ELSENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 4 AUGUST

Residents have complained about the speeding on Stansted Road. Vehicles travel from a 60mph road straight onto a 30mph road.

County Cllr. Gooding reported that there was a proposal to have a 40mph buffer zone on the Stansted Road, which was included within the work schedule for the Local Highways Panel. However, the

Local Highways Panel is no longer looking at new schemes because they would be unlikely to be completed prior to the implementation of Local Government Reform. Cllr. Gooding said that therefore he was looking at alternative ways that this could be funded.

The SERP (Safer Essex Roads Partnership) wants to identify villages that support a 20mph speed limit. Community backing from most residents is essential.

Co-opted member, Mrs Moyra Jackson, was elected as the Chair of the Allotments Committee. It had been agreed at the allotment meeting that there was no justification to increase the allotment fees for 2026/27.

A Public Consultation on Supporting Local Bus Services is currently available. Details and the consultation link can be found on Elsenham Parish Council's website and Facebook page. Participation from as many individuals as possible is encouraged.

The Parish Clerk announced her retirement from both the Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer roles, submitting her resignation to the Chair. Although required to give one month's notice, she will remain until year-end, or a replacement is found. The Chair thanked her on behalf of the Council for fourteen years of service and for her willingness to stay if needed.

A resident requested EPC's support for double yellow lines at Hailes Wood. After consideration, EPC declined, noting that many residents park on the road outside their homes and would likely oppose double yellow lines.

Small electrical items may soon be able to be left with the waste bins to be collected by Uttlesford District Council.

The next Parish Council meeting is September 1 in The Memorial Hall at 7.45pm.

DEVELOPMENT DEVELOPMENTS

There has been a nasty rash of applications over several years regarding May Walk, just over the parish boundary in Stansted. In June this year, a proposal was refused by Uttlesford District Council for change of use of an existing store and workshop into a three-bedroom dwelling. Access from May Walk was a reason for refusal. A month later, a new application was lodged, amended to give access direct from Elsenham Road. It is claimed that the previous objections have thereby been met, but that must be wrong. There were three other grounds for refusal: poor location resulting in excessive use of the private car; harmful impact on the countryside; impact on the B1051.

The application could serve as a case study of the methods whereby the area is converted, little by little, into an extensive development. First, consent was gained for an 'animal shelter'; then it was found that there was a curious shortage of animals needing shelter and it was converted and extended into a 'workshop and equipment store'; now it is discovered that in fact there is no demand for such a store; but, by happy coincidence, the building can readily be converted into a three-bedroom house.

Early in June, an application by the same outfit for a self-build bungalow elsewhere on the site was refused on similar grounds. A month later, an appeal was lodged, and then another application was made, with no discernible difference from the original. Presumably the idea is that if one fails, they get a second chance, but the double application must surely be an abuse of the system.

Second applications have been made recently in this general area regarding the 'Wellness Hub', which can be seen, an empty husk lurking through the trees, near the junction of May Walk with Stansted Road. Proposals for an extension to the building and for changing rooms were both refused. Submissions have now been made for what seem to be identical applications, without mentioning the previous refusals. Presumably they are hoping that UDC are not paying attention.

Elsewhere just over the parish boundary, in Henham this time, an application for seven homes to the west of Old Mead Road north of the last existing house was approved in May last year, but it was not taken further. An application to build nine on the same site has now been made, no doubt on the principle that if this is refused, they can fall back on the permission already granted.

Planning officers are a rare breed with a nationwide shortage, and their time is ill-spared on tactics such as these.

The application for detailed approval of 40 new homes off Robin Hood Road has been delayed again, this time so that the developers can answer objections from transport and ecology. It is not known at the time of writing whether the application will be before UDC's Planning Committee on 27 August. If not, it will happen some time, whenever the applicants finally get their act together.

ELSENHAM VILLAGE HISTORY SOCIETY

We are always finding new information that adds to the story of Elsenham. The latest snippet refers to the railway. As has already been written in previous articles, when the railway through Elsenham was opened in 1845, Elsenham Station was sited in Fullers End at the bottom of Robin Hood Road. There were problems however as the station was built on a steep gradient and trains heading north to Cambridge often had a problem starting. It wasn't unknown either in the early days for trains to slip backwards due to the relatively poor brakes then available. Because of this it was thought that the present Elsenham Station was then built in its present position, on the level, a half mile or so north at the summit of the climb from Stansted. As an aside it should be noted that the level crossing marks the highest point on the line between London and Kings Lynn; to the south the Thames Valley, to the north the Cam Valley and The Fens.

New information now suggests that the present station was there when the line was built and known as Henham or, as sometimes noted in contemporary minutes, Upper Elsenham Station. You may think it is some distance from Henham village but the railways have a strong tradition of building stations far from the communities they serve! Anyway, on with the tale. Because of the problems starting trains from Elsenham, the first station was closed six or seven months after the line first opened in July 1845 and Henham Station became Elsenham. The original station building became a crossing keeper's lodge until it was demolished in 1976.

Much under discussion at present is the state of the new footpath that will connect the station to the Elsenham Park development and the Henham Road on the east side of the railway. This is not the first access to the station from that side as in 1895 Sir Walter Gilbey built Park Road off the High Street. About half way up he installed a set of gates and built a road up to the station known as Park Lane allowing him a fast, direct route from Elsenham Hall to the station. Once there he would step up to the platform and into the waiting room on platform one. The waiting room is equipped with a substantial canopy that prior to the electrification of the line in 1987 stretched out over the rails thus ensuring that Sir Walter didn't get wet boarding his train when it was raining. Nothing has been said about how he managed when he got off the train from London on platform two.

As you read this, hot off the press, we will be just a few days away from our next meeting on Wednesday 10th September at 8pm in the Memorial Hall. Our speaker for the evening will be Chris Bush who has kindly agreed to speak to us about "Listed Elsenham" the story of some of the older buildings at Elsenham's heart. Visitors are always welcome at our meetings for a very modest two pounds but even better, membership still costs just five pounds for a full year's meetings.



The highlight of our month, if not our year so far, was our Garden Party (picture below).



Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

In July, Uttlesford District Councillors visited the bin lorry depot in Little Canfield to get an update from the UDC and Essex County Council environmental services teams. These teams handle our rubbish and recycling across the area.

Did you know that householders have been expected to keep their doorsteps clear of rubbish since 1297, in London if not here. 'It wasn't until 1297 before London's first law relating to waste removal was introduced; the act required householders to clear any refuse from the front of their house. However, legislators failed to take any real action and without an organised rubbish removal service in place the law was for the most part ignored. However, this ignorant attitude would have a devastating effect on the people of London in 1348. This was the year the Black Death struck, killing half of the population, and the ease with which it spread was a direct consequence of the capital's filthy living conditions.' Article by Alessandro Maccioni, April 2014. Lack of enforcement is nothing new!

But proper waste rules only came in during the 19th century. Today, UDC has a legal duty to collect and manage our waste, and new "Simpler Recycling" rules, introduced in 2024, will raise standards even higher. This is the scale of the challenge:

- Essex produces about 660,000 tonnes of waste each year, costing £130 million to collect and recycle. That's around 440 kg and £84 per person.
- In Uttlesford, we create 35,000 tonnes a year, costing £3.2 million (£77 per household).
- We recycle about 49% of this, including 9,100 tonnes of paper, glass, and metals, plus 6,400 tonnes of food and garden waste.

If all of us put our waste in the correct bins the recycling rate could be over 80%. How do we compare? Out of nearly 340 councils in England, Uttlesford ranks 82nd, which is not bad, but leaves room to improve. Top recyclers like St Albans reach 64%, while the lowest are in the mid-20s.

We have a big opportunity: a lot of food waste still ends up in black bins, often still wrapped in packaging, which means it can't be recycled. If you remove the packaging and use the food caddy instead, it can be turned into biogas (to make electricity and heat) and fertiliser.

Uttlesford was the first district to adopt the Essex Waste Strategy, which aims to reuse, recycle, or compost 65% of waste by 2035. The use of landfill for non-recyclable waste has just ended. It is now incinerated at Rivenhall, near Witham.



ELSENHAM ALLOTMENTS

The exact year that allotments were made available within the village is unknown. Elsenham's oldest residents do however tell of their parents talking about visiting the family allotments.

From this and other information it is apparent they were certainly present in Elsenham prior to World War One. There was also an allotment site at Tye Green. This existed at the beginning of the 1900s, being disposed of in 1950.

A piece of land in the middle of the village ran adjacent to the railway, access being made from the High Street. The usage was great, much of the large area being cultivated. This site was sold in 1970. The Glebe land, property of the Church, became Glebe End Estate. A further allotment site was created to the rear of Mill Close.

The 1970 site was much smaller than its predecessor but, even then, not all plots were taken. This area would remain available for only 23 years, then came the next move.

In 1993, to make way for the construction of Rush Lane, a new location was found in what had been the walled garden adjacent to Elsenham Hall. There are still allotments on that site.

Ray A large allotment site was further created in about 2011/12 next to the M11. It is adjacent to the "Crest Nicholson"

development off Stansted Road. A very large site, it incorporates in excess of 60

plots.

Thought For The Month by Louis Wilson

As reported in August's magazine, we have been joined in the benefice by Pete Tibbott and his family. Pete will be ordained as Curate in a special service at Chelmsford Cathedral at 4.30 pm on Sunday 14 September.

I myself was ordained at Gloucester Cathedral 16 years ago.

But this is nothing compared to Angus MacLeay (Rector of my old church - St. Nicholas, Sevenoaks) who was ordained 37 years ago this summer. He recently gave three reflections on his many years of ordained ministry:

First, he said, being ordained had been an incredible **privilege**. To be set apart to handle God's word week by week is a remarkable thing which he has tried not to take for granted. Yet at the same time, the opportunity to enter into people's homes and lives and listen to a whole range of concerns has also been a remarkable privilege. To be entrusted with walking alongside others in their grief, pain or sadness, as well as their joys, is very precious.

Further it is wonderful to be allocated a front row seat to see God at work in the lives of countless individuals, either coming to a personal faith in Christ, growing in Him or launching into active service for the Lord. And what a privilege it continues to be to serve the living God and His people!

Second, his personal experiences in ministry had reinforced his understanding of the basic **pattern** of the Christian life: Christians follow Christ which means that there will be experiences of suffering and the cross before experiences of resurrection and life.

In April 2012, Angus suffered a serious cardiac arrest, and his life appeared to hang in the balance. Yet it underlined very personally the pattern of Christian living: that the cross is followed by resurrection and that we should not be surprised when in some small way we experience suffering now as an indicator that we are on the right route to glorious resurrection.

Angus' final thought concerned the Lord's sustaining **power**, day by day, month by month, year by year. The text for his ordination service was Jehoshaphat's prayer in 2 Chronicles 20: 12 "For we have no power...we don't know what to do, but our eyes are on You." And so he said time and again he had felt weak and lacking in wisdom. Yet time and again, in ways not always clear or obvious, the Lord had sustained and provided.

He concluded: I am sure that over the last 37 years there have been plenty of substandard sermons and unwise decisions, but as I look back my abiding memory is the way the Lord has helped me through my weakness, proving his words in 2 Corinthians 12:9, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." What a privilege to serve Christ! What a privilege to follow Christ. What a privilege to be used by Christ despite all our weaknesses.

Privilege, pattern, power: we trust that this will be Pete's experience too.


What's On lists future events in chronological order. Many entries have a link to further information.

Then click on the walk number to call it up. The first few paragraphs will describe distance, terrain and opportunities for refreshment. When you find a walk you like, print it to take with you. [Control, P] is a useful shortcut to start printing.

Feedback is a way of telling us of changes or something we have missed – perhaps a pub closure, bus route change, additional activity for What's On, or website links or phone numbers that no longer work.

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

A big thank you to the volunteers who have dealt with the Himalayan Balsam at Aubrey Buxton once again this year. Over four work party sessions they have pulled up this invasive species so that it doesn't spread and take over large areas of the reserve. This frequently involves working deep in amongst the nettles, thistles and brambles. We rely heavily on the volunteer group to maintain the nine Essex Wildlife Trust reserves in the Uttlesford area. As mentioned previously, we will be closing the southern entrance to the reserve from the beginning of September. We will reposition and improve some of the paths. Every winter the paths deteriorate badly and the mud forces people to walk further up the slope damaging our meadow areas. We will be receiving tenders from contractors for the laying of paths in some of the wettest areas of the reserve which will hopefully improve the experience for visitors to the reserve in winter.

THE KELLERBY CODE BY JONNY SWEET

"He's found a life worth killing for. Edward is struggling to hold it together. Just about getting by in a world he cannot afford, scurrying after his friends, doing everything he can to prove his value. But not to worry: the attention of his beloved Stanza and the respite he finds in her ancestral home, Kellerby House, provide all the reward he needs. Until he realises that Stanza is in love with his best friend Robert, forcing Edward to re-evaluate what those closest to him are actually worth. No price is too high to stop the life he has strived for slipping from his grip. Especially when he won't be the one paying. Are there limits to what he will do for his friends? Are there limits to what he will do to them?" So says the blurb on the back of the book.

This was the choice of the book group this month.

The Amazon Al summarises: Customers enjoy the book's writing style and find it a great, engaging read that starts well. The plot development receives mixed reactions - while some praise its twisting nature, others find the storyline too far-fetched. Several customers note that the characters are unlikeable.

Of those of us who read the book this month, two loved it, one liked but not loved it, two didn't think much of it and one person totally disliked it.

The book is described as a cross between PG Wodehouse and Patricia Highsmith, with a nod to Saltburn. Wodehouse and Highsmith are skilled in both character and plot development and both have excellent command of language. This book is more about trying to impress than story-telling. Too many adjectives, metaphors, similes, descriptions that go nowhere, exaggerations and caricatures. This book was recommended by the BBC's 'Between the covers' programme. Apparently, *Richard Osman* declared it to be 'Magnificent, a major new talent.' Perhaps he didn't read it?

It concerns Edward, who is in love with Stanza and considers himself her best friend. He is a social misfit and is desperate to be liked and included by the middle upper class. He is devastated when he realises Stanza is in love with Robert, who is a pretentious theatre director who uses Edward to do his errands. Edward convinces himself Robert needs him and realising this is not the case, fuels his jealousy and, frankly, decreases his hold on his mental health, which wasn't great to start with—imaginary friends, obsessive cleaning, excessive exercising. Things descend further (if possible) when Robert reveals he is being blackmailed due to a violent incident in his past. The plot then turns into a farfetched farce with class shenanigans, stereotype villains, faked robbery, murder, incompetent police, body disposal, midnight horse ride (really), a suicidal rejected ex of Robert—and an unfortunate but obviously sign-posted purchase of a signet ring! Oh no—what could that possibly mean?

COOKERY CORNER

Here is a recipe for the best-ever chocolate brownies. These brownies contain no flour and are great for anyone with a gluten intolerance. This quick and simple recipe was given to me by William Coleby a long time ago. Cheers Will!



FLOURLESS CHOCOLATE BROWNIES

200g Plain Chocolate

250g Butter

2 Teaspoons Vanilla Extract

200g Caster Sugar

3 Eggs

150g Ground Almonds

100g Milk Chocolate Chips

Preheat the oven to 170°C/150° fan/gas mark 3. Melt the chocolate and butter gently over a low heat in a large saucepan.

Take the saucepan off the heat, mix in the vanilla extract and caster sugar, and let it cool a little.

Beat the eggs and add them to the saucepan along with the ground almonds. Turn the mixture into a 24cm square baking tin lined with greaseproof paper. Sprinkle the milk chocolate chips over the top of the mixture.

Bake in the oven for 25 minutes, by which time the top will have set but the mixture will still be gooey. Once cooled, take out of the baking tin and cut into 16 squares. Carefully take the squares off the greaseproof paper and place in a sealed container.

CHEF'S RECOMMENDATIONS: I use Cook's Belgian Dark Chocolate, which comes in a 200g bar. If you can't find milk chocolate chips for the topping, shave off or grate from a Cook's Milk Chocolate bar, leaving the remaining half for next time!

Provide nectar for insects this autumn by adding sedums and asters.
