/gas mark 3 for about 2 hours or until the meat is soft and tender. You can add the peppers to the slow cooker ingredients about an hour before serving.

'Three women, five centuries, one spellbinding story In the present day, Kate flees a traumatic relationship to the Cumbrian cottage she inherited from her great-aunt; but the cottage hides secrets of its own.

In 1942, Violet rebels against her father's ideas of a 'proper young lady'... until he takes matters into his own hands. In 1619, Altha is on trial for witchcraft, implicated in the gruesome death of a local man.



Three women they tried to cage – but Weyward women belong to the wild. And they cannot be tamed...' So says the blurb on the back of the book.

"An entertaining read." The Times

This was the choice of the book group last month. It is a fair point to make that the chooser this month was attracted to the cover.

The first story concerns Altha who has an understanding of the Weyward women's gift - the ability to harness the power of nature for good. Altha was brought up by a mother who saw things turning against women (for example Pendle witch trials). Altha and her mother provide alternative herbal treatments to those made by doctors. Altha is on trial accused of witchcraft, after the death of a neighbour, the husband of a woman she knew.

Violet is a young girl who leads a very sheltered life. brought up by her father following her mother's death, Violet is home schooled and her natural curiosity towards nature is curbed by her father's control. Everything she loves goes against her father's wishes. There is an incident with a family member that shapes the rest of her life. Her brother, Graham, is the only positive support.

Kate's is the modern story. She doesn't know anything about her ancestors. She is haunted by a childhood incident with her father and later as an adult finds herself in an abusive relationship. She inherits Violet's cottage and flees to escape her partner. She finds peace and sanctuary in Violet's cottage and gradually starts to learn about Altha and Violet and her family.

There is much male dominance and misogyny that unites the three women as nothing much changes through the centuries. The story is not told in a linear fashion but switches between the three stories—a good ploy to keep one reading. We agreed that Violet's story was the most interesting; we didn't learn anything new from Altha's story and Kate's was very predictable and things come together in a very convenient way.

We had a good discussion and no one disliked the easy to read book. However, we considered it significant that Emilia Hart is a graduate of Creative's Three Month Online Novel Writing Course. You will have to make up your own mind.
